

#### **Project Background**

The Applicants originally submitted a petition for the Town to consider the annexation of Benloch Ranch on May 3, 2023. That application was rescinded by the Applicant in July 2023 to allow them to coordinate some ongoing development issues with Wasatch County.

In September 2023, the applicant submitted their second application for the Town to consider the annexation. The Town scheduled the application for a public hearing with the Town Council on October 12, 2023 but the Applicant requested a postponement to allow them to finalize their concept plans for presentation to the Town Council. This work is still underway and, after discussions with the Applicants, staff recommends that Town Council deny the consideration for annexation at this time.

It is important that the Town adhere to proper noticing and scheduling timelines to ensure due process pursuant to Utah state statues for annexation.

The Applicants may reapply if they wish in the future.

**WHEREAS,** the Council finds it necessary to amend the Fee and Rate Schedule to include electrical permitting fees due to the installation of outside heat tape, lower the remodeling permit fees to be more in line with neighboring communities, and make technical corrections.

WHEREAS, the Council wishes to make clarifications to escrow fees and plan fees.

**NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED** by the Town Council of Hideout Town, State of Utah, as follows:

12. Presentation and recommendation of the traffic study regarding speeds on Shoreline Drive



## North Shoreline Drive Traffic Study

October 2023



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#### Summary

This report documents a traffic study conducted by Epic Engineering for the town of Hideout, Utah. As a result of a growing population, the Town of Hideout has experienced an increased number of vehicles utilizing city streets. Public safety is an important component when considering a city's population growth. In order to maintain the highest standard of safety for its citizens, the Town of Hideout contracted Epic Engineering to assess vehicle speeds, perform a stop sign warrant study, and present traffic calming recommendations. The following report contains the traffic study results.

### Introduction

The town of Hideout covers approximately 2,500 acres of mountainous terrain. The town's location is in the northwestern corner of Wasatch County nestled northeast of the Jordanelle Reservoir and west of US Route 248 (see figure 1). The town was established in 2008 with an original population of 665 residents. Hideout is a growing town boasting a population of 1,152 residents in 2010 and has a projected population of 3,300 by 2040.



Figure 1. Map of Hideout, Utah.

During a recent city-wide road upgrade, several speed humps were removed. Speed humps are often placed on residential streets to force motorists to slow down to a safe speed. According the U.S. Department of Transportation Federal Highway Administration, speed humps can be

effective at reducing speed by nearly 10 mph. The removal of the speed humps generated a concern for maintaining safe vehicular speeds within the community. Concern for public safety prompted the town of Hideout to contract with Epic Engineering to monitor vehicle speeds, perform a stop sign warrant study, and offer recommendations to reduce vehicle speeds.

## Spot Speed Test

A spot speed is the instantaneous speed of a vehicle at any specific location. A spot speed test is conducted by measuring the individual speeds of a sample group of vehicles passing a given spot on a street or highway. Spot speed studies are used to determine the speed distribution of a traffic stream at a specific location. The data gathered in spot speed studies is used to determine vehicle speed percentiles, which are useful in making many speed-related decisions such as speed limits, traffic control devices, roadway design elements, monitoring traffic speed trends, and measuring effectiveness of traffic control devices or programs.

Epic Engineering performed a spot speed study on Tuesday 26, 2023 on N Shoreline Dr near the intersection of N Shoreline Dr and Silver Loop. Traffic volume and speed were recorded in hourly increments for a total of 246 vehicles and an average speed of 25 MPH (See table 1).

Vehicle speed was measured with a Bushnell speed gun. A speed gun transmits radio frequency energy in the form of waves. The radar transmits 24 billion RF cycles of energy per second at the speed of light, which is 186,000 miles per second. The speed gun measures the difference between transmitted and received signals and relays this information to the DSP. The speed accuracy is within +/- 1 MPH. The maximum speed recorded was 40 mph, and the minimum was 13 mph.

## Spot Speed Test Results

The spot speed frequency distribution table displays speed percentiles (see Table 2). Speed percentiles are tools used to determine effective and adequate speed limits. The 50<sup>th</sup> percentile of speed represents the median speed of the traffic stream. The 85<sup>th</sup> percentile is used in evaluating /recommending posted speed limits based on the assumption that 85% of the drivers are traveling at a speed they perceive to be safe (Homburger et al. 1996). Generally, the 85<sup>th</sup> percentile of speed is assumed to be the highest safe speed for a roadway section. Observed speeds may be slower in rainy or snowy conditions.




Figure 2. Spot speed frequency chart.

The result of the Spot Speed study, as shown in figure 2, illustrates the 50<sup>th</sup> percentile and 85<sup>th</sup> percentile for speed is 24.6 mph and 29.6 mph, respectively.

According to the data collected, the average speed on North Shoreline Dr is 25 MPH. The posted speed for Shoreline Dr is 20 mph. The percentage of vehicles with a speed between 20-27 mph is 52%. Vehicles with a speed of more than 27 MPH is 33% and less than 20 mph is 33%.

A report from the Wasatch County Sheriff's Department was obtained. In the town of Hideout during 2023, the sheriff's department reported 57 vehicle stops between the months of Jan and March and 53 vehicle stops between April and June. Two accidents were reported during April and June (See appendix A for the traffic report).

## Stop Sign Benefits

The city of Hideout has proposed adding stop signs to Shoreline Dr intersections as a traffic calming measure. The intersections in question are local streets along Shoreline Dr. All of the intersections are currently single stop intersections with the stop signs being placed on the local streets. Shoreline Dr is a collector street and has no stop signs.

A stop sign is a valuable and effective control device when used in the correct place and under the correct conditions. Appropriately placed stop signs benefit the flow of traffic by assigning the right-of-way at an intersection. Stop signs can also reduce the number of accidents in an intersection, especially accidents involving left turns. However, when stop signs are overused, they can cause motorists to become complacent and disobey the stop sign which can lead to more accidents. Overused stop signs also cause drivers to stop more frequently adding unnecessary delays, often resulting in drivers speeding between stop signs. The Manual on Uniform Traffic Control Devices (MUTCD) is a set of well-developed, federal and state recognized guidelines to indicate when stop signs would be beneficial. These guidelines take into consideration the probability of vehicles arriving at an intersection at the same time, the length of time traffic must wait to enter, traffic delays, and the availability of safe crossing opportunities. According to MUTCD Section 2B.05 Stop Sign Applications, "stop signs should not be used for speed control. Stop signs should be installed in a manner that minimizes the numbers of vehicles having to stop."

Epic Engineering used the MUTCD guidelines and standards in considering placing stop signs in intersections along Shoreline Dr. The intersections were evaluated to determine if additional stop signs would help maximize traffic flow and minimize personal risk.

## Stop Sign Installation Standards

Multiway stop control can be useful as a safety measure at intersections if certain traffic conditions exist. Safety concerns associated with multiway stops include pedestrians, bicyclists, and all road users expecting other road users to stop. Multiway stop control is used where the volume of traffic on the intersecting roads is approximately equal. The restrictions on the use of stop signs described in Section 2B.05 apply to single and multiway stop applications.

The MUTCD has defined the criteria used for the evaluation of the intersections as follows:

1. Traffic signals are warranted and urgently needed, and the multiway stop signs are an interim measure.

2. A crash problem, as indicated by five or more reported crashes in a 12-month period that are susceptible to correction by a multi-way stop installation.

3. Minimum volumes warranting a multi-way stop:

a. The vehicular volume entering the intersection from all approaches must average at least 300 vehicles per hour for any 8 hours of an average day, and

b. The combined vehicular, pedestrian, and bicycle volume entering the intersection from the minor street approaches (total of both approaches) averages at least
200 units per hour for the same 8 hours, with an average delay to minor-street vehicular traffic of at least 30 seconds per vehicle during the highest hour.

The MUTCD further suggest the following additional criteria to be considered in an engineering study:

1. The need to control vehicle/pedestrian conflicts near locations that generate high pedestrian volumes.

2. Locations where a road user, after stopping, cannot see conflicting traffic and is not able to reasonably safely negotiate the intersection unless conflicting cross traffic is

also required to stop.

## Stop Sign Warrant Results

Single stop intersections are warranted along Shoreline Dr. A stop sign should be placed stopping the traffic on Overlook Loop, Silver Hill Loop, Recreation Dr, and Shoreline Ct. According to the guidelines and standards presented by MUTCD, the intersections along Shoreline Dr do not meet the criteria for multi-way stops for the following reasons:

- 1. There is no need for street lights in the near future therefore, temporary multi-way stops are not necessary.
- 2. The intersections along Shoreline Dr are not experiencing 5 or more accidents within a 12-month period.
- 3. Shoreline Dr is not experiencing the volume of cars necessary to warrant multi-way stops.
- 4. According to accident reports and vehicle volume there is no need to control left turns.
- 5. Shoreline Dr does not have high pedestrian crossing areas to warrant a stop sign.
- 6. Intersections along Shoreline Dr have clear visibility of approaching vehicles.

The MUTCD does not support the use of stop signs to be used as speed control and should only be placed if MUTCD criteria has been met. Stop signs are frequently violated if unwarranted. A stop sign that is not warranted due to low traffic volume is seen by drivers as unnecessary. Drivers will often ignore or roll through the stop sign. Drivers will also feel they need to make up for time lost while slowing down and stopping for a stop sign by increasing their speed in between stop signs.

## Traffic Calming Recommendations

Although the average speed recorded during the spot speed test is 25 mph, 33% of the vehicles sampled were traveling above 27 mph. When concern for public safety due to vehicle speeds is considered, the implementation of traffic calming measures can be a positive benefit to a community. The Institute of Transportation Engineers defines traffic calming measures as "a combination of implementations to reduce the negative effects of motor vehicle use, alter driver behavior, and improve conditions for non-motorized street users".

Traffic calming consists of physical design and other measures put in place on existing roads to reduce vehicle speeds and improve safety for pedestrians and cyclists. Four common traffic calming designs are non-physical, vertical, horizontal, and narrowing measures. Non-physical measures encourage public education to ensure citizens understand the importance of traveling at safe speeds, vertical measures are implemented by raising the road forcing drivers to slow down through the raised areas, horizontal measures are implemented by placing curves in the road encouraging drivers to choose slower speeds to navigate the curves safely, and narrowing measures narrows the lane causing the drivers to feel uneasy in a smaller lane and slowing down to a safer speed. The following are traffic calming recommendations with descriptions,

approximate effectiveness, and approximate costs. Please refer to Appendix B for illustrated examples of less common traffic calming measures.

#### Non-Physical Measures

Non-Physical Measures are measures such as signage or speed enforcement that do not require any construction or physical modifications to the roadway. These items can be attempted first since these can be economical and can be easier to remove if they do not improve the problem.

#### a. Community Education

Public awareness of safe driving speeds, especially through residential areas, is an essential asset to a community. Flyers, monthly newsletters, and meetings offer opportunities to inform and remind the community of speeding issues and concerns, and the importance of safe driving. Various resources and literature are available to inform the community on these issues. The cost for community education is negligible.

#### b. Community Gateway Identity Signage.

Community Gateway treatments involve the combined use of sign installations, landscaping, textured pavements, name plates, monuments, or other arrangements placed at the entrance of a neighborhood to communicate a sense of neighborhood identity. The installations serve to inform motorists they are entering a community where there is a significant change in the driving environment such as a transition from a rural or urban road to a residential street. Cost varies. The average reduction is approximately 2 mph.

#### c. Speed Enforcement

For areas where vehicle speed has been deemed excessive, speed enforcement can be a temporary traffic calming measure. For low volume streets, periodic daytime speed enforcement is the best option. Another option available for speed enforcement is a radar trailer device, which measures and displays a vehicle's speed as it approaches. The legal speed limit is shown in clear view next to the vehicle's speed. This reminds drivers to slow to the appropriate speed. These devices are easily transported and utilized rapidly at different locations. Approximate Cost: Varies

#### d. Radar Speed signs

Another option that is very similar to a radar trailer device is called radar speed sign. The difference between this device and other radar devices is that this is permanent or semi-permanent. The device can also have the capability of storing data overtime and providing historical speed information to the city. This device measures and displays a vehicle's speed as it approaches. The legal speed limit is shown in clear view next to the vehicle's speed. This reminds drivers to slow to the appropriate speed. Approximate Cost: \$10,000.

#### e. Signage

Signage such as speed limit and various restriction type signs can be used as a traffic calming measure. Approximate Cost: \$250 per sign.

#### f. Speed Legend

Speed legends are numbers painted on the roadway indicating current speed limit. These are usually painted near the speed limit signposts. Speed legends may be useful for reinforcing speed reduction between different roadway segments (e.g., from one functional class to another or at major residential entry points).

#### g. Improve Visibility Around Crosswalks.

Equip crosswalks with high-visibility paint and markings, appropriate lighting, textured surfaces, and orange flags.

#### h. Additional Fine Signs.

When properly implemented and posted on a residential street, impose a \$200 fine for speeding in addition to the typical fine. The Additional Fines require a formal acceptance process including a request by resolution of the local governing body for the signs, verification that there is a speeding problem and that the increased penalty has community support. The cost is about \$750 per sign. Unknown how effective this is in reducing speeds.

#### Vertical Speed Control Measures

Vertical Speed Control Measures are vertical elevated segments of roadway that require a vehicle to slow down. Typical vertical speed control measures include speed humps, speed tables, raised sidewalks and raised intersections.

#### a. Speed Humb

A speed hump is a raised rounded device usually constructed from asphalt that is placed across a roadway. Speed humps are usually 3 to 4 inches in height and are parabolic or sinusoidal (e.g., gradual) in shape. They extend fully across the roadway but are tapered on each side to allow unimpeded water flow in curb and gutter system. The design speed for a speed hump is approximately 15-25 mph.

#### b. Modified Speed Hump: Speed Lump

Speed lumps are similar to speed humps, except they are divided into three lumps with one foot of space between each lump. The space between the lumps is specifically designed to accommodate the axle width of fire vehicles. All other vehicles with smaller axle widths have to go over the humps from at least one side of the vehicle. Speed lumps are typically 12-14 feet long. Extreme care must be taken to ensure the height of the speed lump can accommodate the ground clearance of fire vehicles. Speed humps were observed to reduce speed approximately 7 mph or approximately 22%. Approximate Cost: \$1,500 to \$4,000.

#### c. Speed Table

A speed table is a raised flat-topped device, which is placed across the roadway. Speed tables are usually 3 to 4 inches in height. The flat-top is approximately 10 feet in the direction of travel and each ramp is 6 feet. The flat-top is usually constructed of asphalt, concrete, brick, or other textured materials. The ramps are parabolic in shape and are usually made of asphalt. Speed tables extend fully across the roadway but are tapered on each side to allow unimpeded water flow in curb and gutter systems. The design speed for a speed table is approximately 30 mph, which is a safe and comfortable speed for passenger vehicles. Speed tables were observed to reduce speed at least 3 mph or approximately 9%. Approximate Cost: \$4,000 to \$15,000 depending on materials used.

#### d. Raised Crosswalk

Raised crosswalks are speed tables with crosswalk markings and signage. The only geometric difference between them is the raised crosswalk extends from curb to curb and the raised crosswalk may be longer and higher than a typical speed table. The most similar device for which data is available is a 22-foot speed table, which can reduce speed at least 6 mph or approximately 18%. Approximate Cost: \$4,000 to \$15,000 depending on materials used.

#### e. Raised Intersection

Raised intersections are like speed tables that cover an entire intersection. Ramps are present on all approaches. The flat-top area is usually a textured material. Raised intersections usually rise to sidewalk level or slightly below to provide an edge for the visually impaired. If there is a concern about loss of on-street parking, raised intersections are a more acceptable traffic calming measure. Approximate Cost: \$25,000 to \$70,000 depending on materials used.

#### Horizontal Speed Control Measures

Horizontal Speed Control Measures are altered segments of roadway, where the straight line of travel has been altered in order to require a vehicle to slow. Typical horizontal speed control measures are traffic circles, roundabouts, chicanes, and lateral shifts.

#### a. Traffic Circle

A traffic circle is a raised island placed in an intersection causing traffic to negotiate around the island. Generally, traffic circles are circular in shape and have some type of landscaping in its center. Also, traffic circles have outer rings (i.e., truck apron or lip) that are mountable so large vehicles can circumnavigate the small radius traffic circle. Traffic circles were observed to reduce speed at least 3 mph or approximately 11%. Approximate Cost: \$20,000 to \$40,000 for asphalt streets and \$30,000 to \$60,000 for concrete streets.

#### b. Roundabout

A roundabout is similar to a traffic circle. It also has a raised island placed in an intersection with circulating traffic. However, roundabouts generally are much larger than traffic circles and need more land for construction. Roundabouts are used at

intersections with higher traffic volumes and are designed for higher speeds. Roundabouts generally have raised splitter islands that deflect traffic to the right, which help form gaps in traffic. Roundabouts may also have flared entry lanes, which increase the capacity of the intersection. Roundabouts may also have bypass lanes to allow drivers to travel through the area without entering the intersection at all.

Effectiveness: Effectiveness is inconclusive. Speed entering roundabouts is affected by geometric curvature design features. However, roundabouts have been shown to reduce crash frequencies. Approximate Cost: \$100,000 to \$250,000 depending on materials and dimensions.

c. Chicane

Chicanes are curb extensions or edge islands that alternate from one side of the roadway to the other. These curb extensions or edge islands give the roadway more "winding" attribute. Curb extensions or edge islands can be semicircular, triangular or squared off. Trapezoidal islands have been found to be more effective at reducing speeds than semi-circular shapes. Curb extensions or edge islands should have a vertical element to draw attention to them. Trees and other landscape materials are an option. For low-speed roadways or roadways that lack right-of-way, mountable curbs are also an option to allow larger vehicles to maneuver through the chicanes. Chicanes can also be formed by alternating on-street parking from one side of the roadway to the other. Parking bays can be created using striping or by installing landscaped islands at each end. Effectiveness: Effectiveness is inconclusive. Approximate Cost: \$40,000 per chicanes (i.e., curb extensions or edge islands).

#### d. Lateral Shift

A lateral shift is like a chicane however the roadway alignment only shifts once. It is only one curb extension or edge island rather than a series of alternating curb extensions or edge islands. Because the road alignment shifts only once, the crossing speed is approximately 5 mph higher than a series of chicanes. A higher speed means that lateral shifts can be placed on higher functional classification roadways (i.e., collectors or arterials). Typical lateral shifts incorporate a landscaped center island to separate opposing traffic. This prohibits drivers from veering into the opposing lane. Effectiveness: Effectiveness is inconclusive. Approximate Cost: Varies depending on size of offset and length of transition.

#### Narrowing Measures

Narrowing Measures are short roadway segments that are narrower than the typical roadway section. Typical narrowing measures are lane striping, neckdowns, chokers, and island narrowing.

a. Lane Striping

Lane striping can be used to create formal bicycle lanes, parking lanes and/or edge lines. The striping "narrows" the travel lane for vehicles and may encourage drivers to lower their speeds. This measure is low cost and requires no construction. Approximate Cost: \$0.20-\$0.30 per lineal foot.

#### b. Neckdown

Neckdowns are curb extensions at an intersection. These neckdowns reduce the roadway width from curb to curb and provide shorter pedestrian crossing distances and times. The short curb return radius also reduces the speeds of turning vehicles. The most similar device for which data was available is called narrowing, which can reduce speed at least 2 mph or approximately 4%. Approximate Cost: \$10,000 to \$40,000 per corner.

#### c. Choker

Chokers are curb extensions at mid-block that narrow the roadway by widening the sidewalk, planting strip, or centerline. A typical two-lane choker is 20 feet from curb to curb. One-lane chokers narrow the roadway to just one travel lane. This is similar to a one-lane bridge condition. The constricted length in the direction of travel varies but should be kept short enough not to block driveways or accesses. Approximate Cost: \$10,000 to \$40,000 depending on site conditions and landscaping.

#### d. Center Island

Center islands are raised barriers in the center of the roadway that narrow the travel lanes. The center island should be large enough to draw attention (e.g., 6 feet wide by 20 feet long). The center island can also be offset to the left from the perspective of approaching traffic. They are often landscaped and can be used as refuge for pedestrians crossing the roadway. Center islands create intermittent left turn areas rather than a continuous median. Center islands placed at intersections or entrances to neighborhoods are often called gateways. The most similar device for which data was available is called narrowing, which can reduce speed at least 2 mph or approximately 4%. Approximate Cost: \$10,000 to \$20,000 per 100 feet depending on site conditions and landscaping.

# Conclusion

The average speed on Shoreline Dr is 5 mph above the posted speed of 20 mph. The town of Hideout could see a decrease in speed by implementing traffic calming measures. Public education is the most cost-efficient measure. Public awareness is important in maintaining community safety. The town of Hideout may experience slower traffic by placing speed legends, painted crosswalks, and implementing vertical measures at residential entrances. When selecting a traffic calming measure to implement, there are several items to consider: is the measure cost effective, is the measure effective at slowing vehicle speeds, does the measure hinder emergency vehicles, and what is the level of construction involved are just a few considerations. Implementing traffic calming measures can add order and beauty to city streets, while slowing drivers and creating a safer environment for the community.

Submittals:	The Applicants and the Council Subcommittee continue to discuss terms on the draft MDA. The MDA is in draft form and will be updated based on information and direction received at this Town Council meeting on December 14, 2023.

#### Background

- The Planning Commission approved a Concept Plan for the Bloom development (located on the eastern +/-72 acres of the total +/-112-acre Salzman property) on April 17, 2023.
- Overall, the Salzman property is 112 acres but the area which is being considered for development and for which a rezone application is requested is +/-72 acres.
- This is an application to rezone the property accompanied by a Master Development Agreement (MDA).
- The rezone request and MDA were favorably recommended by the Planning Commission at a special meeting on November 2, 2023 conditioned upon the areas highlighted in yellow on the attached MDA being reviewed in detail by the Town Council to reach 'mutually agreeable language' with the Applicants.

#### **Recent Meetings/Work**

At the last Town Council meeting on November 8, 2023 the members appointed a subcommittee (Ralph Severini and Chris Baier) to work with the Applicants and Town staff to review the Master Development Agreement (MDA) and report back to the full Town Council.

The Town Subcommittee and Town Staff met with the Applicants' team on November 28<sup>th</sup> and worked through some detailed MDA language and updates. After that meeting, the Applicants continued to work with their attorney, and the Town subcommittee met internally to discuss some open items that are generally policy related but worthy of discussion and inclusion in the MDA.

The following is a list of the following items that the subcommittee would like to discuss:

• With the Public Infrastructure District (PID) now proposed as part of the MDA, the roads will be dedicated to the Town for maintenance, repair, and future replacement. Utah state statute regarding PIDs requires dedication to the local jurisdiction. Initially, the roads were proposed to remain under the ownership of the HOA for the Bloom Development. Under this scenario, the HOA would have covered all maintenance, repair and replacement costs.

The subcommittee discussed anticipated property/sales/TRT tax revenues as well as expenses associated with the project. To fully understand the total anticipated expenses, the subcommittee requested detailed costs associated with road maintenance and repair/replacement. The engineers for the Town indicated the cost at about \$100k per year per linear mile for a small town – this is a back of the envelope assessment. The cost per mile is generally less in larger cities due to economies of scale. Staff are working with the engineers for the Town to provide Council members with detailed costs associated with road maintenance and repair/replacement.

The designer for the Bloom Development provided the total length of the roads:

Center road (currently Golden Eagle access road)	2,617 LF
Remaining roads	<u>8,620 LF</u>
Total	11,237 LF (2.13 miles)

The subcommittee recommended a discussion with the full Town Council and the Applicants.

• The subcommittee also recommended a Town Council discussion regarding developer contributions to the Town that would ensure the success of this project and mitigate impacts of a denser project that currently zoned, as well as address Town needs.

#### **Next Steps**

The Town Council should discuss these open policy issues associated Master Development Agreement (MDA). The Applicants may also have additional information to present to the Town Council. Discussions to date with the Applicants have been collaborative and Town staff recognize the potential of this public-private partnership opportunity. The Applicants are not requesting a vote at this meeting recognizing the importance of addressing these issues first. They are looking for a vote at the January meeting.

#### 38 III. <u>Update on Golden Eagle Subdivision</u>

Town Attorney Polly McLean provided an update on the Golden Eagle Subdivision. She mentioned that there was a court hearing in May, but couldn't recall the specific date. The judge had not issued a ruling yet and had requested both sides to submit papers, which they did just before Memorial Day. No progress had been made on the infrastructure, and they were still

- waiting for the judge's ruling. Additionally, they had not received an update on the storm drain
  plan, which was crucial for issuing building permits.
- Mayor Rubin expressed hope that the judge would respond relatively quickly, ideally within the next week, allowing Staff to move forward. He also mentioned the possibility of hearing from Mustang Development regarding the storm drain plans.

Long-term plans included 16 installing permanent speed bumps and removing the current speed tables that didn't hold up well 17 during the winter. As a temporary solution, he suggested increasing police patrols on Shoreline 18 Drive, specifically near the intersection of Overlook Loop and Longview Drive. He also proposed 19 using temporary barriers or signs to encourage drivers to slow down.
- Mayor Rubin acknowledged Council Member Nadelberg's concerns and mentioned that he had discussed the issue with Town Engineer Timm Dixon, who had reached out to the Wasatch County Sheriff's Office. They were considering implementing another temporary speed bump until they could approve a contract for paving and concrete work later in the summer, aiming to address the issue quickly without using barrels.
- 25 There being no further comments, Mayor Rubin closed public input at 6:16 p.m.

#### 26 V. <u>Public Hearing</u>

### Discussion and possible approval of the amendments to the Town Budget for the fiscal year 2022-2023

Mayor Rubin presented the public hearing to discuss amendments to the Town Budget for the Fiscal Year 2022-2023. The discussion involved adjustments made to the budget and the need for a public hearing. Financial Consultant Katie Shepley provided an overview, stating that the budget amendments were necessary, but that the changes were relatively minor compared to the previous month's presentation. The adjustment included improved financial figures compared to the previous forecast.

Ms. McLean emphasized the requirement for a public hearing when amending the budget and the need to provide the public with adequate notice for participation. There was some discussion about scheduling a short Special Meeting in June for the public hearing, and the importance of adhering to the timeline for notice. The potential dates for this meeting were discussed, taking into consideration the availability of Council Members. The Council Members would email their availability to Recorder Alicia Fairbourne for scheduling.

#### 2. Discuss, with possible approval, the Town Budget for the fiscal year ending June 30, $20\overline{4}$

- Financial Officer Katie Shepley presented an updated budget, which showed marked
  improvements compared to the previous month.
- One significant point of discussion was the encouraging uptick in various revenue sources,
   including property taxes, sales taxes, energy taxes, and revenue from licenses and permits. These
   increases helped mitigate some of the expense rises in the budget.
- Ms. Shepley delved into a detailed analysis of the budget, explaining areas where expenses had grown or diminished. She pointed out that some expenses had increased due to factors such as cost of living employee salary increases, the addition of new employees, and the necessity of maintenance work in various areas.
- 11 Mayor Rubin voiced his concerns about the budget gaps. In response, Ms. Shepley mentioned the 12 intention to raise property taxes in Hideout to cover the budget shortfall.
- 13 Ms. Shepley also addressed the pressing need for infrastructure maintenance and repair. Matters 14 related to waterline repairs, sewer maintenance, and road construction were discussed in detail, 15 underscoring the Town's commitment to addressing long-standing issues.
- 16 At 6:49 pm, Mayor Rubin opened the floor for public comment.
- *Patricia Bidwill* expressed concerns about the accessibility of financial information on the Town's
   website. Ms. Fairbourne acknowledged Ms. Bidwill's comments and informed her where they
   could be found on the website. However, the need to make financial reports, balance sheets, and
   other relevant documents more readily available to the public was also discussed.
- 21 There being no further comments, Mayor Rubin closed the floor for public input at 6:59 pm.
- Ms. McLean explained that there would be a Truth in Taxation public hearing held in August, in which the budget would be discussed and adopted at that time.

24Motion: Council Member Nadelberg moved to continue the discussion of the FY24 budget to25a date to be determined in August, 2023. Council Member Severini made the second. Voting26Yes: Council Member Baier, Council Member Haselton, Council Member Jacobs, Council27Member Nadelberg, and Council Member Severini. There were none opposed. The motion28carried.

#### 29 VI. <u>Agenda Items</u>

#### **1. Presentation of annual municipal audit performed by Ben Probst**

- The annual municipal audit was performed by the accounting firm Gilbert & Stewart. Mayor Rubin noted that Spencer Hintze from Gilbert & Stewart would be giving the presentation instead of Ben Probst, who was unavailable for the meeting.
- Mr. Hintze walked through some key parts of the 60-page audit report, focusing on the independent auditor's report which provided a "clean opinion" that the financial statements fairly presented the Town's financial position. He noted the increase in net position and unrestricted net position were positive signs.

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- There was discussion around the different financial statements and how governmental accounting
   differed from business accounting. Mr. Hintze pointed out the budget to actual report for the
   general fund as useful for budgeting.
- He summarized that the audit found no significant deficiencies or material weaknesses with
  internal controls. The state compliance section also found the Town complied in all material
  respects.
- In the Governance Letter, he noted the prior year's audit had a budget compliance finding that had
  been rectified. Overall he praised the improvements made and the direction the Town was headed.
- 9 Council Member Severini asked some questions regarding how Hideout's financial health was 10 compared to similar towns. Mr. Hintze said Hideout looked to be in good shape compared to 11 others.
- Council Member Severini also asked about the increase in net position year-over-year, which Mr. Hintze attributed to increases in assets and revenue compared to the smaller increase in liabilities and expenses. Mayor Rubin noted that increased costs in the current year due to personnel, winter road maintenance, et cetera, would impact the next audit. He emphasized that costs would be kept under control.
- *Patricia Bidwill* asked what constituted a clean opinion in municipal auditing. In response, Mr.
   Hintze explained it meant an unmodified opinion without deficiencies or misstatements that
   would require modifying the opinion.
- 20 Mayor Rubin thanked Mr. Hintze for the informative presentation.
- Consideration of adopting Resolution 2023-R-XX to amend the Fee and Rate Schedule to
   include a water rate increase beginning July 1, 2023, and an increase in fees
- Mayor Rubin acknowledged the proposed changes to the Fee and Rate Schedule were not complete, particularly with the cost of water meters that needed further clarification. He confirmed with Ms. McCosh the decision could be deferred.
- Mayor Rubin suggested the possibility of adopting a portion of the resolution and revisiting the rest later. Ms. McLean proposed an alternative, suggesting that the public hearing and adoption of the amended budget, scheduled for the next meeting, could be a more suitable time for the decision since it precedes the effective date of water rate increases in July.
- The decision was made to continue the discussion until the upcoming meeting in June, with the understanding that no public hearing was necessary, requiring only a 24-hour notice for the continuation.

## Discussion and possible approval to authorize the Mayor to execute an agreement with Fleet Management in an amount not to exceed \$39,000 for the lease of the Public Works vehicles

- Mayor Rubin explained that the lease for Fleet Management covered six public works vehicles at a cost of approximately \$6,500 each, totaling \$39,000. The lease term was specified as one year. He also discussed the Town's consideration of a mix of leasing and buying vehicles to manage the fleet effectively, with plans to evaluate the return on investment (ROI) for each option.
- 39

- 1 Mayor Rubin sought approval from the Council to execute the lease agreement with Fleet 2 Management and noted a resolution was not necessary; only a majority vote was needed for 3 approval.
- 4 Motion: Council Member Nadelberg moved to approve the Mayor to execute an agreement 5 with Fleet Management in an amount not to exceed \$39,000 for the lease of the Public Works 6 Vehicles. Council Member Baier made the second. Voting Yes: Council Member Baier, 7 Council Member Haselton, Council Member Jacobs, Council Member Nadelberg, and 8 Council Member Severini. There were none opposed. The motion carried.

# 9 4. Discussion and possible approval of adopting Ordinance 2023-O-XX to amend Hideout 10 Municipal Code 1.26.050 CONTENTS OF STATEMENTS to include the 28-Day Financial 11 Report as required by Utah State Code 10-3-208(4)(b)(i)

- Mayor Rubin and Town Attorney Polly McLean discussed proposed changes to Section 1.26.050 of the Hideout Municipal Code related to campaign finance reporting. Ms. McLean explained that the proposed changes aligned with Utah State Code 10-3-208 and aimed to update the timing and content of campaign finance disclosures. The proposed revisions required candidates to submit two reports before and after the Municipal Primary and General Elections, with a 28-day deadline before and a 30-day deadline after. Additionally, the contents of the statements would follow the State Code's requirements on itemized reporting for contributions exceeding \$500.
- Mayor Rubin suggested referencing the Utah State Code instead of creating separate city
   provisions, simplifying the process and aligning with state regulations. Ms. McLean and Ms.
   Fairbourne supported the idea of following the State Code and discussed incorporating any
   discretionary fines into the Town's Fee and Rate schedule.
- Mayor Rubin suggested deferring the decision to the July meeting to allow for a more comprehensive review of Chapter 1.26 on campaign finance. Ms. McLean agreed to explore the changes in the broader context of the chapter. The Council Members agreed with this approach, and the discussion concluded with plans to revisit the topic in a future session.
- 27 VII. <u>Committee Updates</u>

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### 1. Planning Commission – Planning Commissioner Glynnis Tihansky

- Planning Commissioner Glynnis Tihansky discussed the upcoming agenda items, starting with
   the discussion on nightly rental overlay zones. The Planning Commission anticipated making a
   recommendation on the Bloom in Hideout project, specifically addressing the Master
   Development Agreement (MDA) and the rezone during the second public hearing.
- Commissioner Tihansky discussed details about a concept plan review for Hideout Pointe (with an 'E'), noting that it differed from the previous month's Hideout Point (without an 'E'). This new project appeared to be a neighborhood mixed-use development located below the Klaim subdivision. She mentioned she had limited knowledge about it and had only seen pictures, as it had not yet been heard by the Planning Commission.
- Mayor Rubin sought clarification about the location of Hideout Pointe, with Town Planner
   Thomas Eddington providing additional information. It was clarified that Hideout Pointe was
   situated between Klaim and the Woolf property, while Hideout Point was located at the State Park
   entrance.

Mayor Rubin suggested that Council Members should stay informed of the upcoming issues by 1 listening to Planning Commission meetings and reading the minutes to avoid surprises. Mayor 3 Rubin expressed gratitude to the Planning Commissioners for their dedicated efforts, acknowledging the complexity and time commitment involved in their work.

#### 2. Community Engagement Committee - Council Member Jacobs 5

Council Member Jacobs provided an update on the Community Engagement Committee's 6 activities. The Committee was currently focused on organizing events for the summer, though the 7 8 number of events had been reduced due to challenges in finding a suitable venue, with the State Park not opening until August. As of now, events were scheduled for July and August, with a 9 possibility of another in September. 10

- Council Member Jacobs shared that last year, only \$3,500 of the \$10,000 budget was utilized, 11 and the Committee received a \$2,500 grant from Rocky Mountain Power for community events. 12 This year, it appeared they would be receiving the grant again, and All West had already 13 contributed \$1,500 toward community events. Given the limited number of planned events, it was 14 anticipated that the entire budget may not be needed. 15
- Council Member Jacobs also raised the option of making events more financially self-sufficient 16 or even revenue-generating for the Town. This could involve charging more for concert tickets 17 and merchandise. The decision on this matter would be contingent on the Council's preferences. 18
- The next Committee meeting was scheduled for June 15th, where ticket prices and the budget 19 20 would be discussed and finalized.

#### 3. Parks, Open Space and Trails (POST) Committee - Council Member Baier 21

- 22 Council Member Baier mentioned the POST Committee's meeting on May 30 and their attendance at the Mountain Trails Foundation open house, where networking took place. The 23 Committee was currently exploring grant opportunities, with Ms. McCosh and Mr. Eddington 24 actively involved in this effort. 25
- 26 Council Member Baier discussed the Spine Trail outlined in the Post Plan and emphasized its significance as a transportation trail linking Summit County to Summit County through Hideout. 27 This trail would involve engineering and study due to its hard surface paved nature, making it 28 more expensive than backcountry trails. She highlighted the need to spend money on engineering 29 to move the project forward. 30
- Regarding the Ross Creek area, Council Member Baier shared that it would remain closed until 31 late July or mid-August due to construction delays. This impacted the planning of events and 32 activities in that area. She mentioned there should be no members of the public entering the Ross 33 Creek area while it was under construction. 34
- Council Member Baier touched on the potential for a local State Park access pass and noted she 35 had reached out to Ms. Shepley regarding an increase in budget money for the passes. She 36 mentioned ongoing efforts related to Open Space Preservation and expressed hope that Ms. 37 McCosh might arrange a guest speaker for a future Council Meeting to discuss land preservation. 38

#### 4. Transportation Committee - Council Member Haselton

Council Member Haselton provided an update on the Transportation Committee. She mentioned
that the Silver Bus, serving Richardson Flat, was running throughout the summer and would
continue into the fall with adjusted hours. The bus was currently operating from 6:45 am to 7:45
pm, running every 40 minutes.

6 Council Member Haselton then shared an inquiry from a new resident proposing the formation of 7 a group for a private shuttle service to the ski resorts during the winter. She considered the 8 possibility of incorporating the idea into the Committee's work and sought input from the Council. Council Member Baier expressed concerns about the feasibility of the proposed private shuttle, 9 10 especially for destinations like Park City and Canyons, which might not be easily accessible using 11 the existing Silver Bus route. Council Member Haselton acknowledged the potential challenges, including cost and door-to-door service, and emphasized the need for further research. Mayor 12 Rubin supported researching private shuttle options, including contacting relevant service 13 providers to understand the logistics and costs. Council Member Baier raised the idea of a town-14 operated ski bus that Hideout residents could use for free. 15

16 Council Member Severini shared information about a local driver starting a shuttle service 17 focused on the Hideout area and expressed optimism about increased activity in the region. 18 Council Member Haselton welcomed any information about the local driver's shuttle service and 19 expressed interest in exploring options for the winter schedule of the Silver Bus.

#### 20 5. Design Review Committee (DRC) – *Town Planner Thomas Eddington*

Mr. Eddington provided an update on the Economic Development Committee's activities. He mentioned that a second-to-final letter for both Lakeview and Deer Springs 2A and 2B developments was sent. While a few outstanding conditions, mostly related to landscaping, remained, they were in good shape and expect to finalize the process over the next month.

- Council Member Baier inquired about the impact of the adopted dark sky regulations on exterior light fixtures within new developments. Mr. Eddington confirmed that, in general, the light fixtures were compliant, with shields on all four sides and downward lighting. He noted that architects and builders were coming in more prepared due to the normalization of dark sky compliance in the region.
- Regarding the Economic Development Committee (EDC), Council Member Severini acknowledged that although regular updates had not been provided during the Council Meetings, regular EDC meetings were held each Monday. He suggested providing an update on the EDC's activities in the future, and Mayor Rubin agreed to schedule it for the next month. Council Member Baier expressed interest in learning more about the EDC's ongoing initiatives and updates.

### VIII. <u>Closed Executive Session - Discussion of pending or reasonably imminent litigation</u>, personnel matters, and/or sale or acquisition of real property as needed

- 38 There was no need for an Executive Session.
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#### 1 IX. <u>Meeting Adjournment</u>

2 There being no further business, Mayor Rubin asked for a motion to adjourn the meeting.

Motion: Council Member Jacobs moved to adjourn the meeting. Council Member Haselton made the second. Voting Yes: Council Member Baier, Council Member Haselton, Council Member Jacobs, Council Member Nadelberg, and Council Member Severini. There were none opposed. The motion carried.

36		Mayor Rubin intro	oduced the agenda item, clarifying that it involved the final amendments to the			
37		Town Budget. Financial Consultant Katie Shepley then presented a detailed overview of the				

budget adjustments, emphasizing the reallocation of funds within various accounts.
Ms. Shepley explained that the amendments were necessary due to changes in revenue and

40 expenditures. She outlined the sources of funds, including the use of Class C Road Funds and 41 favorable outcomes in areas such as street expenses, municipal energy tax, and salaries and

- benefits. On the contrary, uses of funds were discussed, including higher legal costs, lower
   property taxes, and miscellaneous expenses.
- The General Fund balance indicated a need to take an additional \$91,000 from Capital Funds, while the Enterprise Fund showed a surplus of \$170,000, mainly from favorable standby fees. The surplus in the Enterprise Fund would be directed back to the Capital Funds to balance the budget.
- Mayor Rubin clarified that the adjustments were not an increase in spending but rather a
   reallocation of funds to align with municipal accounting rules. Ms. Shepley then provided a
   comprehensive breakdown of the Enterprise Fund, noting favorable outcomes in various areas
   and explained the reasons behind the surplus.
- 11 Ms. Shepley also touched on the positive financial outlook for the Military Installation 12 Development Authority (MIDA) Fund, highlighting increased revenue from property taxes and 13 sales tax from the MIDA area. The Class C Road Funds were discussed, emphasizing the 14 utilization of accumulated funds to support road maintenance.
- Mayor Rubin opened the floor for council questions, inviting clarification and discussion on the
   proposed budget amendments.
- Council Member Baier raised concerns about the legal fees incurred by the town. Expressing
   feedback and concerns received from the community, she sought clarity on the significant legal
   expenses reflected in both the General and Enterprise Funds.
- Ms. Shepley provided an overview, attributing the legal fees to various legal issues the Town had faced over the past year. Mayor Rubin supplemented the explanation, stating that the legal challenges included lawsuits from individual homeowners and developers related to building processes and code adherence. He emphasized that the Town incurred expenses when legal cases extend beyond the coverage provided by the state.
- Council Member Baier acknowledged understanding the legal issues but felt obligated to address community criticisms regarding the Town's representation and management. She inquired about the allocation of legal funds for the next fiscal year, and Ms. Shepley confirmed that the budget for legal expenses in Fiscal Year 2024 was set at \$267,000, with an increase from the previous year.
- Mayor Rubin provided additional context, mentioning the Town's commitment to upholding codes and standards, which sometimes led to legal challenges. He explained that ongoing legal cases were consuming resources but anticipated a reduction in legal expenses in the upcoming fiscal year as existing cases concluded.
- Council Member Baier expressed gratitude for the clarification and affirmed that her questionstemmed from community concerns.
- There being no further questions from Council, Mayor Rubin opened the floor for public comments at 2:28 p.m.
- There were no public comments. Therefore, Mayor Rubin closed the floor at 2:29 pm and askedfor a motion.

- 4 IV. Agenda Items

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5 1. Consideration of adopting Resolution 2023-R-XX to amend the Fee and Rate Schedule to 6 include a water rate increase beginning July 1, 2023, and an increase in fees

- Mayor Rubin presented the discussion regarding the consideration of adopting Resolution 2023R-XX to amend the Fee and Rate Schedule. The proposed changes included a water rate increase
  starting from July 1, 2023, and adjustments in various fees.
- Town Administrator Jan McCosh explained that inflation-based adjustments were made to many
   fees due to increased costs associated with managing the Town. Mayor Rubin requested a
   discussion on the fees as shown to provide clarity. Ms. McCosh confirmed that planning fees,
   inspections fees and license fees were adjusted for inflation and labor intensity.
- The discussion then focused on water-related fees. Ms. McCosh mentioned an error discovered and subsequent correction in water connection fees. She explained that any new fees or fee adjustments would be reviewed by the Finance Team and the Budget Committee. Mayor Rubin and Ms. McCosh presented a detailed explanation of the adjustments in water meter service rates, including the introduction of usage tiers for water conservation purposes.
- Council Member Baier raised concerns about the trajectory of the rates, especially between the 10,000 to 20,000-gallon range, suggesting it did not follow a linear pattern. Mayor Rubin acknowledged the issue and expressed the need to review and potentially adjust the rates.
- The discussion touched on comparisons with other communities, feedback received, and the impact of the rate changes on residents. Council Member Baier suggested deferring the adoption of the water rates section until further analysis could be conducted.
- Mayor Rubin proposed adopting the Fee and Rate Schedule, excluding the water rates, and revisiting the water rates in the next meeting after further analysis and adjustments. Council Member Baier agreed, expressing concerns about potential confusion among residents with multiple rate changes.
- Discussion ensued regarding the possibility of retroactively applying the water rate changes to July 1. It was decided to adopt the resolution but defer the water rates section to the next meeting for a thorough review and potential adjustments.
- 32 There being no further questions from Council, Mayor Rubin asked for a motion.
- Motion: Council Member Baier moved to approve Resolution 2023-R-08 for repealing and replacing the Fee and Rate Schedule to update the rates due to inflation and to amend the water connection fees erroneous calculation. The water usage tables would be adjusted and addressed at a subsequent meeting. Council Member Haselton made the second. Voting Yes: Council Member Baier, Council Member Haselton, Council Member Jacobs and Council Member Nadelberg. Absent from voting: Council Member Severini. The motion carried.
- 39 Council Member Nadelberg was excused at 3:03 pm.

## Discussion and possible adoption of Resolution 2023-R-XX regarding the restriction of fireworks

Mayor Rubin introduced the agenda item regarding the discussion and possible adoption of
 Resolution 2023-R-XX concerning the restriction of fireworks in the Town.

5 Mayor Rubin clarified that this was a routine matter that the Council addressed annually, and it 6 involved restrictions recommended by the Fire District for the wildland-urban interface. Council 7 Member Baier raised a question about the specified periods for fireworks discharge, pointing out 8 that it seemed like fireworks were allowed during certain holiday periods.

- 9 Town Attorney Polly McLean, responding to the question, explained that the State Code allowed 10 the Town to generally ban fireworks except for specific holidays. The resolution was aimed at 11 reinforcing the ban on fireworks due to increased fire risk, especially in the wildland-urban 12 interface. Mayor Rubin sought further clarification, questioning whether a separate resolution was 13 needed for holidays.
- 14 Ms. McLean clarified that the resolution encompassed both the general ban and the ability to 15 restrict fireworks during high-risk periods throughout the summer. The resolution essentially 16 made the discharge of fireworks within Town boundaries illegal during specified periods.
- Council Member Baier expressed satisfaction with the clarification and reiterated concerns about
   fireworks due to fire hazards, potential irresponsibility, disruption, and the impact on pets.
- Council Member Haselton noted the positive impact of restricted closures in the Ross Creek area,
   reducing the risk of fireworks-related incidents.
- There being no further comments or questions from Council, Mayor Rubin asked for a motion to adopt the resolution.

23 Motion: Council Member Baier moved to adopt Resolution 2023-R-09 finding hazardous 24 environmental conditions and restrictions of fireworks within all portions of Hideout. Council 25 Member Jacobs made the second. Voting Yes: Council Member Baier, Council Member 26 Haselton and Council Member Jacobs. Absent from voting: Council Member Nadelberg and 27 Council Member Severini. The motion carried.

- Council Member Baier asked for Staff to place the fireworks ban signs at the entrances and notice

- Prior to approving the Meeting Minutes, Mayor Rubin informed the public that the 2023
   Municipal General Election ballots had been mailed out, and there were two accessible drop boxes at Town Hall for returns.
- Regarding the approval of council minutes, Council Member Haselton stated she would abstain
  from voting, citing a lack of time to review. She expressed difficulty in reviewing last-minute
  information and was supported by Council Member Baier. Mayor Rubin acknowledged the
  concern and urged timely distribution of materials. He emphasized a new approach that had been
  previously discussed, with materials due a week before meetings.
- 9 There were no corrections to the minutes.

Motion: Council Member Severini moved to approve the May 11, 2023 and October 12, 2023
 Town Council Meeting Minutes. Council Member Jacobs made the second. Voting Yes:
 Council Member Baier, Council Member Jacobs, Council Member Nadelberg and Council
 Member Severini. Abstaining from voting: Council Member Haselton. The motion carried.

#### 14 IV. Follow Up of Items from Approved Minutes

- During the discussion on the approved council minutes, Council Member Severini brought up a concern regarding a list item for signage mentioned in the October 12<sup>th</sup> minutes. He expressed uncertainty about the follow-up on this matter. Mayor Rubin assured him that they had discussions with Engineering and Public Works to encourage compliance from contractors and residents. They were also revisiting the Fee Schedule for related items, emphasizing stricter consequences for non-compliance. New signs had been ordered, and progress was expected, although some individuals were still not adhering.
- Council Member Severini then mentioned another item related to a study on speeding. Mayor Rubin informed that progress had been made, and he planned to have a presentation on traffic and speed in the upcoming December meeting. The presentation would be conducted by a consultant, offering insights into potential options.

#### 26 V. Public Input - Floor open for any attendee to speak on items not listed on the agenda

27 Mayor Rubin opened the floor for public input at 6:16 p.m.

Doug Silver (Vantage Lane resident) raised concerns about the sewer lift project in Shoreline
 Phase 2. He sought information on the project's status, expected completion date, and steps to
 mitigate its impact on residents. Mayor Rubin responded, explaining that the excavation work,
 involving the new pipeline installation, was completed by the end of October as planned.

- Mayor Rubin clarified that the remaining work involved restoration, including the installation of cement catch basins and other finishing touches. Director of Engineering Timm Dixon confirmed that the final completion date was expected in the spring of 2024. Mayor Rubin acknowledged the complexity of the project, mentioning the need for dirt to settle, restoration, and paving in the spring.
- Mayor Rubin assured residents that the project was necessary for the Town's infrastructure and
   waste management and apologized for the disturbance the construction had caused. He
   emphasized the long-term benefits the completed project would bring to the community.
- 40 There being no other public comments, Mayor Rubin closed public input at 6:21 p.m.

#### 1 VI. Agenda Items

#### 2 **1.** Discussion of the Public Infrastructure District (PID) policy

President of Urban and Main Consulting, Rob Sant, provided an overview of PIDs and the associated governing documents. He emphasized that PIDs were financing tools for public infrastructure improvements within defined boundaries, created by statute in 2019. Mr. Sant highlighted key points related to PIDs, such as their reliance on property tax millage for bond funding and the potential revenue sources and uses within the district.

- 8 He explained that PIDs were created for various types of development, allowing growth to pay 9 for growth. Mr. Sant discussed the three parties impacted by PIDs: the creating entity (e.g., 10 Hideout town), homeowners, and the district itself. Notably, there was no recourse to the creating 11 entity or homeowners in case of financial issues within the PID.
- Mr. Sant then detailed the two main types of bonds PIDs could issue: special assessment bonds and Limited Tax General Obligation bonds (LTGO). Both were tax-exempt, but special assessment bonds relied on assessment liens, while LTGO bonds were funded through property tax.
- The governing document of a PID was crucial, outlining powers, limitations, reporting requirements, financing details, and more. Mr. Sant stressed that each PID had a separate governing document, drafted in an interlocal agreement between the creating entity and the PID. He suggested creating a process map outlining the steps and approximate timeline for PID creation.
- Council Member Severini acknowledged that the Council had covered most bases in the PID policy adopted in April of 2022. He suggested creating a process document or timeline for potential applicants. Mr. Sant agreed, emphasizing that it could be a suggested timeline rather than an official adoption.
- Sam Hartman from DA Davidson, a financing entity for PIDs, offered to provide a checklist of
   steps needed to move from the current stage to having a PID ready for financing. Mayor Rubin
   expressed interest in such a presentation in a future meeting.
- Council Member Severini also requested information on how bonds were distributed and if Mr.
   Hartman could share updates on Town bonding. Mayor Rubin agreed to coordinate with Mr.
   Sant and Mr. Hartman for future agenda items related to PIDs and financing.

#### 31 **2. Presentation from The Peace House of Park City**

- Mayor Rubin introduced Kendra Wyckoff from The Peace House of Park City. Ms. Wyckoff thanked the Mayor and Council for the opportunity to speak. She provided an overview of the Peace House, a non-profit organization serving Summit and Wasatch counties, with a mission to address interpersonal violence and abuse.
- Ms. Wyckoff highlighted the prevalence of intimate partner violence and sexual assault in Utah, citing statistics that one in three women and one in five men may experience domestic violence in their lifetime. She discussed the organization's intervention services, such as the lethality assessment used by law enforcement, and prevention programs aimed at educating the community about the various forms of abuse.

- She also discussed the Peace House's facility, emphasizing the co-location of services on one
   campus, including emergency shelter, a 24/7 helpline, transitional housing, clinical counseling,
   legal advocacy, and education programs. Ms. Wyckoff mentioned the recent addition of services
   for sexual assault survivors, including a hospital response team.
- 5 The presentation touched on the importance of serving all individuals affected by abuse, 6 irrespective of gender or identity. Ms. Wyckoff shared details about the Peace House's efforts to 7 provide support for children affected by these issues, including plans for respite and therapeutic 8 childcare services.
- She provided insights into the increased demand for their services, indicating a 41% increase in
  need in the past fiscal year. To date, the Peace House had served 470 clients, and Ms. Wyckoff
  expressed gratitude for the community's support, including a recent blanket drive initiated by
  Council Member Jacobs and the Community Engagement Committee.
- Council Member Jacobs shared information about the blanket drive and expressed appreciation for the Peace House's services. Council Member Baier inquired about additional ways to support and increase community awareness, to which Ms. Wyckoff suggested distributing brochures, volunteering, and donating items from the list provided on the Peace House's website.
- Council Member Baier expressed interest in exploring collaboration opportunities, and Ms.
  Wyckoff welcomed further discussions.
- 19 **3.** Update regarding the Ross Creek/Commercial project area
- Town Administrator Jan McCosh provided an update on the Ross Creek commercial project area. The focus would be to enhance the Ross Creek area, particularly around the reservoir, with collaborative efforts involving Jordanelle State Park, the National Ability Center (NAC), and the Military Installation Development Authority (MIDA). Meetings had been held to brainstorm ideas and coordinate with the Request for Information (RFI) process.
- The deadline for submissions for the RFI was November 17, and the Town had already received responses from several entities with significant experience in commercial projects. The next steps involved evaluating the responses and moving forward with Request for Proposals (RFPs). The timeline for the project was yet to be finalized, considering the number of projects and the upcoming holiday season. Ms. McCosh noted the process was public, and updates on the timeline would be communicated in due course.

## 4. Consideration of approving an ordinance related to the trails project for an appropriation of the funds from the State

- Mayor Rubin introduced the item, but it was decided to continue the discussion due to not enough
  information at the time of the meeting.
- Council Member Baier proposed looking into the matter in the Parks, Open Space and Trails (POST) Committee before bringing it to the full Council. She raised concerns about not having sufficient information about the trails project. Mayor Rubin emphasized the need to keep the POST Committee informed and involved in the process, especially as details are finalized regarding what the Town would request in terms of appropriations for the trails project. Ms. McCosh supported the suggestion.
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# Consideration and possible approval of adopting Resolution 2023-R-XX to update the Hideout Fee and Rate Schedule to include electrical permitting fees, update remodel fees, and make technical corrections

- Mayor Rubin acknowledged that the discussion regarding the update of the Fee and Rate
  Schedule was ongoing, and Financial Consultant Katie Shepley was leading the discussion on
  the proposed rate schedule changes.
- Ms. Shepley began by presenting proposed changes to the building permit fees, specifically for
  remodeling projects. She highlighted that the current fees, based on 11% of the town engineering
  estimate, were deemed excessive. After reviewing practices in other municipalities, the proposal
  was to change the fee to 0.75% of 1% of the total construction cost, a significant reduction while
  still covering costs. She noted that no remodeling projects had been applied for as of the date of
  the meeting.
- The discussion also covered modifications to the plan review fee and the introduction of electrical and mechanical permit fees. These new fees were prompted by requests related to items such as heat tape cables, which required inspections. The proposed electrical and mechanical permit fees aligned with those of neighboring municipalities, particularly Park City.
- 17 Council Member Baier sought clarification on the types of projects that would require electrical 18 and mechanical permits, with a specific mention of heat tape cables and water heater 19 replacements. Council Member Severini raised concerns about how the Town would educate the 20 public on when permits were required for remodels. Mayor Rubin and Mr. Dixon discussed the 21 need to consider structural changes and significant electrical modifications when determining 22 the necessity for a permit.
- The discussion touched on various examples, including electrical vehicle charging stations, generators, and water heaters. The Council expressed support for the proposed changes, emphasizing the need for inspections in cases such as electrical vehicle charging stations and significant remodels.
- The proposed changes were seen as a positive step, and Mayor Rubin emphasized the importance of thorough research and consideration before finalizing the Fee Schedule. Mayor Rubin acknowledged that no resolution was currently available for approval, and the discussion would continue once a written resolution was prepared.

#### **6.** Discuss and set a time for the 2023 Board of Canvassers Meeting

- Mayor Rubin addressed the upcoming 2023 Board of Canvassers Meeting, emphasizing the need to certify the election results on December 5. The meeting would involve reviewing the results provided by the Wasatch County Clerk, who was responsible for counting the ballots due to a countywide proposition. Mayor Rubin sought a quorum of at least three Council Members to participate in a brief meeting to certify the results.
- Council Member Baier suggested holding the meeting at 6 pm on December 5. Council Member
   Jacobs confirmed her availability, while Council Member Haselton expressed tentative
   availability. Council Member Nadelberg noted he may not be available.
- Mayor Rubin decided to set the meeting for December 5 at 6 pm. Recorder for Hideout Alicia
  Fairbourne would send calendar invites to all participants. The Mayor anticipated a quick

meeting where Ms. Fairbourne would share the results, address any questions, and conduct a
vote for certification.

#### 3 VII. <u>Public Hearing</u>

- Discuss and possibly approve an amendment of the Official Town of Hideout Zoning Map to rezone parcels 00-0020-8182 and 00-0020-8184 (the "Bloom in Hideout" Development)
   from Mountain (M) zone to Neighborhood Mixed Use (NMU), Residential 3 (R3),
   Residential 6 (R6), Mountain Residential (MR), and Natural Preservation (NP)
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  2. Discuss and possibly approve a Master Development Agreement (MDA) for the Bloom in
  Hideout Development, which would include nightly rentals in zoning districts that do not
  currently allow for nightly rentals. Additionally, allowances for architecture and/or roof
  designs that are not currently allowed per the Town's current zoning ordinances may be
  included.
- 14 (*Clerk's note: Both agenda items were discussed concurrently.*)
- Mayor Rubin introduced the next agenda item, a Public Hearing to discuss and potentially approve an amendment to the Official Town Zoning Map. The proposed rezone included a mix of zoning designations, such as Neighborhood Mixed Use (NMU) for hotels and commercial areas, R3 for single-family lots, and R6 for townhomes. Town Planner Thomas Eddington explained the layout, which involved a reduction in density from the initial concept plan, accommodating 217 units, including townhomes, cabins, and a boutique hotel.
- Council Member Baier inquired about the size of the R3 lots, and it was clarified that they would average about a third of an acre. Questions were raised about the density and comparisons to other developments in the area, with examples cited such as Rustler and Soaring Hawk.
- Mr. Eddington explained that the R6 zoning allowed for a minimum lot size of 6,000 square feet,
   with applicant Ryan Sapp emphasizing that the density indicated the maximum allowable units
   per acre, not a requirement to build to that density.
- Council Member Baier expressed difficulty visualizing the project's density due to the topography and sought clarity on the potential impact of hilly terrain. Mayor Rubin acknowledged that topography played a crucial role in the perceived density and mentioned that the Klaim development had a low unit count despite tight spacing due to the topography.
- Applicants Jenni Hogan and Ryan Sapp presented the concept plan for a boutique resort community. They highlighted key features, such as keeping density close to the road for visibility and ease of access, the positioning of the hotel to offer scenic views while minimizing impact on nearby residents, and the inclusion of trails and community spaces. The commercial village vision board was discussed, emphasizing the goal of creating a community hub with financially viable tenants.
- The applicants discussed the proposed zoning, including 35,000 square feet of commercial space, hotel zoning, and the desire for community-oriented vendors. They showcased visuals of the project, emphasizing the aesthetics and design compatibility with the landscape. The potential for outdoor events like weddings and markets at a scenic park location referred to as "the knob" was also mentioned.

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- 1 Ms. Hogan provided information on the current zoning, stating that the proposed development 2 would significantly increase town revenue compared to the current zoning, offering benefits like 3 trails, a community hub, and open spaces. They discussed the approximate timeline for the 4 project, including the start of infrastructure in May or June of the following year.
- 5 During the discussion, Mayor Rubin raised concerns about the potential cost to the Town for 6 maintaining the infrastructure, including roads. The applicants addressed concerns about the 7 visual impact of retaining walls in the commercial area, assuring that the design aimed to 8 minimize such features.
- 9 The conversation touched on height restrictions for residential and hotel units, with Mr. Sapp 10 expressing a commitment to a maximum height of fifty-two (52) feet for the hotel and thirty-five 11 (35) feet for residential. Council Member Nadelberg raised questions about the possibility of 12 rooftop living areas and potential eyesores on rooftops. The applicants responded by considering 13 options such as rooftop decks and screening for mechanical equipment.
- 14 Concerns were also raised about the quality and rating of the proposed hotel. Ms. Hogan 15 mentioned a three-star rating in the current plan, with flexibility for the Town Council to approve 16 variations based on the uniqueness of the hotel.
- Discussions touched on potential scenarios where the development might change hands or face challenges, with assurances from the applicants that they had considered these situations. Town Attorney Polly McLean highlighted the binding nature of the MDA even if ownership changed. She would research options for reverting to previous zoning if the development agreement wasn't acted upon, and the applicants expressed their commitment to detailed design guidelines in the MDA to protect the Town's interests.
- Mayor Rubin asked Mr. Eddington to provide a high-level overview of the proposed MDA, since
   the Council had not yet read the full details.
- Mr. Eddington summarized that the Bloom development would be constructed over five phases from Fall 2024 to 2032. Phase 1 would include a hotel, commercial space, 40 townhomes, infrastructure like roads and utilities, an amphitheater, and park space. There was specific discussion about allowing up to 30% flat roofs on buildings to allow design flexibility.
  - Other key points discussed:

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- Incorporating short term rental units into the MDA
- Potential for dedicating some roads to the town for maintenance
- Using a PID to help fund infrastructure
- There was discussion around securing adequate water rights, phasing of development, funding community amenities, and making amenities accessible for both residents and visitors.
- There was still discussion needed around potential contributions to community amenities and non-monetary concessions that could be negotiated as part of the MDA, with Ms. Hogan suggesting the option for the Town to use office space within the development, or the use of the park in lieu of monetary concessions.
- The applicants indicated interest in working collaboratively with the Town. They highlighted their attempts to reduce density and focus early commercial development to benefit the surrounding community.

- Because this was an initial presentation, Mayor Rubin and Mr. Eddington noted the full proposal would need further review and discussion at future meetings after the Council had a chance to conduct a more thorough review. Council Member Baier and Council Member Severini were assigned to form a subcommittee to work with Staff on the next steps.
- 5 There being no further questions from Council, Mayor Rubin opened the floor for public input 6 at 9:03 p.m. Mayor Rubin reminded participants the focus was primarily on zoning and 7 recognizing that the project's final approval was not yet on the table.
- 8 Don Blumenthal shared a quick comment, expressing the need for plans to accommodate electric 9 vehicle charging. He highlighted the opportunity, particularly at the hotel, for a high-speed 10 charger, considering the current lack of such facilities in the community. Mayor Rubin and others 11 acknowledged the importance of this suggestion, noting the standardization of such features in 12 contemporary developments. Mr. Blumenthal noted he had other suggestions that he would send 13 to Council Member Baier and Council Member Severini.
- 14 There being no further questions, Mayor Rubin closed public input at 9:06 p.m.
- Mayor Rubin inquired about the approach to rezoning and whether Council should proceed differently. Ms. McLean recommended not adopting the zone change until the MDA was finalized, emphasizing the interconnected nature of the two processes. Mayor Rubin agreed, highlighting the potential risks of rezoning without clarity on the project behind it.
- Ms. Hogan expressed the desire to gather feedback on zoning before the MDA vote. Council
   Member Severini reassured that the zoning aligned with the concept plan, emphasizing
   adherence to existing standards. Mr. Eddington confirmed that setbacks and road width standards
   remained consistent with Hideout Municipal Code.
- Council Member Baier commended the project's improvement and suggested proceeding forward. Mayor Rubin proposed continuing the discussion to a specified date and suggested the December 14 Regular Council Meeting. Ms. Hogan expressed the goal of securing a vote at the next meeting, allowing time for feedback and adjustments.
- Council Member Severini stressed the importance of timely document submission, particularly
   related to the PID structure. Ms. Hogan acknowledged the need for project management and
   aimed to provide the required information early the following week. Discussions included
   aspects like Town protection clauses, financial submissions, and the potential financial benefits
   to the Town.
- 32 Mayor Rubin then asked for a motion to continue the Public Hearing.
- Motion: Council Member Baier moved to continue the Public Hearing to discuss and possibly 33 approve an amendment of the Official Town of Hideout Zoning Map to rezone parcels 00-34 0020-8182 and 00-0020-8184 (the "Bloom in Hideout" Development) from Mountain (M) 35 zone to Neighborhood Mixed Use (NMU), Residential 3 (R3), Residential 6 (R6), Mountain 36 37 Residential (MR), and Natural Preservation (NP) and discuss and possibly approve a Master Development Agreement (MDA) for the Bloom in Hideout Development, which would 38 include nightly rentals in zoning districts that do not currently allow for nightly rentals. 39 40 Additionally, allowances for architecture and/or roof designs that are not currently allowed per the Town's current zoning ordinances may be included to a date certain of December 14, 41 2023 at 6:00 p.m. Council Member Severini made the second. Voting Yes: Council Member 42

 Absent from voting: Council Member Nadelberg. The motion carried.

#### 3 VIII. <u>Committee Updates</u>

#### 4 **1.** Community Engagement Committee - *Council Member Jacobs*

- 5 Council Member Jacobs provided an update from the Community Engagement Committee, 6 stating that the focus was currently on the Blanket Drive until the new year. She encouraged the 7 public to bring blankets to Town Hall for donation.
- 8 Mayor Rubin inquired about the preference for cotton blankets, wondering if it was related to
  9 fire risk. Council Member Jacobs clarified that the request specified cotton, though she didn't
  10 know the reason.
- 11 The discussion touched on the requirement for new or gently used blankets, with clarification 12 that gently used items were acceptable for donation.

#### 13 2. Economic Development Committee - Council Member Severini

Council Member Severini indicated that much of the information covered in the Council Meeting had been discussed during the Economic Development Committee (EDC) Meetings. He mentioned that the EDC held weekly meetings with members such as Ms. Shepley, JD Cronin, and Ms. McCosh. Mr. Eddington and Ms. McLean had also joined these meetings. The Committee reviewed various aspects, including PIDs, and has had separate meetings, including visits to places like Millcreek to assess potential impacts.

#### 3. Planning Commission -

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- Mr. Eddington provided an update on the Planning Commission's recent activities. He acknowledged the extensive work done by the Planning Commission in preparing recommendations for the discussed Bloom project. He mentioned that the next meeting might include a continued presentation for a brewpub proposal near the Klaim subdivision. Additionally, he noted that the Planning Commission would be discussing minor Code updates, reflecting observations and feedback gathered over the past year and a half with the implementation of the new Code.
- 28 **4. Design Review Committee -** *Thomas Eddington* 
  - Mr. Eddington noted there had been no reviews over the last several weeks.

#### 30 5. Parks, Open Space and Trails (POST) Committee - Council Member Baier

- Council Member Baier provided an update on the POST Committee's recent meeting. The Committee focused on addressing challenges related to the drainage of a natural spring in the State Park area. Mr. Dixon participated in the discussion, and they explored potential remediation efforts that would involve collaboration between the State Park Manager and developers in Hideout.
- Council Member Baier also mentioned that although Ms. McCosh was not able to attend the meeting, she shared updates on discussions she had with the State Park Manager regarding a potential local pass arrangement, which had not gained much traction as of yet. The Committee

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planned to have one more meeting on December 5, marking the last session for the year. They anticipated bringing forward relevant matters for strategic planning during the retreat in January.

### **6.** Transportation Committee - *Council Member Haselton*

Council Member Haselton provided an update on the Transportation Committee. Currently, there
was nothing new to report, but she was actively following transportation-related discussions. She
mentioned Governor Cox's proposal to improve transportation, potentially involving Parley's
Canyon or a train. However, it was noted that this proposal would not significantly impact
Hideout, as it primarily concerned routes into Park City. Council Member Haselton anticipated
providing a more detailed update in December, especially with information related to bus
operations from Richardson Flat as the ski resorts prepare to open.

## 11IX.Closed Executive Session - Discussion of pending or reasonably imminent litigation,12personnel matters, and/or sale or acquisition of real property as needed

13 There was no need for a closed Executive Session.
