# Role of Human Rights Commission Council Work Session

September 8, 2020



## Human Rights Commission

- Per Iowa Code any city with a population of 29,000 or greater shall maintain a local civil rights commission
- There currently are 9 members on the board per City ordinance
- A staff person is assigned to help the Commission (take minutes, post agendas, etc)
- Staff person spends about 3 hours a week on HRC activity or 150 hours in a year
  - working with the Commission and helping claimants complete forms



## Human Rights Commission - Purpose

- The purpose of the commission is outlined in 12-33 of City Code of Ordinances.
  - Seek to conciliate complaints, hold hearings when necessary.....
  - Investigate and study the existence, character, causes, extent and effects of discrimination in public accommodations, employment, ....
  - Investigate possible areas of discrimination in city government.



## Human Rights Commission - Purpose

- Formulate and carry out educational program designed to prevent and eliminate discrimination.
- Adopt such rules & regulations as may be necessary to govern, expedite and effectuate the provisions of this article
- Render to the city council, not less then once a year, a written report of activities and recommendations



## Human Rights Commission - Purpose

- Cooperate with federal, state, regional, county and city agencies..... in developing courses of education.....
- Make recommendations to the mayor and council for such further ordinances concerning discrimination as it may deem necessary and desirable



## Investigations

- Cedar Falls is allowed by state law to refer complaints to the lowa Civil Rights Commission (ICRC) – annual agreement
- Estimate 5-10 calls a year that are referred to the state
- Historically we have had on average 1 formal complaint a year that our local commission investigates



## Investigations

- Benefits of sending investigations to the State:
  - More cost effective the State does not charge us anything
  - Professional staff investigating the complaints
  - State has better perspective because do several complaints
  - Difficult for local commission or staff to keep trained and up to date if only do one complaint a year
  - Does not put City in a conflict of interest situation



## Other Communities

- Reached out to other cities comparable in size:
- Ames, Ankeny, Mason City, & Urbandale Refer complaints to ICRC
- Bettendorf Cross files with ICRC, private attorney retained to investigate locally
- Dubuque paid staff investigate complaints or refer to ICRC
- Marion partners with Cedar Rapids for intakes and investigations



## Other Communities

 Larger cities - Waterloo, Cedar Rapids, Davenport, & Des Moines – paid staff in those cities investigates complaints, not commissioners

 No other city has the commissioners investigate the complaints



### Recommendation

- Human Rights Commission Focus on outreach, education, and advocacy.
- Revise the city ordinance to eliminate investigating complaints and refer all to the State ICRC
  - More consistency with investigations
  - Professional trained staff at the State performing investigations
  - More cost effective
  - Does not put the City in an undesirable position
