Popular Annual Financial Report





Purpose of the PAFR

The Popular Annual Financial Report (PAFR) is intended to increase knowledge of the City of Fridley's (City) financial condition through a readily accessible and easily understandable report. The financial information presented in the PAFR is derived from the City's Annual Comprehensive Financial Report (Annual Report) and is presented here in summarized form. The Annual Report extensively outlines the City's financial position and operating activities for fiscal year 2022. The Annual Report includes financial statements that are prepared in conformance with generally accepted accounting principles (GAAP) and audited by Redpath and Company.

The financial information in this report focuses mainly on the City's governmental activities. Governmental activities are those primarily supported by property tax dollars for services such as public safety, parks and roads, as wells as capital expenditures and debt service obligations. They include the General Fund, used to support core city services, Special Revenue Funds, those which funds are earmarked for specific purposes, Capital Project Funds, used to support capital projects and expenditures and Debt Service Funds, used to support debt service obligations.

Development Completed in 2022

Many single-family homeowners took the opportunity to improve their homes in 2022. The City's Housing & Redevelopment Authority (HRA) issued over \$1.3 million in home improvement loans and an additional \$165,000 in home improvement and energy efficiency grants.





Plans for 2023 and Beyond

A major redevelopment project is being planned for 2023 as Roers Companies requested the approval to allow for the redevelopment of the Moon Plaza Property. The redevelopment will allow for the construction of a affordable 169-unit, multi-family rental housing development.





Cummins, one the City's largest employers, announced 2023 plans for a \$10 million investment at their Fridley facility to manufacture electrolyzers. The site will be the first in the nation to manufacture them and is expected to create 100 new jobs. President Biden visited the facility on April 3, 2023, to recognize Cummins for their investment at their Fridley facility, as well as over \$1 billion in investments Cummins is making across the nation.

The project to construct a bridge over the BNSF Northern Switching Yard to extend 57th Avenue to East River Road received \$4 million in the 2023 State Bonding Bill. State funds will finalize the design and construction drawings, as well as utility rerouting. Federal funding sources to ensure project construction, continue to be sought out. Construction is likely 3-5 years out.





Major Projects in 2022

The City completed the Lakeview Neighborhood Street Rehabilitation Project in 2022. The 2022 Street Rehabilitation Project began in 2022, but was delayed due to weather conditions in November. Construction will be complete in 2023.

The City completed the majority of work for the 7th Street and 57th Avenue Trail project which involves constructing a shared use trail providing an additional transportation network connectivity for pedestrians and cyclists. Federal funding was secured through a grant to cover 80 percent of the cost, which will be finalized in 2023.

Upcoming Projects for 2023 and Beyond



With the feedback portion of the Park System Improvement Plan being complete, the City issued \$20.7 million in General Obligation Tax Abatement Bonds in July 2022. The plan calls for \$30 million in park improvements over the next eight years. The final \$9.3 million will be funded with internal City funds. This project was initiated as a result of an aging park system, and included a robust public input strategy, including

events, surveys, story maps and more. This plan will provide many opportunities for expanded recreation programming, enjoyment of nature and social gatherings. Enhancing and modernizing the City park system will position Fridley as a great place to live, work and play now, and for many years to come.

The City plans on allocating federal American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA) funds to various utility infrastructure projects in 2023, including Water Treatment Plant Security for \$300,000, Water Distribution System Reconstruction for \$314,500, Sanitary Sewer Lining for \$550,000 and Water Quality Projects for \$180,000. The distribution of ARPA funds will allow these improvements to be completed without affecting utility rates.

Three streets projects are set to be completed in 2023: the 53rd Avenue Roundabout Safety Project, the 53rd Avenue Trail and Walk Improvements, and the 2023 Street Rehabilitation Project, which will include roadway and utility improvements in four distinct project locations. These projects will increase safety, walkability and accessibility in our community. Federal and state funding was secured for these project 11

Why Does the City Borrow Money In the Form of Debt?

The City is committed to managing its finances responsibly and transparently. Debt is issued to finance public infrastructure projects such as public facilities, parks, streets, water, sewer and drainage improvements.


The City limits its borrowing for the purchase of assets with a useful life of 20 or more years, much like families who borrow money for large purchases, like a home, but not to pay their electric bill. The City never borrows money to pay for day-to-day operations.

Issuing bonds for important City projects allows the City to move forward to meet service needs like expanded roadways, but spreads the cost over several years and allows for future taxpayers (who enjoy the benefit of the facility) to help pay for the asset. Most recently, it was used to build the Civic and will be used in the coming years for the <u>Park System Improvement Plan</u>.



Property taxes are distributed among various taxing entities, with the majority going to the tax payer's school district, city and county services. Values are determined through real estate market activity and then used to calculate levy rates.

How are Assessed and Taxable Values Determined?

The City's Assessing Division (partnered with Anoka County) establishes the assessed and taxable values of real and personal property on the tax roll every year. This is accomplished by examining real estate market activity, inspecting properties to assure the accuracy of data used to estimate market value, adjusting land and building values to meet assessment level standards, and applying all applicable class codes and exemptions. The taxable values are used to calculate levy rates for multiple taxing jurisdictions, including the City of Fridley, Anoka County and the Fridley School District.





What Are Each of these Revenue Sources?

Taxes | Taxes collected from property owners based upon assessed valuation, exemptions and tax rate. Revenue is used to fund governmental services.

Charges for Services | The combined resources of various departments for services provided.

Intergovernmental | Resources received from outside governments, which is mainly represented in grants received.

Licenses and Permits Fees | Fees collected for the issuance of licenses and permits by the City. Miscellaneous Revenues | Sources not classified elsewhere.

Fines and Forfeitures Revenues | Funds from fines and penalties for offenses.

Special Assessments | A levy made against a property to cover all, or part, of the cost of a capital improvement or service deemed to benefit that property.



Public Safety | Services provided through police, fire and emergency management.

Community Development | Services provided through building, planning and rental inspections.

City Management | Services provided through the City Manager and administration, such as communications, human resources, legal, elections and records management.

Parks and Recreation | Recreation programs and services provided to adults, children and families. Legislative | Services provided by the City Council.



What Are These Revenue Sources?

Intergovernmental Revenue | Items like grants or aid received from the State that pays for operations not supported by property taxes (street projects, equipment replacement and Public Safety services). Charges for Services | Reimbursement from businesses or other agencies for services such as school resource officers, business security, etc. This offsets what would otherwise be funded by property taxes. Other Financing Sources | Items such as bond proceeds that pay out for expenses used the next year. Payment from Component Unit | Payments from HRA for staff and interfund loans. Special Assessments | Additional taxes for property owners who directly benefit from a local improvement, such as a street project. Assessments are based on a geographical location. Contributions and Donations | Donations or contributions made to City services like Springbrook

Nature Center and the Public Safety Department.




Governmental fund activities include General Fund services such as police, fire and street maintenance. Capital improvements, such as new parks and street projects, as well as debt service obligations.

What Are These Expenditures?

Public Safety | Funds services like police, fire and emergency management.

General Government | Funds administrative services such elections, records management, etc.

Debt Service Payments towards City debt used to make long-term improvements to public infrastructure such as parks and buildings. It accounts for all principal and interest.

Public Works | Funds services through facilities management, engineering, street lighting and maintenance, parks maintenance and fleet services.


Capital Outlay | Funds the acquisition, construction or completion of public improvements, such as street projects.

Parks and Recreation | Services provided through Parks and Recreation programs.

Community Development | Services provided through building, planning and rental inspections



Enterprise Funds are run like a business where they are self-supporting to cover their own costs of operation. These funds consist of utility services provided to the community by the City such as water, sewer, stormwater and municipal liquor stores. User fees are designed to pay for the services provided.



What are these Revenues and Expenditures?

Sewer | Quarterly charges for sewer service are based on property class, and are used for the operation and maintenance of City's sanitary sewer system.

Liquor | Revenue from the sale of items at the municipal liquor stores are used for the operations of the stores. Profits from liquor store sales fund City capital expenditures that would otherwise be paid for with taxpayer dollars.

Water Fund | Quarterly charges for water are based on consumption and used for water system operations and maintenance.

Stormwater Fund | Quarterly charges for stormwater drainage is based on per acre. Revenue is used for the City's stormwater system that promotes the maintenance of water quality to the waters t City's stormwater discharges to.

Item 2.

The Council and staff embark on an extensive budgeting and planning process that is continual throughout the year. In the spring, City staff begin strategizing on budgetary considerations for the next year. In April, the Council begins its budgeting discussions and planning and continues those discussions through the fall. The Council adopts the next year's budget in November. After approval, the City Manager and Finance Director are responsible for managing spending to ensure all expenditures fall within budgeted funds.

Audit and Credit Rating

The City's budget and budgeting process is audited on an annual basis and approved by the Council. The sound financial management of the City's overall finances was acknowledged by receiving the 2021 Certificate of Achievement for Excellence in Financial Reporting from the Government Finance Officers Association.

Well-managed finances are also reflected in the City's overall credit rating of Aa2 given by an independent agency, Moody's Investors Service. This year's rating noted the City's strong financial position and established history of well-advised budget management, including healthy financial reserves, stable operations and redevelopment activities.



The City works diligently through the budget process to develop financial plans that emphasize reasonable tax rates, consistent service delivery, infrastructure investments and good financial standing. The City continues to focus on quality-of-life improvements throughout the community. These initiatives include revitalizing parks and public areas, maintaining and improving current City services, and increasing the communication between City representatives and the public.

Beth Kondrick, Deputy City Clerk, presented the application for an On-Sale Liquor License from Debesay Girmalul for the Continental Restaurant. She reviewed the background and analysis of the request, stating that staff recommends approval of the request following the public hearing.

Debesay Girmalul, applicant, commented that in this location he currently has the food service license and would now like to obtain the necessary license to serve alcohol. He stated that his intent is not to focus on just alcohol, but to offer that in addition to his food menu. He commented that he would continue to run his business professionally.

Mayor Lund asked and received confirmation that the restaurant is currently open and serving food. He asked about the applicant's prior food service experience.

Mr. Girmalul commented that he did operate a large restaurant in another country, but this is his first attempt in the U.S. He confirmed that he was aware of the 60/40 rule related to food and alcohol sales.

Mayor Lund provided additional expectations for food service to be the main focus, noting that alcohol sales are not to continue past the time food is served. He noted the problems that existed for the business that previously operated in this location.

Mr. Girmalul replied that if alcohol sales became an issue, he would simply stop serving those beverages.

Councilmember Tillberry stated that the website for the business shows an event hall and asked if there is a separate license required for that.

Ms. Kondrick commented that this license would cover the event hall as well.

Councilmember Tillberry asked if Mr. Girmalul has experience selling alcohol.

Mr. Girbalul commented that his restaurant in Nyrobi served alcohol and that operated for 20 years. He noted that this would be his first-time serving alcohol in the U.S. as this is his first restaurant in the U.S.

Councilmember Bolkcom stressed that the City is very serious about the 60/40 rule for food and alcohol. She asked for more information on the type of food served and the training that would be provided for the staff serving alcohol.

Item 3

Mr. Girmalul commented that they serve culturally diverse food. He stated that he would train all employees to check identification on all customers, regardless of age. He stated that they also have a time limit during which they would offer alcohol service, noting that his restaurant closes at 11 p.m. but the hours may be different for the event hall. He stated that event hall customers must also have food included in the service.

Councilmember Ostwald asked if the restaurant caters for the events at the event center or whether an outside caterer could be used.

Mr. Girmalul commented that generally they serve the food, but outside food is allowed with the proper catering licenses provided. He stated that his plan would be for beer and wine service but perhaps liquor in the future.

Mayor Lund asked if there are any plans for remodeling or improvements on the exterior.

Mr. Girmalul commented that they have invested in improvements to the interior, and he will now begin to improve the outside appearance.

Councilmember Bolkcom asked if there is concern with the 60/40 ratio for those that use outside catering.

Mr. Girmalul stated that he does have a plan to regulate alcohol service during those events.

Mayor Lund noted that perhaps for events that would like alcohol service, the business requires that the restaurant is used for catering to ensure the 60/40 rule is met.

Councilmember Evanson asked for details on staffing and management of the restaurant and event space.

Mr. Girmalul provided details on his staffing, noting that once the business grows, he will continue to add more staff. He was aware that if someone else were added to management, they would need to be added to the liquor license.

Motion made by Councilmember Evanson to close the public hearing, Seconded by Councilmember Bolkcom.

Upon a voice vote, all voting aye, Mayor Lund declared the motion carried unanimously.

Motion made by Councilmember Ostwald to adopt Resolution No. 2024-42, Approving On-Sale Liquor License for Continental Restaurant. Seconded by Councilmember Tillberry.

Upon a voice vote, all voting aye, Mayor Lund declared the motion carried unanimously.

9. Ordinance No. 1421, Public Hearing and First Reading Amending the Name, Boundaries, Powers and Construction of Government Chapter of the Fridley City Charter.

Motion made by Councilmember Tillberry to open the public hearing. Seconded by Councilmember Bolkcom.

Upon a voice vote, all voting aye, Mayor Lund declared the motion carried unanimously.

Ms. Kondrick presented a proposed amendment to Chapter 1 of the Fridley City Charter. She reviewed background information on the request, summarizing details of Chapter 1 along with the proposed amendments. She reviewed the next steps, should the first reading be approved.

Mayor Lund invited any members of the public to provide comments.

No public comments were provided.

Motion made by Councilmember Bolkcom to close the public hearing, Seconded by Councilmember Tillberry.

Upon a voice vote, all voting aye, Mayor Lund declared the motion carried unanimously.

Motion made by Councilmember Evanson to approve the first reading of Ordinance No. 1421, Amending the Name, Boundaries, Powers and Construction of Government Chapter of the Fridley City Charter. Seconded by Councilmember Ostwald.

Upon a voice vote, all voting aye, Mayor Lund declared the motion carried unanimously.

10. Ordinance No. 1422, Amending the Fridley City Code Chapter 105, Commissions, to Establish a Public Arts Commission.

Scott Hickok, Community Development Director, provided background information on public art and the public engagement process that occurred thus far and the recommendation that moved forward to the City Council. He reviewed the proposed ordinance which would establish a Public Arts Commission. He reviewed the next steps, should the first reading be approved.

Councilmember Tillberry asked if there would be a process to involve the new Commission in public projects to determine if there would be an opportunity to include public art.

Mr. Hickok replied that there would be a staff liaison, currently identified as himself, and noted that it would be his responsibility to identify those opportunities.

Councilmember Evanson asked for more information on the creation of a 501-3c organization and how that would work with this group.

Item 3.

Mr. Hickok explained that the 501-3c would be separate and operate independently with the purpose of fundraising to further the interest of public art. He stated that the Commission would be an advisory commission to the Council. He stated that the by-laws of the 501-3c would tie that organization to the Public Arts Commission.

Councilmember Tillberry noted that it would be similar to the Springbrook Nature Center Foundation.

Councilmember Bolkcom thanked the residents who have participated, noting the enthusiasm of the group.

Motion made by Councilmember Evanson to approve the first reading of Ordinance No. 1422, Amending the Fridley City Code Chapter 105, Commissions, to Establish a Public Arts Commission. Seconded by Councilmember Bolkcom.

Upon a voice vote, all voting aye, Mayor Lund declared the motion carried unanimously.

Informal Status Reports

Councilmember Bolkcom noted the 44th Avenue bridge discussion scheduled for the following night at City Hall.

Councilmember Tillberry commented on the wonderful fundraising event that was held the previous Saturday at Springbrook Nature Center, hosted by the Springbrook Nature Center Foundation. The Council thanked the City staff and other volunteers who assisted in preparing and running the event.

The Council also asked residents to take a photo of their water service line and provide it to staff.

Ordinance No. 1421, Amending the Name, Boundaries, Powers and Construction of Government Chapter of the Fridley City Charter (Second Reading)

Background

The Fridley City Charter (Charter) is the fundamental law that defines the authorities and powers of the City of Fridley (City). Minnesota Statute (M.S.) § 410.12, subd. 7 allows for an amendment to the Charter by ordinance upon the recommendation of the Charter Commission. The recommended amendments to the chapter are compiled into Ordinance No. 1421, making it more consistent with M.S. and other chapters of the Charter itself.

Most of the revisions to the Chapter align it with the City's Writing Style Guide. Notable revisions to the Chapter include:

- Section 1.01, adding Definitions and moving them to the beginning of the chapter; and
- Section 1.03, moving Charter, A Public Act to earlier in the chapter.

Passage of a Charter amendment must follow timelines according to M.S. and the Charter itself. To date, the following events have occurred for this proposed amendment:

- February 5 the Charter Commission formally recommended the Charter amendment to the Fridley City Council (Council)
- March 25 the Council approved Resolution No. 2024-35 to call for this evening's Public Hearing
- March 28 a Notice of Public Hearing was published in the Official Publication and posted to the City's website.
- April 8 a Public Hearing was held and Council conducted the first reading of the Ordinance.

Assuming the Council continues to advance the recommended amendment, staff anticipate the following schedule:

- April 22 the Council will conduct the second reading of the Ordinance;
- April 24 the Ordinance will be published in the Official Publication;
- July 23 pursuant to M.S. § 410.12 subd. 7, "an ordinance amending a city charter shall not become effective until 90 days after passage and publication."

Ordinance No. 1421

Amending the Name, Boundaries, Powers and Construction of Government Chapter of the Fridley City Charter

The Fridley City Charter Commission has completed its review of the Fridley City Charter Chapter 1 and has recommended an amendment of the City Charter by Ordinance to the City Council on February 5, 2024. The Fridley City Council hereby finds after review, examination and recommendation of the Charter Commission that the Fridley City Charter should be hereby amended and the City of Fridley does ordain:

Fridley City Charter Chapter 1. Name, Boundaries, Powers and Construction of Government

Section 1.01 Definitions

Home Rule Charter, City Charter, Charter: The City of Fridley's local constitution.

Home Rule Charter Commission: A body of 15 Fridley residents appointed by the district court who work collaboratively to evaluate and propose changes to the Fridley City Charter that reflect the importance of the Charter to enable effective government operations that reflect the values of residents.

Voter: A registered voter who lives in the City.

Section 1.01. Section 1.02 Name and Boundaries

Upon the taking effect of this Chapter, the Village of Fridley in the County of Anoka and State of Minnesota shall become a City under the name of City of Fridley and shall continue to be a municipal corporation with boundaries the same as they now are established or as they may hereafter be established.

Section 1.03 Charter, A Public Act

The Charter was approved by voters on September 10, 1957. It is a public act and need not be pleaded or proved in any case.

Section 1.02. Section 1.04 Powers of the City

The City of Fridley:

shall have perpetual succession;

may sue and be sued;

may use and alter its seal at pleasure;

shall be capable of contracting and being contracted with;

may take by purchase, condemnation, gift, devise, or otherwise, and hold, lease, sell and convey all such real and personal property as its purposes may require, or the transaction of its business may render convenient, within or without the limits of the City;

may acquire, construct, own, lease and operate public utilities, and render public service of every kind;

may grant franchises or licenses for the construction, operation and maintenance of public utilities in, over, upon and under the streets and public places in the City, and shall have power to fix and regulate the fares, tolls, or charges which may be collected, the extensions which shall be made, and regulate the services which shall be rendered by any owner or operator of a public utility franchise or license;

may assess, levy and collect taxes, for general or special purposes, on all subjects or objects which the city may lawfully tax;

may borrow money on the faith and credit of the City or on a public utility or other property owned by the City or the revenues therefrom by the issuance and sale of bonds or certificates of indebtedness;

may appropriate the money of the City for all lawful purposes;

may provide for, construct, regulate, and maintain public works and local improvements;

may levy and collect assessments against real property within the City for local improvements and services including garbage and refuse collection and disposal;

may license and regulate persons, corporations and associations engaged in any occupation, trade or business;

may define, prohibit, abate, and suppress all things detrimental to the health, morals, comfort, safety, convenience and welfare of the inhabitants of the City, and all nuisances and causes thereof;

may regulate the construction, height and materials used in all buildings, and the maintenance and occupancy thereof;

may regulate and control the use for whatever purposes of the streets and other public places;

may make and enforce local police, sanitary, and other regulations;

may pass ordinances for maintaining and promoting the peace, good government and welfare of the City, and for the performance of all the functions thereof;

shall have all the powers possessed by municipal corporations at common law;

shall have, retain and may exercise all powers, functions, rights, and privileges, heretofore possessed by the Village of Fridley;

may exercise such powers beyond its corporate limits as may be necessary for the effective exercise of any powers granted herein as now authorized by law;

and in addition thereto, the City of Fridley shall have and exercise all powers, functions, rights, and privileges exercised by, or which are incidental to, or inherent in, municipal corporations and are not denied to it by the Constitution or general laws of the State of Minnesota.

The enumeration of powers herein shall not be construed to limit or restrict the powers granted in general terms, nor shall any specific power granted in this charter be construed to limit or restrict the powers granted in this Section.

In addition to the powers herein and hereafter granted, the City of Fridley shall have full power to deal with all matters of municipal concern and have complete self-government in harmony with and subject to the Constitution and laws of the State of Minnesota.

Section 1.03. Charter, A Public Act

This Charter shall be a public act and need not be pleaded or proved in any case. It shall take effect fifteen (15) days from and after its adoption by the voters.

Section 1.04. Definitions

Eligible voter.

A resident of the City of Fridley who is qualified to register to vote.

Registered Voter.

An eligible voter who is currently registered in the City of Fridley.

3. Voter.

A registered voter who has voted in the City of Fridley within the last four years.

4. Electorate.

The whole body of eligible voters.

After adoption the Ordinance will become effective on May 11. A companion resolution has been included on the agenda for this evening's meeting. If approved, it will officially appoint the members to the Commission.

Ordinance No. 1422

Amending the Fridley City Code Chapter 105, Commissions, to Establish a Public Arts Commission

The City Council of the City of Fridley does ordain, after review, examination and staff recommendation that the Fridley City Code be amended as follows:

Fridley City Code Chapter 105 Commissions

105.01 Purpose

Pursuant to the Fridley City Charter Chapter 2, the Fridley City Council (Council) may create commissions with advisory powers to investigate any subject of interest to the City of Fridley (City). Advisory commissions provide for citizen input and are advisory to the Council. Advisory commissions shall have no decision-making authority, except as expressly established by the Fridley City Code or Minnesota Statutes (M.S.).

105.02 Commissions Generally

- 1. Membership
 - (a) Each commission, unless otherwise indicated, shall consist of seven Fridley residents appointed by Council.
 - (b) The Council will annually appoint, by Council resolution, a chairperson to each advisory commission.
 - (c) Each commission shall elect a vice chairperson. At any meeting of the commission if the chairperson is unable to attend, the vice chairperson shall act as chairperson.
 - (d) The commission members shall be appointed by the Council for three-year terms, except the Council shall make every effort to stagger the appointments so that the terms of no more than three members shall expire in any one year. Attempts shall be made to have all City wards represented on the commissions. Upon the expiration of their terms of office, members shall continue to serve until their successor shall have been appointed.
- 2. Vacancy

Commission members may resign or be removed from office by a majority vote of the Council. The commission member appointed to fill any vacancy shall serve for the remainder of the vacated term.

3. Organization

- (a) Following the appointment of membership, each of the commissions shall meet, organize and with the exception of the chairperson, elect any officers, as it deems desirable.
- (b) Adopt rules for its meetings and the transaction of its business, in order to fulfill the responsibilities of the commission.
- (c) The chairperson shall assure the fulfillment of the following responsibilities:
 - (1) Call and preside over meetings of the commission.
 - (2) Appear or appoint a representative to appear, if deemed necessary, before the Council or any City commission pertaining to matters within the scope of the commission.
 - (3) Provide liaison with other governmental and citizens' groups pertaining to matters within the scope of the commission for the purpose of timely and relevant information for consideration by the commission.

4. Staff Liaison

The City Manager shall assign one member of staff to serve as Staff Liaison to each commission. The Staff Liaison shall perform only such duties on behalf of a commission as may be assigned by the chairperson and with the consent of the City Manager. Additional advisory staff shall be assigned to the commissions by the City Manager within the restraints of the adopted general fund budget. A Staff Liaison shall not serve as an appointed member of any City advisory commission.

5. Project Committees

The commissions may establish special project committees to further the objectives of the commissions and provide for greater citizen participation. Such project committees shall be appointed by a commission for special projects and shall cease to exist when their activities are completed. The qualifications for membership, composition and duties of such project committees shall be at the discretion of the commission. The project committee may be chaired by a member of the commission, and at least one member of the commission shall act as a liaison for each project committee.

6. Compensation

The members of the commissions shall serve without pay, but may be reimbursed for actual expenses if funds therefore are provided in the adopted general fund budget.

7. Reports

The commissions shall make such reports as requested by the Council. or Planning Commission.

8. Meetings

Meetings shall be called by the chairperson and shall be held as necessary to fulfill the responsibilities of the commissions. All meetings of the commissions shall be open to the public. Minutes shall be kept of all meetings. Findings and recommendations shall be transmitted by the commission chairperson to the to the Council.

105.03 Planning Commission

1. Commission Established

There is hereby created a Planning Commission for the City of Fridley, Minnesota pursuant to M.S. Chapter 462.

- 2. Purpose
 - (a) The Planning Commission is established to provide comprehensive planning and zoning advice to the Council, provide a process by which the public may appeal staff's interpretation of the Code, or request a variance to performance standards in the zoning chapters of the Code.
 - (b) The Council hereby establishes the Planning Commission to serve as the Board of Appeals and Adjustments and exercise all authority and perform all functions of said Board pursuant to M.S. §§ 462.351 to 462.364 and operate according to this Code.
- 3. Scope
 - (a) The Planning Commission shall serve in an advisory capacity to the Council. Matters shall be referred to the Planning Commission by the Council, City Manager or chairperson of the member commissions, and may be assigned to the member commissions for detailed study and recommendations as required. All recommendations by the Planning Commission shall be made to the Council.
 - (b) The Planning Commission is charged with responsibility for community planning, growth and development of comprehensive goals and policies, including but not limited to, land use, housing, transportation, , and other related community activities.

- (c) The Planning Commission shall advise the Council in the development of programs to give increased effectiveness and direction in implementing established City goals and policies and recommend actions needed to carry out planning responsibility.
- 4. Appeals and Requests
 - (a) The Planning Commission shall hear and recommend to the Council appeals or requests in the following cases according to the procedures established in Chapters 128 and 205 of this Code:

(1) Appeals where it is alleged that there is an error in any order, requirement, decision, or determination made by a City compliance official in the enforcement of the Code, or State Building Code.

(2) Requests for variances from the literal provisions of Code in instances where strict enforcement would cause practical difficulties due to circumstances unique to the individual property under consideration.

5. Membership of Planning Commission

The Planning Commission shall consist of the Planning Commission chairperson, the chairperson of the Parks and Recreation Commission, the chairperson of the Environmental Quality and Energy Commission, and four members at large.

Nothing herein shall prohibit any Planning Commission members from serving on other commissions; however, none of these shall be elected as chairperson or vice-chairperson of any other commissions.

105.04 Parks and Recreation Commission

1. Commission Established

There is established a Parks and Recreation Commission for the City.

2. Purpose

The Parks and Recreation Commission is established to promote the systematic and comprehensive development of park facilities and recreational activities necessary for the physical, mental and emotional health and well-being of the residents of the City.

3. Scope

- (a) The Parks and Recreation Commission shall act as an advisory commission to the Council for continuous community planning and development of comprehensive City goals and policies. Any change in related community planning and comprehensive City goals and policies must be reviewed by the Council.
- (b) The Parks and Recreation Commission shall advise the Council in the development of programs to give increased effectiveness and direction in implementing established City goals and policies and recommend actions as needed to provide park and recreational opportunities.

4. Program

The Commission shall each year, prior to June 1, recommend a capital investment program for park improvement and acquisition and for public recreation activities for the ensuing year.

5. Funds

For the purpose of financing the parks and recreation programs authorized by this Chapter, the accounting shall be the responsibility of the City Treasurer. The Commission shall be authorized to establish charges or fees for the restricted use of any facility or to make any phase of the recreation program wholly or partially self-sustaining.

105.05 Environmental Quality and Energy Commission

1. Commission Established

There is established an Environmental Quality and Energy Commission for the City.

2. Purpose

The Environmental Quality and Energy Commission is established to stimulate interest in and to promote an awareness of environmental and energy concerns among citizens and businesses of the City. It will serve as a resource to the City in the conservation and management of energy and the environment, including information on environmental problems, laws, policies, and regulations of the county, metropolitan, state, and federal levels to the extent of their effect on Fridley and advise the Council, the City Manager, and other appropriate City commissions on matters pertaining to conservation and management of energy and the environment, including the review and recommendation of programs and policies within the City.

- 3. Scope
 - (a) The Environmental Quality and Energy Commission shall act as an advisory commission to the Council for continuous community planning and development of

the comprehensive City goals and policies. Any change in related community planning and comprehensive City goals and policies must be reviewed by the Council.

(b) The Environmental Quality and Energy Commission shall advise the Council in the development of programs to give increased effectiveness and direction on implementing established City goals and policies, and recommend actions as needed relevant to the conservation and management of environmental and energy resources.

105.06 Public Arts Commission

1. Commission Established

There is hereby created a Public Arts Commission for the City.

2. Purpose

The Public Arts Commission is established to foster the development of the arts, to advise the Council on arts related matters and to stimulate participation in and appreciation of the arts by residents.

<u>3. Scope</u>

(a) The Public Arts Commission serves in an advisory capacity to the Council on matters pertaining to visual public art within the City. The Commission develops a general policy for inclusion and approval of visual art in public places and projects as well as informs and educates the public about the importance and need for visual arts integration within public spaces, including parks, green space, City facilities and other buildings freely accessible to the public.

(b) The Public Arts Commission promotes the acquisition, maintenance, and upkeep of works of art on sites throughout the City.

(c) It may advise the City Council and other community groups and agencies who are initiating a public art project concerning the proposed site, selection of a professional artist and commissioning of a public artwork. The Commission shall cooperate with foundations, educational institutions, nonprofit organizations, other governmental agencies, and various civic groups to foster a broad public arts program for the community.

4. Membership of Public Arts Commission

(a) Members must have an interest in the various studies of the arts.

(b) Members must be residents of Fridley.

(c) Ex official members:

(1) may be appointed by the Council;

(2) may serve for specified terms;

(3) are not required to live in the City;

(4) may include persons under age 18; and

(5) do not have voting privileges.

5. Annual Report

Every year the Commission must make a written or oral report to the Council of the Commission's activities for the calendar year.



Resolution No. 2024-48, Approving a Six-Month Extension for Approval of the Final Registered Land Survey (RLS), PS #23-01 Petitioned by the City's Housing and Redevelopment Authority (HRA) for the Property Located at 5660 Main Street N.E.

Background

The Fridley City Council (Council) approved RLS, PS #23-01 on September 11, 2023, to create two new lots, Tracts A and B, from the property at 5660 Main Street (former Goodwill property). The creation of the new lots will allow the City to take ownership of Tract B, which is the land area needed for the right-of-way for the 57th Avenue bridge extension from Main Street to East River Road.



The HRA is requesting a six-month extension to get the final RLS approved by the Council and recorded at Anoka County. The extension is needed due to delays from the property owners of the former Goodwill property, Home Depot, and Burlington Northern Santa Fe (BNSF) related to easement and site access discussions. Staff anticipates that the purchase agreement with the former Goodwill property owner will occur soon, which will then allow the RLS mylars to be created, signed, and filed. A six-month extension is being requested in the event there are unforeseeable delays.

Background

City of Fridley Park Bench Sponsorship Guidelines were approved by the Parks and Recreation Commission on April 1, 2024. City of Fridley Memorial/Tribute Guidelines for Park System

Memorial/Tribute Bench Guidelines for Fridley Park System

The City of Fridley (City) Parks and Recreation Department has the following guidelines for management of personalized benches to be used within the City of Fridley Park System to memorialize or to pay tribute to a person or occasion:

- 1. Requests for a memorial/tribute bench will be submitted in writing to the Parks and Recreation Department through an official order form or online order form. Parks and Recreation staff will review orders and work with sponsors to select bench locations that are compatible with park maintenance and future improvements.
- 2. The donor may request bench installation in a specific park and may, in some cases, suggest a location within that park. Final placement of a bench is at the discretion of City of Fridley staff based on environmental conditions, utility locations and proximity of other bench amenities.
- All costs related to a memorial/tribute bench purchase and installation must be paid in advance of bench purchase and installation of an inscribed plaque. Bench sponsorship may be made for a new or existing bench and all sponsorships are \$2,500
- 4. An inscribed recognition plaque, approximately 3" tall by 7" wide, will be affixed to the park bench. Plaques will be centered horizontally on the bench back with vertical alignment ensuring proper attachment. Typically, the inscription is limited to three lines of 18 characters per line.
- 5. Memorial/tribute benches will be installed by the City Parks Division staff and/or its contractor.
- 6. The City of Fridley will provide general monitoring of the condition of park benches, including those that have been sponsored with an attached plaque. Sponsored benches will be maintained to the same standards as other park system amenities.
- 7. The City is not responsible for damage to a bench or plaque due to vandalism, graffiti, accidents or weather. Reasonable accommodations will be made to repair or replace a bench or plaque at the City's expense for five years after a bench is sponsored. After five years, a donor may have the option to have the bench or plaque replaced if badly damaged or missing at the city's replacement cost for the bench or plaque at market rate.

- 8. A sponsorship of a bench will be valid for 10 years after plaque installation. After this time, the City reserves the right to place a new sponsored bench in the same location. It will not be policy to replace a bench or actively seek new sponsors for a bench until the condition of the bench and/or plaque fall below minimum standards for a park amenity. A typical park bench life span is estimated at 20 years.
- 9. Benches will be placed in public park land and use of the benches are intended to be for the public. The donor or associated parties do not have preferential use of the bench for general use, gatherings, or ceremonies. Items, such as flowers, may not be placed and left at the bench.
- 10. The City of Fridley reserves the right to refuse inscriptions deemed to be offensive, inappropriate or of a divisive nature. Staff review of inscriptions shall be completed by the Parks and Recreation Director. The Fridley Parks and Recreation Commission shall review and approve/deny any inscriptions that staff deems reviewable. Denials of text submissions made by the Commission shall be final. Sponsors may have the opportunity to edit their submission if denied.
- 11. Examples of standard wording for memorial/tribute bench plaques include:
 "IN MEMORY OF JANE DOE, JULY 2024"
 "RECOGNIZING THE 50TH WEDDING ANNIVERSARY OF JOHN AND JANE DOE"
- 12. Donations to Fridley Parks and Recreation for park bench sponsorship may be taxdeductible and the City of Fridley will provide a dated donation acknowledgment letter.
- 13. Bench and plaque type are subject to change. Current 2024 standards will be as shown or of similar style and quality:

Resolution No. 2024-56, Approving Gifts, Donations and Sponsorships Received Between March 16, 2024, and April 12, 2024

Background

Each month, the City of Fridley (City) receives various donations and gifts to support City operations, programs and projects. Pursuant to Minnesota Statute § 465.03, the City may accept these donations and gifts for the benefit of residents. For specific donations or gifts, the donor may prescribe certain requirements, such as for a specific activity or department.

Consistent with the abovementioned statute, staff prepared Schedule No. 1 (Exhibit A), which outlines the various donations, gifts and/or sponsorships received by the City between March 16, 2024, and April 12, 2024. To accept the same, the Council must adopt the attached resolution by a two-third majority vote.

Lastly, for each donation, gift or sponsorship, staff ensure it meets an identified need, does not create a quid-pro-quo or long-term maintenance obligation, and the donor received an acknowledgment of their gift through a letter or publication.

Financial Impact

Resolution No. 2024-58, Authorizing the Granting of Easements to Anoka County for the Rice Creek West Regional Trail and also Authorizing the Execution of Declarations Related to State Bond Financing with Respect to Locke Park and the Rice Creek West Regional Trail

Background

The City of Fridley (City) and Anoka County (County) entered into a Joint Powers Agreement (JPA) dated July 17, 1980, for the operation and maintenance of the Rice Creek West Regional Trail (RCWRT) and Locke Park (LP). The City adopted Resolution No. 2022-126 on November 14, 2022, which terminated the agreement on November 14, 2023.

During the term of the JPA, the County entered into grant agreements with the Metropolitan Council (MC) in order to receive funds from Minnesota Management and Budget (MMB) for the RCWRT and certain improvements within LP. These grant agreements required that either a joint powers agreement with the City be in place or that the County maintain a property interest in the RCWRT and LP. The City has agreed to provide the County with easements over the RCWRT in order to satisfy the property interest requirement of the grant agreements, provided the County allow the City to perform emergency maintenance on the trail and snow removal as deemed necessary by the City. The County agrees to install ADA improvements to the RCWRT by 2029.

Since the RCWRT is a state bond-finance property, a declaration must be recorded against the properties containing the trail. MMB has agreed that provided the City execute and record a declaration for the LP property that indicates that improvements to the property have been financed by state grant funds, the City will not be able to sell the property without MMB's consent, and the City will be subjecting the property to the grant agreements, the MMB will be satisfied with the County not having a property interest in the LP property.

As a result of the agreements, attached are the necessary documents that Council needs to approve in this matter:

1. Resolution No. 2024-58, Approving the Granting of Easements to Anoka County for the RCWRT and also Authorizing the Execution of Declarations Related to State Bond Financing with Respect to LP and the RCWRT;

2. Warranty Deed from the City to the County approving the County easements for the RCWRT. The Mayor and the City Manager are authorized to execute said Warranty Deed and provide it to the County for recording. This approval is conditioned upon the City and the County working out a maintenance plan that will allow the City to remove snow from the trail as deemed necessary by the City. This approval is also conditioned upon the County constructing ADA improvements to the RCWRT. If the said improvements are not constructed by 2029, the City may construct the improvements and bill the County for the costs.

3. The Declarations for the LP and the RCWRT properties. The Mayor and the City Manager are authorized to execute the Declarations and provide them to the County for recording.

Whereas, during the term of the Joint Powers Agreement, the County entered into grant agreements with the Metropolitan Council in order to receive state grant funds from Minnesota Management and Budget (MMB) for the Rice Creek West Regional Trail and certain improvements within Locke Park; and

Whereas, the grant agreements required that either a joint powers agreement with the City be in place or that the County maintain a property interest in the Rice Creek West Regional Trail and Locke Park; and

Whereas, the City has agreed to provide the County with easements over the Rice Creek West Regional Trail in order to satisfy the property interest requirement of the grant agreements, provided that the County allow the City to perform emergency maintenance on the trail and snow removal as deemed necessary by the City and the County agrees to install ADA improvements to the trail by 2029; and

Whereas, because the Rice Creek West Regional Trail is state bond-financed property, a declaration must be recorded against the properties containing the trail; and

Whereas, MMB has agreed that provided that the City execute and record a declaration for the Locke Park property that says that improvements to the property have been financed by state grant funds, the City will not be able to sell the property without MMB's consent, and the City will be subjecting the property to the grant agreements, the MMB will be satisfied with the County not having a property interest in the Locke Park property.

Now, therefore be it resolved, that the City Council of the City of Fridley hereby approves the following:

1. The Warranty Deed from the City to the County granting the County easements for the Rice Creek West Regional Trail is hereby approved. The Mayor and the City Manager are authorized to execute said Warranty Deed and provide it to the County for recording. This approval is conditioned upon the City and the County working out a maintenance plan that will allow the City to remove snow from the trail as deemed necessary by the City. This approval is also

conditioned upon the County constructing ADA improvements to the Rice Creek Regional Trail. Should the said improvements not be constructed by 2029, the City may construct the improvements and bill the County for the costs.

2. The Declarations for the Locke Park and the Rice Creek Regional Trail properties are hereby approved. The Mayor and the City Manager are authorized to execute said Declarations and provide them to the County for recording.

JOINT POWERS AGREEMENT BETWEEN ANOKA COUNTY AND THE CITY OF FRIDLEY FOR CONVEYANCE OF RIGHT OF WAY AND TRAIL EASEMENT

This Joint Powers Agreement (JPA) is made and entered into this 2 day of 2019, by and between the County of Anoka, a political subdivision of the 3 State of Minnesota, 2100 Third Avenue, Anoka, Minnesota 55303 ("County") and the City of 5 Fridley, a municipal corporation under the laws of the 3 State of Minnesota, 7071 University Avenue NE, Fridley, Minnesota 55432 ("City").

WITNESSETH

WHEREAS, the City is in the process of completing its new Civic Campus at Locke Park Pointe, the former Columbia Arena site, in Fridley, Minnesota; and

WHEREAS, the City plans to construct a road which will provide access from 71st Avenue N.E. to the Civic Center campus, Locke County Park, and adjacent residential development (the "Project"); and

WHEREAS, the road improvements will require the use of certain park land on the western edge of Locke Park, which will then be compensated by the City through the conveyance of replacement park land to be added to the park boundary, as depicted in Exhibit A; and

WHEREAS, the City also agrees to convey a Trail Easement to the County, running over the southerly fifteen feet of the Lock Parkway right-of-way, adjacent to the residential developments, that will serve as part of the Rice Creek West Regional Trail and will provide public access to Locke Park; and

WHEREAS, it is in the interest of each jurisdiction to collaborate in this Project regarding the road configuration, replacement park land, and trail facilities that benefit both local and county area residents; and

WHEREAS, access to parks, trails, and recreation areas are essential to the quality of life, health, and welfare of the residents of the City, the County, and the region; and

WHEREAS, Minn. Stat. § 471.59 authorizes political subdivisions of the State to enter into joint powers agreements for the joint exercise of powers common to each.

NOW, THEREFORE, IT IS MUTUALLY STIPULATED AND AGREED AS FOLLOWS:

I. PURPOSE

3

The parties have joined together to enable the City to construct a roadway (Locke Parkway) as part of its overall Civic Campus project at Locke Point Park, which includes a large residential development. The parcels and land areas involved in the Project are legally described and depicted in a series of exhibits, attached hereto and incorporated herein. Further, it is the purpose of this Joint Powers Agreement ("Agreement") to provide for the planning, conveyance of property, construction, and costs necessary to complete the Project and provide for the ongoing operation and maintenance of the Project.

II. REPLACEMENT PARK LAND

The City plans to construct a road on the westerly edge of Locke Park, which is currently owned by the City but situated within the regional park boundary. In exchange for the City's use of park land for its right of way, the City shall provide and identify replacement park land, to be added to the boundary for Rice Creek West Regional Trail Corridor. The proposed right of way to be removed from the park boundary and the replacement park land are depicted in **Exhibit A** and legally described in paragraphs (1) and (2) of **Exhibit B**, attached hereto.

III. CONVEYANCE OF TRAIL EASEMENT

The regional trail lies within Outlot D of the Locke Park Pointe plat. As part of the Project, a portion of regional trail will be relocated and shifted south from its original location, as depicted in **Exhibit A** and legally described in paragraph (3) of **Exhibit B**. The City will construct the portion of regional trail depicted herein within one (1) year of this Agreement, and shall convey to the County a 15-foot-wide Permanent Easement for trail purposes over the Rice Creek West Regional Trail alignment, to provide public access to Locke Park and the regional trail. A "preliminary description" of the trail easement area is included in paragraph (4) of **Exhibit B**, and is subject to modification by agreement of the parties. The parties agree that the easement will not be finalized or recorded until substantial completion of the Project. The parties further agree to work together in achieving a final description of the trail easement as soon as reasonably possible during completion of the Project. The City shall maintain the portion of the regional trail located within the residential development, as described in Section VIII. below.

IV. METHODS AND COST ALLOCATION

a. Planning and Design

The City shall provide for the planning, engineering, construction, and construction administration for the Project solely at the City's expense. The City shall be responsible for all engineering and design services and will prepare plans and specifications for the Project in consultation with the County. The regional trail shall be reconstructed to Anoka County's specifications.

b. Bidding / Construction

\$

The City shall do the calling for all bids and the accepting of all bid proposals, and shall cause the construction of the Project in conformance with the approved plans and specifications. After receipt of all necessary governmental approvals, the City shall cause the commencement of the Project's construction, shall keep the County informed of its progress, and shall manage the Project through to completion.

c. Trail Closure and Detour Routes

Since the construction of the Project will necessitate short-term, temporary closures and re-routing of the Rice Creek West Regional Trail, the City will provide detour routes, as depicted in **Exhibit C1**, attached hereto, to ensure public access to Locke County Park and to the regional trail adjacent to the Project. The City will post signage, as depicted in **Exhibit C2**, at all times during construction to inform the public of the locations of trail closures and detour routes.

d. Restoration Activities

The City shall restore, at its own cost, all areas of County property that are disturbed or damaged during the Project, including any park land and the regional trail, if impacted. Any damaged areas shall be restored to Anoka County's specifications.

V. TERM / TERMINATION

This Agreement shall become effective immediately upon signing and will remain in effect until the Project and all restoration activities are completed, *with exception* of the ownership and maintenance provisions in Section VII., which shall continue indefinitely.

VI. STRICT ACCOUNTABILITY

A strict accounting shall be made of all funds and reports of all receipts and disbursements shall be made upon request by either party.

VII. OWNERSHIP AND MAINTENANCE OF IMPROVEMENTS

The City shall own and maintain all improvements within the Project, with the exception of the Trail Easement as described in Section III, above. The City will maintain that portion of the regional trail within Outlot D, including mowing, trash pick-up, crack-sealing, pothole repairs, stormwater maintenance and any other repairs or maintenance needed within Outlot D. The County is responsible to plow the trail in the winter and for regional trail construction. Any damage caused to the regional trail from activities or construction performed by the City or its contractors shall be restored by the City at its sole cost to the original condition of the trail before the damage occurred.

VIII. NOTICES

For purposes of delivery of any notices hereunder, the notice shall be effective if delivered to the County Adminstrator of Anoka County, 2100 Third Avenue, Anoka, Minnesota 55303, on behalf of the County, and to the City Administrator for the City of Fridley, 7071 University Avenue NE, Fridley, Minnesota 55432, on behalf of the City.

IX. INDEMNIFICATION / INSURANCE

Subject to exceptions and limitations provided by law, including but not limited to those contained in Minnesota Statutes, Chapter 466, the City agrees to indemnify and hold harmless the County from any claims, losses, costs, expenses or damages resulting from the acts or omissions of its respective officers, agents, or employees relating to activities conducted under this Agreement. The City shall maintain the insurance as set forth in **Exhibit D** and shall name the County of Anoka as additional insured on any such policies.

X. SEVERABILITY

Should any portion, term, condition, or provision of this Agreement be decided by a court of competent jurisdiction to be illegal or in conflicts with any laws of the State of Minnesota, or be otherwise rendered unenforceable or ineffectual, the validity of the remaining portions, terms, conditions and provisions shall not be affected thereby.

XI. AMENDMENT

Any alterations, variations, modifications or amendments to the provisions of this Agreement shall be valid only when they have been reduced to writing and duly signed by the parties.

XII. ENTIRE AGREEMENT

It is understood and agreed that the entire agreement of the parties is contained herein and that this Agreement supersedes all oral agreements and all negotiations between the parties relating to the subject matter thereof, as well as any previous agreement presently in effect between the parties to the subject matter thereof.





- 1.2 **Automobile Liability.** Contractor will maintain Automobile Liability and, if necessary, commercial umbrella insurance, with a limit of not less than \$3,000,000 each accident.
 - 1.2.1 Automobile insurance will cover liability arising out of Any Auto (including owned, hired, and non-owned autos). If the Contractor does not own any vehicles,

Anoka County will accept hired and non-owned autos with a letter from the Contractor stating that it does not own any autos.


- 1.2.2 Coverage as required in Paragraph 1.2 herein will be written on ISO form CA 00 01, or substitute form providing equivalent liability coverage. This endorsement supersedes the Standard Cancellation Statement on Certificates of Insurance to which this endorsement is attached.
- 1.5.3 **No Representation of Coverage Adequacy.** By requiring insurance herein, Anoka County does not represent that coverage and limits will necessarily be adequate to protect the Contractor and such coverage and limits shall not be deemed as a limitation on Contractor's liability under the indemnities granted to Anoka County in this Contract.
- 1.5.4 Failure of Anoka County to demand such certification or other evidence of full compliance with these insurance requirements or failure of Anoka County to identify deficiency from evidence that is provided will not be construed as a waiver of Contractor's obligation to maintain such insurance.
- 1.5.5 Failure to maintain the required insurance may result in termination of this Contract at Anoka County's option.
- 1.5.6 Contractor will provide certified copies of all insurance policies required herein within ten (10) days if requested in writing by Anoka County.
- 1.5.7 Cross-Liability coverage. If Contractor's liability does not contain the standard ISO separation of insured provision, or a substantially similar clause, they shall be endorsed to provide cross-liability coverage.
- 1.5.8 For any policy written on a claims-made basis, the Contractor warrants that any retroactive date applicable to coverage under the policy precedes the effective date of this Contract; and that continuous coverage will be maintained for an extended discovery period of two (2) years beginning from the time that work under this Contract is completed.
- 1.5.9 Acceptability of Insurer(s). Anoka County reserves the right to reject any insurance carriers that are rated less than: A.M. Best rating of A: IV.



Title

Resolution No. 2023-49, Approving 2024-2025 Business License Renewals

Background

Pursuant to certain sections of the Fridley City Code (Code), certain business licensing activities require approval of the Fridley City Council (Council), including:

- Food, Tobacco, Gas
- Junkyard
- Massage Therapy (individuals and businesses)
- On-Sale Liquor
- Liquor Catering

- Off-Sale Liquor
- Pawn Shop
- Hemp THC Products Shops
- Tobacco Product Shop.

The businesses listed in Resolution No. 2024-49 have met all requirements and paid all appropriate fees established in the Code for their respective licenses. Staff have performed all necessary inspections and checks to ensure all license requirements have been satisfied.

The Police Division conducts compliance checks for businesses holding massage therapy, on-sale liquor, off-sale liquor, pawn, tobacco, tobacco product shop and hemp THC product shop licenses. In the 2023-2024 licensing period, there were four tobacco violations for attempted sale to minors at Moore Lake Tobacco, Fridley BP, Kitty's Corner and Mr. Discount Tobacco. Violation letters were mailed to each business owner and to the staff member who failed the compliance check. The fee for a violation for the business owner is \$500. In addition, the Police Division works closely with the business owner and store manager to bolster staff training to ensure additional violations do not occur.

The Intoxicating Liquor Chapter of the Code requires restaurants to maintain a ratio of at least 40% of their annual sales from the sale of food (Exhibit A). As part of the license renewal process, the City requires certified financial statements, which show compliance with this requirement. All restaurants have satisfied the food-to-liquor sales requirement.

Vision Statement

We believe Fridley will be a safe, vibrant, friendly and stable home for families and businesses.

Financial Impact

All revenues for these licenses were anticipated as part of the 2024 Budget.

Recommendation

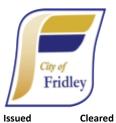

Public Hearing and Resolution No. 2024-53, Approving an Easement Vacation Request, SAV #24-01 for Natasha Lawrence, property owner of 6677 Lucia Lane N.E. (Ward 2)

Background

In 2018, the large single-family lot that was 6663 Lucia Lane N.E., was replatted to create three single family lots. When a property is replatted, the Subdivision Chapter of the City Code requires that drainage and utility easements be dedicated along the side and rear property lines.

In 2023, the petitioner, Natasha Lawrence reached out to City staff to inquire about combining the

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northern two lots, to create one large singlefamily lot, because the wetlands on the northern portion of Lot 3 made it difficult to be developed on its own. Staff advised that a simple lot combination form could be filed and recorded at Anoka County to make the two lots into one.

A small portion of the petitioner's new home will encroach into the easement, so staff suggested that the two five-foot side yard easements be vacated between Lots 2 and 3. The lot line that ran between the two lots no longer exists because of the lot combination, so there is no longer a need to retain the easements. North line of Lot 2, Block 1, VALEY ADDITION Also the South line of Lot 3, Block 1, VALEY ADDITION

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Engineering staff have reviewed this request

and have no concerns. Staff also notified private utility companies and no concerns were received from them.

A Notice of Public Hearing before the City Council was published in the April 5, 2024 and April 12, 2024 editions of the Official Publication.

Resolution No. 2024-51, Awarding 2024 Neighborhood Parks Improvements Project No. 24-70457

Background

On Tuesday, April 16 at 9:00 a.m., bids were publicly opened online via the virtual platform available on QuestCDN and Microsoft Teams for the 2024 Neighborhood Parks Improvements Project. Three responsive bids were received.

This project is part of the City of Fridley's (City) Park System Improvement Plan (PSIP). The parks included in this year's project are Edgewater Gardens Park, Plymouth Square Park and Logan Park (see Exhibit A). After a successful kick-off of the first year of implementation of the park plan in 2023, staff is excited to continue our second year of implementation. The purpose of the project is to provide park improvements that include improved accessibility, playground equipment, fitness equipment and added amenities such as picnic shelters. The playground equipment will be installed by specialized contractors and the remaining sitework and installations will be completed by the 2024 Neighborhood Parks Improvements Project contractor.

As noted, three bids were received. The low bid was received from Peterson Companies, Inc. of Chisago City, MN in the amount of \$725,600, which is 31% below the final engineer's estimate of \$1,052,426 (see Exhibit B). The next lowest bid was within \$126,661 (17.5%) of Peterson's bid. Of the three bids, the high bid received was \$954,329 and staff believes Peterson's competitive bid is attributed to having availability in their schedule prior to the close of the 2024 construction season.

Construction of this project is anticipated for this season with substantial completion by late-October 2024. Note all work under the project must meet the City's prevailing wage requirements.

Peterson Companies has successfully completed three projects for the City in the past three years as well as others within the past several years. The three most recent were the Craig Park Improvements, East Moore Lake Biochar & Iron-Enhanced Sand Filter, and Farr Lake/Danube Ponds Dredging Projects. Staff believes they are a responsive and reputable contractor, and will deliver the project with the requisite quality specified in the bid documents.

Vision Statement

The resolution requests the bid amount of \$725,600.74 with a 5% contingency. The contingency would be available for any unforeseen minor exclusions in the plans, or additional improvements that may be identified by staff during construction of the project. If the City Council approves the attached resolution, staff will notify the contractor of the award and issue a notice to proceed to the contractor upon receipt of acceptable submittals.

Financial Impact

Funding is provided by bond proceeds through the Capital Investment Program (CIP). The 2024 Neighborhood Improvements Project combined with the playground equipment and installation is approximately \$257,250 under the approved 2024 CIP budget. This is a result of in-kind work performed by Parks Maintenance Staff that included miscellaneous site removals. Additionally, Engineering Staff provided in-house project design and contract administration through the bid solicitation phase. Construction administration and oversight will also be provided by Public Works Staff through project completion.

Recommendation

Staff recommends the approval of Resolution No. 2024-51, Awarding 2024 Neighborhood Parks Improvements Project No. 24-70457.



Resolution No. 2024-52, Awarding 2024 Street Rehabilitation Project No. ST2024-01

Background

On Tuesday, April 16 at 9:30 a.m., bids were publicly opened via the virtual bidding platform QuestCDN and Microsoft Teams for the 2024 Street Rehabilitation Project No. ST2024-01. A total of eight responsive bids were received.

The 2024 Street Rehabilitation Project No. ST2024-01 is identified within the City of Fridley's (City) annual street rehabilitation program and includes the rehabilitation of portions of Lucia Lane, Channel Road, 66th Avenue, Norton Avenue and Buchanan Street. The total project length is approximately 1.28 miles.

Roadway rehabilitation across the project will include asphalt reclaiming and milling, asphalt paving and concrete curb & gutter repairs. Additional roadway improvements include the termination and construction of a cul-de-sac at the intersection of Lucia Lane and 68th Place, as well as the construction of traffic calming measures along Channel Road.

Improvements to the City's existing water utility distribution system will include the replacement of approximately 1,650 feet of water main along Channel Road as well as the replacement of 12 fire hydrant assemblies across the project area. Additional utility improvements include the construction of a hydrodynamic separator device along Channel Road for stormwater pretreatment.

As noted, eight bids were received (Exhibit A). The low bid was received from North Valley, Inc. of Nowthen, Minnesota in the amount of \$1,211,092.08. This is 18% below the final engineer's estimate of \$1,480,112.50. The three lowest bids were competitive and within \$65,371.60 of one another and the four lowest bids were within \$102,897.36. Of the eight bids, the high bid received was \$1,739,092.07.

The City has worked with North Valley, Inc. in the past, most recently as the prime contractor of the 2021 Street Rehabilitation Project No. ST2021-01 as well as a subcontractor on the 7th Street and 57th Avenue Trail Project No. ST2021-21. Staff believe they are a knowledgeable and reputable contractor and will deliver the project within the requisite quality specified in the bid documents.

Vision Statement

We believe Fridley will be a safe, vibrant, friendly and stable home for families and businesses.

Based upon favorable pricing of the low bid, special assessments are anticipated to be lower than the preliminary estimates previously reported at the Hearing on Improvements. Property owners will receive notification of project advancement in May presuming the City Council awards the project at this meeting. A project information sheet will provide a tentative work schedule, work description and contact information. During the project, staff will distribute weekly project updates via email and the project-specific page on the City's website to minimize disruption to the residents. Staff expect work to begin in June/July with substantial completion in September of this year.

Financial Impact

Funding for this project is derived from several sources including Municipal State Aid street funding, special assessments and Utility Capital Investment Plan (CIP) funds (water, sanitary sewer, and storm sewer). Additional CIP funding for Traffic Safety Upgrades will support the addition of traffic calming improvements along Channel Road.

The low bid for the overall project is roughly \$200,000 below budget. Special assessment estimates based on the low bid are in line with preliminary estimates.

Recommendation

Staff recommend the approval of Resolution No. 2024-52, Awarding 2024 Street Rehabilitation Project No. ST2024-01.

Title

Resolution No. 2024-55, Appointing Members to the Public Arts Commission

Background

In fall of 2023, the City of Fridley (City) hosted a series of public engagement meetings. These meetings were well attended and facilitated by Gretchen Nicholls and Barbara Raye, CDI, Minneapolis. The facilitators were instrumental in drawing out the creative notions of those who attended. The goal of the sessions was to prepare a plan and recommendations for the Fridley City Council (Council) to help direct the initiative in a way the public saw the City's identity moving. The final report was posted on the City website after the Council received the document in January of this year.

Great things have grown out of the recommendations have a task force, creation of a 501C3 non-profit as the fund-raising arm, and starting small with the installations so policy can form around the installations and the task force can make a final policy plan document that includes not only suggested art installation locations, but set policy for rotation (if appropriate), temporary installations, maintenance, etc.

The task force has so enthusiastically taken on its role that the Mayor and Council have asked that the task force be formally recognized as the Fridley Art Commission. The council considered the ordinance to transition the group from a task force to a Commission at the April 8 City Council meeting. A Second Reading of that Ordinance will occur this evening.

The Public Arts Commission will be established to foster the development of the arts, to advise the Council on arts related matters and to stimulate participation in and appreciation of the arts by residents. Members to be appointed to the Commission include Joshua Collins, Ryan Fugleberg, Gary Osterbauer, Frank Sedzielarz, Maija Sedzielarz and Gary Swanson.

While still a task force, the future Arts Commission named the 501C3, Fridley Creative Arts Foundation. The formative legal documents necessary for a 501C3 are being reviewed and prepared at this time.

Financial Impact

Meeting minutes will now be officially prepared, which is consistent with the process of all other City administrative processes. Cost absorbed.

Appointing Members to the Fridley Public Art Commission

Whereas, the Fridley City Council (Council) asked staff to create a process for encouraging Public Art in the City of Fridley (City); and

Whereas, to initially guide the Fridley Public Art Plan, the City enlisted LISC Twin Cities' Corridor Development Initiative (CDI) to facilitate a series of community workshops from September to October 2023 to gather community input; and

Whereas, numerous residents and business participants attended three community workshops, and others offered their input through an on-line Public Art Ideas map that provided an alternative way for community members to identify potential locations for public art and suggestions for what type of public art could be a good fit for those locations; and

Whereas, as defined by those members of the public, accessible original art enriches the City as it evokes meaning in the public realm. It can be a variety of art forms and takes into consideration the site, its location and context, and the audience. Public art may possess functional as well as aesthetic qualities; it may be integrated or discreet. Artists may work in partnership with other design professionals or members of the community; however, the artist is directly involved in the concept, design, or creation. Performances, installations, events, and other temporary expressions are included in the definition; and

Whereas, those engaged in the process created the following Mission statement: Empowering our vibrant community through the transformative power of public art, our mission is to cultivate a cityscape that celebrates diversity, creativity, and shared experiences. We are dedicated to fostering a sense of belonging, sparking dialogue and inspiring innovation through the strategic integration of art into our urban fabric, enhancing the quality of life for all residents and visitors; and

Whereas, the public participants recommended the following;

- 1. creation of an Arts Commission composed of people that understand art.
- 2. Commissioners could include artists/creatives, business owners, community organizations, and others.
- 3. Delay creating public art policies or ordinances until there is clarity from experience, and how to best guide or administer public art initiatives (e.g., how to accept donations or gifts, how to sunset art, etc.).
- 4. Consider ways to integrate public art into capital projects where the city is already building infrastructure.
- 5. Coordinate efforts with the Park System Improvement Plan to explore opportunities to incorporate public art in parks.

6. Other cities like Hopkins, Bloomington, Mankato, Minneapolis, and Saint Paul have models of governance bodies that oversee public art activities and offer important insights valuable to their cities; and

Whereas, all members of the task force originally created in 2023, in response to the Public Arts engagement process have carried on their responsibilities admirably; and

Whereas, members of that task force included Joshua Collins, Ryan Fugleberg, Gary Osterbauer, Frank Sedzielarz, Maija Sedzielarz and Gary Swanson, who all agree to loyally transition into their role as Public Art Commissioner.

Now, therefore be resolved, that the City Council of the City of Fridley does hereby appoint Joshua Collins, Ryan Fugleberg, Gary Osterbauer, Frank Sedzielarz, Maija Sedzielarz and Gary Swanson to the Fridley Public Arts Commission for terms to expire on December 31, 2027.
