SUMMARY

The Oroville Arts Commission will receive public art ideas for future Beautification Notice of Funds Available (NOFA)

DISCUSSION

Staff released a two week public call for art ideas on January 9, 2023 the attached ideas were received by the close date of January 24, 2023. This was posted and boosted on the City social media, as well as City website and local Mercury Register.

If the Committee selects a project, staff is suggesting a 2023 Beautification Notice of Funds Available (NOFA) in the amount of \$40,000. With several upcoming construction projects staff expects an increase in the Art in Public Places fund. Until that time, the balance of Art in Public Places funding will be used for the Table Mountain Blvd. Art Wall allocation.

If the Committee decides on a project a NOFA will be posed for 30-days and all qualifying submissions will be reviewed and selected by the Oroville Arts Commission and taken to City Council for final approval.

Hi Jordan,

My name is Inkpa Manui and I was sent your call for Art Ideas by a community member and was immediately interested.

I am an Indigenous community based artist working nationally in public artworks. These artworks are often done through sculpture and murals with a special interest in local history.

Working in this field and managing public art projects is what I have found are the benefits of public art made through community based art techniques I have developed.

- 1. Building community cohesion: Community-based art projects can bring people together and foster a sense of belonging and shared identity within a community.
- 2. Promoting social and cultural understanding: By providing a platform for different members of a community to express themselves and share their perspectives, community-based art can help to promote understanding and tolerance among different groups.
- 3. Revitalizing public spaces: Community-based art can help to transform neglected or underutilized public spaces into vibrant and engaging places that people want to visit and spend time in.
- 4. Empowering communities: Community-based art projects can give voice to community members and provide them with an opportunity to take ownership of their environment and shape their own narratives.
- 5. Cultural preservation: Community-based art can be used to commemorate and preserve cultural heritage and traditions.

Overall, community-based art can play an important role in promoting social and cultural understanding, addressing important issues, and building stronger and more vibrant communities.

In Murals I invite the community to meet and share stories that are important to the local history and landscape and work together to create a mural that adds value to its surroundings, activates and beautifies the downtown area, and is informative to visitors. In this work community members are also invited to help paint elements of the mural.

In public sculptures I invite community members to explore stories and experiences integral to living in their community. I utilize the information to design large scale sculptures that create a place and space for community members together and learn. I often use local natural materials such as stone and wood to create the sculpture.

Maybe, these beautiful artistic labels need to be on display on any city approved buildings planned to be built on these parcels. If not a community garden with large garden art sculptures or an agricultural sculpture that marks and acknowledges this property as the historic agricultural landmark that it is. Here's the back story on that property! These parcels at 18th and Feather Ave were farmed since the 1800s and have type 2 soil. Americo had a beautiful home, ranch and winery located on Feather Ave. in Oroville, California. I believe it may have been the home of his father in law Joseph. Many of his wine labels still exist today. As you can tell from the photo he grew a wide variety of fruits and vegetables. [https://www.findagrave.com/.../americo_giovanni_-

Americo Ghianda, 58, largest individual orange grower and packer in the Oroville district, and widely known fruit man Mr. Ghianda operated approximately 100 acres of land. He was well known as a fig grower and owned a large grape acreage.

He also was interested in olive production and was a director of the Oroville Olive Growers Association.

Before he constructed his own packing plant he was a Director of the Butte County Citrus Association. Previous to the general freeze he shipped as many as 20 carloads of oranges annually from his place.

GREW SATSUMAS

He was widely known for his production of Satsuma oranges and at one time shipped them extensively to the Hawaiian Islands. He also handled satsumas for other growers in this district.

Mr. Ghianda was born in Italy Dec. 2, 1879. At the age of 14 he came alone to America to work for an uncle who operated a fruit store in Sacramento.

His connection with the fruit industry, on which he was regarded as an authority, dated from that time.

HIS CAREER

For five years he remained in the Sacramento store, then he accepted a position with Mike Belluomini in a San Francisco fruit market. After a few years he became Belluominis partner in the Roma Market at Hayes and Franklin streets. The market was destroyed in the earthquake and fire in 1906. Afterward Mr. Ghianda became associated with A. Puccinelli in another market at Hayes and Fillmore streets.

Mr. Ghianda came to Oroville in 1915. For two years the family lived at Pomona and Third avenues then he purchased the Vince Dal Parto orange grove in Thermalito on Feather River avenue. A year or two afterwards he bought the Hatfield place which extends to 18th street on the south side of Feather River avenue.

BUILT OWN PACKING HOUSE

He constructed his own packing house shortly after coming to Thermalito. He handled a large tonnage of dried figs, besides packing oranges.

His home was in Oroville and later Thermalito at all times after he came here in 1915 with the exception of nine months in 1933 when he operated the fruit department in the Standard Market on clement street in San Francisco.

In 1935 he established A. Ghianda Winery. His long familiarity with the fruit industry, both wholesale and retail, made him one of the best informed growers in the area.

GREW FINE FIGS


Figs grown on his property won numerous awards at state fair exhibits, while oranges and dried figs from his place won prizes in the orange and olive exposition held here until a few years ago.

Mr. Ghianda was a member of the Thermalito Farm Center.

He is survived by his wife, Mrs. Delia Ghianda, and by two sons and two daughters, Rudolph Ghianda a mail carrier in Richmond; and Alma, Norma and Joseph Ghianda, all of Thermalito. Also surviving are two sisters in



Italy.

Hi Jordan,

I read the article in the Mercury Register seeking input for public art in Oroville. I would love to get involved and I have some suggestions.

Every year hundreds of pieces are created for Burning Man. After the event many of them are boxed-up and sit unused, and are available for installation, often very inexpensively. I actually made a documentary about art from Burning Man art finding homes in civic settings. It is 41 minutes long, You can view it here, when your schedule permits: https://www.youtube.com/watch?v=k4uxzj48zCw

In a conservative community such as Oroville, proposing art from Burning Man might be a difficult sell. However there are several Burning Man attendees (Burners) and other art aficionados and throughout Northern California who would travel here to see such pieces on display. The city of Arlington, Texas installed a sculpture from Burning Man, on land owned by a local Baptist church. It has been a boon in attracting people to their historic downtown district. This is covered in-depth in my documentary.

About me: I am a new homeowner in Oroville. I am the videographer and photographer in the Marketing Department of a regional real estate company, with an office in downtown Oroville. I am invested in this city, and am excited to get involved in revitalizing the community. I have experience in this arena, and a network of people willing to assist.

Maybe with rock walls designed like the ones out when coming in to Chico that were made during the "gold days" ... and also small brick walls creating beautiful peaceful walkway mazes (that can be painted showing our history!) Local trees... sidewalks lined with native flowers.

This can be called the "Walkway of the history of Oroville" using sculptures, flowers and wall art! This will also get people from the freeway to drive further down town when they get off the exit in Oroville
