K. TDC Administrator's Board Report:

Information Items:

1. Collections Report: August Collections were \$ 190,136.02 Which is a 42% increase over August 2019. An increase of \$55,897.35. This is the highest amount ever collected by the Franklin County TDC in the month of August.

2. Occupancy Statistics: With September occupancy rates being above 20% higher than in 2019 the TDC expects to surpass last year's record collections numbers for the year. This with being closed for almost 2 months for rentals.

3. The Franklin County TDC is excited to announce the release in the next few days of the new Visit Florida's Forgotten Coast Mobile App. The Board approved the creation of the App back in September. The last 2 months has been spent building and tweaking the App. This is a major step forward in the promotion of Franklin County as a tourist destination.

4. Visit Florida Flagler Awards: Commissioner Jones and myself will be attending the Visit Florida Awards ceremony this Thursday. The Franklin County TDC has been recognized in three categories for awards. We do not know what place we finished but we do know the TDC has won three Flagler Awards this year.

The final application will be on file at that office on or before November 30, 2020, the submission deadline date.

The grant applications contains the following components. Alligator Point Project, Alligator Drive Area \$9,600,000 Beach/dune construction for Alligator Point \$ 700,000 Engineering \$ 700,000 Administration \$11,000,000 Total St. George Island Dune Restoration Project \$1,500,000 Dune construction \$ 156,000 Engineering \$ 144,000 Administration \$1,800,000 Total

Proposed beach/dune restoration will address the CDBG national objective of Urgent Need. There will be no displacement of households or businesses as a result of this project.

CDBG Administrator - Report (Deborah Belcher)

M. CDBG Board Report

Action Items:

1. The County is applying to the Florida Department of Economic Opportunity (DEO) for the initial round of Hurricane Michael Community Development Block Grant Disaster Recovery (CDBG-DR) infrastructure funding. Applications are due 11/30/2020. The Board authorized the initiation of 2 project applications: beach renourishment/dune restoration on Alligator Point in the vicinity of Alligator Drive, and dune restoration on St. George Island. Neither application is likely to score will in the competition, as they do not serve a primarily low/moderate income beneficiary group, and they do not address the DEO priority infrastructure categories of stormwater, potable water, wastewater. However, they are eligible for funding if they make it through the competitive process.

Requested Action: Conduct public hearing on CDBG-DR application for Alligator Point beach renourishment and dune restoration,

Requested Action: Conduct public hearing on CDBG-DR applicationa for Saint George Island dune restoration.

Requested Action: Adopt Resolution authorizing submission of the grant applications.

2. Three new applications for CDBG mobile home replacement were received from Eastpoint Wildfire zone property owners, and one former applicant confirmed her desire to proceed with home replacement. One of the homeowners, Daniel Walker, had a mobile home on the property at the time of the fire, but had not installed septic tank, well or power. Due to cancer, he had to stop work, and has been assisted by his daughter on the adjacent property with power and use of plumbing. Walker will need CDBG funding not only for the mobile home replacement, but for the septic tank, well and power.

3. The County received 2 responses from mobile home dealers to the advertised CDBG bid package #4, request for mobile home replacement bids for Eastpoint Wildfire victims. The responders are Clayton Homes of Panama City and Ironwood Homes of Perry. Ironwood's pricing was significantly lower than Clayton's on comparable models. I discussed the proposals with each of the homeowners, and they all approved and requested funding for the Ironwood Homes of Perry proposals.

Special Projects Consultant - Alan Pierce - Report

W. Special Projects Coordinator Board Report

Action Item:

1. Board action to ratify a Resolution signed by the Chairman on Friday, Nov. 13, supporting the county's application for design funds from the FDEP Beach Management Program. I had advised the Board on September 15 that Mike Dombrowski would be drafting a resolution and would be getting it to Michael Moron. It has taken longer than I expected.

I also would like to remind the Board that this FDEP application is only for the design portion, which is \$200K. If FDEP approves funds for design then the county would apply in the 2022 Legislature for construction funds. If FDEP does not approve the design then the funding of a beach to protect 1.1 mile of Alligator Drive will not happen through the FDEP program. Board action to ratify the Resolution, and then I will describe the other path the county is seeking to protect the road.

Information Items:

2. I understand from Ms. Debbie Belcher that she is completing an application for CDBG-DR funds for a beach project to protect Alligator Drive in the same location and manner as the FDEP Beach Management application. The difference in the applications is not the funds as both projects propose a construction cost of \$10M, and it is not a difference in dimensions as

both projects propose to protect the same 1.1 mile of road that is most vulnerable to storm damage. The difference in applications is in the county's obligation. Under the FDEP program, the state would provide 50% of the construction costs and the county would have to provide 50% of the construction costs. So, the state would put up \$5M funded from the Legislature and the county would put up \$5M from its RESTORE funds. Under the CDBG program, the county would not have to put up any money; the CDBG program would provide all the funds. I have spoken to Ms. Belcher and I believe she was going to ask for \$11M in the event there are some cost over-runs.

The question I have for the Board is how the Board wants to proceed on maintaining the beach if we receive CDBG funds. The Board has said previously that if FDEP funds the project the Board would create an assessment to help maintain the beach. Does the Board have the same opinion if CDBG funds the project?

And if the Board does have the same opinion, and if the county gets funded then the first step in determining an assessment is determining how large an area can be included in the assessment. The size of the area to be included in the assessment has a direct bearing on how much an individual would pay. In general, the question has been whether all property owners on the Point, which could be as many as 1000, could legally be included in an assessment, or whether just those property owners who need the road, which is less than 500, would be the assessment area. I give this advice now because if we get funded for the beach the county needs to get a legal opinion on the extent of the assessment area.

3. Inform the Board that the state has issued a time extension for 8 county Hurricane Michael projects till October, 2022, and one of them is PW 1152, Alligator Drive. I had sent a letter to FDEM yesterday asking for a time extension until Sept. 30, 2021, and then received a phone call from FDEM saying that this much longer time extension had already been granted. I do not expect the project to take that long, but the current deadline for permanent work to be completed is April 11, 2021, and no matter what happens with the bid process the project will not be completed by then.

The other county projects that have received a time extension until Oct. 1, 2022 are: C30A; St. George Island Fishing Pier; Island View Park; Ochlockonee Bridge fishing pier; Eastpoint Fishing Pier; Alligator Point Dune Walkovers; St. George Island Fishing Pier Road.

Ms. Brownell's office had made the request back on Feb. 21, 2020, but the FDEM contractor who called me said there was no indication the state sent her the letters notifying her of the extensions. I have received a set and have provided them for the Board file.

4. Status of Alligator Point Road repairs- as the Board is aware, we received a letter from Anderson Columbia saying they could not honor their original bid to repair Alligator Drive, but for \$130K increase in price they would still do the job. Based upon my desire not to have to re-bid I did recommend the Board accept this increased bid. At the last meeting I told the Board that I had sent a draft contract to FEMA for review and have not heard back. I have since been advised that Ms. Brownell has arranged for a FEMA procurement webinar on Thursday, Nov. 19. I am going to participate in this webinar because I am concerned with two items. Can the Board accept an increased bid from one vendor without allowing other vendors the same opportunity? And, I have a question about the required notification of minority businesses. There is a registry of minority business, and I can not find where I sent the bid notice back in 2019 to the registry. To further compound the issue, the bid documents that Dewberry use requires a qualified applicant to be FDOT pre-qualified and I need to verify with FEMA whether such additional requirement is consistent with their procurement. The summary is that I might have to reverse my recommendation on re-bidding. I have discussed this situation with Clay Kennedy and Mr. Shuler. I certainly defer to the Board, but at this time I believe I should participate in the FEMA webinar on Thursday and then make a recommendation to the Board at the Dec. 1 BCC meeting.

County Coordinator - Michael Morón - Report

X. County Coordinator's Board Report

Action Items

1. CR 30A & CR 67 CEI Services: Negotiations with AECOM Technical Services, Inc. to provide the CEI services for the widening and resurfacing of CR 30A and CR 67 have concluded, and it is recommended that the County enter into agreements with them. The agreement for CR 30A would be for \$124,970.38 and the agreement for CR 67 would be for \$372,934.96. These costs will be covered by the FDOT grants for these projects.

Request: Board action to have the chairman sign these two contracts.

2. Airport Master Plan Meeting: On Tuesday, October 27th AVCON hosted a public hearing via Zoom where the Airport Master plan development alternatives were presented, and public feedback was received. There was a good question and answer segment at the end of the presentation. There was one request to extend the public comment deadline beyond the December 2nd date to allow local interested parties to review the information. I asked John Collins (AVCON) to contact FAA and FDOT and ask if the 36-day public comment period was adequate, both agencies agreed that any extension to the comment period was not justified. Unless the Board thinks otherwise, the December 2nd deadline will stand, and AVCON will consider and incorporate into the Master Plan summary report any public comments and suggestions submitted by that date. The Master Plan summary report will be presented to the Board early next year for your review and approval.

Request: Board discussion and direction regarding the December 2nd public comment deadline.

3. In-Person Public Attendance: In October, the Board directed staff to contact surrounding counties to find out what they were doing about in-person public attendance for BOCC meetings. Based on that research, all six counties are opened to the public for meetings with social distancing requirements, however, some require masks, temperature checks, and other regulations. With that in mind, here are some recommendations for re-opening your meetings for in-person public attendance:

-Start in-person attendance at your January 5, 2021 meeting

-Use the allowed seating locations as designated by the 2nd Circuit Court Trial Marshal, which is based on the Florida Supreme Court Chief Justice's order. Designate what seating will reserved for staff, for agenda presenters, and for the public.

- Require temperature checks before entering the meeting room.

- Require mask, unless you are speaking in front of a microphone. Removing your mask to speak allows for a clear understanding of what is being said for the official meeting minutes.

- Continue the use of Zoom and Live-stream. Applicants, presenters, public comments will be heard in-room and virtually via Zoom.

- If there is an overcrowding issue based on limited available seating, those wanting to comment during the Public Comments agenda item will be rotated with anyone waiting at an outside location to speak.

- The meeting room will be sanitized prior to and after each meeting. A hand sanitizing station will be located at the speaker podium for anyone that addresses the Board from that location.

- Planning and Zoning and Board of Adjustment meetings will be conducted via Zoom. Will the Board require in-person attendance starting in January?

Request: Board discussion and possible action on procedures for allowing in-person public attendance at meetings.

4. Planning & Zoning Appointment: Commissioner Boldt would like to appoint Ms. Kay McCord to the Planning and Zoning District 2 seat. Ms. McCord has talked to Ms. Amy Kelly (Zoning Administrator) about her role as a Planning and Zoning member and attended the November 10th Planning and Zoning meeting as an observer.

Request: Board action to appoint Ms. Kay McCord to the Planning and Zoning District 2 seat.

5. E Triple C Funding: Ms. Traci Buzbee (CARES Act Funding Consultant) recently received a Business grant application from Elder Care Community Council of Franklin County (E Triple C). After reviewing the application, Ms. Buzbee realized that E Triple C would qualify as a candidate for the \$10,000 food distribution grant for food pantries and distribution. Their application indicates that distribution of daily meals has increased from 10 to somewhere between 60 – 80. It would raise that line-item grant amount from \$40,000 to \$50,000. Your CARES Act Funding Oversight Committee recommends this action.

Request: Board action to award E Triple C a \$10,000 food pantry and distribution grant.

6. High-Speed Internet Resolution: Staff received a request from Mr. Chris Doolin (Small County Coalition) to ask for Board adoption and the Chairman's signature on a Resolution supporting Affordable and Reliable High-Speed Internet throughout Florida. This Resolution will be presented to the Secretary of the Department of Economic Opportunity, Dane Eagle, during the Small County Coalition lunch or during another meeting scheduled for December 3rd in Jacksonville. A sample copy of the Resolution and the Small County Coalition Broadband Initiative document are attached to my report.

Request: Board action to adopt and authorize the Chairman's signature on the Resolution.

7. Syrup Branch & Trout Creek Bridge Repairs: Attached are inspection reports for New River Road over Syrup Branch (494099) and Mill Road over Trout Creek (494096), both in Tate's Hell Forest. Also attached are two proposals, \$50,375 (494099) and \$88,850 (494096) to repair both bridges, and based on the proposals, are in need of extensive repairs. As stated, both bridges are in Tate's Hell Forest and probably used by the State more than any home or property owners. Unless there are other uses that would justify using approximately \$140,000 of county funds to repair these bridges, is the Board interested in transferring ownership of these bridges to the State? Until that decision is made, should the Board direct Mr. Howard Nabors to close both bridges (roads)?

Request: Board discussion and direction.

8. EP Christmas Parade: Mrs. Dottye Thornburg, event coordinator for the 2020 Eastpoint Christmas parade and celebration is requesting approval of the parade route. The parade

line-up will start at 4:00 pm (ET), thirty minutes before the parade start time, on Friday, December 11th. The parade will begin on behind Webb seafood, at the corner of Power Drive and C A Gillespie Street, then turn left (East) onto Highway 98 and end at Fisherman's Choice (300 Highway 98).

Request: Board action to approve the Eastpoint 2020 Christmas parade route.

9. Tobacco Grant Letter of Support: Ms. Marquita Thompkins, Tobacco Prevention Specialist with the Department of Health, requested a letter of support from the County to retain grant funding for the County's tobacco prevention program. The letter was due on Friday of last week, so Chairman Lockley signed it that morning.

Request: Board action to ratify the Chairman's signature on the letter of support.

10. Artificial Reef Grant: During Public Comments you should have heard from Ms. Lorena Holley and Frank Gidus (Coastal Conservation Association) regarding a request to have Franklin County apply for a grant from the FWC to construct an artificial reef on the Carrabelle 10 Mile Reef in the honor of Dr. Bart Carey. Unfortunately, I do not have any additional information on this request besides the documentation attached to my report. Is the Board ready to proceed with this request based on the information provided or do you need additional information?

Request: Board discussion and direction.

11. FAC Conference: Remind the Board that the Florida Association of Counties Legislative Conference is scheduled for December 2nd – 4th at the Hyatt Regency in Duval County. This is the final opportunity for the association members to meet and voice their opinion on the policies FAC lobbies during the legislative session.

12. ARPC Municipal Representative: Mayor LaPaz has served as the County's Apalachee Regional Planning Council (ARPC) municipal representative for approximately four years. Usually, the Board rotates this seat between the City of Apalachicola and the City of Carrabelle every two years. Would the Board like me to reach out to the City of Apalachicola to find out if they would like to serve as the County's municipal representative?

Request: Board discussion and direction.

13. Highway 98 Letter to FDOT: At your last meeting I was directed to send a letter to Florida Department of Transportation (FDOT) regarding repairs to Highway 98 from Carrabelle to Eastpoint and both causeways between Eastpoint and Apalachicola. After checking the FDOT's Five Year Work Program for Franklin County, a Highway 98 resurfacing project from Franklin St. in Eastpoint to the Carrabelle River Bridge is already in design and engineering phase. However, I did not see any projects that would resurface the causeways between Eastpoint and Apalachicola. Would the Board consider amending the previous motion so the letter request repairs to the causeways only so there isn't a mixed message sent to FDOT that would pause the Eastpoint to Carrabelle Highway 98 resurfacing project?

Request: Board discussion and direction.

Information Items

14. FDOT TRIP & TA Grants: The Florida Department of Transportation informed Mr. Mark Curenton (County Planner) that the Transportation Alternative (TA) and the Transportation Regional Incentive Program (TRIP) grant cycles are now open. The TA grant funds nonmotorized transportation such as sidewalks and multi-use trails. The TRIP grants have to be multi-county projects. I have included more detailed information from FDOT as an attachment so if you have any questions contact Mr. Curenton. The application deadline is Friday, February 26, 2021.

Ms. Jordan asked why it was not repaired. She said \$450,000 is being spent on the St. George Island bathrooms and this park has not been repaired and people are traveling by it coming into the community. Department Directors Report

Superintendent of Public Works – Howard Nabors

D. Road Department Board Report

Mr. Nabors said they are cutting grass and some of the inmate crews came back last Monday. He stated there are 2 inmates per crew. He explained they are weed eating ditches and will start on driveway and shoulder work after they are caught up on grass cutting. Mr. Nabors reported 2 more crews are getting inmate certified this week so that will give him 6 inmate crews. Chairman Lockley said that is good so they can get caught up.

Mr. Moron read the following item from his report:

1. North Bay Shore Drive Emergency Repair – Commissioner Jones and Mr. Howard Nabors stated that there is a portion of North Bay Shore Drive that is sinking and determined it requires immediate repairs. Roberts and Roberts was asked to look at this issue and determine what could be done to repair this road as soon as possible. Unfortunately, until the pavement is removed and the road is "dug up", we won't know if the drainage reinforced concrete pipes and the headwalls will have to be replaced. With that in mind, Roberts and Roberts was asked to provide a "worst cost scenario" proposal which they did at a total cost of \$61,350.

D.

Request: Board action to declare this matter an emergency and authorize the Chairman to sign an agreement, based on the quote, to repair the sinking portion of North Bay Shore Drive for an amount not to exceed \$61,350 which will be paid from District 1's paving fund.

Mr. Nabors said a pipe may have separated with all the rain and the road is caving in. He reported when FEMA was here they took pictures and looked at this area so hopefully the county will get reimbursed. Attorney Shuler stated the Board needs to declare a state of emergency so they can bypass the local bid policy. He asked Mr. Nabors to give testimony about whether or not he considers this road sinking an emergency and whether he has a recommendation on repairs. Mr. Nabors stated the road definitely needs to be fixed. Attorney Shuler asked if it needs to be fixed on an emergency basis. Mr. Nabors answered yes. He stated the road is caving in so they need to either close the road or fix it. Commissioner Jones explained when he and Mr. Nabors looked at the road last week it was sinking but now the road is about 3" below the other side. Mr. Nabors reported signs and barricades are posted in this area. He said if the road gets any worse it will have to be closed. Attorney Shuler stated that is a sufficient factual basis for the Board to declare an emergency and move forward with an emergency bid. On motion by Commissioner Jones, seconded by Commissioner Boldt, and by unanimous vote of the Board present, it was agreed to declare this situation an emergency and authorize the Chairman to sign the agreement based on the quote to repair the sinking portion of North Bay Shore Drive in an amount not to exceed \$61,350 which will be paid from **District 1's paving fund.** Chairman Lockley questioned if there is signage in this area. Special Project Consultant – Alan Pierce – Report

Mr. Pierce said in response to the public comment this morning about Island View Park this project is FEMA funded and the St. George Island Bathroom Project is a not FEMA funded but a locally funded project. He explained the timeline for this project is under FEMA control not the county's control. Mr. Pierce stated FEMA has obligated the funds and the project will move forward but the park must be re-designed. He said the park was completed and 6 weeks later the storm came in and damaged part of the park. Mr. Pierce explained it was clear to everyone that the park should be re-designed so it will not be damaged again. He described the damage that was done and the improvements that are needed when the park is rebuilt. Mr. Pierce stated the park has to be put back in its natural habitat because the money to buy the land was given to keep it as a natural maritime hammock. He said he is not leading this project but wanted to provide an update for informational purposes.

Mr. Pierce reported the Board directed that Anderson Columbia be awarded the low bid on the rebuilding of Alligator Drive. He stated he talked with Mr. Clay Kennedy, Dewberry, and Attorney Shuler and Mr. Jesse Rose, FEMA, has volunteered to review the draft contract to make sure it has all the things that would be required in a FEMA contract. He reported the contract has been sent to Mr. Rose but has not been signed yet because they are trying to determine what they need to do to be in compliance because the bid was a year old and there was an increase in price. He said he is trying to protect the Board and make sure they are on the right path so FEMA will review the language on the contract and hopefully that will eliminate one issue that might be a problem. He reported this is a big project and they want to get it done but he does not want to impose a burden on the county at a later date so he is trying to be as diligent as possible. Attorney Shuler asked Mr. Pierce to clarify the potential risk

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he is trying to mitigate. Mr. Pierce stated FEMA has obligated \$5.5 million for the rebuilding of Alligator Drive and they have a low bid and amendment that is below the obligated funds but the county did not rebid the project so he wants to make sure FEMA is satisfied with the process. He explained he does not know if the worst case scenario is just the \$130,000 increase in price or the fact that FEMA wants them to do the whole process again. Mr. Pierce stated the worst case could be \$4.8 million but he does not know because they will not give him a definite answer on what will happen at closeout in 1-2 years. He said he is trying to mitigate the risk but there is an unknown. Mr. Pierce stated there are also personnel changes at FEMA with these big projects that go on for a long time. He said he would think the federal representative should be on their side because he is trying to get this road finished before another hurricane but that is not a legal basis for proceeding. Chairman Lockley said Mr. Pierce is trying to keep the county from having to pay any more money. Attorney Shuler reported Mr. Pierce came to him for advice but although he has been the Board's attorney for 20 years he has not handled FEMA reimbursements or FEMA projects. He explained he is not able to help Mr. Pierce so he directed him back to FEMA, their consultants or DEM because they are familiar with the processes and can give guidance. He reported this is a potential risk to the Board if FEMA at the end says the project should have been rebid and they will not provide reimbursement. Attorney Shuler stated he does not know how to guide Mr. Pierce or the Board on this issue so they must look to someone else to answer this question. Commissioner Parrish said he feels like they need to move on because the bid went up \$130,000 after almost a year and Commissioner Boldt has agreed to pay this increase out of his road paving funds if necessary. He questioned if that is the risk with the project. Mr. Pierce said he does not know. Attorney Shuler stated they do not know but it could be the entire cost of the project and not just the increase and that is why they need guidance from FEMA. Commissioner Parrish asked if the county could be at risk for \$4-5 million. Mr. Pierce said he does not know but the Board bid the project and accepted the low bid. He stated he feels like FEMA would honor the low bid and it would be the increase they did not negotiate that was in question but he does not know. Commissioner Parrish reported this will create another delay in the project. Mr. Pierce stated he does not want to do that. Commissioner Parrish said it sounds like they have no other choice. Chairman Lockley stated he does not mind the \$130,000 but it is different if it is \$4-5 million. Commissioner Parrish asked who the FEMA representative is. Mr. Pierce replied Mr. Rose is going to look at the contract but he told him as far as FEMA is concerned there is \$5.5 million available to Franklin County to build the road and the contractual issues are not FEMA's responsibility. He explained the Florida Division of Emergency Management (FDEM) handles these items and he has reached out their representative Mr. Buck Dickinson. Mr. Pierce said he has shown Attorney Shuler the emails from Mr. Dickinson which said if the project is less than the \$5.5 million it looks like they have room. He reported that indicates they should move forward but they have not done this before so he is trying to be careful. Commissioner Parrish clarified that the state administers this FEMA allocation on behalf of FEMA. Mr. Pierce replied yes. Commissioner Parrish stated Mr. Dickinson told him to move forward. Mr. Pierce said when he told him about the \$130,000 overage Mr. Dickinson commented as long as they are under the \$5.5 million allocated he does not see a problem. Commissioner Parrish questioned if they have this comment in an email. Mr. Pierce responded yes. Chairman Lockley questioned

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if they should check with their representatives. Mr. Pierce explained he does not want to contact the elected officials because that will definitely slow the project down. Commissioner Jones stated if they have written email correspondence from the state that says they have room and the amount of money for the project and FEMA is not going to look into the contracts or bids the county received then he agreed with Commissioner Parrish that they need to move forward and build the road. He said if they do not move forward then they will never see an end to this matter because FEMA does switch the representatives working in the county and they could get another answer in the next 4 weeks. Mr. Pierce agreed they switch personnel every 6 months. Commissioner Parrish said the state is holding the money and administering it for FEMA and the state is saying as long as they do not exceed the \$5.5 they should move forward. He reported if it is going to take 6 weeks to start this project they need to get started so this road is completed before the next hurricane season. Commissioner Parrish stated they cannot delay another 90 days and complete the project before hurricane season. He said it is time to move forward. Mr. Pierce said the contract has been sent to FEMA for review so hopefully he will bring the contract back to the Board at the next meeting and they can move forward. Mr. Moron reported Ms. Traci Buzbee, The Management Experts, said she will contact Mr. Pierce after the meeting and provide assistance. Mr. Pierce said hopefully they will have an answer from FEMA on the contract at the next meeting and the Board can take action. Commissioner Jones reported that way they will only have a 2 week delay. Mr. Pierce answered yes. Chairman Lockley said they need to make sure they have everything in writing.

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Mr. Pierce presented copies of a letter from the Alligator Point Water Resources District to the Board members about the Alligator Point multi-use/bike path project. He said Attorney Shuler and Commissioner Boldt already have a copy of this letter and he defers to them on whether or not this is an action item for today. He read the letter addressing this project and the depth of cuts and damage that could occur to existing water service lines. Mr. Pierce said he has not been involved in this project but he does not think the project has been awarded. He stated this may be an issue that causes the contract not to be awarded but he defers to the Board. Commissioner Boldt stated in Paragraph 2 of the letter they are concerned about the cross section of cuts required for installing the base material and say anything deeper will impair the existing water lines. He said this implies the design is right and that they do not need to go any deeper. He reported they should go ahead and do an analysis and meet with Mr. Charles Cook, Project Manager, and the water board and check this out. Commissioner Boldt stated from a planning standpoint when they are rebuilding Alligator Drive they cannot do that project and the multi-use/bike path project at the same time due to traffic so they have time to pursue this matter. Attorney Shuler reminded the Board of the bid protest filed regarding the award of the bike path to Roberts & Roberts after the disqualification of Capital Asphalt. He said he is not sure about the engineering language but it sounds like there may be a design flaw so they may need to pause this process and let the engineers get together and figure out the path forward. He said the design may be fine or the design may not be sufficient and need to be designed and rebid but they do not know until the experts address it. He requested the Board consider notifying FDOT and Roberts & Roberts of this matter and that the county is pausing the project until the engineers can come up with a resolution and report back to the Board so they can

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make a decision. He explained cutting the water lines could substantially increase the cost of the project. He suggested they allow the engineers to get together and come back to the Board with a report. Commissioner Parrish said the letter is requesting a meeting between the engineer and Dewberry. Mr. Pierce stated the contractor should be included but the contractor for this project has not been hired yet. Attorney Shuler said to his knowledge FDOT has not given concurrence to the award of the contract to Roberts & Roberts so in the absence of that concurrence there is no contract. Commissioner Parrish said they need to have this meeting to look at the design to see if these items must be considered so if they move forward the contractor is aware of the issues he is facing. He stated when the county does a project they must check the lines so nothing is cut. Commissioner Parrish said he does not see anything wrong with this happening and it should not take much time. Commissioner Parrish asked if they are saying this is west of the Alligator Point Volunteer Fire Department and asked if this is where the bike path is going. Mr. Pierce reported the first phase that is being built is from the marina to the fire house. He explained they are starting at that point and working their way toward Highway 98. Commissioner Boldt reported sometimes there are 2 paths of 5 ft. paralleling Alligator Drive on each side because there is not enough right-of-way for one path of 10 ft. Chairman Lockley reported checking the depth of the pipes is a common thing that is done but apparently they have not done it. Commissioner Boldt agreed they need to get moving and work with the water department to make sure this is okay. Chairman Lockley said this seems like a simple fix. Commissioner Boldt asked if a motion is necessary. Mr. Pierce stated the letter said to please reply if they accept the offer so he will give the letter to Mr. Moron. Attorney Shuler reported they should pause the project and put Roberts & Roberts on notice that they are pausing the project because they do not know where this is going but the Board can come back in 2 weeks and un-pause the project if necessary. He stated he is not sure how long this will take but there is a bid protect and threat of a lawsuit also. Attorney Shuler reported FDOT is also reviewing the bid and determining if they will give concurrence or not to the award of the bid to Roberts & Roberts. He stated they should notify FDOT and Roberts & Roberts that they are pausing the project until they get an engineering resolution to this conflict that was reported by the Alligator Point Water Resources District. Attorney Shuler reported the Board does need to take action because the last action was to award the contract and move forward. He explained once they receive input from the engineers and the Alligator Point Water Resources District they can come back and take further action. **Commissioner** Boldt made a motion to notify FDOT and Roberts & Roberts that the county received this notification from the Alligator Point Water Resources District and there may be an engineering problem and they are pausing consideration of the construction project until the potential engineering issue is resolved. Commissioner Massey seconded the motion. Chairman Lockley said this is a good thing to do because they do not know who the contractor is going to be yet and they need everyone to be together. Commissioner Parrish said he would have thought all these issues would have been resolved when they were designing this project. He suggested this could be an attempt to delay the project by some of the residents as the bike path will encourage more people in the area and they do not like people coming down to Alligator Point. Commissioner Parrish stated it seems like the engineers would have taken this into consideration when they designed the project. He reported he is in favor of the pause for

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the 2 weeks but not for stonewalling the project. Commissioner Boldt reported the citizens of Alligator Point welcome both of these projects. He said it is a positive conversation and these projects will happen. Chairman Lockley stated people need to accept this because these areas are private and public and the county has to do what they have to do. **Motion carried; 5-0.**

D.

County Coordinator – Michael Morón – Report

Mr. Moron provided his report for the Board as follows:

J. County Coordinator's Report

Action Items

1. This item was addressed during the Road Department Report.

2. Old Ferry Dock Boat Ramp Analysis – As part of the permitting process for the redesign of the Old Ferry Dock Boat Ramp by Dewberry Engineers, Inc., the Florida Department of Environmental Protection required a hydrographic analysis that was not part of the engineer's original scope of work. The cost of the analysis was \$6500. This expense was required in order to obtain the permit, however, the Board needs to formally approve the expense that was incurred to have the analysis done. It has since been submitted to the State of Florida as part of the permit application.

Request: Board Action to approve the \$6500 hydrographic analysis for the Old Ferry Dock Boat Ramp Project to be paid out of professional services.

On motion by Commissioner Jones, seconded by Commissioner Massey, and by unanimous vote of the Board present, it was agreed to approve the \$6,500 hydrographic analysis for the Old Ferry Dock Boat Ramp Project to be paid out of professional services.

3. Old Ferry Dock Boat Ramp Access – In preparation for closing out the Old Ferry Dock Boat Ramp Design Grant from FWC, the Chairman needs to sign a form dedicating the site for use as a public boating access facility for the next twenty years. Once signed this form will be recorded in the public records and a copy sent to FWC. Request: Board action to authorize the Chairman to sign the site dedication form.

Mr. Moron said he asked Mr. Mark Curenton, County Planner, if this form was already on file but Mr. Curenton said every time they get grant funding they must complete this form. **On motion by Commissioner Jones, seconded by Commissioner Parrish, and by unanimous vote of the Board present, it was agreed to authorize the Chairman to sign the site dedication form.**

4. Alligator Drive CEI Services – Negotiations have been concluded with AECOM Technical Services, Inc. to provide CEI services for the Alligator Drive multi-use path project, and FDOT has approved the proposed contract for a cost not to exceed \$141,522.71. This cost will be covered by the grant.

Request: Board action to approve the contract and authorize the Chairman to sign the contract.

On motion by Commissioner Boldt, seconded by Commissioner Massey, and by unanimous vote of the Board present, it was agreed to approve the contract and authorize the Chairman to sign the contract.

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5. County Roads Paving – In order to save on mobilization costs, the Board waived its bid policy at an earlier meeting and authorized Roberts and Roberts, the airport new access road contractor, to pave certain county roads. Commissioner Boldt would like to add Delaware Street in Lanark Village to that list of county roads. The total cost of \$74,500 to pave Delaware Street will be paid from District 2's paving funds. Commissioner Parrish would like to add Magnolia Lane to the list. The total cost of \$36,100 to pave Magnolia Lane will be paid from District 4's paving fund. Commissioner Massey would like to add Pinnacle Street and Light House Road to that list. The \$96,060 quote to pave these roads will be paid from District 5's paving fund.

Request: Board action to authorize Roberts and Roberts to pave Delaware Street for a total \$74,500, Magnolia Lane for a total of \$36,100, and Pinnacle Street and Light House Road for \$96,060.

Commissioner Massey made a motion to authorize Roberts and Roberts to pave Delaware Street for a total cost of \$74,500 from District 2's paving funds, pave Magnolia Lane for a total cost of \$36,100 from District 4's paving funds, and pave Pinnacle Street and Light House Road for a total cost of \$96,060 from District 5's paving fund. Commissioner Boldt seconded the motion. Commissioner Jones asked if striping is included in this price. Mr. Moron said he will verify striping is included. Motion carried; 5-0.

6. CARES Funds for Food Distribution – At an earlier meeting the Board set aside \$10,000 of CARES Act funds for food pantries and distribution. Based on requests for those funds, it is apparent that additional funding is needed for the four established food pantries in the County, based on local demand and distribution. Ms. Traci Buzbee (CARES Act Funds Consultant) spoke to the state and direct funds to food pantries for operational expenses is an allowable item. With that in mind, the CARES Act Oversight committee recommends a total line item budget of \$40,000, which would allow each pantry to receive up to \$10,000 as long as the appropriate justification paperwork is provided to the County. Request: Board action to increase the line item for Food Distribution from \$10,000 to \$40,000.

Commissioner Massey made a motion to approve increasing the line item for Food Distribution from \$10,000 to \$40,000. Commissioner Jones seconded the motion. Chairman Lockley asked if there is a time limit on this money. Mr. Moron said the paperwork may need to be filed by November 16th but he will check with Ms. Buzbee. He reported Ms. Buzbee is on the telephone and he can unmute her if the Board has questions. Commissioner Parrish asked if they will cut a check or they will know where the money is being spent. He questioned if they will have documentation if they have an audit. Commissioner Parrish asked if this item is on a reimbursement basis. Mr. Moron explained the food pantries will turn in their paperwork saying what they are spending the money on and Ms. Buzbee will request specific paperwork and they will be reimbursed based on invoice. He stated some of the food pantries do not have the money to put up front but he thinks they can pay from invoice and he will verify that with

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Ms. Buzbee. Ms. Buzbee clarified the food pantries are actually a dedicated line item Treasury has put forth due to the demand and it is not a reimbursable program but support of the local programs. She said she talked with Franklin's Food and Franklin's Promise and they both have justification on the increased need with transportation and delivery. Ms. Buzbee reported she confirmed with the state as long as they package it correctly they can give them a \$10,000 grant or whatever funds they decide up to the \$10,000 to continue and sustain through the holidays and beyond. She explained this program is not as strict as the business program and is more of a service as Treasury and the State of Florida have seen the demand and the need. Mr. Moron asked if they are bound by the November 16th deadline for paperwork. Ms. Buzbee said on November 16th the county has to turn in their actual expenses to date and on another line place the amount of encumbered expenses. She reported on December 30th they have to turn in what was actually spent. She said if they have more money allocated or line itemed they could potentially receive more money because there are several counties that will not spend their allocation. Ms. Buzbee explained once the county gives the \$10,000 to the food pantry they do not have to spend all of it by December 30th because the county has already spent the money. Chairman Lockley said they want to make sure the pantries only spend the money for food so people receive food. Mr. Moron agreed the county does not want the money to be used for administration. Ms. Buzbee reported in talking with the food pantries she learned all of their food is free from Second Harvest but it does cover the increased cost of transportation and delivery. She said the money will go to sustain the four food pantries that are established in the county. Mr. Moron stated the Board wants to be specific and make sure the money does not go to salaries within the non-profits. He said the other 2 food pantries are the Methodist Church in Carrabelle and the First Baptist Church in Eastpoint. He stated if there are other food pantries they missed someone needs to let them know so they could make whatever changes they need to at the next meeting. Ms. Buzbee said she was told these were the 4 established food pantries. She explained there are pop-up mobile units but they get their food from these 4 pantries. Chairman Lockley asked why they are paying extra if they are on a schedule for delivery. Mr. Moron stated the demand and the distribution is up so the amount they are giving out is a higher amount. Motion carried; 5-0. Mr. Moron reported it is good that this is a line item for a grant. Ms. Buzbee stated they are their own category in reimbursement.

D.

7. This item was handled during the Solid Waste Director's Report.

8. HHRP Allocation – At your last meeting, Mrs. Lori Switzer-Mills your SHIP Program administrator stated that the County will receive additional HHRP funds for Hurricane Michael home repair and replacement. As with the original funding, approval of a Hurricane Housing Recovery Program Funding Agreement with Florida Housing Finance Corporation for the funds and an agreement with Lori Switzer-Mills your SHIP Administrator for the administration of the program is required. I will ask Attorney Shuler to review both agreements to verify that besides the amounts, there are no additional changes to both agreements.

Mr. Moron requested the Board approve both agreements. On motion by Commissioner Boldt, seconded by Commissioner Parrish, and by unanimous vote of the Board present, it was agreed to authorize the Chairman to sign both agreements.

Information Item

9. LSE COVID-19 & Sally – As authorized by the Board, Chairman Lockley signed Local State of Emergency Declarations for COVID-19 on October 5th, 12th, 19th, & 26th. The Chairman also signed Local State of Emergency Declarations for Hurricane Sally on October 6th, 13th, 20th, & 27th.

D.

Commissioner Parrish brought into discussion repairs that have been needed on U.S. Highway 98 since Hurricane Michael. He stated work is needed between the 2 bridges and this is a federal highway and the state gets money to maintain the federal roads. Commissioner Parrish reported he wants county staff to write a letter and copy the federal and state delegation requesting that the roads be fixed. He reported the state has federal funds to repair this road and Hurricane Michael was 2 years ago on October 10th and something needs to be done to fix it since it is a federal highway. Commissioner Parrish said the damage between Eastpoint and Carrabelle needs to be repaired. He stated there is no reason why this road has not already been fixed. Commissioner Parrish made a motion to authorize county staff to write a letter and copy the federal and state delegation and request that U.S. Highway 98 from Apalachicola to Carrabelle be repaired. Commissioner Parrish said there have not been delays in fixing the road in other counties and he questioned why there is a delay in Franklin County and why they are being treated differently. He reported people complain every day about this road. He explained it is not only residents that travel the road but also tourists. **Commissioner Boldt seconded the motion.** Commissioner Boldt suggested the letter should be signed by all the Commissioners. Chairman Lockley said that is fine with him. Commissioner Parrish asked if it is just to show unanimous support. Commissioner Boldt answered yes. Chairman Lockley agreed the road has been like this since the storm and has only been patched. Commissioner Massey reported the road is beating up the school buses. Mr. Moron stated there is a project in the FDOT pipeline that he and Commissioner Jones were notified about to repair from the road from Eastpoint to Carrabelle but they are ignoring the areas between the bridges. He reported there has been a campaign from staff to include the causeways. Mr. Moron stated they tried to say they already fixed these areas but they told them they fixed half the causeway and ignored the other side. Commissioner Jones asked if the Board at a previous meeting sent a letter asking them to look at expanding the boundaries. Mr. Moron said yes he thinks they sent a letter but he will check. Commissioner Parrish reported the letter needs to be more strongly worded because this is U.S. Highway 98 not a county or state road and he knows they have federal funds to take care of the road. He said he does not understand why this is not being taken care of. Commissioner Parrish stated they have fixed the road in adjoining counties and it is pitiful for a federal highway to be in this kind of shape. He reported the letter needs to be worded stronger and maybe all the Commissioners signing will help. Commissioner Boldt suggested they emphasize how close the road is to the water. Commissioner Parrish asked who represents the county on these issues and who presents the 5 year plan. Commissioner Jones stated the county does not have representation and are not part of the Capital Region Transportation Planning Agency (CRPTA). He said the one agency they had in this area was disbanded a year ago. Mr. Moron explained that is where the representative came from to report on the 5 year plan. Commissioner Parrish asked about the Apalachee Regional Planning Council (ARPC). Commissioner Jones stated he asked ARPC but CRPTA does not want to assume Franklin County but he has definitely lobbied for it. Commissioner Parrish said they are not interested because there are problems here. Commissioner Parrish stated when they write the letter they need to request that the person over the district from FDOT attend the meeting. **Motion carried; 5-0.**

D.

County Attorney – Michael Shuler – Report

Attorney Shuler reported Ms. Buzbee sent an email wanting the Board to consider a first addendum to a management consulting contract she signed with the county in September, 2019 to provide certain consulting services for Emergency Management Services. He explained in her contract there is a provision she would like to add that would allow her to piggyback other government entities using their procurement process so they can avoid going through the bidding process. Attorney Shuler said Ms. Buzbee explained it is similar to the county piggybacking onto the state bid list and purchasing items. He stated Ms. Buzbee assured him the county is not at risk and he has added language into this first draft addendum that says the county is not expressing any opinion whether they agree with the consultant that the procurement process qualifies for piggybacking or not. Attorney Shuler reported Ms. Buzbee has also agreed to give them an indemnification. Ms. Buzbee explained this agreement will allow other jurisdictions within Franklin County to contract without going through the procurement process. She reported it is a grueling process on both the jurisdiction releasing it and the people responding to it. She explained they went through this process with the county in the summer of 2019 and this will allow other jurisdictions in Franklin County to utilize their procurement process. Ms. Buzbee stated the contract tasks will be separated and there will be no ties to the county. Attorney Shuler said he will need to amend the addendum to limit the piggybacking to jurisdictions within Franklin County because he did not understand that was the geographic limitation but otherwise he is content with the form and content of the first addendum he sent to the Board yesterday. Ms. Buzbee stated she has this in all her other contracts so it is only for jurisdictions within the county. **On motion by Commissioner Massey**, seconded by Commissioner Jones, and by unanimous vote of the Board present, it was agreed to approve the first addendum to the contract.

Attorney Shuler stated he and Mr. David Theriaque, outside counsel, are requesting the Board authorize an Executive Session to receive advice from the Board concerning pending litigation in the case entitled HLS Management Properties-41 West Bayshore LLC vs Franklin County, Case #2017-183CA. On motion by Commissioner Parrish, seconded by Commissioner Jones, and by unanimous vote of the Board present, it was agreed to authorize an Executive Session for this case.

Commissioners' Comments

There were no comments from the Commissioners.

Adjournment

There being no further business to come before the Board, the meeting was adjourned at 10:13 a.m.

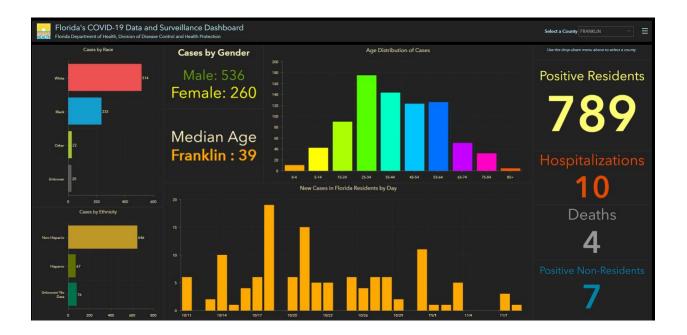

STATE AID TO LIBRARIES GRANT AGREEMENT BETWEEN THE STATE OF FLORIDA, DEPARTMENT OF STATE AND County Board of County Commissioners for and on behalf of Fu

Franklin County Board of County Commissioners for and on behalf of Franklin County Public Library

This Agreement is by and between the State of Florida, Department of State, Division of Library and Information Services, hereinafter referred to as the "Division," and the Franklin County Board of County Commissioners for and on behalf of Franklin County Public Library, hereinafter referred to as the "Grantee."

The Grantee has submitted an application and has met all eligibility requirements and has been awarded a State Aid to Libraries Grant (CSFA 45.030) by the Division in the amount specified on the "Fiscal Year 2020-21 State Aid to Libraries Final Grants" document (which is incorporated as part of this Agreement and entitled Attachment B). The Division has the authority to administer this grant in accordance with Section 257, *Florida Statutes*. By reference, the application and any approved revisions are hereby made a part of this agreement.

In consideration of the mutual covenants and promises contained herein, the parties agree as follows:

- 1. **Grant Purpose.**This grant shall be used exclusively for the "State Aid to Libraries Grant," the public purpose for which these funds were appropriated.
 - a) The Grantee shall perform the following **Scope of Work**:

In accordance with Sections 257.17-257.18, Florida Statutes, the Grantee shall receive a grant amount that is calculated and based upon local funds expended during the second preceding fiscal year for the operation and maintenance of the library. For this grant, the local expenditures shall have been made during the period October 1, 2018 - September 30, 2019.

In order to be eligible to receive the grant funding, the Grantee shall manage or coordinate free library service to the residents of its legal service area for the period October 1, 2018 through June 30, 2021. The Grantee shall:

- Have a single administrative head employed full time by the library's governing body;
- Provide free library service, including loaning materials available for circulation free of charge and providing reference and information services free of charge;
- Provide access to materials, information and services for all residents of the area served; and
- Have at least one library, branch library or member library open 40 hours or more each week (excluding holidays; between Sunday through Saturday, on a schedule determined by the library system) during the length of the agreement.

b) The Grantee agrees to provide the following **Deliverables** related to the Scope of Work for payments to be awarded.

Payment 1, Deliverable/Task 1

Payment will be an advance in the amount of 50% of the grant award for the period October 1, 2018 through June 30, 2021. The Grantee will:

- Have expended funds to provide free library service during the period October 1, 2018 September 30, 2019;
- Provide an Expenditure Report and certification of Local Operating Expenditures for the period October 1, 2018 September 30, 2019 only; and
- Provide the Certification of Credentials for the Single Administrative Head.

Payment 2, Deliverable/Task 2

Payment will be an advance in the amount of 50% of the grant award for the period October 1, 2018 through June 30, 2021. The Grantee will:

- Provide documentation showing that at least one library, branch library or member library is open 40 hours or more each week (excluding holidays; between Sunday through Saturday, on a schedule determined by the library system) during the length of the agreement; and
- Provide a Certification of Hours, Free Library Service and Access to Materials.
- c) Grant funds shall be used for the operation and maintenance of the library. The allowable budget categories are: Personnel Services (salaries, wages, and related employee benefits provided for all persons employed by the reporting entity whether on full-time, part-time, temporary, or seasonal basis); Operating Expenses (expenditures for goods and services which primarily benefit the current period and are not defined as personal services or capital outlays); Non-Fixed Capital Outlay (outlays for the acquisition of or addition to fixed assets); and Other (other operating expenditure categories in the library budget).
- 2. Length of Agreement. This Agreement covers the period of October 1, 2018 to June 30, 2021, unless terminated in accordance with the provisions of Section 28 of this Agreement. This period begins with the start of the Grantee's second preceding fiscal year (October 1, 2018) and concludes with the end of the State of Florida's current fiscal year (June 30, 2021).
- 3. Expenditure of Grant Funds. Grant funds will be used to reimburse a portion of local funds expended by the Grantee during their second preceding fiscal year (October 1, 2018 September 30, 2019) for the operation and maintenance of a library and shall not exceed the amount specified in Attachment B. No costs incurred after the second preceding fiscal year shall be allowed unless specifically authorized by the Division.
- 4. **Contract Administration.** The parties are legally bound by the requirements of this agreement. Each party's contract manager, named below, will be responsible for monitoring its performance under this Agreement and will be the official contact for each party. Any notice(s) or other communications in regard to this agreement shall be directed to or delivered to the other party's contract manager by utilizing the information below. Any change in the contact information below should be submitted in writing to the contract manager within 10 days

of the change.

5. **Grant Payments.** The total grant award shall not exceed the amount specified on the Fiscal Year 2020-21 State Aid to Libraries Final Grants document (Attachment B), which shall be paid by the Division in consideration for the Grantees minimum performance as set forth by the terms and conditions of this Agreement. Payment will be made in accordance with the completion of the Deliverables.

The grant payment schedule is outlined below:

- a) The first payment will be 50% of the grant award. Payment will be made in accordance with the completion of the Deliverables.
- b) The second payment will be 50% of the grant award. Payment will be made in accordance with the completion of the Deliverables.
- 6. Electronic Payments. The Grantee can choose to use electronic funds transfer (EFT) to receive grant payments. All grantees wishing to receive their award through EFT must submit a Vendor Direct Deposit Authorization form (form number DFS-AI-26E, rev 6/2014), incorporated by reference, to the Florida Department of Financial Services. If EFT has already been set up for your organization, you do not need to submit another authorization form unless you have changed bank accounts. To download this form visit myfloridacfo.com/Division/AA/Forms/DFS-AI-26E.pdf. The form also includes tools and information that allow you to check on payments.
- 7. Florida Substitute Form W-9. A completed Substitute Form W-9 is required from any entity that receives a payment from the State of Florida that may be subject to 1099 reporting. The Department of Financial Services (DFS) must have the correct Taxpayer Identification Number (TIN) and other related information in order to report accurate tax information to the Internal Revenue Service (IRS). To register or access a Florida Substitute Form W-9 visit flvendor.myfloridacfo.com/. A copy of the Grantee's Florida Substitute Form W-9 must

be submitted by the Grantee to the Division before or with the executed Agreement.

8. Financial Consequences. The Department shall apply the following financial consequences for failure to perform the minimum level of services required by this Agreement in accordance with Sections 215.971 and 287.058, *Florida Statutes*:

The Department shall require the return of the award in a prorated amount based upon the percentage of time that the library failed to perform the minimum level of services. The prorated reduction will be in the same percentage as the percentage of time that the library was not providing minimum level of services.

9. Credit Line(s) to Acknowledge Grant Funding. The Division requires public acknowledgement of State Aid to Libraries Grant funding for activities and publications supported by grant funds. Any announcements, information, press releases, publications, brochures, videos, web pages, programs, etc. created as part of a State Aid to Libraries Grant project must include an acknowledgment that State Aid to Libraries Grant funds were used to create them.

Use the following text:

"This project has been funded under the provisions of the State Aid to Libraries Grant program, administered by the Florida Department of State's Division of Library and Information Services."

10. Non-allowable Grant Expenditures. The Grantee agrees to expend all grant funds received under this agreement solely for the purposes for which they were authorized and appropriated. Expenditures shall be in compliance with the state guidelines for allowable project costs as outlined in the Department of Financial Services' Reference Guide for State Expenditures (as of January 2020), incorporated by reference, which are available online at

https://www.myfloridacfo.com/division/aa/manuals/documents/ReferenceGuideforStateExpenditures.pdf.

Grant funds may not be used for the purchase or construction of a library building or library quarters.

- **11. Travel Expenses.** The Grantee must pay any travel expenses, from grant or local matching funds, in accordance to the provisions of Section 112.061, *Florida Statutes*.
- 12. Unobligated and Unearned Funds and Allowable Costs. In accordance with Section 215.971, *Florida Statutes*, the Grantee shall refund to the State of Florida any balance of unobligated funds which has been advanced or paid to the Grantee. In addition, funds paid in excess of the amount to which the recipient is entitled under the terms and conditions of the agreement must be refunded to the state agency. Further, the recipient may expend funds only for allowable costs resulting from obligations incurred during the specified agreement period. Expenditures of state financial assistance must be in compliance with the laws, rules and regulations applicable to expenditures of State funds as outlined in the Department of Financial Service's Reference Guide for State Expenditures (as of January 2020)

(https://www.myfloridacfo.com/division/aa/manuals/documents/ReferenceGuideforStateExpenditures.pdf), incorporated by reference.

- **13. Repayment.** All refunds or repayments to be made to the Department under this agreement are to be made payable to the order of "Department of State" and mailed directly to the following address: Florida Department of State, Attention: Marian Deeney, Division of Library and Information Services, 500 South Bronough Street, Mail Station #9D, Tallahassee, FL 32399. In accordance with Section 215.34(2), *Florida Statutes*, if a check or other draft is returned to the Department for collection, Recipient shall pay to the Department a service fee of \$15.00 or five percent (5%) of the face amount of the returned check or draft, whichever is greater.
- 14. Single Audit Act. Each Grantee, other than a Grantee that is a State agency, shall submit to an audit pursuant to Section 215.97, Florida Statutes. See Attachment A for additional information regarding this requirement. If a Grantee is not required by law to conduct an audit in accordance with the Florida Single Audit Act because it did not expend at least \$750,000 in state financial assistance, it must submit a Financial Report on its operations pursuant to Section 218.39, *Florida Statutes* within nine months of the close of its fiscal year.
- **15. Retention of Accounting Records.** Financial records, supporting documents, statistical records and all other records, including electronic storage media pertinent to the Project, shall be retained for a period of five (5) fiscal years after the close out of the grant and release of the audit. If any litigation or audit is initiated or claim made before the expiration of the five-year period, the records shall be retained for five fiscal years after the litigation, audit or claim has been resolved.
- 16. Obligation to Provide State Access to Grant Records. The Grantee must make all grant records of expenditures, copies of reports, books, and related documentation available to the Division or a duly authorized representative of the State of Florida for inspection at reasonable times for the purpose of making audits, examinations, excerpts and transcripts.
- 17. Obligation to Provide Public Access to Grant Records. The Division reserves the right to unilaterally cancel this Agreement in the event that the Grantee refuses public access to all documents or other materials made or received by the Grantee that are subject to the provisions of Chapter 119, *Florida Statutes*, known as the *Florida Public Records Act*. The Grantee must immediately contact the Division's Contract Manager for assistance if it receives a public records request related to this Agreement.
- 18. Noncompliance. Any Grantee that is not following Florida statutes or rules, the terms of the grant agreement, Florida Department of State policies and guidance, local policies, or other applicable law or that has not submitted required reports or satisfied other administrative requirements for other Division of Library and Information Services grants or grants from any other Office of Cultural, Historical, and Information Programs (OCHIP) Division will be in noncompliance status and subject to the OCHIP Grants Compliance Procedure. OCHIP Divisions include the Division of Cultural Affairs, the Division of Historical Resources, and the Division of Library and Information Services. Grant compliance issues must be resolved before a grant award agreement may be executed and before grant payments for any OCHIP grant may be released.
- **19.** Accounting Requirements. The Grantee must maintain an accounting system that provides a complete record of the use of all grant funds as follows:
 - a) The accounting system must be able to specifically identify and provide audit trails that trace the receipt, maintenance and expenditure of state funds;

- b) Accounting records must adequately identify the sources and application of funds for all grant activities and must classify and identify grant funds by using the same budget categories that were approved in the grant application. If Grantee's accounting system accumulates data in a different format than the one in the grant application, subsidiary records must document and reconcile the amounts shown in the Grantee's accounting records to those amounts reported to the Division;
- c) An interest-bearing checking account or accounts in a state or federally chartered institution may be used for revenues and expenses described in the Scope of Work and detailed in the Estimated Project Budget;
- d) The name of the account(s) must include the grant award number;
- e) The Grantee's accounting records must have effective control over and accountability for all funds, property and other assets; and
- f) Accounting records must be supported by source documentation and be in sufficient detail to allow for a proper pre-audit and post-audit (such as invoices, bills and canceled checks).
- **20. Availability of State Funds.** The State of Florida's performance and obligation to pay under this Agreement are contingent upon an annual appropriation by the Florida Legislature. In the event that the state funds upon which this Agreement is dependent are withdrawn, this Agreement will be automatically terminated and the Division shall have no further liability to the Grantee beyond those amounts already expended prior to the termination date. Such termination will not affect the responsibility of the Grantee under this Agreement as to those funds previously distributed. In the event of a state revenue shortfall, the total grant may be reduced accordingly.
- **21.** Lobbying. The Grantee will not use any grant funds for lobbying the state legislature, the state judicial branch or any state agency.
- 22. Independent Contractor Status of Grantee. The Grantee, if not a state agency, agrees that its officers, agents and employees, in performance of this Agreement, shall act in the capacity of independent contractors and not as officers, agents or employees of the state. The Grantee is not entitled to accrue any benefits of state employment, including retirement benefits and any other rights or privileges connected with employment by the State of Florida.
- **23. Grantee's Subcontractors.** The Grantee shall be responsible for all work performed and all expenses incurred in connection with this Agreement. The Grantee may subcontract, as necessary, to perform the services and to provide commodities required by this Agreement. The Division shall not be liable to any subcontractor(s) for any expenses or liabilities incurred under the Grantee's subcontract(s), and the Grantee shall be solely liable to its subcontractor(s) for all expenses and liabilities incurred under its subcontract(s). The Grantee must take the necessary steps to ensure that each of its subcontractors will be deemed to be independent contractors and will not be considered or permitted to be agents, servants, joint venturers or partners of the Division.
- 24. Liability. The Division will not assume any liability for the acts, omissions to act or negligence of the Grantee, its agents, servants or employees; nor may the Grantee exclude liability for its own acts, omissions to act or negligence to the Division.

- a) The Grantee shall be responsible for claims of any nature, including but not limited to injury, death and property damage arising out of activities related to this Agreement by the Grantee, its agents, servants, employees and subcontractors. The Grantee shall indemnify and hold the Division harmless from any and all claims of any nature and shall investigate all such claims at its own expense. If the Grantee is governed by Section 768.28, *Florida Statutes*, it shall only be obligated in accordance with this Section.
- b) Neither the state nor any agency or subdivision of the state waives any defense of sovereign immunity or increases the limits of its liability by entering into this Agreement.
- c) The Division shall not be liable for attorney fees, interest, late charges or service fees, or cost of collection related to this Agreement.
- d) The Grantee shall be responsible for all work performed and all expenses incurred in connection with the project. The Grantee may subcontract as necessary to perform the services set forth in this Agreement, including entering into subcontracts with vendors for services and commodities, provided that such subcontract has been approved in writing by the Department prior to its execution and provided that it is understood by the Grantee that the Department shall not be liable to the subcontractor for any expenses or liabilities incurred under the subcontract and that the Grantee shall be solely liable to the subcontractor for all expenses and liabilities incurred under the subcontract.
- 25. Strict Compliance with Laws. The Grantee shall perform all acts required by this Agreement in strict conformity with all applicable laws and regulations of the local, state and federal law. For consequences of noncompliance, see Section18, Noncompliance.
- 26. No Discrimination. The Grantee may not discriminate against any employee employed under this Agreement or against any applicant for employment because of race, color, religion, gender, national origin, age, handicap, pregnancy or marital status. The Grantee shall insert a similar provision in all of its subcontracts for services under this Agreement.
- 27. Breach of Agreement. The Division will demand the return of grant funds already received, will withhold subsequent payments and/or will terminate this agreement if the Grantee improperly expends and manages grant funds; fails to prepare, preserve or surrender records required by this Agreement; or otherwise violates this Agreement.
- **28.** Termination of Agreement. The Division will terminate or end this Agreement if the Grantee fails to fulfill its obligations herein. In such event, the Division will provide the Grantee a notice of its violation by letter and shall give the Grantee fifteen (15) calendar days from the date of receipt to cure its violation. If the violation is not cured within the stated period, the Division will terminate this Agreement. The notice of violation letter shall be delivered to the Grantee's Contract Manager, personally, or mailed to his/her specified address by a method that provides proof of receipt. In the event that the Division terminates this Agreement, the Grantee will be compensated for any work completed in accordance with this Agreement prior to the notification of termination if the Division deems this reasonable under the circumstances. Grant funds previously advanced and not expended on work completed in accordance with this Agreement shall be returned to the Division, with interest, within thirty (30) days after termination of this Agreement. The Division does not waive any of its rights to additional damages if grant funds are returned under this Section.

- **29. Preservation of Remedies.** No delay or omission to exercise any right, power or remedy accruing to either party upon breach or violation by either party under this Agreement shall impair any such right, power or remedy of either party; nor shall such delay or omission be construed as a waiver of any such breach or default or any similar breach or default.
- **30.** Non-Assignment of Agreement. The Grantee may not assign, sublicense or otherwise transfer its rights, duties or obligations under this Agreement without the prior written consent of the Division, which shall not unreasonably be withheld. The agreement transferee must demonstrate compliance with the requirements of the project. If the Division approves a transfer of the Grantee's obligations, the Grantee shall remain liable for all work performed and all expenses incurred in connection with this Agreement. In the event the Legislature transfers the rights, duties and obligations of the Division to another governmental entity, pursuant to Section 20.06, *Florida Statutes* or otherwise, the rights, duties and obligations under this Agreement shall be transferred to the succeeding governmental agency as if it was the original party to this Agreement.
- **31. Required Procurement Procedures for Obtaining Goods and Services.** The Grantee shall provide maximum open competition when procuring goods and services related to the grant-assisted project in accordance with Section 287.057, *Florida Statutes*.
 - a) Procurement of Goods and Services Not Exceeding \$35,000. The Grantee must use the applicable procurement method described below:
 - 1. Purchases Up to \$2,500: Procurement of goods and services where individual purchases do not exceed \$2,500 do not require competition and may be conducted at the Grantee's discretion.
 - 2. Purchases or Contract Amounts Between \$2,500 and \$35,000: Goods and services costing between \$2,500 and \$35,000 require informal competition and may be procured by purchase order, acceptance of vendor proposals or other appropriate procurement document.
 - b) Procurement of Goods and Services Exceeding \$35,000. Goods and services costing over \$35,000 may be procured by either Formal Invitation to Bid, Request for Proposals or Invitation to Negotiate and may be procured by purchase order, acceptance of vendor proposals or other appropriate procurement document.
- **32. Conflicts of Interest.** The Grantee hereby certifies that it is cognizant of the prohibition of conflicts of interest described in Sections 112.311 through 112.326, *Florida Statutes* and affirms that it will not enter into or maintain a business or other relationship with any employee of the Department of State that would violate those provisions. The Grantee further agrees to seek authorization from the General Counsel for the Department of State prior to entering into any business or other relationship with a Department of State Employee to avoid a potential violation of those statutes.
- **33. Binding of Successors.** This Agreement shall bind the successors, assigns and legal representatives of the Grantee and of any legal entity that succeeds to the obligations of the Division of Library and Information Services.
- **34.** Employment of Unauthorized Aliens. The employment of unauthorized aliens by the Grantee is considered a violation of Section 274A (a) of the Immigration and Nationality Act. If the Grantee knowingly employs

unauthorized aliens, such violation shall be cause for unilateral cancellation of this Agreement.

- **35.** Severability. If any term or provision of the Agreement is found to be illegal and unenforceable, the remainder will remain in full force and effect, and such term or provision shall be deemed stricken.
- **36.** Americans with Disabilities Act. All programs and facilities related to this Agreement must meet the standards of Sections 553.501-553.513, *Florida Statutes* and the Americans with Disabilities Act of 1990 (ada.gov (as of January 2020)), incorporated by reference).
- **37. Governing Law.** This Agreement shall be construed, performed and enforced in all respects in accordance with the laws and rules of Florida. Venue or location for any legal action arising under this Agreement will be in Leon County, Florida.

38. Entire Agreement. The entire Agreement of the parties consists of the following documents:

Applications are due 11/30/2020. The Board authorized the initiation of 2 project applications: beach renourishment/dune restoration on Alligator Point in the vicinity of Alligator Drive, and dune restoration on St. George Island. Neither application is likely to score will in the competition, as they do not serve a primarily low/moderate income beneficiary group, and they do not address the DEO priority infrastructure categories of stormwater, potable water, wastewater. However, they are eligible for funding if they make it through the competitive process.

Requested Action: Conduct public hearing on CDBG-DR application for Alligator Point beach renourishment and dune restoration,

Requested Action: Conduct public hearing on CDBG-DR applicationa for Saint George Island dune restoration.

Requested Action: Adopt Resolution authorizing submission of the grant applications.

Action Items:

2. Three new applications for CDBG mobile home replacement were received from Eastpoint Wildfire zone property owners, and one former applicant confirmed her desire to proceed with home replacement. One of the homeowners, Daniel Walker, had a mobile home on the property at the time of the fire, but had not installed septic tank, well or power. Due to cancer, he had to stop work, and has been assisted by his daughter on the adjacent property with power and use of plumbing. Walker will need CDBG funding not only for the mobile home replacement, but for the septic tank, well and power.

I had advised the Board on September 15 that Mike Dombrowski would be drafting a resolution and would be getting it to Michael Moron. It has taken longer than I expected.

I also would like to remind the Board that this FDEP application is only for the design portion, which is \$200K. If FDEP approves funds for design then the county would apply in the 2022 Legislature for construction funds. If FDEP does not approve the design then the funding of a beach to protect 1.1 mile of Alligator Drive will not happen through the FDEP program. Board action to ratify the Resolution, and then I will describe the other path the county is seeking to protect the road.

Information Items:

2- I understand from Ms. Debbie Belcher that she is completing an application for CDBG-DR funds for a beach project to protect Alligator Drive in the same location and manner as the FDEP Beach Management application. The difference in the applications is not the funds as both projects propose a construction cost of \$10M, and it is not a difference in dimensions as both projects propose to protect the same 1.1 mile of road that is most vulnerable to storm damage. The difference in applications is in the county's obligation. Under the FDEP program, the state would provide 50% of the construction costs and the county would have to provide 50% of the construction costs. So, the state would put up \$5M funded from the Legislature and the county would put up \$5M from its RESTORE funds. Under the CDBG program, the stopken to Ms. Belcher and I believe she was going to ask for \$11M in the event there are some cost over-runs.

The question I have for the Board is how the Board wants to proceed on maintaining the beach if we receive CDBG funds. The Board has said previously that if FDEP funds the project the Board would create an assessment to help maintain the beach. Does the Board have the same opinion if CDBG funds the project?

And if the Board does have the same opini *W* hd if the county gets funded then the first step in determining an assessment is determining how large an area can be included in the assessment. The size of the area to be included in the assessment has a direct bearing on how much an individual would pay. In general, the question has been whether all property owners on the Point, which could be as many as 1000, could legally be included in an assessment, or whether just those property owners who need the road, which is less than 500, would be the assessment area. I give this advice now because if we get funded for the beach the county needs to get a legal opinion on the extent of the assessment area.

3- Inform the Board that the state has issued a time extension for 8 county Hurricane Michael projects till October, 2022, and one of them is PW 1152, Alligator Drive. I had sent a letter to FDEM yesterday asking for a time extension until Sept. 30, 2021, and then received a phone call from FDEM saying that this much longer time extension had already been granted. I do not expect the project to take that long, but the current deadline for permanent work to be completed is April 11, 2021, and no matter what happens with the bid process the project will not be completed by then.

The other county projects that have received a time extension until Oct. 1, 2022 are: C30A; St. George Island Fishing Pier; Island View Park; Ochlockonee Bridge fishing pier; Eastpoint Fishing Pier; Alligator Point Dune Walkovers; St. George Island Fishing Pier Road.

Ms. Brownell's office had made the request back on Feb. 21, 2020, but the FDEM contractor who called me said there was no indication the state sent her the letters notifying her of the extensions. I have received a set and have provided them for the Board file.

4- Status of Alligator Point Road repairs- as the Board is aware, we received a letter from Anderson Columbia saying they could not honor their original bid to repair Alligator Drive, but for \$130K increase in price they would still do the job. Based upon my desire not to have to re-bid I did recommend the Board accept this increased bid. At the last meeting I told the Board that I had sent a draft contract to FEMA for review and have not heard back. I have since been advised that Ms. Brownell has arranged for a FEMA procurement webinar on Thursday, Nov. 19. I am going to participate in this webinar because I am concerned with two items. Can the Board accept an increased bid from one vendor without allowing other vendors the same opportunity? And, I have a question about the required notification of minority businesses. There is a registry of minority business, and I can not find where I sent the bid notice back in 2019 to the registry. To further compound the issue, the bid documents that Dewberry use requires a qualified applicant to be FDOT pre-qualified and I need to verify with FEMA whether such additional requirement is consistent with their procurement. The summary is that I might have to reverse my recommendation on rebidding. I have discussed this situation with Clay Kennedy and Mr. Shuler. I certainly defer to the Board, but at this time I believe I should participate in the FEMA webinar on Thursday and then make a recommendation to the Board at the Dec. 1 BCC meeting.

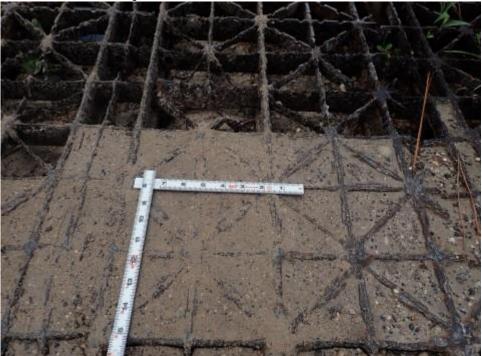

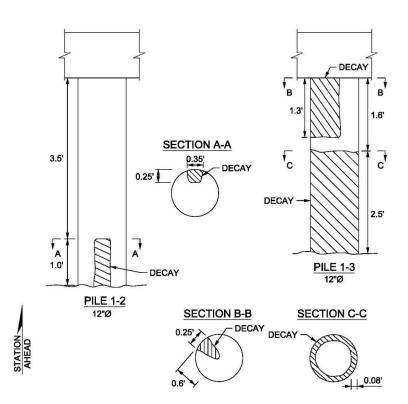

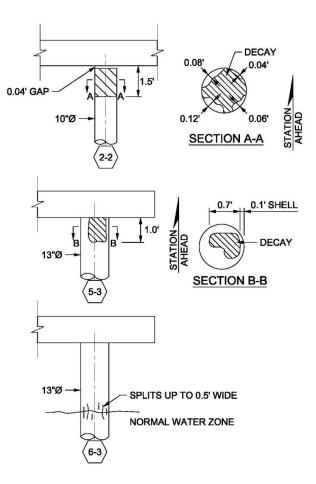

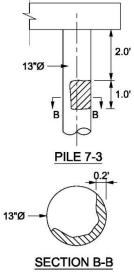

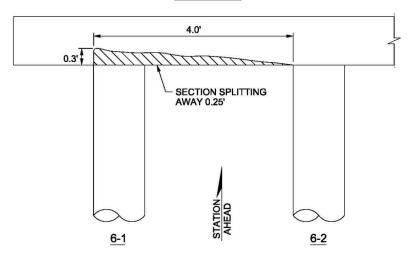

The document underscores the imperative of moving forward with a collaborative strategic plan that addresses the internet access needs of the public, supports the ability of the private sector to provide expanded internet services, and engage governmental entities at the Federal, State and Local level. This goal of universal internet services requires coordination, cooperation, and focus to ensure that all assets are utilized, and additional assets solicited to target areas that are underserved. 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Fixed and mobile broadband services provide access to employment, education, entertainment, and health care opportunities. Communities that lack broadband access have difficulty attracting new capital investment. While Florida's urban areas are served at a fixed broadband coverage rate of 98 percent, its rural areas are served at a rate of 75.2 percent. This disparity is caused primarily by high per-unit construction costs required to build broadband infrastructure across larger swaths of rural geographic areas.

<u>Florida's Broadband Program</u> - In 2009, the Legislature authorized the Department of Management Services (DMS) to work collaboratively with Enterprise Florida, state agencies, local governments, private businesses, and community organizations to:

- Assess the needs for broadband Internet service and develop data and maps that provide a baseline assessment of the availability and speed of broadband service throughout Florida.
- Create a strategic plan to increase use of broadband Internet service in Florida.
- Build local technology planning teams representing, among others, libraries, schools, colleges and universities, local health care providers, private businesses, community organizations, economic development organizations, local governments, tourism, parks and recreation, and agriculture; and
- Encourage the use of broadband Internet service, especially in rural, unserved, and underserved areas of the state through grant programs.
- DMS was also authorized to apply for and accept federal funds, as well as gifts and donations from individuals, foundations, and private organizations, for these purposes.

In 2009, the U.S. Department of Commerce's National Telecommunications Information Administration (NTIA) launched the State Broadband Initiative (SBI) to implement two federal laws, the American Recovery and Reinvestment Act of 2009 and the Broadband Data Improvement Act of 2008. According to the NTIA's SBI website, twelve separate entities within Florida were awarded grants totaling \$183.7 million for broadband infrastructure, sustainable adoption, and public computer center projects. Among those grants, DMS was awarded a total of \$8,877,028. In 2012, the Legislature passed a law transferring the state's broadband program from DMS to the Department of Economic Opportunity (DEO) and designating DEO as the single state entity to receive and manage all federal SBI funds. By its terms, this law would become effective only if the U.S. Department of Commerce approved the transfer of the existing federal SBI grant from DMS to DEO. This approval was never provided; thus, the program remains under DMS. After depletion of the remaining SBI grant funds, the state broadband program has been unfunded and dormant.

Federal Broadband Initiatives - In January 2020, the Federal Communications Commission (FCC) established the Rural Digital Opportunity Fund (Fund) to fund the deployment of broadband networks in rural America over the next decade. The program will consist of two phases. Using data from the FCC's previous mapping efforts, the first phase will begin later this year and will make available up to \$16 billion to target census blocks that are wholly unserved with fixed broadband speeds of at least 25 megabits per second (Mbps) downstream and 3 Mbps upstream (25/3 Mbps). Using more precise data to be developed through a new FCC mapping effort, the second phase will make available at least \$4.4 billion to target census blocks where some locations lack access to 25/3 Mbps broadband. In addition, the U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA), through its ReConnect Program, offers federal loans, grants, and loan/grant combinations to facilitate broadband deployment to rural areas without access to sufficient broadband service.9 Eligible entities include cooperatives and non-profits, for-profit companies, and state and local governments and their agencies and political subdivisions. Applicants requesting a grant or a loan/grant combination under the ReConnect Program are required to submit a scoring sheet by which USDA may analyze nine separate evaluation criteria to score the application. One

of the evaluation criteria is whether the proposed project is in a state with a broadband plan that has been updated within the previous 5 years.

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USDA is currently providing significant amounts of grant monies throughout the country. In addition, in many areas local communities have conducted or are conducting broadband feasibility studies for their communities. These and other activities underscore the readiness and eagerness to move forward.

Rural Florida has been behind too long in developing accessible, reliable, affordable, high speed internet to its communities. Closing the digital gap is critical. It is important to understand the environment in rural Florida counties and regions differ. These differences must be accommodated to successfully reach the overall goal. The mapping of resources is critical in understanding what exists and what should be included in a comprehensive plan to address the gaps.

HB 969 provides the platform for the State of Florida and the current interests of rural organizations like the Small County Coalition, the Florida Association of Counties, the Florida Regional Councils Association, the Florida Rural Economic Development Association and the Small School District Council Consortium and other entities provide a great opportunity to move forward.

Ensuring Industry Expansion of Service

Clearly one of the main obstacles in achieving rural high-speed internet service is the lack of facilities in rural service areas. Current service providers have not provided ample facilities because of the costs. Without a reasonable return on investment, the likelihood they do so in the future is not promising. The legislature should consider a grant program for the service providers to build-out their networks in rural Florida. The grant program could be managed in a similar fashion as the Rural Development Grant program whereby the service provider would build-out their network and once the network is built and operational, the service provider could submit for either all of their cost or some subset of the cost to be reimbursed. It should be noted the expectations of service provider receiving the grant would be providing the service themselves. This would accomplish two important elements needed for success - service providers would be able to receive monetary support on the buildout and the customer could see a potential reduction in cost of the service.

House Bill 969

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The 2020 Florida Legislature moved forward to begin addressing the lack of broadband service in the state by passing legislation calling for a comprehensive, collaborative effort to expand broadband capacity in every community across the State of Florida. The Legislature passed <u>HB 969</u> creating the Florida Office of Broadband within the Department of Economic Opportunity's Division of Community Development. HB 969 called for a comprehensive initiative to develop, market, and promote broadband Internet services to Florida. DEO was designated as the lead state agency and given the responsibility to facilitate the expansion of broadband Internet service in the state. The establishment of the Office of Broadband will enhance the ability of the State of Florida to be more competitive in seeking funding and support at the Federal level. However, the legislation contemplates more than enhancing DEO's competitive status for grants. The department is directed to collaborate with private businesses, and to receive staffing support and other resources from, Enterprise Florida, Inc., state agencies, local governments, and community organizations. HB 969 provides the "roadmap" directing the Office of Broadband to do the following:

- Create a strategic plan that has goals and strategies for increasing the use of broadband Internet service in the state. The plan must include a process to review and verify public input regarding transmission speeds and availability of broadband Internet service throughout the state. Note The FCC Household Broadband Guide currently suggests 12-25 Mpbs for households that may have 2 users or devices at a time where basic functions include email, browsing, basic video, Internet radio, plus one high-demand application such as: streaming HD video, multiparty video conferencing, online gaming, and telecommuting. The FCC recommends more than 25Mbps for more advanced uses. https://www.fcc.gov/consumers/guides/broadband-speed-guide
- Build and facilitate local technology planning teams or partnerships with members representing cross-sections of the community, which may include, but are not limited to, representatives from the following organizations and industries: libraries, K-12 education, colleges and universities, local health care providers, private businesses, community organizations, economic development organizations, local governments, tourism, parks and recreation, and agriculture.
- Encourage the use of broadband Internet service, especially in the rural, unserved, or/and underserved communities of the state through grant programs having effective strategies to facilitate the statewide deployment of broadband Internet service. For any grants to be awarded, priority must be given to projects that:
 - 1. Provide access to broadband education, awareness, training, access, equipment, and support to libraries, schools, colleges and universities, health care providers, and community support organizations.
 - 2. Encourage the sustainable adoption of broadband in primarily underserved areas by removing barriers to entry.
 - 3. Work toward encouraging investments in establishing affordable and sustainable broadband Internet service in underserved/unserved areas of the state.
 - 4. Facilitate the development of applications, programs, and services, including, but not limited to, telework, telemedicine, and e-learning to increase the usage of, and demand for, broadband Internet service in the state.
- Monitor, participate in, and provide input in proceedings of the Federal Communications Commission and other federal agencies related to the geographic availability and deployment of broadband Internet service in the state as necessary to ensure that this information is accurately presented and that rural, whether unserved/underserved areas of the state are best positioned to benefit from federal and state broadband deployment programs.

Recommendations for Consideration

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The success of the Office of Broadband will require the highest level of support from Florida's government officials and the private sector. Strong support from the Office of the Governor, Agency Leadership, Local Governments, Private Providers and other organizations that rely on the use of broadband services. Coordination and Collaboration is needed to underscore the importance of this initiative and to encourage the involvement necessary to address the challenges and accomplish the goal. In that regard, the following requests/recommendation are made:

- Governor DeSantis, State Officials, Private Sector Leadership, Local Government and other stakeholders should support a comprehensive set of actions to set the foundation for moving this initiative forward.
 - The State of Florida should make sure that a high-level state official remains engaged to oversee the development and implementation of the strategic plan.
 - The Office of Broadband should consider establishing a "Working Group" made up of representatives of public and private interests to assist the State of Florida in guiding the development of the strategic plan and participate in follow up efforts related to implementation of the plan.
- In accordance with the development of the strategic plan required in HB 969 the following actions should be considered:
 - Local technology planning teams should be initiated to assess local access and to determine specific needs to address internet access at the local level- the membership of which may include education, health care, private business, agriculture, economic development organizations, local government, and tourism representatives.
 - An up-to-date map of internet capacity should be developed documenting the areas of the state that have access, have limited access and have no access.
 - A set of metrics should be adopted to establish a baseline of current availability and speeds of broadband service throughout Florida for use in assessing progress toward the goal of universal broadband.
 - There should be an inventory established of all agency and state funded programs related to digital connectivity. This inventory should serve as the basis to direct collaboration and focus to maximize the use of state resources.
 - There should be an inventory established of recent plans and/or studies developed by state, regional, and local entities to determine where initiatives have been designed and the extent to which they have been implemented.
 - Available resources in the public and private sector should be identified that could be acquired through application or legislative initiative that would facilitate implementation of the elements of the strategic plan; and,
 - There should be a set of initiatives that can be pursued at the State and Federal level that could provide service providers and other entities ideas and resources to develop and expand broadband access.

Specific Actions for Counties to Consider:

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- Counties should adopt a local resolution supporting the Internet Services Initiative
- Counties should document the current status of internet service throughout the county.
- Counties should identify a person to serve as the point of contact for engagement regarding the coordination of information with DEO's Office of Broadband
- Counties should begin considering the make-up of the local technology teams outlined in HB 969 and work with DEO to structure those for engagement.
- Counties, if applicable, should identify recent, current, or planned feasibility studies that have or will be conducted and send them to the Office of Broadband.
- Counties should outline current providers and services that exist in their communities and describe the current state of reliable, affordable high-speed internet in their county.
- Counties should incorporate the mapping application "Testit!" as a standard for providing information on accessibility in their communities.

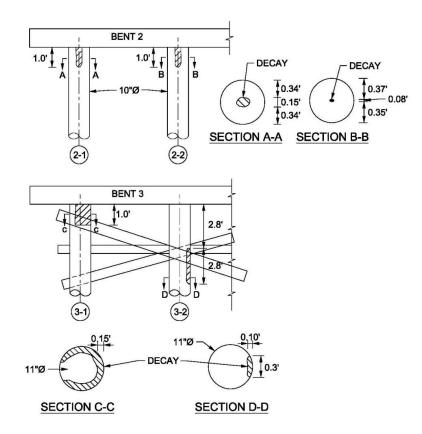

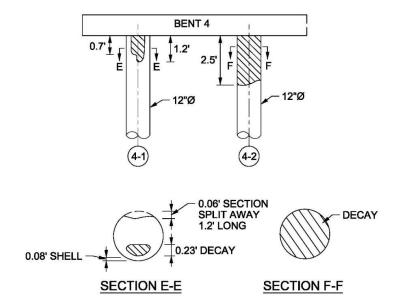

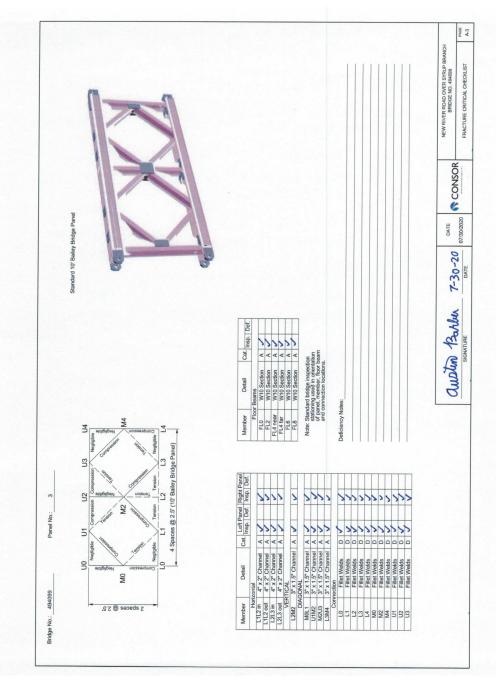

Dr. Bart Carey Memorial Reef Franklin County, Florida

On September 20, 2020, Dr. Bart Carey passed away leaving behind family, friends and loved ones that mourn the loss of a life that ended far too soon. Bart was 49 years old. In an effort to honor Bart and his immense contributions to society, a memorial reef is being planned off of Franklin County. Bart was an avid fisherman and outdoorsman, and spent much of his time off the coast of Franklin County and Carrabelle.

The Dr. Bart Carey Memorial Reef will be deployed on the Carrabelle 10 Mile Reef, which has an active permit under the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers Department of the Army permit number SAJ-2001-00310 (SP-JML). A copy of the permit, provided by the Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission (FWC), has been attached with this project description summary.

The Dr. Bart Carey Memorial Reef will consist of several 10-foot tall limestone and concrete pyramid reef structures (tetrahedrons), and one 15-foot tall limestone pyramid reef structure with an engraved plaque that will serve as the memorial. These pyramid structure are acceptable reefing materials and meet all permit conditions. These structures are favored by many agencies as they provide excellent habitat for marine species, they are designed to prevent scouring and settling, and they have been proven to withstand storm events.

This request is for Franklin County to apply as the applicant for the 2021 FWC Artificial Reef Grant which will be due in March 2021. Franklin County has applied for and been awarded this FWC grant in the past. You are authorized to perform work in accordance with the terms and conditions specified below.

Project Description: The project entails a 10-year reauthorization to continue the deployment of materials for the creation of artificial reefs within a site known as the Carrabelle 10 Mile Reef aka Rose City Reef. The reef was initially authorized by Individual Permit, on April 9, 2002 and expired on April 9, 2007. The reef was reauthorized on March 26, 2007 and was valid until April 9, 2012. Carrabelle 1/0 Mile Reef totals 84.7 acres and measures one nautical mile in a north-south direction by 0.10 nautical mile in an East-West direction. The proposed project will include deploying prefabricated materials, vessels of opportunity or other common and clean reef materials lasting 50 years or more. In all cases materials will be placed in such a manner, that the 27 ft navigation clearance will not be exceeded. Materials will be transported by barge and deployed using a crane and placed in 'patch reefs', at 0.1 to 0.2 nautical mile intervals throughout a North-South direction within the permitted area. Pre- and post-deployment surveys will be conducted to ensure proper deployment and provide periodic monitoring. Temporary buoys/markers will be deployed immediately prior to the placement of any artificial reef. These structures will guide the contractor to the exact location of all proposed reefs and will be removed immediately upon completion of that specific deployment. Due to the ephemeral nature of some isolated exposed hardbottom, pre-deployment surveys will confirm sandy bottom habitat and any areas of exposed livebottom habitat will be buoyed and avoided during construction. If any live bottom is encountered, a minimum 200 ft buffer will be maintained from construction activities and no new reefs will be placed within this buffer. The relatively shallow depth of this site will allow for precision deployments to ensure construction will be limited to designated areas as determined by pre-deployment surveys. This permit provides a 10-year authorization for the project. The work described above is to be completed in accordance with the five pages of drawings [and six attachments] affixed at the end of this permit instrument.

2. Initial Agency Notification: The Permittee shall provide to the Corps, NOAA and USCG written notification of the planned deployment start date at least two weeks prior to the initial deployment on the authorized artificial reef site.

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3. Protection of Existing Resources: The Permittee shall not deploy artificial reef materials until an assessment of the bottom conditions has been accomplished by diver, submersible video camera, fathometer, depth/bottom sounder (e.g. "fish finder"), or side-scan sonar. The inspection of the deployment area may occur at the time of deployment, but no more than one year prior to deployment. The Permittee shall maintain a deployment buffer of at least 200 feet from any submerged beds of sea grasses, coral reefs, live bottom, areas supporting growth of sponges, sea fans, soft corals, and other sessile macroinvertebrates generally associated with rock outcrops, oyster reefs, scallop beds, clam beds, or areas where there are unique or unusual concentrations of bottom-dwelling marine organisms. If, during the inspection, evidence is observed of cultural/archaeological resources, such as sunken vessels, ballast, historic refuse piles, or careenage areas the Corps will be notified by the Permittee and the above referenced deployment buffer will be implemented around the resources. The Permittee shall maintain a record of the information gained during the inspection such that it can be provided upon request to the Corps.

4. Pre-Deployment Notification: No less than 14 days prior to each deployment of material on the artificial reef, the Permittee shall transmit by electronic mail ("email") a complete and signed "Florida Artificial Reef Materials Cargo Manifest and Pre-Deployment Notification" form, provided in Attachment 2 of this permit, to the Corps and FWC to allow inspection of the proposed reef materials as deemed necessary by the agencies. Inspection is allowable at the staging area. By signing the Pre-Deployment Notification the Permittee certifies that all materials are free from asphalt, petroleum, other hydrocarbons and toxic residues. The Permittee shall not deploy material if notified by the Corps or FWC that the material is unacceptable. The material needs to be evaluated before it is released for deployment. Any material that is deemed unacceptable for reef material will be disposed in an approved upland disposal site.

Deployment of the material shall not occur until after the end of the 14-day inspection period. The Permittee shall ensure both a copy of the Corps permit and the signed "*Florida Artificial Reef Materials Cargo Manifest and Pre-Deployment Notification Form*" are maintained aboard the deployment vessel at all times during loading, transit, and deployment.

If vessels are proposed for deployment, the Permittee must submit a project-specific vessel deployment plan to the Corps and the FWC in conjunction with the completed and signed *"Florida Artificial Reef Materials Cargo Manifest and Pre-Deployment Notification"* form. The Permittee shall not deploy the vessel if notified by the Corps or the FWC that the vessel or any portion of the plan is deemed unacceptable. The vessel deployment plan must include the following information:

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a) Detailed description of the proposed deployment including material type, deployment depth, intended orientation of the material (e.g., upright, on its side, upside down), navigational clearance with the material in all orientations, and the weight and dimensions of the selected material;

b) Stability analysis of the proposed material at the depth and location proposed for deployment;

d) Tow and anchoring plan describing how the materials will be towed to and anchored at the deployment site;

e) Sink Plan describing the methods used to deploy the materials;

f) A monitoring plan describing on-water and pre-deployment monitoring, immediate postdeployment monitoring, and annual monitoring activities to document that the material is deployed/located within the permitted area including coordinates, orientation of material (e.g., upright, side, upside down), structural integrity status (i.e., is the material in one piece, are pieces being disassociated from the structure), and documentation that the material meets USCG navigational requirements.

g) A copy of the proposed project budget, and documentation that the permittee has approved funding adequate to procure, clean, deploy, and conduct monitoring of the selected vessel.

5. Post-Deployment Placement Report/As-Built Drawing: No less than 30 days after each deployment at the reef site, the Permittee shall transmit by email to the Corps, FWC, and NOAA a complete and signed "*Florida Artificial Reef Materials Placement Report and Post-Deployment Notification*" form provided in Attachment 3 of this permit. Please note, the Corps requires the latitude and longitude to be accurate within 5 meters horizontal distance on the postdeployment report. Attach to the report, an as-built drawing that contains the approximate deployment configurations and the height of the material after placement. Depth shall be

verified utilizing fathometer, depth sounder, or similar device accurate to within 1 meter. Also, include information on the condition of the material at the time of deployment. The report and drawing shall be limited to a few pages per deployment. Representative photographs and/or video, if available, are encouraged to be submitted.

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6. Ownership/Maintenance/Liability: By signing this permit, the Permittee certifies and acknowledges ownership of all artificial reef materials deployed on the reef, accepts responsibility for maintenance of the artificial reef, and possesses the ability to assume liability for all damages that may arise with respect to the artificial reef.

7. Assurance of Navigation and Maintenance: The Permittee understands and agrees that, if future operations by the United States require the removal, relocation, or other alteration, of the structures or work herein authorized, or if in the opinion of the Secretary of the Army or his authorized representative, said structure or work shall cause unreasonable obstruction to the free navigation of the navigable waters, the Permittee will be required, upon due notice from the Corps of Engineers, to remove, relocate, or alter the structural work or obstructions caused thereby, without expense to the United States. No claim shall be made against the United States on account of any such removal or alteration.

8. Sea Turtle/Sawfish/Sturgeon Guidelines: The Permittee shall comply with the National Marine Fisheries Service's "Sea Turtle and Smalltooth Sawfish Construction Conditions", which also applies to Gulf sturgeon, provided in Attachment 4 of this permit.

9. Manatee Protection: The Permittee shall ensure that wharf fenders are installed on deployment vessels to reduce the risk of a vessel crushing a manatee. The wharf fenders shall be installed with appropriate materials to provide sufficient standoff space of at least 3 feet under compression. Fenders or buoys providing a minimum standoff space of at least 3 feet under compression shall be utilized between two vessels that are moored together.

10. Manatee Condition: The Permittee shall abide by the "Standard Manatee Conditions for In-Water Work", dated 2011 (Attachment 5).

11. Protected Species Guidance: The Permittee shall comply with the "Vessel Strike Avoidance Measures and Injured or Dead Protected Species Reporting" guidance for marine turtles and marine mammals, provided in Attachment 6 of this permit.

12. Regulatory Agency Changes: Should any other regulatory agency require changes to the work authorized or obligated by this permit, the Permittee is advised that a modification to this permit instrument is required prior to initiation of those changes. It is the Permittee's responsibility to request a modification of this permit from the Panama City Regulatory Office.

13. Navigational Clearance: The Permittee shall maintain a minimum navigational clearance of at least 27 feet relative to MLLW.

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14. Reef Materials: The Permittee agrees to follow State and Federal guidance on suitable artificial reef materials. Materials used for artificial reefs must be durable and stable in a 20-year return interval storm event at the requested depth. The material should not move off the proposed reef site or substantially break up with resultant loss of habitat value. The deployment of material from the following list has been proven to be durable and stable:

a. Prefabricated artificial reef modules (Examples of possible modules may include such modules as the ecosystem reef (<u>http://www.reefmaker-ecosystems.com/</u>); Reef Balls, Reef Cubes, Juvenile Habitats, Layer Cakes (<u>http://reefinnovations.com/?page_id=71</u>); or Poseidon Reefs (<u>http://www.poseidomsgarden.com/about.html</u>)) that are composed of ferrous and/or aluminum-alloy metals ¹/₄ inch or more in thickness, concrete, rock or a combination of these materials.

b. Natural rock boulders and other pre-cast concrete material, such as, culverts, stormwater junction boxes, power poles, railroad ties, jersey barriers, or other similar concrete material.

c. Large concrete building demolition materials, such as bridges, with all steel reinforcement rods severed to ensure the rods will not create a fishing tackle or diver ensnaring hazard.

d. Heavy gauge ferrous and aluminum alloy metal material components or structures, $\frac{1}{4}$ inch or more in thickness, such as utility poles and antenna towers.

e. The above material shall weigh at least 500 pounds and be clean and free from asphalt, creosote, petroleum, other hydrocarbons and toxic residues, loose free floating material or other deleterious substances. Materials/structures will be configured and constructed to be stable in a 20-year return interval storm event at the depth of placement. Materials shall be designed, selected and deployed in such a manner as to avoid entrapping marine life.

f. Any exposed rebar will be cut flush to the maximum extent possible, and not extend any greater than 6 inches from the concrete.

15. Cultural Resources/Historic Properties:

a. No structure or work shall adversely affect impact or disturb properties listed in the National Register of Historic Places (NRHP) or those eligible for inclusion in the NRHP.

b. If during the ground disturbing activities and construction work within the permit area, there are archaeological/cultural materials encountered which were not the subject of a previous cultural resources assessment survey (and which shall include, but not be limited to: pottery,

modified shell, flora, fauna, human remains, ceramics, stone tools or metal implements, dugout canoes, evidence of structures or any other physical remains that could be associated with Native American cultures or early colonial or American settlement), the Permittee shall immediately stop all work and ground-disturbing activities within a 100-meter diameter of the discovery and notify the Corps within the same business day (8 hours). The Corps shall then notify the Florida State Historic Preservation Officer (SHPO) and the appropriate Tribal Historic Preservation Officer(s) (THPO(s)) to assess the significance of the discovery and devise appropriate actions.

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c. Additional cultural resources assessments may be required of the permit area in the case of unanticipated discoveries as referenced in accordance with the above Special Condition ; and if deemed necessary by the SHPO, THPO(s), or Corps, in accordance with 36 CFR 800 or 33 CFR 325, Appendix C (5). Based, on the circumstances of the discovery, equity to all parties, and considerations of the public interest, the Corps may modify, suspend or revoke the permit in accordance with 33 CFR Part 325.7. Such activity shall not resume on non-federal lands without written authorization from the SHPO for finds under his or her jurisdiction, and from the Corps.

d. In the unlikely event that unmarked human remains are identified on non-federal lands, they will be treated in accordance with Section 872.05 Florida Statutes. All work and ground disturbing activities within a 100-meter diameter of the unmarked human remains shall immediately cease and the Permittee shall immediately notify the medical examiner, Corps, and State Archeologist within the same business day (8-hours). The Corps shall then notify the appropriate SHPO and THPO(s). Based, on the circumstances of the discovery, equity to all parties, and considerations of the public interest, the Corps may modify, suspend or revoke the permit in accordance with 33 CFR Part 325.7. Such activity shall not resume without written authorization from the State Archeologist and from the Corps.

16. Explosives: The use of explosive devices to sink any proposed artificial reef material which includes vessels, is prohibited from use by this permit. In order to use explosives, this permit must be modified and recoordinated with the appropriate agencies.

The project name references the distance to the nearest shoreline located on Dog Island approximately 10 nautical miles from the northern permit boundary. The first deployment under the original permit was constructed in 2003 and was named the Rose City Reef. See Table 2 for a list of artificial patch reefs constructed within the Carrabelle 10 Mile Artificial Reef Site. Construction of these reefs was coordinated through the Organization for Artificial Reefs, Inc. (OAR).

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<u>Waterway and Location</u>: The project is located in the Gulf of Mexico, off Franklin County, FL (Figure #1 and Figure #2). The center of the site is located approximately 13.7 nautical miles from Lanark Village Marina at a bearing of 151 degrees and approximately 10.5 nautical miles from the east end of Dog Island.

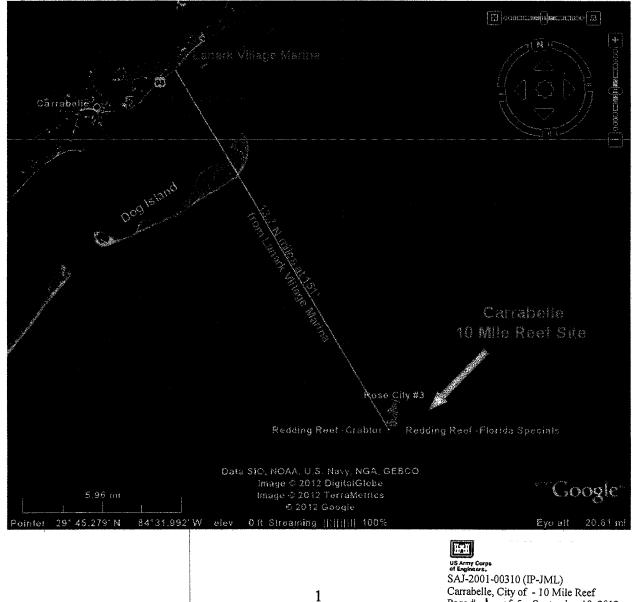


Figure 1. Area location map of Carrabelle 10 Mile Artificial Reef Site

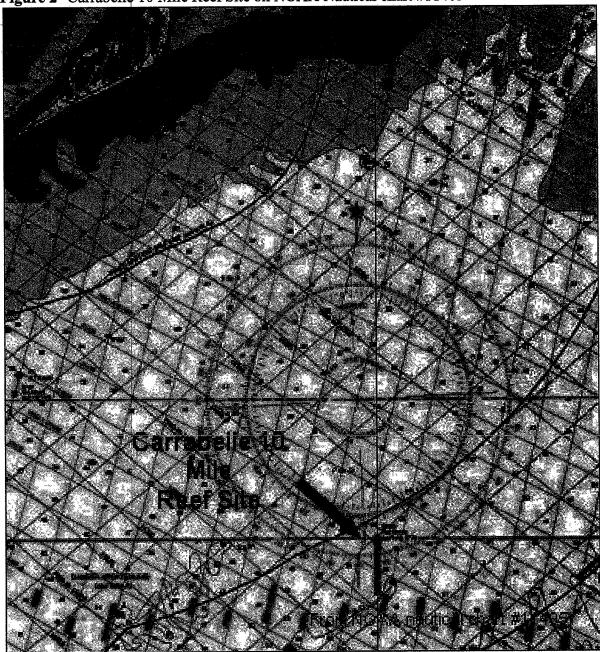
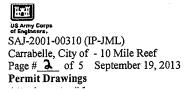


Figure 2- Carrabelle 10 Mile Reef Site on NOAA Nautical chart #11405

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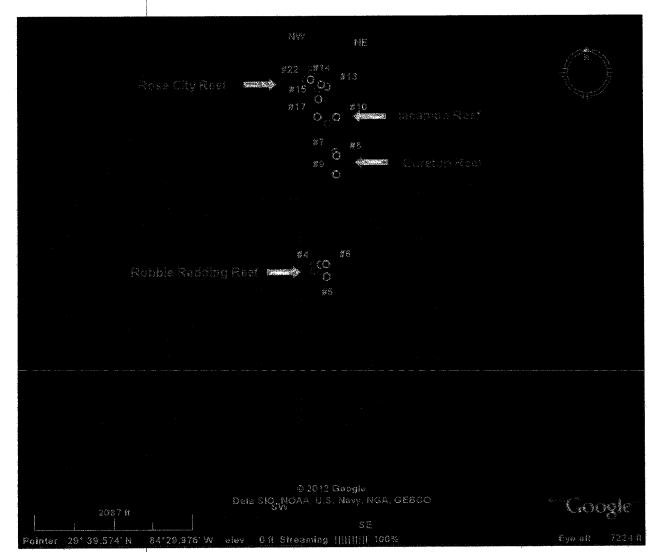


Figure 3- Locations of previous patch reef materials deployed on the Carrabelle 10 Mile Reef.

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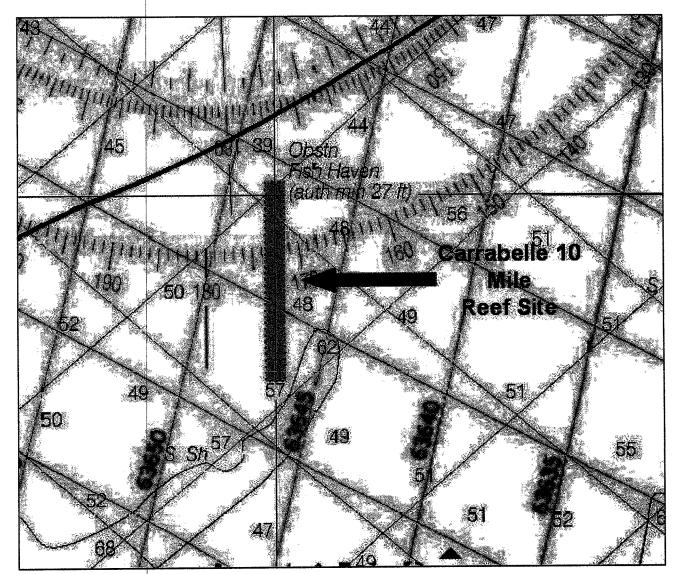


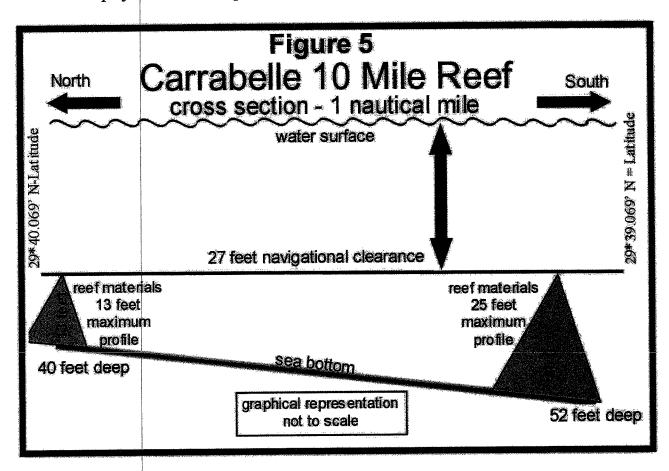
Figure 4- Carrabelle 10 Mile Reef Site as a charted Fish Haven on NOAA Nautical chart #11405

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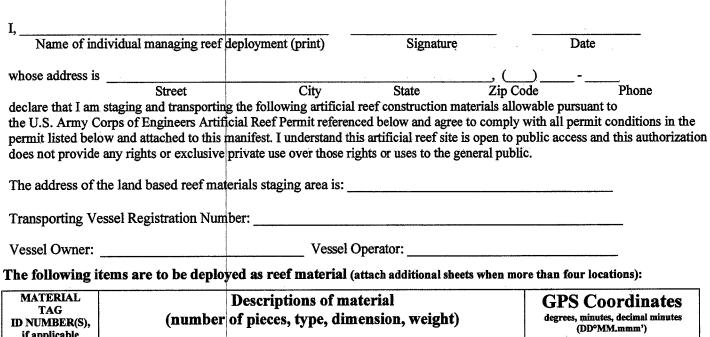

The attached artificial reef cargo manifest has been developed in compliance with subsection 370.25 (6)(b), Florida Statutes, which states that:

"It is unlawful for any person to: store, possess or transport on or across state waters any materials reasonably suited for artificial reef construction and stored in such a manner providing ready access for use and placement as an artificial reef, unless a valid cargo manifest issued by the commission or a commission-certified inspector is onboard the transporting vessel. The manifest will serve as authorization to use a valid permitted site or land-based staging area, which will validate that the type of artificial reef construction material being transported is permissible for use at the permitted site, and will describe and quantify the artificial reef material being transported. The manifest will also include the latitude and longitude coordinates of the proposed deployment location, the valid permit number, and the copy off the permit conditions for the permitted site. The manifest must be available for inspection by any authorized law enforcement officer or commission employee."

This requirement for a cargo manifest became part of the statutory revision of the artificial reef program statute Section 370.25 Florida Statutes (F.S.), modified during the 2000 State of Florida Legislature. The statutory language allows a "commission certified inspector" to complete and approve the artificial reef materials cargo manifest. Therefore, we are providing the attached cargo manifest form to all local coastal government artificial reef coordinators and eligible non-profit corporations who may physically construct artificial reefs with the approval of the permit holders.

INSTRUCTIONS

A separate cargo manifest form is to be completed for each load to be transported offshore (i.e., one manifest per voyage). The manifest is to list all, and only, the reef materials onboard.

The top of the form is to be filled out by the reef builder with his/her contact information and the information about the proposed reef materials to be deployed written into the boxes. If several materials are identical but have different tag numbers, please write "SAME" in the box for the other materials. Also put "SAME" under additional coordinates if all materials are going to the same deployment site.

The shaded portion of the form at the bottom is to be filled out by the materials inspector. The cargo manifest must be completed by an entity representing the holder of the applicable artificial reef permit to assure that all materials meet the requirements of the permit.

Completion of the artificial reef materials cargo manifest is required for all construction activities.

The requirement to complete this document is not intended to be an undue burden on entities wishing to legally construct artificial reefs within permitted sites, but is a tool to assist law enforcement personnel in preventing the illegal construction of artificial reefs without the knowledge of the permit holder or in areas outside of legally permitted sites. It is intended to allow law enforcement staff to determine whether or not a load of materials is legal under the permit conditions. Without a properly completed Cargo Manifest Form on board, reef builders will be returned to port pursuant to Chapter 370.25 (6) (b). It is not necessary to send a copy of the Cargo Manifest Form to the FWC artificial reef section in Tallahassee. Documentation of the reef building activity should be maintained by the entity issuing the manifest in the event of any FWC inquiries.

Reminder: the placement of all public artificial reefs in state or adjacent federal waters requires the submittal of a Materials Placement Report to the FWC artificial reef program within 30 days of public reef deployment in accordance with s. 370.25 F.S.

SEA TURTLE AND SMALLTOOTH SAWFISH CONSTRUCTION CONDITIONS

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The permittee shall comply with the following protected species construction conditions:

- a. The permittee shall instruct all personnel associated with the project of the potential presence of these species and the need to avoid collisions with sea turtles and smalltooth sawfish. All construction personnel are responsible for observing water-related activities for the presence of these species.
- b. The permittee shall advise all construction personnel that there are civil and criminal penalties for harming, harassing, or killing sea turtles or smalltooth sawfish, which are protected under the Endangered Species Act of 1973.
- c. Siltation barriers shall be made of material in which a sea turtle or smalltooth sawfish cannot become entangled, be properly secured, and be regularly monitored to avoid protected species entrapment. Barriers may not block sea turtle or smalltooth sawfish entry to or exit from designated critical habitat without prior agreement from the National Marine Fisheries Service's Protected Resources Division, St. Petersburg, Florida.
- d. All vessels associated with the construction project shall operate at "no wake/idle" speeds at all times while in the construction area and while in water depths where the draft of the vessel provides less than a four-foot clearance from the bottom. All vessels will preferentially follow deep-water routes (e.g., marked channels) whenever possible.
- e. If a sea turtle or smalltooth sawfish is seen within 100 yards of the active daily construction/dredging operation or vessel movement, all appropriate precautions shall be implemented to ensure its protection. These precautions shall include cessation of operation of any moving equipment closer than 50 feet of a sea turtle or smalltooth sawfish. Operation of any mechanical construction equipment shall cease immediately if a sea turtle or smalltooth sawfish is seen within a 50-ft radius of the equipment. Activities may not resume until the protected species has departed the project area of its own volition.
- f. Any collision with and/or injury to a sea turtle or smalltooth sawfish shall be reported immediately to the National Marine Fisheries Service's Protected Resources Division (727-824-5312) and the local authorized sea turtle stranding/rescue organization.
- g. Any special construction conditions, required of your specific project, outside these general conditions, if applicable, will be addressed in the primary consultation.

STANDARD MANATEE CONDITIONS FOR IN-WATER WORK 2011

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The permittee shall comply with the following conditions intended to protect manatees from direct project effects:

- a. All personnel associated with the project shall be instructed about the presence of manatees and manatee speed zones, and the need to avoid collisions with and injury to manatees. The permittee shall advise all construction personnel that there are civil and criminal penalties for harming, harassing, or killing manatees which are protected under the Marine Mammal Protection Act, the Endangered Species Act, and the Florida Manatee Sanctuary Act.
- b. All vessels associated with the construction project shall operate at "Idle Speed/No Wake" at all times while in the immediate area and while in water where the draft of the vessel provides less than a four-foot clearance from the bottom. All vessels will follow routes of deep water whenever possible.
- c. Siltation or turbidity barriers shall be made of material in which manatees cannot become entangled, shall be properly secured, and shall be regularly monitored to avoid manatee entanglement or entrapment. Barriers must not impede manatee movement.
- d. All on-site project personnel are responsible for observing water-related activities for the presence of manatee(s). All in-water operations, including vessels, must be shutdown if a manatee(s) comes within 50 feet of the operation. Activities will not resume until the manatee(s) has moved beyond the 50-foot radius of the project operation, or until 30 minutes elapses if the manatee(s) has not reappeared within 50 feet of the operation. Animals must not be herded away or harassed into leaving.
- e. Any collision with or injury to a manatee shall be reported immediately to the Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission (FWC) Hotline at 1-888-404-3922. Collision and/or injury should also be reported to the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service in Jacksonville (1-904-731-3336) for north Florida or Vero Beach (1-772-562-3909) for south Florida, and to FWC at <u>ImperiledSpecies@myFWC.com</u>
- f. Temporary signs concerning manatees shall be posted prior to and during all in-water project activities. All signs are to be removed by the permittee upon completion of the project. Temporary signs that have already been approved for this use by the FWC must be used. One sign which reads *Caution: Boaters* must be posted. A second sign measuring at least 8 ½" by 11" explaining the requirements for "Idle Speed/No Wake" and the shut down of in-water operations must be posted in a location prominently visible to all personnel engaged in water-related activities. Background

The National Marine Fisheries Service (NMFS) has determined that collisions with vessels can injure or kill protected species (e.g., endangered and threatened species, and marine mammals). The following standard measures should be implemented to reduce the risk associated with vessel strikes or disturbance of these protected species to discountable levels. NMFS should be contacted to identify any additional conservation and recovery issues of concern, and to assist in the development of measures that may be necessary.

Protected Species Identification Training

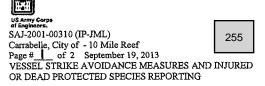
Vessel crews should use an Atlantic and Gulf of Mexico reference guide that helps identify protected species that might be encountered in U.S. waters of the Atlantic Ocean, including the Caribbean Sea, and Gulf of Mexico. Additional training should be provided regarding information and resources available regarding federal laws and regulations for protected species, ship strike information, critical habitat, migratory routes and seasonal abundance, and recent sightings of protected species.

Vessel Strike Avoidance

In order to avoid causing injury or death to marine mammals and sea turtles the following measures should be taken when consistent with safe navigation:

- 1. Vessel operators and crews should maintain a vigilant watch for marine mammals and sea turtles to avoid striking sighted protected species.
- 2. When whales are sighted, maintain a distance of 100 yards or greater between the whale and the vessel.
- 3. When sea turtles or small cetaceans are sighted, attempt to maintain a distance of 50 yards or greater between the animal and the vessel whenever possible.
- 4. When small cetaceans are sighted while a vessel is underway (e.g., bow-riding), attempt to remain parallel to the animal's course. Avoid excessive speed or abrupt changes in direction until the cetacean has left the area.
- 5. Reduce vessel speed to 10 knots or less when mother/calf pairs, groups, or large assemblages of cetaceans are observed near an underway vessel, when safety permits. A single cetacean at the surface may indicate the presence of submerged animals in the vicinity; therefore, prudent precautionary measures should always be exercised. The vessel should attempt to route around the animals, maintaining a minimum distance of 100 yards whenever possible.

6. Whales may surface in unpredictable locations or approach slowly moving vessels. When an animal is sighted in the vessel's path or in close proximity to a moving vessel and when safety permits, reduce speed and shift the engine to neutral. Do not engage the engines until the animals are clear of the area.

Additional Requirements for the North Atlantic Right Whale

- 1. If a sighted whale is believed to be a North Atlantic right whale, federal regulation requires a minimum distance of 500 yards be maintained from the animal (50 CFR 224.103 (c)).
- 2. Vessels entering North Atlantic right whale critical habitat are required to report into the Mandatory Ship Reporting System.
- 3. Mariners should check with various communication media for general information regarding avoiding ship strikes and specific information regarding North Atlantic right whale sighting locations. These include NOAA weather radio, U.S. Coast Guard NAVTEX broadcasts, and Notices to Mariners. Commercial mariners calling on United States ports should view the most recent version of the NOAA/USCG produced training CD entitled "A Prudent Mariner's Guide to Right Whale Protection" (contact the NMFS Southeast Region, Protected Resources Division for more information regarding the CD).
- 4. Injured, dead, or entangled right whales should be immediately reported to the U.S. Coast Guard via VHF Channel 16.

Injured or Dead Protected Species Reporting

Vessel crews should report sightings of any injured or dead protected species immediately, regardless of whether the injury or death is caused by your vessel.

If the injury or death of a marine mammal was caused by a collision with your vessel, responsible parties should remain available to assist the respective salvage and stranding network as needed.
