



SUBJECT: Authorize the City Manager to execute Grapefruit Blvd Urban Greening and

Connectivity Project Change Order #10, City Project ST-123.

STAFF RECOMMENDATION:

Authorize the City Manager to execute on behalf of the City Council of the City of Coachella, Change Order #10 in an amount \$331,803.44 by and between the City of Coachella and C.S. Legacy to install a signalized intersection at 6th Street and Grapefruit Blvd for the Grapefruit Blvd Urban Greening and Connectivity Project, City Project ST-123.

BACKGROUND:

On November 2, 2018 the City of Coachella received a \$3.19 million grant from the California Natural Resources Agency (CNRA) for the Grapefruit Urban Greening and Connectivity Project. In addition, in October, 2020, the City entered into an Infill Infrastructure Grant Disbursement Agreement that included \$250,000 in funding towards a signalized traffic signal located at the intersection of 6th Street and Grapefruit Blvd,

On November 18, 2020 City Council authorized the City Manager to execute a professional services agreement with NV5 to provide Engineering Services for the Design of a signalized intersection at 6th Street and Grapefruit Blvd. The sum of the approved and executed NV5 design contract is for \$21,315, leaving a balance of \$228,685 to be applied towards construction of the traffic signal.

On November 18, 2020 the City of Coachella awarded a construction contract with C.S. Legacy to construct a pleasant, safe, artful walkable roadway in the Pueblo Viejo Downtown District on Grapefruit Blvd. This project is currently under construction.

DISCUSSION/ANALYSIS:

The signalized intersection at 6th Street and Grapefruit Blvd has been identified as warranted through traffic studies. This traffic signal will mitigate increased traffic due to the Pueblo Viejo Villas, currently under construction, and provide traffic calming along Grapefruit Blvd. The Engineering department recommends installing the traffic signal with the current Urban Greening Project to prevent the removal and replacement of improvements currently under construction.

FISCAL IMPACT:

The total cost for the Change Order is \$331,803. The funding sources for this change order are Fund 152 (Grants) provided by the IIG Grant in an amount of \$228,685 and Fund 127 (Street and Transportation DIF) in an amount of \$103,118.44 for a total amount of \$331,803.44.

STAFF RECOMMENDATION:

City Council adopt Resolution No. 2021-28 receiving and filing the City's AB 1600 Annual Report pursuant to California Government Code Sections 66000-66008.

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

Government Code Section 66006 requires each local agency that imposes development impact fees to prepare an annual report for these specific fees. The fees, when collected, must be segregated from the General Fund and accounted for separately from other impact fees. This is done by placing the fees into their own accounting 'fund' and only expending the monies for the purposes for which the fees were collected. The attached report, for the fiscal year ending June 30, 2019, includes the beginning (prior year ending) and current year ending balances for each fund as well as any changes during the year. The report also provides the amount of fees collected, interest, other income, and allowable expenditures for each fund.

BACKGROUND:

The City imposes fees on developer projects for the purpose of mitigating the impacts caused by new development. The City's developer impact fees are collected to defray all or at least a portion of the cost of public facilities, recreation facilities, parks, infrastructure (streets, signals, drainage, etc.) and public safety facilities. The purpose for which many of these developer fees are imposed supports not only past impacts to the City but future impacts that are also consistent with several strategic results areas including: Land Use, Open Space; Parks and Recreation; Public Safety and Emergency Services and Transportation.

FISCAL IMPACT:

Receive and File. There is no fiscal impact as a result of this action.

STAFF RECOMMENDATION:

Staff recommends that the City Council consider approving a Community Based Grant to the Riverside County Fire Explorers (Coachella Post) in the amount of \$1,000 to assist with training program costs.

BACKGROUND:

The Community Based Grant Program was established in 2010 and allows the City of Coachella to offer financial assistance to local nonprofit organizations, youth-serving organizations, and other community-based organizations that provide essential services, programs and activities to residents in Coachella. Applicant organizations are only eligible to submit one application for consideration each fiscal year and must be legally established with non-profit or tax-exempt status, be based in the Coachella Valley, or provide direct service to Coachella residents. Approval of grant funds does not constitute a precedent for grant allocations in subsequent years. All CBG grants are reimbursement grants to ensure that applicants are meeting their stated goals. The FY 20-21 budget included an allocation of \$15,000 for the Community Based Grant Program.

DISCUSSION/ANALYSIS:

The Riverside County Fire Department Fire Explorer Program is a youth program organized through 'Learning For Life'. The program is designed to allow male and female youth, between the ages of 14 and 20, to explore a career in the fire service. The explorers receive training similar to volunteer and professional firefighters, including basic fire chemistry, hose evolutions, ladder operations, medical and CPR training, hazardous materials, and auto extrication.

(1st Reading)

STAFF RECOMMENDATION:

Staff recommends that the City Council introduce for first reading, by title only, Ordinance No. 1179 to Amend Section 16.12.110, Subsection B, of the Coachella Municipal Code to Require that Subdividers Post On-Site Notices of Public Hearing and to Provide Uniform Posting Standards.

BACKGROUND:

Section 16.12.110 of the Coachella Municipal Code requires that all tentative subdivision maps be reviewed by both the planning commission and city council at a duly noticed public hearing. Such notices are to be mailed and posted on the subject property. Subsection B of section 16.12.110 requires an agent of the city planner to post notices of the public hearing not less than 10 days before the public hearing. Subsection B requires at least three notices to be posted, not more than 300 feet apart, in front of each block or part of a block effected by the public hearing.

DISCUSSION:

Section 16.12.110, subsection B, currently places the posting requirement on an agent of the city planner. Section 16.12.110, subsection B, as written, also provides no standards as to the contents of the notices, the sizing of the notices, or the manner of posting. The proposed amendments would shift the on-site posting requirement to the subdivider and provide uniform, detailed, and clear posting requirements, including the manner of posting, content of notices, duration of notices, a proof of posting requirement, and a notice that failure to post notices or comply with the subsection may result in the delay of the public hearing. The amendments provide flexibility for the planning director to deviate from the posting requirements and set other requirements, such as font size, style, and notice color, in order to meet the intent of the notice provision. Finally, the amendment clarifies that the subdivider is responsible for the costs associated with the sign posting requirements.

ALTERNATIVES:

- Introduce for first reading, by title only, the attached Ordinance No. 1179 Amending Section 16.12.110, Subsection B, of the Municipal Code to Require that Subdividers Post On-Site Notices of Public Hearing and to Provide Uniform Posting Standards.
- 2) Introduce for first reading, by title only, the attached Ordinance No. 1179, with modifications.
- 3) Continue this item and provide staff with direction.

FISCAL IMPACTS

There are no fiscal impacts associated with amending the posting requirements for subdivision projects, in that the Ordinance merely changes the method and responsibility for posting public notices.

ORDINANCE NO. 1179

AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF COACHELLA, CALIFORNIA, AMENDING SECTION 16.12.110, SUBSECTION B, OF THE CIOACHELLA MUNICIPAL CODE TO REQUIRE THAT SUBDIVIDERS POST ON-SITE NOTICES OF PUBLIC HEARING AND TO PROVIDE UNIFORM POSTING STANDARDS. CITY-INITIATED (1ST Reading)

THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF COACHELLA DOES ORDAIN AS FOLLOWS:

SECTION 1. Amendment to Coachella Municipal Code. Subsection B of Section 16.12.110 of the Coachella Municipal Code entitled "*Public Hearing*." is hereby deleted in its entirety and re-written to read as follows:

- "B. On-Site Posting Requirements. At least ten (10) days before the public hearing, the subdivider shall cause at least three notices to be posted, not more than three hundred (300) feet apart, in front of each block or part of a block affected by the public hearing. The notices shall be posted as follows:
 - 1. Manner of Posting. The notices may be posted in the form of posters or signs generally measuring three feet by four feet or in such other dimensions as may be necessary to effectuate the posting. The notices shall be posted six feet in height from ground level. If the property is surrounded by fences, walls, or hedges at or near the street property line, additional height may be provided as necessary to ensure visibility of the sign from the public right-of-way. The notices may be posted on support elements made of wood posts, on existing utility poles or street lights using clear tape, or, when there is an existing structure on the property, in a window, on a fence, or on a building wall. In all cases, the notices shall be legible from the nearest public right-of-way; provided, however, that the notices shall not be illuminated.
 - 2. Content. The notices shall contain, at a minimum, the date, time, and place of the public hearing, the identity of the hearing body, a general explanation of the matter to be considered, and a general description of the location of the subject real property. The director of planning may prescribe a standardized notice form or template as may effectuate public notice pursuant to this section in accordance with law.
 - 3. Duration. The notices shall remain in place until the city council has approved, conditionally approved, or disapproved the tentative map in accordance with section 16.12.100. The notices shall be removed within ten (10) days of such action by the city council.

- 4. Proof of posting. The subdivider shall submit proof of posting to the director of planning or his or her designee in the form of a signed affidavit, indicating the placement locations of the notices, the number of notices posted, and the date the notices were posted. The subdivider shall include photographs evidencing posting of the notices upon request.
- 5. Deviations. The director of planning may approve deviations to these requirements and require such other specifications, such as size, style, and color of the lettering or notice, in order to meet the intent of this section.
- 6. Failure to Post. Failure to post notices or otherwise comply with these standards and requirements may result in the delay of the required public hearing.
- 7. Costs. The subdivider shall bear the costs of complying with this subsection."

SECTION 2. CEQA. The City Council finds that this Ordinance is not subject to the California Environmental Quality Act ("CEQA") pursuant to Sections 15060(c)(2) (the activity will not result in a direct or reasonably foreseeable indirect physical change in the environment) and 15060(c)(3) (the activity is not a project as defined in Section 15378) of the CEQA Guidelines, California Code of Regulations Title 14, Chapter 3, because it has no potential for resulting in physical change to the environment, directly or indirectly.

SECTION 3. Effective Date. This Ordinance shall take effect thirty (30) days after its adoption.

SECTION 5. Severability. If any section, subsection, subdivision, paragraph, sentence, clause or phrase of this Ordinance, or any part thereof is for any reason held to be unconstitutional, such decision shall not affect the validity of the remaining portion of this Ordinance or any part thereof. The City Council hereby declares that it would have passed each section, subsection, subdivision, paragraph, sentence, clause or phrase thereof, irrespective of the fact that any one or more section, subsection, subdivision, paragraph, sentence, clause or phrase be declared unconstitutional.

SECTION 4. Certification. The City Clerk shall certify the passage of this Ordinance and shall cause the same to be entered in the book of original ordinances of said City; shall make a minute passage and adoption thereof in the records of the meeting at which time the same is passed and adopted; and shall, within fifteen (15) days after the passage and adoption thereof, cause the same to be published as required by law, in a local newspaper of general circulation and which is hereby designated for that purpose.

Regarding the Public Arts Fee, Fund and Program (*First Reading*)

RECOMMENDATION:

Pursuant to the request of Council Member Delgado and Council Member Beaman Jacinto: Introduce and waive first reading of Ordinance No. 1180 an Ordinance of the City Council of the City of Coachella, California, Amending Coachella Municipal Code Chapter 4.46 Regarding the Public Arts Fee, Fund and Program.

BACKGROUND:

City adopted Coachella Municipal Code Chapter 4.46 *Public Arts Fee, Fund and Program* in 2012 to promote the general welfare through balancing the community's physical growth with revitalization and its cultural and artistic resources.

DISCUSSION/ANALYSIS:

The proposed Ordinance revises Coachella Municipal Code Chapter 4.46 entitled *Public Arts Fee, Fund and Program* as detailed below.

1. Public Arts Fund Grants.

The proposed Ordinance includes more detailed information on how public arts fund grants are awarded. It revises section 4.46.020, subsection 'C', as noted below:

- Public arts fund grants shall be awarded directly to artists, subject to the terms of the Chapter. Third party applicants are not eligible for public arts fund grants.
- Non-United States citizen artist applicants may apply for public arts fund grants.
- Each grant shall not exceed ten thousand dollars (\$10,000) per year, which may be used to fund one or more art installations by the same artist. Applicants requesting in excess of ten

thousand dollars (\$10,000) per year may submit their proposal for review by both the commission and city council.

- To apply for a grant, applicants must submit invoices including a proposed artist fee and estimates for maintenance and other costs.
- Applicants are not eligible to receive reimbursements from the public arts fund for artwork installed in the City without prior approval by the commission.
- Requires appraisal of the artwork.

2. Selection of Artwork by Direct Commission Eliminated.

The proposed Ordinance revises section 4.46.090 to eliminate the Direct Commission option for selection of artwork.

3. Exclusion of Privately Owned Residences.

The proposed Ordinance revises section 4.46.110 to exclude approving art to be install on privately owned residences.

ORDINANCE NO. 1180

AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF COACHELLA, CALIFORNIA, AMENDING COACHELLA MUNICIPAL CODE CHAPTER 4.46 REGARDING THE PUBLIC ARTS FEE, FUND AND PROGRAM

WHEREAS, California Government Code Section 15813 recognizes that the City of Coachella has a responsibility to expand public experience with art; and

WHEREAS, the City adopted Coachella Municipal Code Chapter 4.46 Public Arts Fee, Fund and Program in 2012 to promote the general welfare through balancing the community's physical growth with revitalization and its cultural and artistic resources; and

WHEREAS, the City Council of the City of Coachella wishes to amend Coachella Municipal Code Chapter 4.46 to update and clarify public arts fund program provisions.

NOW, THEREFORE, THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF COACHELLA DOES ORDAIN AS FOLLOWS:

SECTION 1. Recitals. The City Council hereby finds and determines that the recitals set forth above are true and correct and are hereby incorporated and adopted as findings and determinations by the City Council as if fully set forth herein.

SECTION 2. Amendment to Coachella Municipal Code. Coachella Municipal Code Section 4.46.040 *Public arts fund, subdivision (C)* of Chapter 4.46 *Public Arts Fee, Fund and Program* is hereby amended as follows:

"4.46.040 - Public arts fund.

. . .

C. Use of Fund. The funds shall be used solely for the acquisition, installation, improvement, maintenance and insurance of artwork to be displayed in the city and the administration of the public arts program. Public arts fund grants shall be awarded directly to artists, subject to the terms of this Chapter. Third party applicants are not eligible for public arts fund grants. Non-United States citizen artist applicants may apply for public arts fund grants. Each grant shall not exceed ten thousand dollars (\$10,000) per year, which may be used to fund one or more art installations by the same artist. Applicants requesting in excess of ten thousand dollars (\$10,000) per year may submit their proposal for review by both the commission and city council. To apply for a grant, applicants must submit invoices including a proposed artist fee and estimates for maintenance and other costs. Applicants are not eligible to receive reimbursements from the public arts fund for artwork installed in the City without prior approval by the commission. Artwork shall be appraised pursuant to standards developed by the City.

...'

SECTION 3. Amendment to Coachella Municipal Code. Coachella Municipal Code Section 4.46.090 *Criteria for artwork selection, subdivision (B)* of Chapter 4.46 *Public Arts Fee, Fund and Program* is hereby amended as follows:

"4.46.090 - Criteria for artwork selection.

...

- B. The following methods may be used to select artwork:
- (1) Direct Purchase. A completed work of art may be purchased for a specific project or location;
- (2) Direct Commission. An artist may be chosen directly by an artist selection jury and paid to submit a proposal. Artists will be selected on the basis of their qualifications for a particular project and its probability of successful completion;
- (3) (2) Limited Competition. A small number of artists may be invited and paid by the selection jury to submit proposals;
- (4) (3) Open Competition. Any artist may apply subject to limitations established by the selection jury. No proposal fee is paid to artists; however, a small number of finalists may be selected to submit details, models or plans for which a fee is paid.

...;

SECTION 4. Amendment to Coachella Municipal Code. Coachella Municipal Code Section 4.46.110 *Application procedures for placement of artwork on private property* of Chapter 4.46 *Public Arts Fee, Fund and Program* is hereby amended as follows:

"4.46.110 - Application procedures for placement of artwork on private property.

Any artwork being placed on private property as part of the city's public arts program shall be a one-of-a-kind piece. The city encourages applicants to submit an application prior to the development of the architect's schematic design. <u>Applications for artwork to be installed on privately owned residences will not be accepted.</u> The requirements and procedures for the processing of a public arts program proposal application (an "arts application") shall be as follows:

- (1) Upon submission of a development project application for a project subject to the requirements of this chapter, the department of planning and zoning shall provide to the project applicant a copy of this chapter, an arts application form and the name and phone number of the city's arts administrator.
- (2) The project applicant shall submit to the arts administrator, the completed arts application form describing the manner in which the project applicant intends to comply with this chapter.

- (3) The arts application shall include:
- (a) Preliminary sketches, photographs, or other documentation of sufficient descriptive clarity to indicate the nature of the proposed artwork;
- (b) An appraisal or other evidence of the value of the proposed artwork, including acquisition and installation costs;
- (c) Preliminary plans containing such detailed information as may be required by the commission to adequately evaluate the location of the artwork in relation to the proposed development, and its compatibility with the proposed development (the artwork shall be an integral part of the landscaping and/or architecture of the building), including compatibility with the character of adjacent conforming developed parcels and existing neighborhoods if necessary to evaluate the proposal;
- (d) A narrative statement to demonstrate that the artwork will be displayed in an area open and freely available to the general public, or otherwise provide public accessibility in an equivalent manner based on the characteristics of the artwork or its placement on the site; and(e)Maintenance factors required to insure its permanence.

SECTION 5. Severability. If any section, subsection, subdivision, paragraph, sentence, clause or phrase of this Ordinance, or any part thereof, is for any reason held to be unconstitutional, such decision shall not affect the validity of the remaining portion of this Ordinance or any part thereof. The City Council hereby declares that it would have passed each section, subsection, subdivision, paragraph, sentence, clause or phrase thereof, irrespective of the fact that any one or more section, subsection, subdivision, paragraph, sentence, clause or phrase be declared unconstitutional. If for any reason any portion of this Ordinance is found to be invalid by a court of competent jurisdiction, the balance of this Ordinance shall not be affected.

SECTION 6. Certification and Publication. The City Clerk of the City of Coachella shall certify to the adoption of this Ordinance and cause publication to occur in a newspaper of general circulation and published and circulated in the City in a manner permitted under California Government Code Section 36933.

SECTION 7. CEQA. The City Council finds that adoption of this Ordinance is not a "project," as defined in the California Environmental Quality Act because it does not have a potential for resulting in either a direct physical change in the environment or a reasonably foreseeable indirect physical change in the environment and concerns general policy and procedure making.

SUBJECT: Resolution No. 2021-26, Denouncing Violent Crimes Against Asians, Asian

Americans, and Pacific Islanders Across the Country

RECOMMENDATION:

Adopt a resolution entitled "Resolution of the City Council of the City of Coachella, California, Denouncing Violent Crimes Against Asians, Asian Americans, and Pacific Islanders Across the Country."

BACKGROUND:

At its Regular Meeting on March 8, 2021, the Human Rights Commission denounced the alarming increase in violent crimes against Asian, Asian American and Pacific Islanders (AAPI) across the country. Anti-Asian sentiment is a long-standing part of American history including the Chinese Exclusion Act of 1882, and Internment of Japanese American people in the United States. The Human Rights Commission discussed how this increase of violent crimes against the AAPI Community across the country, and these expressions of hate and prejudice, have no place in our society.

Three San Francisco Bay organizations created StopAAPlHate.org to serve as an aggregator of anti-Asian hate crimes incidents. The coalition has reported the following information:

- Hate crimes targeting the AAPI Community increased nearly 150 percent in major cities.
- Businesses are the primary site of discrimination (35.4%), followed by public streets (25.3%), and public parks (9.8%). Online incidents account for 10.8% of the total incidents.
- 3 in 10 Asian Americans (31%) report having experienced racial slurs or racist jokes since the beginning of the pandemic.
- Chinese are the largest ethnic group (42.2%) that report experiencing hate, followed by Koreans (14.8%), Vietnamese (8.5%), and Filipinos (7.9%).
- States with high Asian American populations report the most incidents. CA (43.8%); NY (13.0%); WA (4.1%); and IL (2.8%) have the highest rates
- There has been a documented pattern of recent attacks against the AAPI Community.

• They have received nearly 3,800 reports of hate incidents across the country since March 2020

Recent cases of violence against the AAPI Community include the deadly assault on Vicha Ratanapakdee who was brutally attacked while on his morning walk in San Francisco and died from a resulting brain hemorrhage, and the three deadly shootings which targeted Asian American businesses in Atlanta, Georgia on March 17, 2021, resulting in the deaths of eight people.

In recent years, Coachella experienced 4 hate crimes and/or incidences.

The Human Rights Commission expressed that it stands in solidarity with the entire AAPI Community in condemning those who commit anti-Asian violence. They call on the community to be vigilant, watch out for your neighbors, and together speak out against racism and hate driven violence. The attached resolution denouncing such actions has been prepared for City Council consideration.

DISCUSSION:

The proposed resolution proclaims that the City of Coachella:

- Will not tolerate xenophobia and condemns the rise in hate crimes, attacks, and attitudes against Asian American and Pacific Islander communities;
- Urges residents to join in calling attention to these harms and denouncing hate to help keep us all safe during this pandemic and beyond;
- Will commit to protecting residents who are targets of hate by providing tools and resources for reporting such crimes;
- Will prosecute and curb hate acts related to COVID-19 in partnership with nonprofit organizations, the Riverside County District Attorney's Office, and the City's Police Department/Riverside County Sheriff's Department.

RESOLUTION NO. 2021-26

A RESOLUTION OF THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF COACHELLA, CALIFORNIA, DENOUNCING VIOLENT CRIMES AGAINST ASIANS, ASIAN AMERICANS, AND PACIFIC ISLANDERS ACROSS THE COUNTRY.

- **WHEREAS**, the COVID-19 pandemic is a public health emergency that has caused devastating effects throughout the world and across political and social boundaries, and was not created or caused by any race, nationality, or ethnicity;
- **WHEREAS**, the World Health Organization recognizes that public health emergencies often lead to stigma, demonization, discrimination and scapegoating towards certain communities and groups;
- **WHEREAS**, anti-Asian sentiment has been a long-standing part of American history from People v. Hall and the Chinese Exclusion Act of 1882 to the 1942 executive order that led to internment camps for Japanese people in the United States;
- **WHEREAS**, hate crimes targeting Asian Americans and Pacific Islanders ("AAPI") increased by nearly 150 percent in major cities despite decreasing overall in the last year and 44 percent of the incidents reported to Stop AAPI Hate are from California;
- **WHEREAS**, Asian Americans and Pacific Islanders have been facing bias incidents such as verbal harassment, physical assault, job discrimination, and destruction of their businesses as they are being blamed for the outbreak and spread of COVID-19, perpetuated by rhetoric stemming from federal leadership in 2020;
- **WHEREAS**, 3 deadly shootings targeted Asian American businesses in Atlanta, Georgia on March 17, 2021;
- **WHEREAS**, violent attacks have particularly intensified against Asian senior citizens and such xenophobia and discrimination can have a range of adverse physical and mental health consequences for stigmatized groups and their communities;
- **WHEREAS**, the City of Coachella wishes promote and protect the diversity of our community and to improve human relations through education and community awareness.

NOW, THEREFORE, THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF COACHELLA DOES HEREBY RESOLVE AS FOLLOWS:

- **SECTION 1.** That the City will not tolerate xenophobia and condemns the rise in hate crimes, attacks, and attitudes against Asian American and Pacific Islander communities;
- **SECTION 2.** That the City urges residents to join in calling attention to these harms and denouncing hate to help keep us all safe during this pandemic and beyond;

SECTION 3. That the City will commit to protecting residents who are targets of hate by providing tools and resources for reporting such crimes;

<u>SECTION 4.</u> That the City will prosecute and curb hate acts related to COVID-19 in partnership with nonprofit organizations, the Riverside County District Attorney's Office, and the City's Police Department/Riverside County Sheriff's Department.

STAFF RECOMMENDATION:

Staff recommends that the City Council introduce for first reading, by title only, Ordinance No. 1176 to Amend Sections 16.12.110 and 17.70.050 of the Municipal Code Regarding Notices of Public Hearing Related to Tentative Subdivision Maps and the Processing of Applications on Planning and Zoning Matters. City – Initiated. (*1st Reading*)

BACKGROUND:

Section 16.12.110 of the Coachella Municipal Code requires that all tentative subdivision maps be reviewed by both the planning commission and city council at a duly noticed public hearing. Such notices are to be mailed and posted on the subject property. Notice is mailed to the subdivider and all property owners within 300 feet of the exterior boundary of the subject property. Section 16.12.110, subdivision D, provides that any interested person may appear at the hearing and shall be heard.

Similarly, Section 17.70.50 provides for public hearings to receive original evidence or testimony in relation to applications to initiate consideration of planning and zoning matters. Subdivision F of Section 17.70.50 requires such a public hearing to be noticed. Among the parties to be notified are adjacent property owners of the subject property, owners of property within a 300 foot radius from the subject property, and other persons who have requested notice.

DISCUSSION:

Currently, the majority of public hearing notices required by Sections 16.12.110 and 17.70.50 are provided in English only. The proposed amendments to Sections 16.12.110 and 17.70.50 would require written public notices provided under those sections to be provided in both the English and Spanish languages or in such other language as may be required by law. The amendments also

include provisions upholding the validity of such notices should they happen to be provided in English only.

ALTERNATIVES:

- 1) Recommend approval of Ordinance No. 1176 as presented.
- 2) Recommend approval of Ordinance No. 1176 with amendments.
- 3) Recommend denial of Ordinance No. 1176.
- 4) Continue this item and provide staff with direction.

FISCAL IMPACTS

There will be a minor added cost to the Planning Division's "Advertising" budget in order to translate all public notices for planning application projects into Spanish and to advertise in local Spanish newspapers, as needed. This can be absorbed into the current staff workload without the need to amend the Department's operating budget.

AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF COACHELLA, CALIFORNIA, AMENDING SECTIONS 16.12.110 AND 17.70.050 OF THE MUNICIPAL CODE REGARDING NOTICES OF PUBLIC HEARING RELATED TO TENTATIVE SUBDIVISION MAPS AND THE PROCESSING OF APPLICATIONS ON PLANNING AND ZONING MATTERS. CITY-INITIATED. (1ST Reading)

THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF COACHELLA DOES ORDAIN AS FOLLOWS:

<u>SECTION 1.</u> Amendment to Coachella Municipal Code. Coachella Municipal Code Chapter 16.12 *Tentative Maps*, Section 6.12.110 is hereby amended as follows (deleted text in strikethrough, new text in **bold underline**):

"16.12.110 - Public hearing.

All tentative subdivision maps shall be reviewed by both the planning commission and the city council at duly noticed public hearings. Notice of public hearings shall be by both mailed notice and posting of the property. Such written notice shall be provided in English and Spanish, or in such other language as may be required by law. Failure to provide written notice in any language other than English shall not affect the validity of any notice provided hereunder.

A. Written notice shall be mailed to the subdivider and to the owners of all property within three hundred (300) feet of the exterior boundaries of the property involved at least ten (10) days prior to the date of the hearing. The last known name and address of each owner as shown on the records of the county assessor may be used for the notice.

.

D. Any interested person may appear at a hearing and shall be heard."

<u>SECTION 2.</u> Amendment to Coachella Municipal Code. Coachella Municipal Code Chapter 17.70 *Administration Generally*, Subsection F of Section 17.70.050 is hereby amended as follows (deleted text in strikethrough, new text in **bold underline**):

"17.70.050 - General rules for processing applications.

A. Initiation. Applications to initiate consideration of planning and zoning matters may be made by a variety of persons or agencies, such as owners, bona fide lessees, the city planning commission or the city council. The specific types of are listed under the applicable procedures.

.

F. Notification of Public Hearing. A public hearing shall require notification of the time, place and purpose of the hearing in one or more of the following ways <u>listed below</u> and as noted by reference under the specific procedure. Written notice provided in the ways listed below

shall be provided in English and Spanish, or in such other language as may be required by law. Failure to provide written notice in any language other than English shall not affect the validity of any notice provided hereunder.

1. Newspaper. by at least one publication in a newspaper of general circulation in the city not less than ten (10) days prior to the date of the hearing.

.

6. Notification of Subsequent Hearings. Notice of subsequent public hearings may be given at each preceding meeting, but additional written notice is not required."

SECTION 3. CEQA. The City Council finds that this Ordinance is not subject to the California Environmental Quality Act ("CEQA") pursuant to Sections 15060(c)(2) (the activity will not result in a direct or reasonable foreseeable indirect physical change in the environment) and 15060(c)(3) (the activity is not a project as defined in Section 15378) of the CEQA Guidelines, California Code of Regulations Title 14, Chapter 3, because it has no potential for resulting in physical change to the environment, directly or indirectly.

SECTION 4. Effective Date. This Ordinance shall take effect thirty (30) days after its adoption.

SECTION 5. Severability. If any section, subsection, subdivision, paragraph, sentence, clause or phrase of this Ordinance, or any part thereof is for any reason held to be unconstitutional, such decision shall not affect the validity of the remaining portion of this Ordinance or any part thereof. The City Council hereby declares that it would have passed each section, subsection, subdivision, paragraph, sentence, clause or phrase thereof, irrespective of the fact that any one or more section, subsection, subdivision, paragraph, sentence, clause or phrase be declared unconstitutional.

SECTION 6. Certification. The City Clerk shall certify the passage of this Ordinance and shall cause the same to be entered in the book of original ordinances of said City; shall make a minute passage and adoption thereof in the records of the meeting at which time the same is passed and adopted; and shall, within fifteen (15) days after the passage and adoption thereof, cause the same to be published as required by law, in a local newspaper of general circulation and which is hereby designated for that purpose.

SUBJECT: Coachella Canna Club Project

SPECIFICS: a) Resolution No. 2021-24 approving Conditional Use Permit No. 330 that

proposes to establish a 7170 square foot retail cannabis business and consumption lounge within the existing building located at 46156 Dillon Road; and Conditional Use Permit No. 331 that proposes to modify the interior of the existing building to create a commercial kitchen and take-out window with outside seating (Chick Next Door) located at 46156 Dillon

Road; and

b) Ordinance No. 1178 approving Change of Zone No. 20-04 that proposes to add the Retail Cannabis Overlay zone (R-C) to the existing C-G (General

Commercial) Zone on the project site.

STAFF RECOMMENDATION:

Staff recommends that the City Council continue the Coachella Canna Club project to the April 28, 2021 City Council meeting.

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY:

The Coachella Canna Club Project consists of two conditional use permits and a change of zone. The Project is proposing to convert the existing building located at 46-156 Dillon Road that, for the past 15 years, has been used for sexually-oriented businesses and a restaurant/nightclub into a retail cannabis business that includes two consumption lounges and a fast food commercial kitchen including a take-out window and outdoor seating area. The project is described in more detail as follows: Conditional Use Permit No. 330 proposes to establish a 7170 square foot retail cannabis business and consumption lounge; Conditional Use Permit No. 331 proposes to modify the interior of the existing building to create a take-out restaurant (Chick Next Door) along with outside seating; and Change of Zone 20-04 proposes to add the Retail Cannabis Overlay Zone (RC) to the property located at 46-156 Dillon Road.

The City Council considered the Coachella Canna Club Project at the March 24, 2021 City Council meeting and continued the item to the April 14, 2021 meeting. At the meeting, the Council directed

the Applicant to incorporate indoor seating for the Chick Next Door restaurant within the existing building.

Additionally, the City Council directed Staff to review City ordinance provisions regarding sexually-oriented businesses to determine where future businesses of this nature could locate if the existing building was converted into a retail cannabis business and consumption lounge.

As of this writing, the Applicant is still working on revising the plans to incorporate indoor dining into the building as directed by the City Council. Additionally, staff is working with the City Attorney's office to bring back recommendations on the City's sexually-oriented businesses ordinance. Therefore, Staff is therefore recommending that the public hearing on Conditional Use Permit 330, Conditional Use Permit 331 and Change of Zone 20-04 be continued to the April 28, 2021 City Council meeting.

City- Initiated Revocation.

STAFF RECOMMENDATION:

Staff recommends that the City Council continue the public hearing for Appeal of Planning Commission's Revocation of Conditional Use Permit (CUP 312) to the May 12, 2021 City Council Meeting.

BACKGROUND:

This item was continued from the March 10, 2021, January 27, 2021, December 9, 2020, October 14, 2020, September 9, 2020, July 7, 2020 and May 13, 2020 City Council meetings, pursuant to an executed Memorandum Of Understanding agreement (MOU) between the City of Coachella and Glenroy Coachella, LLC. The MOU allows for the interim curing of the CUP violations outlined in this staff report, in exchange for periodic payments of lost Transient Occupancy Tax (TOT) for the hotel resort, and subject to adherence by the developer to a performance schedule that would secure new financing and reactivation of construction activities, and completion of the hotel resort by April 30, 2021.

On February 27, 2019, the Planning Commission approved Conditional Use Permit No. 312 (CUP 312). Pursuant to Condition No. 3 of CUP 312, the Development Services Director conducted a 12-month review of CUP 312 and determined that the permittee failed to comply with the Conditions of Approval of CUP 312.

On April 15, 2020, the Planning Commission conducted a duly noticed public hearing to determine whether it should revoke CUP 312 for the appellant's failure to comply with the Conditions of Approval. After the closure of the public hearing, the Planning Commission adopted Resolution No. PC2020-03 revoking CUP 312, finding that one or more Conditions of Approval of CUP 312 were violated. Following the Planning Commission's Revocation, The Coachella Lighthouse, LLC filed an appeal to the City Council pursuant to Sections 17.74.040 and 17.74.050(B)(2) of the Coachella Municipal Code ("CMC").

UPDATE:

The City received a creditor notice that the Glenroy Resort developer filed for Chapter 11 Bankruptcy protection under the federal courts, and there are court hearings scheduled in early May 2021. Additionally, and notwithstanding the violation of certain deal points, the developer has continued to pay the City a "Payment of In Lieu Transient Occupancy Taxes" as part of the Memorandum of Understanding, dated May 13, 2021 between the City and Glenroy Coachella, LLC. The remainder of this staff report discusses the findings for revocation of CUP 312.

REQUIRED FINDINGS

The Planning Commission's revocation was based on Sections 17.84.070 and 17.74.050(B)(1) of the Coachella Municipal Code. Pursuant to Section 17.84.070 of the Coachella Municipal Code, the Planning Commission may consider a conditional use permit for revocation if the applicant or permittee or owner, its agent, employee, or any person connected or associated with the applicant or permittee:

- (1) Has knowingly made false statements in the applicant's application or in any reports or other supporting documents furnished by the applicant or permittee;
- (2) Has failed to maintain a valid state license;
- (3) Has failed to comply with any applicable provision of the Coachella Municipal Code, including, but not limited to, this chapter, the city's building, zoning, health, and public safety regulations;
- (4) Has failed to comply with any condition imposed on the conditional use permit; or
- (5) Has allowed the existence of or created a public nuisance in violation of the Coachella Municipal Code.

In addition, pursuant to Section 17.74.050(B)(1) of the Coachella Municipal Code, the Planning Commission may consider a conditional use permit for revocation if one or more conditions are not complied with. According to Section 17.70.080 of the CMC, the hearing on an appeal from a Planning Commission decision is a de novo hearing, based upon the evidence and testimony introduced at any previous hearing or hearings and the subsequent record, findings, and recommendations or determinations. Before granting an appeal, in whole or in part, the City Council must find an error or abuse of discretion in the original determination and make any findings required to support any new or revised determination of the matter.

DISCUSSION/ANALYSIS

The written appeal application submitted by the appellant argues with some detail how the Commission erred in its decision to revoke CUP 312 and that the Commission's action was an

abuse of discretion. The City Council is being asked to overturn the decision of the Planning Commission.

Staff contends that there was no error or abuse of discretion in the Planning Commission's decision. One or more Conditions of Approval of CUP 312 have been violated. The following chart describes the Conditions of Approval of CUP 312 that were in violation at the time of the April 15, 2020 revocation hearing, and continue to be in violation:

According to inspections of the property by City staff, as of April 7, 2021, the perimeter landscaping and fencing improvements for the retail cannabis microbusiness have not been completed. Landscaping was installed but the perimeter fencing in front of the dispensary is missing.
Condition No. 2(c) of CUP 312 states: "Approval of Conditional Use Permit No. 312 is contingent upon City Council approval of the attendant Second Amendment to the Glenroy Resort Development Agreement, or a separate Development Agreement, granting	According to inspections of the property by City staff, as of April 7, 2021, additional glazing on the façade of the retail cannabis microbusiness was not completed.

Condition No. 5 of CUP 312 states: "The applicant or successor in interest shall comply with all conditions of approval imposed upon Architectural Review No. 17-07. The front façade of the business shall incorporate additional glazing on the front façade, subject to review by the Development Services Director."	According to inspections of the property by City staff, as of April 7, 2021, the front façade of the business did not incorporate additional glazing.
Condition No. 6 of CUP 312 states: "A comprehensive sign program for the Glenroy Resort project must be reviewed and approved by the Planning Commission prior to the issuance of any sign permits for the retail cannabis microbusiness. The front façade of the retail cannabis microbusiness may have one identification sign and one secondary 'logo sign' placed on the front façade."	According to a review of City records by City staff, as of April 7, 2021 a sign program for the Glenroy Resort project was not yet reviewed or approved by the Planning Commission.
Condition No. 14 of CUP 312 states: "The owner shall install a conforming trash enclosure for solid waste and recyclables within 250 feet of the proposed cannabis retail microbusiness."	According to inspections of the property by City staff, as of April 7, 2021, no conforming trash enclosure for solid waste and recyclables has been installed within 250 feet of the cannabis retail microbusiness.
Condition No. 15 of CUP 312 states: "The owner shall install a minimum of five bicycle racks in front of the retail cannabis microbusiness, or adjacent to the parking lot serving the proposed business."	According to inspections of the property by City staff, as of April 7, 2021, there were no bicycle racks in front of the retail cannabis microbusiness or adjacent to the parking lot serving the business.
Condition No. 16 of CUP 312 states: "The fencing along Avenue 48 may consist of a decorative wrought iron fence with a maximum height of five feet. The parking lot	According to inspections of the property by City staff, as of April 7, 2021, there is no fencing installed in front of the business and

security gates shall consist of low barrier, non- automated gates to remain open during all hours of business operation. All entry gates must be reviewed and approved by the Fire Marshal's Office and the Building Official."	

Pursuant to Condition No. 3 of CUP 312, the Development Services Director conducted a 12-month review of CUP 312. As part of this review, on March 9, 2020, the Development Services Director mailed a letter to Quonset Partners LLC, care of Joseph Rubin, requesting written status of compliance with the Conditions of Approval. Quonset Partners LLC failed to respond to the letter. The Development Services Director concluded his review and determined that the project failed to comply with the Conditions of Approval of CUP 312.

On March 24, 2020, the City issued a letter to all interested parties, Coachella Lighthouse, LLC, Quonset Partners LLC, and Inception RE Credit Holds, LLC, demanding compliance with the Conditions of Approval by April 14, 2020, which they failed to meet. Staff conducted a site visit of The Lighthouse property and the adjoining parking area to the west on April 8, 2020. Staff observed the lack of compliance with several of the Conditions of Approval, as noted above.

However, numerous Conditions of Approval of CUP 312 that were being violated at the time of the Planning Commission's April 15, 2020 revocation hearing have not been cured and are currently being violated. Sections 17.84.070 and 17.74.050(B)(1) of the Coachella Municipal Code authorize revocation of a conditional use permit for *any* violation of a conditional of approval. So each violation of the Conditions of Approval is an independent basis to revoke CUP 312. Thus, the Planning Commission neither erred nor abused its discretion when it determined that "one or more" Conditions of Approval of CUP 312 were violated. In addition, subsequent correction of a violation does not necessarily warrant granting of the appeal. The appeal should only be granted if *all* violations of the Conditions of Approval of CUP 312 have been cured. Again, revocation remains appropriate if "one or more" Conditions of Approval of CUP 312 were violated.

Due to the noncompliance described above, as authorized by Section 17.84.070(D) and Section 17.74.050(B)(1) of the Coachella Municipal Code, revocation of CUP 312 is determined the appropriate City response.

RECOMMENDATIONS:

Based on the facts noted in this staff report and the documentation attached hereto, City staff continues to make affirmative findings for the revocation of CUP 312. However, in light of recent events related to the developer's Chapter 11 court hearings, and compliance with the City's MOU, staff is recommending a continuance to May 12, 2021.
