CITY OF MARSHALL CITY COUNCIL MEETING M I N U T E S Tuesday, March 26, 2019

The regular meeting of the Common Council of the City of Marshall was held March 26, 2019 in the Professional Development Room at the Marshall Middle School, 401 South Saratoga Street. The meeting was called to order at 5:30 P.M. by Mayor Robert Byrnes. In addition to Byrnes the following members were in attendance: Craig Schafer, Steven Meister, Glenn Bayerkohler John DeCramer, Russ Labat and James Lozinski. Absent: None. Staff present included: Sharon Hanson, City Administrator; Dennis Simpson, City Attorney; Glenn Olson, Director of Public Works/City Engineer; Jason Anderson, Assistant City Engineer/Zoning Administrator; Ilya Gutman, Plan Examiner/Assistant Zoning Administrator; Jim Marshall, Director of Public Safety; Annette Storm, Director of Administrative Services; Sheila Dubs, Human Resource Manager; Scott VanDerMillen, Director of Community Services; Preston Stensrud, Parks Superintended and Kyle Box, City Clerk.

The Pledge of Allegiance was recited at this time.

There was a consensus to operate under the presented agenda with the addition of an agenda item, Approval of Various Boards and Commissions.

Consider approval of the minutes of the work session and regular meeting held on March 12, 2019.

Motion made by Councilmember Meister, Seconded by Councilmember Lozinski that the minutes of the work session and regular meeting held on March 12, 2019 be approved as filed with each member and that the reading of the same be waived. Voting Yea: Mayor Byrnes, Councilmember Schafer, Councilmember Meister, Councilmember DeCramer, Councilmember Labat, Councilmember Lozinski. Voting Abstaining: Councilmember Bayerkohler. The motion **Passed. 6-0-1**

<u>Project Z67: Michigan Road/Superior Road Reconstruction Project - 1) Continuation of Public Hearing on</u> Assessment.

At their meeting on September 25, 2018, the City Council voted to continue the public hearing at the regular Council meeting held on October 23, 2018. At the October 23, 2018 meeting, the City Council voted to continue the public hearing on assessment to March 26, 2019.

One objection letter has been received as of March 19, 2019. An owner may appeal an assessment to District Court pursuant to Minnesota Statutes Section 429.081 by serving notice of the appeal upon the Mayor or Clerk of the City within 30 days after the adoption of the assessment and filing such notice with the District Court within ten days after service upon the Mayor or Clerk.

This project consists of the following: Reconstruction and utility replacement on Michigan Road between Superior Road and Hahn Road and on Superior Road from a point approximately 175 feet north of Ontario Road to Huron Road. All utilities will be replaced, including watermain, sanitary sewer, and storm sewer.

The purpose of the continuation of the public hearing was to review and potentially revise the City's assessment procedure for commercial and industrial properties.

City of Marshall staff (Administration, Engineering, Legal and Finance) have spent considerable time analyzing and reviewing special assessment policies for numerous municipalities within the State of Minnesota. The findings of that analysis have been reviewed with Ways & Means Committee members. In addition, Counc

Member Bayerkohler as Ways & Means Committee member has also conducted his own analysis and review of state municipality policies and procedures for calculation of special assessment amounts due for public improvement projects.

The analysis of Minnesota Statutes, Minnesota case law and review of additional municipality procedures has led to the proposal for a new procedure to calculate special assessment amounts.

The Minnesota Court stated as follows: "Any method resulting in a fair approximation of the increase in market value for each benefited parcel may be used. A method which on its face appears to be a fair approximation will be presumed valid with the burden resting upon the objector to show its invalidity."

The result of this review was brought to the City Council on March 12, 2019 resulting in a revision of the 2019 Fee Schedule that established a maximum amount formula for commercial/industrial street assessments for reconstruction. In addition, this maximum is compared to actual costs and square footage and the minimum amount of the three methods is the recommended street assessment for the improvement for the property owners.

Director of Public Works/City Engineer Glenn Olson introduced and provided the background information on the item.

Lynn Chedder representing Mustang Truck and Trailer/Pete, LLC discussed the amount to be owed by Pete, LLC and how these numbers are supported without the property being appraised. Pete, LLC mentioned that they would like to see the appraisal to justify the amounts.

City Administrator commented that a project appraisal was completed on the entire project, not individual properties. The data collected from the project appraisal has been kept private due to pending litigation. Administrator Hanson mentioned that the methods used in calculating these special assessments where also used by the project appraiser.

Councilmember Bayerkohler also mentioned that he also reached out to an additional appraisal company to confirm methods that are used.

City Attorney Dennis Simpson commented that it was a project appraiser that provided the City a method and number and that it was not a formal appraisal.

Mr. Chedder provided discussion on a memo drafted by the City Attorney discussing that the benefit of the project can not exceed the cost of the assessment as the primary consideration. Mr. Chedder commented that to get those accurate numbers an appraisal should be done.

City Attorney Dennis Simpson commented that appraisals are not required to be done according to state statute.

Mr. Chedder mentioned again that the information was not justifiable without seeing the project appraisal.

Brian Stucke of BH Electronics provided discussion from prior council meetings and the support to have an appraisal done to identify the benefit to the affected property owners. Mr. Stucke was concerned that even after the project review has not been shared.

Councilmember Bayerkohler mentioned again that he did reach out to another appraisal company and that they were not interested in coming to Marshall to do the appraisal. They recommended the same process that the City took, hiring a project appraiser to review the project.

Mr. Stucke also discussed another previous council meeting when action was taken on the item did not meet the requirements needed by statute. The City reaffirmed the project by amending the resolution at a later meeting.

City Attorney Dennis Simpson mentioned that from the recommendation of Bond Council a reaffirmation of the resolution was provided. Attorney Simpson mentioned this process must happen within six months of the public hearing.

Councilmember Bayerkohler thanked the staff and council for reviewing the policy and commented that he believes this policy will benefit projects going forward.

Councilmember Lozinski mentioned that this is a better commercial special assessment policy.

Councilmember Schafer appreciates the input from the property owners.

Lynn Chedder of Mustang Truck and Trailer asked where the increased benefit is in the assessment and that he would like to see an appraisal before payment.

Mayor Byrnes discussed that an absolute number may not be known unless an individual property appraisal is completed.

There was further discussion on the infrastructure and what benefit that brings.

City Administrator Sharon Hanson discussed the difficulties in the item. Administrator Hanson mentioned that there is discussion not only on the assessments but the process that the City used and there is indication that no matter what validation the City uses there will be litigation.

Motion made by Councilmember Lozinski, Seconded by Councilmember Schafer to close the continuation of the public hearing on assessment for Project Z67: Michigan Road/Superior Road Reconstruction Project. Voting Yea: Mayor Byrnes, Councilmember Schafer, Councilmember Meister, Councilmember Bayerkohler, Councilmember DeCramer, Councilmember Labat, Councilmember Lozinski. The motioned **Carried. 7-0**

The motion **Passed. 6-0-1**

<u>Project Z69: East Lyon Street Reconstruction Project – 1) Public Hearing on Improvement.</u>

The project consists of the reconstruction of East Lyon Street from TH 23 east approximately 800 feet to near the city limits.

Property owners affected by the above-referenced project have been notified, according to law, that a hearing would be held on March 26, 2019. A public presentation will be made followed by any discussion. An informational meeting was held on March 19, 2019 11 am at City Hall.

Information regarding project scope and calculations of proposed assessments was provided to all those in attendance.

The engineer's estimate for the construction portion of the project is \$180,400. The total estimated project cost, including 10% allowance for contingencies and 16% for engineering and administrative costs are \$230,190.

All improvements will be assessed according to the current Special Assessment Policy including any variations of assessments deemed necessary by the City Council, including but not limited to participation from Wastewater Department, Surface Water Management Utility Fund and Ad Valorem participation. Final approval of the project must include determination of funding sources.

Director of Public Works/City Engineer Glenn Olson provided the background information on the item.

Steve Klein of Walnut Grove Mercantile, opposes the project currently. Mr. Klein said they may be in favor of the project if this was involved in a larger comprehensive plan for development of that area.

Councilmember Lozinski asked what kind of reduction Mr. Klein's business takes when there is a construction project in that area. Mr. Klein commented that his business took anywhere from 5% to 35% hit depending on the project.

Councilmember Meister commented on parking during the proposed project.

Director Olson provided discussion on multiple options for parking.

There was further discussion on the history of the project.

Councilmember Labat discussed any trouble individuals have had with snow on the road.

Mr. Klein commented that there are not typically any issues.

Councilmember Meister asked if all property owners were able to attend the informational meetings.

Mr. Klein commented that yes, they were all able to be there.

Councilmember DeCramer asked if a drawn-out payment and a lower interest rate would change Mr. Klein's mind.

Mr. Klein mentioned that at this time they still would oppose the project. However, if this is a part of a bigger plan his perspective is different.

Councilmember Schafer mentioned that because there are only three property owners he doesn't want to see anyone be opposed to the project.

There was further discussion on the project.

Motion made by Councilmember Lozinski, Seconded by Councilmember Schafer to close the public hearing on improvement for Project Z69: East Lyon Street Reconstruction Project. Mayor Byrnes asked for a motion on the resolution. There was no motion by Council on the resolution.

<u>Project Z74: Huron Road/Superior Road Reconstruction Project – 1) Public Hearing on Improvement.</u>

The project consists of watermain replacement on Huron Road between Superior Road and TH 59 and reconstruction on Superior Road from Huron Road to CSAH 33. All utilities will be replaced, including watermain, sanitary sewer, and storm sewer on Superior Road and watermain replacement only on Huron Road.

Property owners affected by the above-referenced project have been notified, according to law, that a hearing would be held on March 26, 2019. A public presentation will be made followed by any discussion. An informational meeting was held on March 18, 2019 at 3 pm at City Hall. Information regarding project scope and calculations of proposed assessments was provided to all those in attendance.

The engineer's estimate for the construction portion of the project is \$1,038,787. The total estimated project cost, including 10% allowance for contingencies and 16% for engineering and administrative costs is \$1,325,490.

All improvements will be assessed according to the current Special Assessment Policy, including but not limited to participation from Marshall Municipal Utilities, Wastewater Department, Surface Water Management Utility Fund and Ad Valorem participation. Final approval of the project must include determination of funding sources.

Director of Public Works, Glenn Olson presented the information on the item.

There was discussion on the project.

Motion made by Councilmember Schafer, Seconded by Councilmember Lozinski to close the public hearing on improvement for Project Z69: East Lyon Street Reconstruction Project. Voting Yea: Mayor Byrnes, Councilmember Schafer, Councilmember Meister, Councilmember Bayerkohler, Councilmember DeCramer, Councilmember Labat, Councilmember Lozinski. The motion **Carried. 7-0**

Project Z74: Huron Road/Superior Road Reconstruction Project. Voting Yea: Mayor Byrnes, Councilmember Schafer, Councilmember Bayerkohler, Councilmember DeCramer, Councilmember Lozinski. Voting Nay: Councilmember Labat. The motion **Passes. 6-1**

Motion made by Councilmember DeCramer, Seconded by Councilmember Schafer that the Council adopt RESOLUTION NUMBER 4598, which is the "Resolution Approving Plans and Specifications and Ordering Advertisement for Bids" for Project Z74: Huron Road/Superior Road Reconstruction Project. Voting Yea: Mayor Byrnes, Councilmember Schafer, Councilmember Meister, Councilmember Bayerkohler, Councilmember DeCramer, Councilmember Lozinski. Voting Nay: Councilmember Labat. The motion **Passes. 6-1**

Councilmember Labat discussed the reuse of trailers with different departments within the City. Councilmember DeCramer discussed the reuse of flower pots. There was further discussion by Council and Staff.

Motion made by Councilmember Labat, Seconded by Councilmember DeCramer to Approve the surplus of equipment for the Parks Department to be sold. Voting Yea: Mayor Byrnes, Councilmember Schafer, Councilmember Meister, Councilmember Bayerkohler, Councilmember DeCramer, Councilmember Labat, Councilmember Lozinski. The motion **Carried. 7-0**

With Council consent agenda item number 24, Marshall Community Branding Proposal Acceptance, was moved to the next agenda item.

Marshall Community Branding Proposal Acceptance

The City Council approved a Branding/Marketing Request for Proposal (RFP) in late 2018. Over 20 proposals were submitted to the City for consideration. A branding committee comprised of local business leaders, marketing professionals and Director of CVB reviewed the proposals including interviewing the top tier selected proposals. The committee has recommended that the City proceed with the firm North Star. \$50,000; with \$20,000 budgeted use of 2019 reserves; \$10,000 from CVB and \$20,000 budgeted use of 2020 reserves.

Lauren Deutz, Director of Marshall Convention and Visitors Bureau presented via PowerPoint. There was further discussion by Council and Staff.

Motion made by Councilmember Lozinski, Seconded by Councilmember Schafer to approve North Star proposal in the amount of \$50,000.00 Voting Yea: Mayor Byrnes, Councilmember Schafer, Councilmember Meister, Councilmember DeCramer, Councilmember Labat, Councilmember Lozinski. Voting Nay: Councilmember Bayerkohler. The motion **Passed. 6-1**

Consider a Resolution Extending a Local Emergency Declaration

On March 24, 2019, Bob Byrnes, the Mayor of Marshall, acting on behalf of and for the City of Marshall, declared a state of emergency within the City of Marshall as per Minnesota Chapter 12. A declaration of a local emergency invokes necessary portions of the response and recovery aspects of applicable local or interjurisdictional disaster plans and may authorize aid and assistance under those plans. With this declaration the city's emergency organization structure, plan and EOC is activated.

A Resolution must be enacted under authority of Minnesota Statutes Sections 12.29 and 12.37 to extend the period of a mayor-declared local emergency.

Media Communication Specialist Alex Peterson provided information on the recent river event via video. Director of Public Safety Jim Marshall provided additional information on the agenda item. There was further discussion by Council.

Motion made by Councilmember Lozinski, Seconded by Councilmember Meister to adopt Resolution Number 4600, Second Series, a resolution enacted under authority of Minnesota Statutes Sections 12.29 and 12.37 to extend the period of a mayor-declared local emergency. Voting Yea: Mayor Byrnes, Councilmember Schafer, Councilmember Meister, Councilmember Bayerkohler, Councilmember DeCramer, Councilmember Labat, Councilmember Lozinski. The motion **Carried. 7-0**

Consideration of renewal agreement with Pyrotechnic Display Inc., for City of Marshall July 4th fireworks.

The City of Marshall began contracting services from Pyrotechnic Display Inc., in 2014 for their annual fireworks. That initial agreement was approved at a cost of \$8,925.00 yearly. An additional 3-year renewal was approved in 2016 for \$10,263.00 per year. The show provided entertains for approximately 20 minutes and has been well received by the attendees and surrounding communities. The current 3-year agreement expires after July 4, 2019.

Director of Community Services Scott VanDerMillen presented the background information on the agenda item. There was further discussion by Council.

Motion made by Councilmember Lozinski, Seconded by Councilmember Meister to approve the three-year renewal agreement (2020, 2021 & 2022) with Pyrotechnic Display, Inc. Voting Yea: Mayor Byrnes, Councilmember Schafer, Councilmember Meister, Councilmember Bayerkohler, Councilmember DeCramer, Councilmember Labat, Councilmember Lozinski. The motion **Carried. 7-0**

Consider approval of labor agreements between the City of Marshall and LELS Local No. 190

The 2016-2018 labor agreement with LELS Local 190 expired on December 31, 2018. Tentative agreement with the union on contract terms for a new three-year agreement (2019-2021) has been reached.

Summary of contract amendments:

- 1) Duration: January 1, 2019 December 31, 2021
- 2) Union Security—technical change relating to the payment of dues by union members; language was proposed by the City as recommended by our labor attorney
- 3) Wages: increase in shift differential from \$0.30 to \$0.50 per hour; increase in Field Training Officer pay from \$1.00 to \$1.25 per hour for actual hours worked in this role.
- 4) Overtime—increase in maximum compensatory time accrual limit from 45 to 50 hours.
- 5) Insurance—amended contract years.
- 6) Vacation—deletion of a clause that restricted new employees from using their vacation accruals in the first six months of employment.
- 7) Holidays—amended clause to allow an employee to elect holiday pay in lieu of time off on a holiday; where employees do not elect pay for holidays, contract language has been added which pays out unused holiday hours on the first payroll check of December each year.
- 8) Leaves of Absence: added reference to three laws that may be applicable to employees requesting a leave of absence; the consideration for approval or denial of employee leaves will continue to be administered in accordance with both state and federal laws.
- 9) Wages: 2% general wage increase for 2019 plus a \$0.40 market adjustment added to each step; 3.25% general wage increase for 2020, and 3.25% general wage increase for 2021.
- 10) Memorandum of Understanding—identifies the effective dates of the proposed wage schedule for the term of the agreement (effective 1st day of the pay period that includes January 1).
- 11) Memorandum of Agreement regarding the accrual of compensatory time; this agreement will expire on December 31, 2021. The language in this agreement is consistent with the current administration of earned accruals.

Human Resource Manager Sheila Dubs provided the background information on the agenda item. There was further discussion on the item by Council.

Motion made by Councilmember DeCramer, Seconded by Councilmember Meister to approve RESOLUTION NUMBER 4602, SECOND SERIES approving a collective bargaining agreement, memorandum of understanding, and memorandum of agreement between the City of Marshall and LELS Local 190 and authorizes proper City officials to sign the agreements.

Councilmember Bayerkohler commented that he was in support of the motion because of staff wanting to review the wage and step schedule.

Voting Yea: Mayor Byrnes, Councilmember Schafer, Councilmember Meister, Councilmember Bayerkohler, Councilmember DeCramer, Councilmember Labat, Councilmember Lozinski. The motion **Carried. 7-0**

Request for map amendment (rezone).

This is a request by Douglas and Peggy Anderson, Marshall, MN to rezone properties at 1213, 1215 and 1217 West Main Street from B-3 General Business District to a I-2 General Industrial District. The owner intends to build an addition to his building (Marshall Machine Shop); that addition will be built on the north side and will extend into the lots along West Main Street. The use of the building is manufacturing, and it is not permitted in a B-3 General Business District, which the three lots to be rezoned currently are. To permit building an addition, they must be rezoned to an I-2 General Industrial District.

The adjacent land south of these lots is presently zoned I-2 General Industrial District and the land across Main Street is zoned I-1 Limited Industrial District, so the requested rezoning is consistent with the zoning of surrounding areas. However, the 1996 City Comprehensive plan shows the corridor along Main Street as a commercial use rather than industrial. Nevertheless, the staff's opinion is that at this time the requested change is acceptable considering the age of the Comprehensive plan, the use of the neighboring properties and the location of major commercial development areas within the city.

Rezoning procedures are described in Section 86-30 Amendments.

At the March 13, 2019, Planning Commission meeting, a public hearing was held, and a motion was made by Carstens, second by Ruud to recommend approval to City Council to rezone the property as recommended by staff. All voted in favor.

<u>Authorization for Parks Department to Apply of MN DNR Outdoor Recreation Grant.</u>

Construction of the SMASC ball fields was mostly complete in 2017 with the exception of playground (currently 80% complete), entryway arch (complete but not installed), and landscaping. Elements left from the master plan during original construction include lighting the additional two fields and a picnic pavilion.

Staff was informed of a possible grant through the MN DNR to help with funding the picnic pavilion and would like to pursue and apply for this grant. Grant applications are due March 29th, 2019 and the grant has been 95% complete at time of submitting this memo.

The award of this grant would allow for the construction of a 24' by 24' picnic pavilion with 12' \times 24' storage attached to it along with concrete trails connecting the picnic pavilion to the playground area as well as the concession stand and restroom area at a 50% cost share with the DNR. The City's cost towards the project would be \$51,750.00.

At this time the total estimated cost for the entire project including picnic pavilion, storage area, sidewalks, picnic tables, and garbage receptacles is \$103,500.00.

FIRE PROTECTION AGREEMENT

May 1, 2019- April 30, 2020

THIS AGREEMENT, made this 1^{st} day of May, 2019 between the City of Marshall, party of the first part, and the Township of (Township) County of Lyon and State of Minnesota, party of the second part, WITNESSETH:

Section 1. Purposes and Intent.

(A) The party of the first part has been requested to provide "fire service" as defined to include any deployment of firefighting personnel and/or equipment to extinguish a fire or perform any preventative measure in an effort to protect equipment, life or property in an area threatened by fire. It also includes the deployment of firefighting personnel and/or equipment to provide fire suppression, rescue, extrication, and any other services related to fire and rescue as may occasionally occur.

Section 2. Services and Conditions.

- (A) The City of Marshall will maintain equipment, personnel and related training and certifications to provide full fire and related rescue response to the party of the second part as legally described in the attached Exhibit A.
- (B) The City of Marshall agrees to respond promptly to all calls or help within the territory to be serviced, but it is understood that the City of Marshall has entered into and will from time to time enter into similar arrangements with other townships and municipalities within its trade territory and that calls will be responded to in order in which they are received by the party of the City of Marshall; and it can respond to only one call at a time; and that in any event neither the City of Marshall nor any officer or employee thereof shall be liable to the party of the second part to any persons within the territory of such party of loss or damage of any kind whatsoever resulting from a failure to furnish or delay in furnishing fire-fighting equipment and personnel, or either of them, or from any failure to prevent, control or extinguish any fire whether such loss or damage is caused by the negligence of the officers, agents or employees of the City of Marshall or its fire department, or otherwise.

Section 3. Term and Rates.

- (A) The party of the first part for a period of 1 year beginning on May 1, 2019, will, subject to the terms and conditions of this agreement, service all of the territory within the limits of the second party as legally described in Exhibit A, thereof, furnishing for that purpose the above described fire-fighting equipment for a consideration of \$(amount)\$ which is \$514.21 per section for the period May 1, 2019 through April 30, 2020 to be paid on or before May 1, 2019. The basis of the fee is upon the formula calculation for this time period as summarized in the attached Exhibit B. Successive years under the formula in Exhibit B are for estimated purposes and subject to change.
- (B) In addition to the foregoing, additional fees as summarized in the attached Exhibit C apply.
- (C) All collected fire charges will be City of Marshall funds and used to offset the expenses of the fire department in providing fire services.

Section 4. Billing and Collection.

- (A) The party of the second part agrees to pay to the City of Marshall as compensation for all fire service furnished pursuant to this agreement the sum specified in Section 3(A) thereof and to make a town fire protection tax levy or otherwise provide funds in any amount sufficient to pay the party of the first part the compensation agreed upon above.
- (B) Parties requesting or receiving fire services will be billed directly by the City of Marshall. Additionally, if the party receiving fire services did not request services but a fire or other situation exists which, at the discretion of the City of Marshall requires fire service, the party will be charged and billed according to the sum specified in Section 3 (B). All parties will be billed whether or not covered by a party's insurance. Any billable amount of the fire service charge not covered by a party's insurance remains a debt of the party receiving the fire service.
- (C) Parties billed for fire service will have thirty (30) days to pay. If the fire service charge is not paid by that time, it will be considered delinquent and the City will send notice of delinquency and charge a 1.5% administrative penalty on the unpaid balance.
- (D) If the service charge remains unpaid for 30 days after this notice of delinquency is sent, the City will use all practical and reasonable legal means to collect the fire service

- charge. The party receiving fire service shall be liable for all collection costs incurred by the City including, but not limited to, reasonable attorney fees and court costs.
- (E) If the fire service charge remains unpaid for 30 days after the notice of delinquency is sent, the City of Marshall Council may also, on or before October 15 of each year, certify the unpaid property for collection with property taxes. The County auditor is responsible for remitting to the City all charges collected on behalf of the City of Marshall. The City of Marshall must give the property owner notice of its intent to certify the unpaid service charge by September 15.

ADMINISTRATIVE POLICY Revised: April 9, 2019

FUND BALANCE POLICY

I. PURPOSE

- A. The purpose of this policy is to establish specific rules the City of Marshall will use to maintain an adequate level of fund balance to provide for cash flow requirements and contingency needs because major revenues, including property taxes and other government aids, are received in the second half of the City's fiscal year.
- B. The purpose of this policy is to also establish specific rules the City of Marshall will use to classify fund balances into categories; based primarily on the extent to which the City is bound to honor constraints on the specific purposes for which amounts in these funds can be spent.

II. CLASSIFICATION OF FUND BALANCE

A. Non-spendable

1. This category includes fund balance that cannot be spent because it is either (a) not in spendable form or (b) is legally or contractually required to be maintained intact. Examples include inventories and prepaid amounts.

B. Restricted

1. Fund balance should be reported as restricted when constraints placed on those resources are either (a) externally imposed by creditors, grantors, contributors, or laws or regulations of other governments or (b) imposed by law through constitutional provisions or enabling legislation.

C. Committed

- Fund balance that can only be used for specific purposes pursuant to
 constraints imposed by formal action of the government's highest level of
 decision-making authority. The committed amounts cannot be used for any
 other purpose unless the government removes or changes the specified use
 by taking the same type of action it employed to commit those amounts.
- 2. The City's highest level of decision making authority (City Council) will, annually or as deemed necessary, commit specific revenue sources for specified purposes by resolution. This formal action must occur prior to the end of the reporting period however, the amount to be subject to the constraint may be determined in the subsequent period.
- 3. To remove the constraint on specified use of committed resources the City Council shall pass a resolution.

D. Assigned

- 1. Amounts that are constrained by the government's intent to use for specified purposes, but are neither restricted nor committed. Assigned fund balance in the General fund includes amounts that are intended to be used for specific purposes.
- 2. The City Council has delegated the authority to assign and remove assignments of fund balance amounts for specified purposes to the Finance Director.

E. Unassigned

- 1. Unassigned fund balance represents the residual classification for the General fund. It includes amounts that have not been assigned to other funds and that have not been restricted, committed, or assigned to specific purposes within the General fund. The General fund should be the only fund that reports a positive unassigned fund balance amount.
 - a. The City will maintain an unrestricted fund balance in the General fund and the Economic Development special revenue fund of an amount not less than 40% of the next year's budgeted expenditures of the General fund and the Economic Development special revenue fund. This will assist in maintaining an adequate level of fund balance to provide for cash flow requirements and contingency needs because major revenues, including property taxes and other government aids, are received in the second half of the City's fiscal year.
 - b. Fund balance exceeding 40% but less than 50% of the next year's budgeted General fund expenditures shall remain as an unassigned fund balance.
 - c. Fund balance in excess of 50% shall be reviewed by City Council to determine if such excess should be transferred to other funds to be used as a financing source for capital improvement, equipment purchases, or other needs as determined by City Council.
 - d. If spending unrestricted fund balance in designated circumstances has reduced unrestricted fund balance to a point below the minimum targeted level, as noted above, the replenishment will be funded by revenue and/or expenditure adjustments within the next year's budgeting process.

III. DESIGNATION OF ENTERPRISE FUNDS

- 1. It is the goal of each enterprise fund to cover the costs of operations, including depreciation and a transfer to the General fund, to maintain a financially healthy enterprise. The City will maintain cash reserves in the Enterprise funds at a minimum level equal to 25% of the annual operating costs plus one year of debt service payments
 - a. The Liquor fund shall be exempt from this provision since the majority of the profits are transferred to the General fund
 - b. The waste water fund in addition shall reserve 1/3 depreciation of all assets annually to fund future improvements. The City Council shall

determine the use of these reserves.

2. If the cash reserve balance falls below the minimum target level, the replenishment will be funded by revenue and/or expense adjustments within the next year's budgeting process

IV. STABILIZATION ARRANGEMENTS

- A. Stabilization arrangements are defined as formally setting aside amounts for use in emergency situations or when revenue shortages or budgetary imbalances arise.
- B. The City will set aside amounts by resolution as deemed necessary that can only be expended when certain specific circumstances exist. The resolution will identify and describe the specific circumstances under which a need for stabilization arises. The need for stabilization will only be utilized for situations that are not expected to occur routinely.

V. MONITORING AND REPORTING

- A. The City Administrator and Director of Administrative Services shall annually prepare the status of fund balances in relation to this policy and present to the City Council in conjunction with the annual audit.
- B. When both restricted and unrestricted resources are available for use, it is the City's policy to first use restricted resources, and then use unrestricted resources as they are needed.
- C. When committed, assigned or unassigned resources are available for use, it is the City's policy to use resources in the following order: 1.) committed 2.) assigned and 3.) unassigned.

FUND BALANCE POLICY

I. PURPOSE

- A. The purpose of this policy is to establish specific rules the City of Marshall will use to maintain an adequate level of fund balance to provide for cash flow requirements and contingency needs because major revenues, including property taxes and other government aids, are received in the second half of the City's fiscal year.
- B. The purpose of this policy is to also establish specific rules the City of Marshall will use to classify fund balances into categories; based primarily on the extent to which the City is bound to honor constraints on the specific purposes for which amounts in these funds can be spent.

II. CLASSIFICATION OF FUND BALANCE

A. Non-spendable

1. This category includes fund balance that cannot be spent because it is either (a) not in spendable form or (b) is legally or contractually required to be maintained intact. Examples include inventories and prepaid amounts.

B. Restricted

1. Fund balance should be reported as restricted when constraints placed on those resources are either (a) externally imposed by creditors, grantors, contributors, or laws or regulations of other governments or (b) imposed by law through constitutional provisions or enabling legislation.

C. Committed

- 1. Fund balance that can only be used for specific purposes pursuant to constraints imposed by formal action of the government's highest level of decision-making authority. The committed amounts cannot be used for any other purpose unless the government removes or changes the specified use by taking the same type of action it employed to commit those amounts.
- 2. The City's highest level of decision making authority (City Council) will, annually or as deemed necessary, commit specific revenue sources for specified purposes by resolution. This formal action must occur prior to the end of the reporting period however, the amount to be subject to the constraint may be determined in the subsequent period.

3. To remove the constraint on specified use of committed resources the City Council shall pass a resolution.

D. Assigned

- 1. Amounts that are constrained by the government's intent to use for specified purposes, but are neither restricted nor committed. Assigned fund balance in the General fund includes amounts that are intended to be used for specific purposes.
- 2. The City Council has delegated the authority to assign and remove assignments of fund balance amounts for specified purposes to the Finance Director.

E. Unassigned

- 1. Unassigned fund balance represents the residual classification for the General fund. It includes amounts that have not been assigned to other funds and that have not been restricted, committed, or assigned to specific purposes within the General fund. The General fund should be the only fund that reports a positive unassigned fund balance amount.
 - a. The City will maintain an unrestricted fund balance in the General fund and the Economic Development special revenue fund of an amount not less than 540% of the next year's budgeted expenditures of the General fund and the Economic Development special revenue fund. This will assist in maintaining an adequate level of fund balance to provide for cash flow requirements and contingency needs because major revenues, including property taxes and other government aids, are received in the second half of the City's fiscal year.
 - b. Fund balance exceeding 40% but less than 50% of the next year's budgeted General fund expenditures shall remain as an unassigned fund balance.
 - a.c. Fund balance in excess of 50% shall be reviewed by City Council to determine if such excess should be transferred to other funds to be used as a financing source for capital improvement, equipment purchases, or other needs as determined by City Council.
 - b. The City will maintain an unrestricted fund balance for emergency or unanticipated expenditures in the General fund of an amount not less than 1-month of the next year's budgeted expenditures of the General fund.
 - c. According to the Governmental Accounting Standards Board (GASB) Statement 45, the City of Marshall is required to have an actuarial valuation of the City's Other Post-Employment Benefits (OPEBs) completed every two years. This actuarial valuation considers post retirement medical, dental and life insurance and also severance pay including accrued vacation and sick leave. Based upon the benefits and census information, the actuarial valuation is computed for the City's annual contribution for two years; which shall be maintained as an unrestricted fund balance in each respective City fund.

If spending unrestricted fund balance in designated circumstances has reduced unrestricted fund balance to a point below the minimum targeted level, as noted above, the replenishment will be funded by revenue and/or expenditure adjustments within the next year's budgeting process.

d.

III. DESIGNATION OF ENTERPRISE FUNDS NET ASSETS

III.

- 1. The City will maintain a restricted net asset balance in the Enterprise funds of an amount not less than 25% of the next year's budgeted expenditures of each individual Enterprise fund. This will assist in maintaining an adequate level of funds for cash flow requirements and contingency.
- 1. It is the goal of each enterprise fund to cover the costs of operations, including depreciation and a transfer to the General fund, to maintain a financially healthy enterprise. The City will maintain cash reserves in the Enterprise funds at a minimum level equal to 25% of the annual operating costs plus one year of debt service payments
 - a. The Liquor fund shall be exempt from this provision since the majority of the profits are transferred to the General fund
 - b. The waste water fund in addition shall reserve 1/3 depreciation of all assets annually to fund future improvements. The City Council shall determine the use of these reserves.
- 2. If the cash reserve balance falls below the minimum target level, the replenishment will be funded by revenue and/or expense adjustments within the next year's budgeting process

IV. STABILIZATION ARRANGEMENTS

A.—Stabilization arrangements are defined as formally setting aside amounts for use in emergency situations or when revenue shortages or budgetary imbalances arise.

A.

B. The City will set aside amounts by resolution as deemed necessary that can only be expended when certain specific circumstances exist. The resolution will identify and describe the specific circumstances under which a need for stabilization arises. The need for stabilization will only be utilized for situations that are not expected to occur routinely.

V. MONITORING AND REPORTING

- A. The City Administrator and <u>Director of Administrative Services</u> City Clerk shall annually prepare the status of fund balances in relation to this policy and present to the City Council in conjunction with the annual audit.
- B. When both restricted and unrestricted resources are available for use, it is the City's policy to first use restricted resources, and then use unrestricted resources

- as they are needed.
- C. When committed, assigned or unassigned resources are available for use, it is the City's policy to use resources in the following order: 1.) committed 2.) assigned and 3.) unassigned.
- D. A negative residual amount may not be reported for restricted, committed, or assigned fund balances in the General fund.



Background	Several apartment complexes in Marshall have recently been purchased by Suite Liv'n Company. They
	want to add a new apartment building at the back of the 501-517 Village Drive development. There are already 6 buildings there so the options for new building location are limited. Zoning Ordinance requires a rear yard to be 25% of the entire lot depth, which in this case will be about a hundred feet. The owner is asking to reduce it to 30 feet.
	An apartment building on the property directly south is located within 10 feet from the rear property line, based on a variance approved in 1992. Considering this information and the fact that adjacent property to the west is zoned A – Agricultural District and used as a cemetery, this request seems reasonable.



Subject:	Request for map amendment (rezone) 1213, 1215 and 1217 West Main Street.
Background Information:	This is a request by Douglas and Peggy Anderson, Marshall, MN to rezone properties at 1213, 1215 and 1217 West Main Street from B-3 General Business District to a I-2 General Industrial District. The owner intends to build an addition to his building (Marshall Machine Shop); that addition will be built on the north side and will extend into the lots along West Main Street. The use of the building is manufacturing, and it is not permitted in a B-3 General Business District, which the three lots to be rezoned currently are. To permit building an addition, they must be rezoned to an I-2 General Industrial District. The adjacent land south of these lots is presently zoned I-2 General Industrial District and the land
	across Main Street is zoned I-1 Limited Industrial District, so the requested rezoning is consistent with the zoning of surrounding areas. However, the 1996 City Comprehensive plan shows the corridor along Main Street as a commercial use rather than industrial. Nevertheless, the staff's opinion is that at this time the requested change is acceptable considering the age of the Comprehensive plan, the use of the neighboring properties and the location of major commercial development areas within the city.

Background Information:	Carr Family LTD Partnership, owner of property at 405 Country Club Drive, has applied for a Conditional Use Permit to allow a dog treat preparation, packaging, and distribution facility to be placed in existing building formerly utilized by a grocery store.
	This building is located in a B-3 General Business District and was occupied by County Fair grocery store until 2014, after which it has been vacant. The current owner wants to sell this building to Chasing Our Tails, a dog treat company that is looking to move from its current location in New Hampshire to Minnesota. According to Stephen Trachtenberg, the owner of Chasing Our Tails, about 20% of the building area will be utilized for making dog treats and 65% of the building area will be used for packaging and warehousing of dog treats, with the remainder devoted to offices and accessory uses. Mr. Trachtenberg also stated that the traffic will be relatively light, with just several trucks coming and leaving every day.
	Dog treat processing and distribution is not specifically listed as a permitted use in a B-3 General Business District (or any other district), according to the Zoning Ordinance. However, "other business uses of the same general character as listed" in Permitted Uses subsection are allowed as conditional uses. The proposed use resembles closely enough "wholesale business and offices with no outside storage" category, which is a permitted use, to justify consideration for a Conditional Use Permit.
	The definition of wholesale is "the selling of goods in large quantities to be retailed by others." Based on Mr. Trachtenberg's description of the building use, over three quarters of the building area will be used for packaging, storage, shipping, receiving, and offices – all functions of a standard wholesale business; less than a quarter of the building will be used for processing of dog treats. Historically, staff has viewed limited area auxiliary uses of a building as an accessory to the main use of the property and did not stipulate that this accessory use must be listed separately among permitted uses, along with the main use. (An example of this approach, codified in the ordinance, would be a home occupation, which allows using up to 30% of the dwelling areas, without changing the residential character of the structure.) The requirement to maintain processing space below 25% of the building area is one of the proposed conditions attached to this conditional use permit.
	After establishing that the proposed use is indeed similar to a listed permitted use, the 18 criteria itemized in Section 86-49 should be evaluated in determining the appropriateness of granting a conditional use permit. And finally, the seven proposed conditions are supposed to prevent any possible negative effect on a neighborhood; in particular, Condition Four makes sure that no offensive odor will be noticed outside this property.

Marshall Planning Commission Report to City Council – Request for Conditional Use Permit 405 Country Club Drive, City of Marshall, Lyon County, Minnesota

Findings of Fact:

- The office of the City of Marshall Zoning Administrator received an application for a conditional
 use permit related to property located at 405 Country Club Drive. The applicant for the
 conditional use permit was property owner Carr Family LTD Partnership and 405 Country Club
 Drive, LLC. The application for a conditional use permit was dated March 13, 2019.
- 2. A written request for a conditional use permit is subject to the Minnesota 60 day rule as codified in Minnesota Statutes §15.99. The 60 day rule requires an approval or denial of a conditional use permit within 60 days of the time conditional use permit request is submitted. If no action occurs on the request for conditional use permit within 60 days, it is deemed approved pursuant to Minnesota Statute.
- 3. City staff representatives from the Planning and Zoning Department reviewed the application for the conditional use permit and believed that the request for a conditional use permit was appropriate. Conditional use permits are granted only for uses specifically listed as conditional uses for a particular zoning district. The property at 405 Country Club Drive is zoned B-3 General Business District as defined in Ordinance Sec. 86-104.
- 4. The conditional use permit was requested to allow for business to be conducted on that property for the preparation, packaging, and distribution of dog treats.
- 5. Dog treat preparation, packaging and distribution is not a permitted use within the B-3 district as listed in Ordinance Sec. 86-104(b).
- 6. Conditional uses of B-3 property are defined within Ordinance Sec. 86-104(d). Conditional uses include uses falling under the general description "other business uses of the same general character as listed" as a permitted use.
- 7. Staff believes that the proposed dog treat preparation, packaging and distribution business is of the same general character as the permitted use described as "wholesale business and office with no outside storage", based on information provided by the business owner indicating that the floor space dedicated to processing of treats would occupy less than 25% of the total floor space.
- 8. Staff believes that the proposed use is appropriate for consideration of the conditional use permit and therefore brought this matter forward for public hearing pursuant to provisions of Ordinance Sec. 86-48.
- 9. Public hearing was scheduled for March 28, 2019 to consider the request for conditional use permit at 405 Country Club Drive. Notice of that hearing was published and was mailed pursuant to provisions of Ordinance Sec. 86-47 and further in compliance with Minnesota Statutes.

- 10. Public hearing was held as scheduled. The three items considered by the Planning Commission at the public hearing were as follows:
 - <u>Item 1</u>: Evaluate the proposed use of the building for dog treat preparation, packaging, and distribution with less than 25% of floor space dedicated to processing of treats to determine whether it is similar to another permitted use of the same general character as a permitted use, i.e. "a wholesale business and office with no outside storage."

<u>Item 2</u>: Consider the following standard criteria for conditional use permit review as outlined in Ordinance Sec. 86-49:

- (1) Whether the proposed use is designed to be compatible with the existing neighborhood environment and use.
- (2) Whether the proposed use has adequate access to roads and rights-of-way.
- (3) The effect of any additional traffic generated by facility.
- (4) The landscaping, fencing and/or screening plan.
- (5) The outside storage provisions.
- (6) The accessory buildings provisions.
- (7) The facility size.
- (8) The area of site.
- (9) The off-street parking facilities.
- (10) The density of the population and structures.
- (11) The duration of proposed conditional use.
- (12) The open space, recreational/plat areas proposed.
- (13) The availability of existing utility and public service facility.
- (14) The future maintenance provisions.
- (15) Whether the proposed use has a positive community need as defined in the comprehensive plan.
- (16) The effect upon the public welfare in general.
- (17) The effect upon the welfare of the adjacent area, and persons residing or working in the area adjacent to the area.
- (18) Whether the proposed use will be injurious to the property or improvements in the area adjacent to such proposed use and the community as a whole.

<u>Item 3</u>: If the proposed use is found to be an appropriate conditional use, evaluate the seven proposed conditions as recommended by staff:

- That the regulations, standards and requirements as set forth in the City Code and as pertains to the class of district in which such premises are located shall be conformed with.
- 2. That the City reserves the right to revoke the conditional use permit in the event that any person has breached the conditions contained in this permit provided that the City serve the person with written notice specifying items of any default and allow the applicant a reasonable time in which to repaid such default.
- 3. That the property is maintained to conform to the Zoning Code and not cause or create negative impacts to adjacent existing or future properties.
- 4. That no offensive odor is detectable beyond property lines.

- 5. That the ratio of building area used for packaging and storage to the area used for dog treat preparation shall not be less than 3 to 1.
- 6. That any building addition or new building intended for requested use shall require a new conditional use permit.
- 7. That no outside storage is permitted.

At the public hearing, numerous comments were received from the public both recommending denial and recommending approval of the conditional use permit as requested.

At the conclusion of the public hearing, motion was made by Commission Member Knieff, second by Commission Member Fox to recommend approval of the conditional use permit with the included proposed conditions to the Marshall City Council for consideration. Motion was approved 4 votes yes, 2 votes no.

It is therefore recommended that the conditional use permit be recommended for approval to the Marshall City Council.



Background	On September 26, 2017, Marshall City Council approved Resolution No. 4430, Second Series, a
Information:	resolution in support of chloride reduction in water discharged to the Redwood River. The 2017 resolution supported the development by MMU and its consultants for the development of plans for new pretreatment of water system for the City of Marshall. The anticipated costs of the project at that time totaled \$9,043,000. Of that amount, MMU submitted an application hoping to receive \$7M grant to pay for the majority of the improvement costs. Grant application was submitted through the Point Source Implementation Grant (PSIG) process. The prior application, however, was denied and the PSIG funds were not dispersed to the MMU. MMU, however, has continued to develop the proposed plans and has now submitted a "certified plan" for the development of a water system for pretreatment of water. PSIG has now approved the \$7M grant to the MMU. The plans have continued to develop and it is anticipated that the costs of the project are now \$10,606,000. The majority of those costs are to be paid by the \$7M PSIG grant. Discussions have ensued between MMU and the City as to the appropriate parties to pay the remaining \$3,606,000
	of the project. The resolution as proposed divides those remaining costs 55.74% to the City of Marshall and 44.26% to MMU. City's anticipated costs, based upon engineer's estimate would be \$2,009,984. MMU's costs would be \$1,596,016. Project is to be bid by MMU on June 11, 2019.
	MMU General Manager Brad Roos, Bob VanMoer, Wastewater Superintendent and Glenn Olson, Director of Public Works/City Engineer will be present to discuss this matter. Various documents and presentations have been submitted in connection with the project. City staff is recommending that the attached resolution be approved.
Fiscal Impact:	City's anticipated costs, based upon engineer's estimate would be \$2,009,984.

Resolution No.______, Second Series A Resolution Amending Resolution 4430, Second Series in Support of Chloride Reduction in Water Discharged to the Redwood River

Whereas, the City of Marshall (City) operates a wastewater treatment facility that treats the community's wastewater prior to its discharge into the Redwood River, pursuant to a National Pollutant Discharge Elimination System (NPDES) Permit issued by the Minnesota Pollution Control Agency (MPCA). The City's NPDES permit contains a chloride (salt) limitation that must be achieved by 2024. The City and Marshall Municipal Utilities (MMU) have been in discussion about methods to attain the reduction in chloride (salt) discharged into the Redwood River; and

Whereas, City and MMU have each retained the services of qualified consultants to provide analysis and recommendations regarding the most cost-efficient methods to attain compliance with the required chloride limits as set forth by the MPCA permit. That analysis has included both a review of upgrades to the existing water treatment plant and has also included a review of retrofitting the City's wastewater treatment plant; and

Whereas, the City and MMU desire to coordinate the planning between the community's water utility and its wastewater treatment facility by developing a process to lower the wastewater treatment facility's chloride discharge. Based upon the consultant's analysis, it has been determined that the most significant measure to lower the chloride is to provide softer water from MMU's Water Treatment Plant. To achieve the permit's required result, upgrades to the existing Water Treatment Plant would have to occur at an estimated cost of \$10,606,000 based upon fully designed plans by MMU's water engineering consultant, MMU applied for a \$7,000,000 Minnesota Public Facilities Authority Point Source AE2S. Implementation Grant (PSIG) and has received notice the PSIG funding will be available for upgrades to MMU's Water Treatment Plant, the "project". With the "project" fully designed and with notice of the PSIG grant, the local funding must be put in place.

Now Therefore Be It Resolved, that the local funding for the "project" is set forth below:

With the local funding for the "project" estimated to be \$3,606,000, the City commits to funding 55.74% of the local portion of the "project" costs estimated to be \$2,010,000. The remaining local portion of estimated funding shall be paid by MMU providing 44.26% of the local portion of funding estimated to be \$1,596,000. To the extent the actual "project" costs are different than the estimated, \$10,606,000 the City and MMU will share said differences according to the stated percentages herein; and

Be it Further Resolved, the City hereby:

- 1. Commits to all measures required to attain NPDES Chloride compliance including the measures as outlined in the City's August 3, 2017 report prepared and submitted by their consultant, Bolton & Menk, as set forth below:
 - a. Support Marshall Municipal Utilities further softening of the community water supply quality to 5-8 grains using Lime/Soda Ash Softening to reduce Ion Exchange softening brine discharge.
 - b. Establish chloride surcharge on customers of the City of Marshall wastewater treatment facilities that have an industrial treatment agreement. Remit revenue collected from the surcharge to MMU in support of their further softening.
 - c. If it is determined by MMU to be required, authorize MMU adding chloride surcharge to the monthly utility bill for wastewater (sewer) customers invoiced by MMU. MMU is authorized to collect and retain said revenue. Currently, MMU is not contemplating the 151 need for this type of surcharge.

- d. Public and Industry education to reduce chlorides at the source.
- e. Potential incentive program to set all softeners to the most efficient settings.
- f. Set industrial limits in SIU Agreements.

If, after the "project" is bid on or about June 11, 2019, the amount of City's commitment is greater than \$2,211,000 (110% of the estimated \$2,010,000), the City reserves the right to request that the MMU Commission not award the contract to construct.

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Resolution No.4430, Second Series A Resolution in Support of Chloride Reduction in Water Discharged to the Redwood River

Whereas, the City of Marshall (City) operates a wastewater treatment facility that treats the community's wastewater prior to its discharge into the Redwood River, pursuant to a National Pollutant Discharge Elimination System (NPDES) Permit issued by the Minnesota Pollution Control Agency (MPCA). The City's NPDES permit contains a chloride (salt) limitation that must be achieved by 2024. The City and Marshall Municipal Utilities (MMU) have been in discussion about methods to attain the reduction in chloride (salt) discharged into the Redwood River; and

Whereas, City and MMU have each retained the services of qualified consultants to provide analysis and recommendations regarding the most cost efficient methods to attain compliance with the required chloride limits as set forth by the MPCA permit. That analysis has included both a review of upgrades to the existing water treatment plant and has also included a review of retrofitting the City's wastewater treatment plant; and

Whereas, the City and MMU desire to coordinate the planning between the community's water utility and its wastewater treatment facility by developing a process to lower the wastewater treatment facility's chloride discharge. Based upon the consultant's analysis, it has been determined that the most significant measure to lower the chloride is to provide softer water from MMU's Water Treatment Plant. In an attempt to achieve the permit's required result, upgrades to the existing Water Treatment Plant would have to occur at a cost of \$9,043,000 (2019 dollars) as estimated by MMU's water engineering consultant, AE2S. As part of this coordination agreement, MMU applied for a \$7,000,000 Minnesota Public Facilities Authority Point Source Implementation Grant (PSIG) and received notice the PSIG will not be awarded to MMU in 2018; and

Whereas, in order to have the highest chance of grant award in the next funding cycle, MMU and City staff have been advised that a project design needs to be completed and submitted to the Minnesota Department of Health (MDH) for its review and certification prior to the next PSIG process; and

Whereas, MMU has received, from its consultant AE2S, an engineering proposal to develop a design agreement for the Water Treatment Plant Softening System Improvements Project in the amount of \$815,000; and

Whereas, contingent upon the City Council's approval of this Resolution of Support, MMU would enter into the Engineering Agreement design phase of the project with AE2S.

Now Therefore Be It Resolved, the City requests MMU to reapply for the PSIG until funding is secured in order to make the improvements to MMU's Water Treatment Plant.

Be It Further Resolved, the City hereby:

- 1. Commits to funding 90% of \$815,000 or \$733,500 to MMU on or about January 8, 2018 for the engineering and design of the Water Treatment Plant Softening System Improvements Project.
- 2. Commits to all measures required to attain NPDES Chloride compliance including the measures as outlined in the City's August 3, 2017 report prepared and submitted by their consultant, Bolton & Menk, as set forth below:
 - a. Support Marshall Municipal Utilities further softening of the community water supply quality to 5-8 grains using Lime/Soda Ash Softening to reduce Ion Exchange softening brine discharge.

- b. Establish chloride surcharge on customers of the City of Marshall wastewater treatment facilities that have an industrial treatment agreement. Remit revenue collected from the surcharge to MMU in support of their further softening.
- c. Authorize MMU adding chloride surcharge to the monthly utility bill for wastewater (sewer) customers invoiced by MMU. MMU is authorized to collect and retain said revenue.
- d. Public and Industry education to reduce chlorides at the source.
- e. Potential incentive program to set all softeners to the most efficient settings.
- f. Set industrial limits in SIU Agreements.
- g. Apply for MPCA Variance on chloride limit.
- h. If all of the above measures have been implemented and chloride limits are not met; the City should, by ordinance, end the practice of Ion Exchange softening, if needed to reach final limit.
- 3. Commits to making a capital contribution to the project in an amount reflecting the project costs minus any grant funds received and minus the amount MMU would otherwise spend on softening system improvements currently estimated at \$900,000. (As an example, had MMU received the PSIG grant of \$7,000,000, the City's commitment would have been \$1,143,000. (Project cost of \$9,043,000 less PSIG received of \$7,000,000 less MMU's committed expenditure of \$900,000)).
- 4. Upon request by MMU Commission, indicates City's willingness to authorize and approve the sale of G.O. backed public utility revenue bonds by the City, with MMU making payment on the bonds. If issued, the bonds would be 15 year in length and the bond size would not exceed the project cost minus any grant funds received by MMU for the project.

After the PSIG amounts are known and final project estimates are developed, if the amount of City's commitment is greater than \$1,715,000 (150% of the estimated \$1,143,000), the City reserves the right to request that the MMU Commission not award the contract to construct.

Frequently Asked Questions (FAQ)

In the fall of 2019, the Marshall Municipal Utilities will begin a water softening enhancement project at the existing water treatment plant. The following are answers to FAQ being asked in our community:

What is the project about? The State of Minnesota has placed a chloride (salt) limitation on the permit given to the City of Marshall Wastewater Treatment Facility for the first time. The permit requires the water entering the Redwood River following treatment to contain less than 261 mg/l or ppm by 2024. After a study by water engineering professional, it was determined that the most economical way to attain that chloride limitation, is to keep the chloride (salt) from entering the wastewater in the first place. Since a primary source of salt in the wastewater comes from ion exchange softening equipment, measures were studied to determine if Marshall's water could be made softer. Again, following professional analysis, it was determined that it can be made softer by introducing a new treatment technique.

What is the new treatment technique? The current lime softening process will add soda ash to reduce the water hardness from the 50 grains as it enters the water plant, to 6 grains following the new type of process. Today the water is treated to 35 grains hardness.

How much salt enters the Redwood River? In a February 2017 study conducted for MMU by AE2S, its water consulting engineer, it was estimated that 11,356 pounds per day on average and 15,881 pounds per day maximum, enter the Redwood River. Of this amount they estimated 7,330 pounds of salt come from softening units being recharged using salt in residential, commercial and light industrial.

Will the water at 6 grains of hardness be more expensive? Yes, it will. While an exact amount is not yet known, it is estimated that for every 1,000 gallons, it may cost \$1.44 more. There will be an offsetting lower salt costs estimated to save the water customer who softens approximately \$.93 per 1,000 gallons. Netting the lower cost of salt against the higher cost of water results in an increase of an estimated \$.51 per 1,000 gallons.

Must I remove my water softening equipment? No. It is strictly a personal choice whether you keep your softener operating. Many water customers enjoy water softened to a softness of 0-1 grains of hardness and will choose to keep their softeners working. It will be important for all old-style softeners that recharge based on time to change to softeners that recharge based on demand or usage. Most home softeners already have that style of controller.

If I have a new style softener controller, am I all set? No. After the project is finished and your water is now 6 grains hard rather than 35 grains, the controller will need to be adjusted. Your softening company would be happy to assist you in doing this. In some instances, you may be able to do it yourself. In any case, it should not be done until after the project is completed.

MMU will notify its water customers when the water quality has changed, expected to be spring of 2021.

What will the project cost to construct? It is estimated that the project will cost \$10,606,000 to construct.

What are the sources of capital to fund the construction? The State of Minnesota will provide \$7,000,000 with the remainder coming from a combination of funds from the City of Marshall and the Marshall Municipal Utilities.

This memorandum is a supplement to the June 30, 2017 Chloride and Copper Reduction Progress Report which was completed in accordance with Chapter 1, Paragraphs 1.12 and 1.21 contained in the NPDES/SDS Permit No. MN0022179 for the Marshall Wastewater Treatment Facility (WWTF) in Marshall, Minnesota. The report documented the chloride and copper sampling and source reduction efforts. The facility is working toward compliance with a maximum daily chloride limit of 302 mg/L and a monthly average chloride limit of 261 mg/L.

This memorandum identifies additional future source reduction measures. The measures listed below are available to the City of Marshall to attain their chloride limitation compliance by 2024. The measures may not all have to be utilized to attain compliance, but in the opinion of the City's consulting engineer, Bolton-Menk, compliance cannot be attained with the reduction salt based water softening alone.

- 1. Support Marshall Municipal Utilities further softening of the community water supply quality to 5-8 grains using Lime/ Soda Ash Softening to reduce Ion Exchange softening brine discharge.
- 2. Establish chloride surcharge on customers of the City of Marshall wastewater treatment facilities that have an industrial treatment agreement. Remit revenue collected from the surcharge to MMU in support of their further softening.
- 3. Authorize MMU adding chloride surcharge to the monthly utility bill for wastewater (sewer) customers invoiced by MMU. MMU is authorized to collect and retain said revenue.
- 4. Public and Industry education to reduce chlorides at the source.
- 5. Potential incentive program to set all softeners to the most efficient settings.
- 6. Set industrial limits in SIU Agreements.
- 7. Apply for MPCA Variance on chloride limit.
- 8. If all of the above measures have been implemented and chloride limits are not met; the City should by ordinance, end the practice of Ion Exchange softening if needed to reach final limit.

CITY OF MARSHALL CHLORIDE ISSUES

September 26, 2017

- * The MPCA issued the City of Marshall Wastewater Facility a Chloride limit in its NPDES Permit issued in 2014.
- * The limit has a compliance schedule to meet this limit by 2024.
- * The new limit is 261 mg/l and we are currently discharging about 560 mg/l.

Chloride (salt) is used in water softeners to recharge the media so the media attracts the hard water chemicals as the water passes through the media.

This process produces the soft water for use in our homes.

As the media gets full of hard water chemicals, the media needs to be recharged and the brine (salt) solution flushes the hard water chemicals with the brine solution into the sanitary sewer.

This is how chlorides get into the wastewater. Once salt is added to water, it is very difficult to remove.

Salt passes through the wastewater plant and is discharged into the river and may cause toxicity to fish and aquatic life. The City of Marshall discharges 13,000 pounds of salt into the Redwood River every day.

Road salt is also a cause of non-point pollution in rivers.

Marshall has very hard water, and softening is necessary.

Marshall Municipal Utilities (MMU) currently partially softens its raw water using lime.

MMU has a proposed upgrade design to further soften the raw water using lime and soda ash.

This would allow MMU to treat the raw water to a much softer level where home softening could be greatly reduced or eliminated.

The proposed upgrade would be very expensive. Current estimates are in the \$9 million range.

We have investigated the potential for some grant money from State agencies to help offset the cost.

MMU is hoping to receive a Point Source Implementation Grant from the Minnesota Clean Water Legacy Fund in the amount of \$7,000,000 towards the project in 2019.

MPCA has said our chances of getting grant funding awarded in 2019 are the highest if we have the project designed and ready to bid by June of 2018.

The increased costs to reduce chlorides is a wastewater permit issue. Reduction of chlorides is easier and more cost-effective at the raw water treatment plant by further softening, resulting in the reduction of water softener needs.

The capital costs for improvements for elimination of chlorides to permit levels should be funded through wastewater user charges and grant funds.

Increased O&M costs for the enhanced softening at the water plant can be supported as Bolton & Menk suggests, is by a surcharge on the utility bill.

The WWTF Fund should pay 90% the cost of the design; estimated at \$815,000 in 2018 so we are ready to bid and get the PSIG Grant funding in 2019. This would be a WWTF cost of \$733,500.

The City of Marshall Wastewater Treatment Facility's total estimated commitment is \$1,143,000 and Marshall Municipal Utilities commitment of \$900,000 which they would need to spend on plant improvements if they did not further soften.

The City of Marshall should support MMU in this project to further soften the community water supply in order to provide a better quality water to the consumers and to meet compliance requirements for the Wastewater Treatment Facility.

The strategic plan will be created by the city council and city administrator in a 5-hour retreat facilitated by Allen and Wimmer. During this retreat a detailed 3-year strategic plan, grounded in the survey results, will be developed, including action plans and accountability marks for each key goal.

Desired Outcomes

Stakeholders will develop ownership in the future of the city and have their voices heard regarding the key goals for the city.

With analyzed input from the stakeholders, the city council, and key city staff a mission and vision for the city will be developed to use in future decision making.

Council members will increase their sense of team membership as they work together.

The city council and key city staff will identify key goals for the next 3 years in accordance with stakeholder's input.

The city council and key city staff will determine an action plan for each key goal, who is accountable for carrying out actions, and benchmarks for measuring success.

- Design, distribution, synthesis and analysis of a survey administered to five key city stakeholder groups

CITY ADMINISTRATOR

- This past month participated in several meetings related to emergency operations planning and subsequent declaration of emergency that was issued on March 24, 2019.
- On March 26th, the Mayor, Chief Marshall and I reviewed current spring flooding status and toured the flood control project with Senator Klobuchar's State Director and Director of Field Operations.
- Participated in discussion on city branding request for proposals and eventual selection of North Star. Kick-off discussions have begun and input from community will be thorough.
- Worked on State of the City presentation with eventual presentation on March 14, 2019.
- Met with MMU Director Brad Roos, Finance Director Karla Drown, Director of Administrative Services Annette Storm and WWW Superintendent Bob VanMoer to discuss funding of water softening project with existing funds and the current level approved by City Council.
- Met with Mayor, Community Services and community partners regarding Bicycle Friendly
 Community program and bike sharing program that is scheduled for implementation May 20th.
- Had several meetings regarding long term debt study, capital improvement planning, City Hall, planning and zoning items.
- Attended introduction of new SMSU President on March 21st as well as participating in farewell remarks to current SMSU President Gores on April 5, 2019.

PUBLIC WORKS DIVISION

Engineering

- Project Z47: Commerce Industrial Park- All utility work is complete. The contractor has installed fabric, gravel and curb and gutter on Michigan Road. Work remaining for spring 2019: Michigan Road street paving, Northeast Pond subsurface drainage, final shaping/seeding around Michigan Road, and final shaping/seeding in the Northeast Pond drainage ditch. Farm leases are being prepared for 2019-2021.
- Project Z64/SAP 139-111-006: Saratoga Street Reconstruction Project is substantially completed for 2018. Contractor will return in spring 2019 to complete minor sidewalk paving and complete final seeding between C Street and the Redwood River bridge near Hamden Drive.
- Project Z67: Michigan Road/Superior Road Reconstruction Project Project is substantially completed for 2018. Contractor will return in spring 2019 to complete minor concrete work for drainage facilities and final grading and seeding.
- Project Z74: Superior Road/Huron Road Reconstruction Project Bids to be received April 18, 2019 and awarded April 23, 2019.
- Project Z51-2019: Bituminous Overlay Project Bids to be received on April 16, 2019.
- Stormwater Study Work is progressing on the stormwater study by Bolton & Menk for the area including Buffalo Ridge Concrete, areas along Burlington Northern Railroad Tracks from TH 19 to Parkway III due to the significant recent flooding in the area and potential development in the Parkway III area. A draft proposal may be available in March 2019.
- TH 23 and Lyon J-Turn Mn/DOT Project- Work is substantially completed. Landscaping items remaining for spring 2019.
- MERIT Center Phase 2- Bids received 02/05/2019. Recommendation to award to R&G Construction Co. for base bid plus Alt. B plus Alt. C in the amount of \$\$2,712,530.50.
- 2019 Projects are currently in the design and scoping process. Projects currently include:
 - Country Club Drive Utility Replacement project; water, sanitary sewer, storm sewer from a point approximately 200' west of 4th Street to 2nd Street.

- Superior Rd/Huron Rd Reconstruction project: The project has been revised to include the complete replacement of water main, storm sewer catch basins, and sanitary sewer spot repairs on Huron Road and Superior Road between Huron Road and Erie Road. The project was initially being proposed as a complete reconstruction, but the scope has been altered due to special assessment considerations.
- Hahn Rd Storm Sewer Reconstruction project: replacement and addition of storm water facilities and a ditch cleaning effort to improve drainage and help reduce localized street flooding in the area.
- UCAP Transit Bus Shelters: Design continues for the installation of UCAP bus shelters at 3 locations; S. 4th/Stephen Ave, N. 4th between Redwood and Lyon, Birch Avenue between Mustang Trail and Village Drive. Project includes new sidewalk at all 3 locations, nearby ADA ramp reconstruction, and a street bump out at S. 4th to allow buses to pull off street. Project is a partially grant funded and coordinated effort between City and UCAP Transit.
- East Lyon Street Paving Project: pave East Lyon Street from Hwy 23 to a point approximately 750-FT east of Hwy 23. Staff will be holding a meeting in late February to discuss the project with neighboring businesses and residents.
- o 2019 Chip Seal Project
- Other alley projects. Interest from two neighborhoods for alley improvements. A meeting was held with neighborhood residents on January 28th to discuss the potential projects. Feedback from the neighborhood was generally positive. Staff will be preparing plans for alley improvements.
- River slope stabilization projects near the flood protection levee west of town and street protection projects at Bladholm and High Streets
- Parking lot projects as directed by Council at a later date. The potential projects include: Rose Lot, Addison Lot, and a new parking lot north of Red Baron Arena.
- Nearing completion of an ADA self-evaluation of sidewalk pedestrian ramps at city intersections
 in the City of Marshall. The self-evaluation inventory will be included with the city ADA transition
 plan for city rights-of-way. An ADA transition plan is a required document if the City wishes to be
 awarded federal and State funding for future construction projects. Our transition plan is
 currently being developed.
- Currently reviewing State Aid roadway network. We are reviewing street mileage in the city and with recent changes to the State Aid funding mechanism, we are evaluating the efficacy of the current State Aid network and reviewing for possibility of proposed changes and additions.

The State Fire Marshal's Office will oversee all the teams including funding, equipment etc. A Chief's meeting is scheduled for April 23rd, 2019 at Camp Ripley to discuss the transition and how this may impact existing teams.

MERIT CENTER

- In March, the MERIT Center hosted a variety of training/events. On March 24th, 2019, a request was made of the Mayor to implement a Local Declaration of a State of Emergency. This declaration/resolution was brought before the City Council on March 26th, 2019 and extended until April 23rd, 2019.

MINUTES OF THE MARSHALL PLANNING COMMISSION MEETING MARCH 28, 2019

MEMBERS PRESENT: Fox, Knieff, Steen, Edblom, Lee and Carstens

MEMBERS ABSENT: Ruud

OTHERS PRESENT: Ilya Gutman, Jason Anderson and Glenn Bayerkohler

- The meeting was called to order by Chairman Edblom. He asked for the approval of the minutes of the March 13, 2019, regular meeting of the Marshall Planning Commission. Fox MADE A MOTION, SECOND BY Steen, to approve the minutes as written. ALL VOTED IN FAVOR OF THE MOTION.
- 2. Gutman stated that several apartment complexes in Marshall have recently been purchased by Suite Liv'n Company. They want to add a new apartment building at the back of the 501-517 Village Drive development. There are already 6 buildings there so the options for new building location are limited. Zoning Ordinance requires a rear yard to be 25% of the entire lot depth, which in this case would be about 100 feet. The owner is asking to reduce it to 30 feet. Several apartment buildings located on the property directly south are located within 10 feet from the rear property line, based on a variance approved in 1992. Considering this information, and the fact that adjacent property to the west is zoned A Agricultural District and used as a cemetery, this request seems reasonable. Staff recommends approval to the City Council of the request by L2A, LLC for a Variance Adjustment Permit for reduction of the required rear yard from 25% of the lot depth, or about 100 feet, to 30 feet. Dr. Affolter, Marshall MN, asked if there is adequate parking. Gutman said the site plan shows the required parking per City Ordinance. Fox MADE A MOTION, SECOND BY Knieff, to close the public hearing ALL VOTED IN FAVOR OF THE MOTION. Fox MADE A MOTION, SECOND BY Knieff to recommend to City Council an approval as recommend by staff. ALL VOTED IN FAVOR OF THE MOTION.
- 3. Gutman informed that Carr Family LTD Partnership has applied for a Conditional Use Permit to allow a dog treat preparation, packaging, and distribution facility to be placed in the existing building formerly utilized by a grocery store. This building is located in a B-3 General Business District and was occupied by County Fair store until 2014, after which it has been vacant. The current owner wants to sell this building to Chasing Our Tails, a dog treat company that is looking to move from its current location in New Hampshire to Minnesota. According to Steve Trachtenberg, the owner of Chasing Our Tails, about 20% of the building area will be utilized for making dog treats and about 65% of the building area will be used for packaging, storage, and shipping, with the remainder devoted to offices and accessory uses. Mr. Trachtenberg also stated that the traffic will be relatively light, with several trucks coming and going every day. Dog treat processing and distribution is not specifically listed as a permitted use in a B-3 General Business District, according to the Zoning Ordinance. However, "other business uses of the same general character as listed" in Permitted Uses subsection are allowed as conditional uses. The proposed use resembles closely enough the "wholesale business and offices with no outside storage" category, which is a permitted use, to justify consideration for a Conditional Use Permit. Staff suggested approval to the Planning Commission of the request by Carr Family LTD Partnership, Marshall, MN for a Conditional Use Permit for a dog treat preparation, packaging and distribution facility in a B-3 General Business District as a business use similar to the wholesale use with the following

conditions: 1) That the regulations, standards and requirements as set forth in the City Code and as pertains to the class of district in which such premises are located shall be conformed with. 2) That the City reserves the right to revoke the Conditional Use Permit in the event that any person has breached the conditions contained in this permit provided that the City serve the person with written notice specifying items of any default and allow the applicant a reasonable time in which to repair such default. 3) That the property is maintained to conform to the Zoning Code and not cause or create negative impacts to adjacent existing or future properties. 4) That no offensive odor is ever detectable beyond property lines. 5) That dog treat preparation area does not exceed 25% of the building area. 6) That any building addition or new building intended for requested use shall require a new conditional use permit. 7) That no outside storage is permitted. Steve Trachtenberg, owner of Chasing Our Tails, stated that they are a New England based dog treat company. So why is he here? It started out with a broker who has been in the meat business for 65 years. He is 86 years old and he needed a retirement plan. That retirement plan involved Trachtenberg. In October of 2018, he purchased a USDA meat processing plant in Sanborn, MN. It makes human food there every day and it is still in operation. He realized what a great community it is here; how Minnesota nice is a real thing. He purchased a home in Walnut Grove. He then purchased the Lucan, MN, locker where they do the slaughter. They make use of 95% of the animals. They are going to build up the Lucan locker to make it a USDA facility; currently it is a state facility, so he is going to make that a Federal inspection facility. He already has a Federal Inspection facility in Sanborn. Dog treats are governed by the FDA, not the USDA. He purchased a 25,000 square foot building in Tracy that was going to be the dog treat facility, but it suffered a partial roof collapse this winter. He needs to have his company moved to Minnesota by the end of May. This dog treat company has been in business for 11 years. Everything they make is edible. It is all USDA inspected and is like human food. A customer is Whole Foods, which has been selling his treats for 10 years. In New Hampshire he uses a 25,000 square foot building, of which he occupies half. The other side is occupied by 250 office employees and they don't smell anything, they don't complain. Across the street there are two nursing homes and they do not complain of smell. They bake and dehydrate their products just like a grocery store. There will be less traffic than when it was a grocery store. Trucks come occasionally to bring in frozen USDA inspected product and fresh products come from the slaughter in Lucan. They ship about 1000 boxes a week by UPS Ground, so the truck comes once a day. Pallets ship daily, which may be one to two trucks in the evening. He is the only owner and will bring 25 to 30 full time jobs to Marshall, with a total of 50 jobs to Southwest Minnesota. Edblom asked if the public was aware of the proposed Conditional Use Permit conditions. Gutman said no, they have not seen that. Edblom read all 7 conditions. Dale Howe, 901 S 4th Street, said he moved here in 1971. He said he is here to speak about the request of the Carr Family for a Conditional Use Permit to use the former County Fair property for a manufacturing and distribution business in a B-3 General Business District. Chapter 86 (Sections 86-3 through 86-5) of the City Code explains the purpose and intent of the Zoning Code. It states the chapter was adopted by the City of Marshall to promote the health, safety, property values, etc., and the general welfare of the public thru this code and to achieve the goals of the Marshall Comprehensive Land Use Plan. It goes on to say that every use and change of use shall conform to the Comprehensive Plan. Section 86-46 says a CUP may be issued for "Any uses or purposes for which such permits are required by the provisions of this chapter." Section 86-49 is the Standard for hearing. "When the Planning Commission, or City Council, is reviewing the proposed CUP, besides the special conditions provided for in each district, it shall also evaluate the following when Applicable." It provides 18 points for review. The City of Marshall Comprehensive Plan, Pg. 81, Housing, 2nd Goal includes, "Maintain a high-quality living environment in Marshall's residential

neighborhoods." And, the second line under Policies says to support the necessary zoning regulations to help maintain property throughout the City. The Comprehensive Plan, Land Use section, Goals #3 is "Support the orderly growth of residential, commercial, and industrial areas." And, Policy #6 is "Design and locate industrial and commercial developments to avoid through truck traffic in residential areas." The Comprehensive Plan, City Form, Key Elements, item #4 is "The commercial areas should be controlled so that they do not negatively impact adjacent residential housing." The Comprehensive Plan, Land Use Plan (map), (pg. 92), shows the property in a Commercial zone. Findings: The property is in a B-3 General Business District and the proposed use is an I-2 General Industry Permitted Use. There is no provision for a manufacturing and distribution or similar use in the B-3 District list of Permitted Conditional Uses (sec 86-104). The proposed use would require rezoning. The Comprehensive Plan however, shows the property as Commercial. The property is abutting single family residential properties on two sides and within a residential neighborhood. The Comprehensive Plan, Key Elements, item #4, "The commercial areas should be controlled so that they do not negatively impact adjacent residential housing." An industrial use will negatively impact adjacent residential housing. Trucks will be transporting material and products in and out of the subject property and travel 4th St. and Southview Dr. The Comprehensive Plan, Land Use section, Policy #6 is "Design and locate industrial and commercial developments to avoid through truck traffic in residential areas." Summary: This request is not a candidate for a Conditional Use Permit. A manufacturing plant and distribution use is not a use listed in the B-3 General Business District as a Conditional Use. This proposed use is an industrial use as defined in the I-Districts of City Code. The proposed use does not comply with the goals and policies of the City of Marshall Comprehensive Plan in that it is abutting single family housing and a residential district and will promote truck traffic through a large residential neighborhood. Offensive odors have caused problems for other industries and residential neighborhoods, and placing conditions regulating odors is almost impossible to enforce as the City has seen in the past. Surely the proposed user will want to expand, and consolidate their operations, as their business succeeds in Marshall. Such expansions will only compound neighborhood concerns and difficulties for the company. Howe encouraged the Economic Development Commission to help their client by encouraging them to locate in the industrial park where they can grow. Howe said that he respectfully requests that the Planning Commission recommend denying the request as it is not a permitted Conditional Use in a B-3 General Business District; it does not comply with the goals and policies of the Marshall Comprehensive Plan, and the effect of the industrial use on the residential neighborhood because of inherent operations and traffic thru the adjacent residential neighborhoods. Patrick Louwagie, 514 Country Club Drive, said his property is across the street from the property that the Conditional Use Permit is proposed for. At first, he was concerned, and he did some research online and there are many articles online that list the problems that do exist with pet food manufacturing. He is not sure if Trachtenberg has the secret how to do it, but it surprises him because clearly the smell exists. Trachtenberg said Mr. Louwagie was confused since pet food is not pet treats. Kibble manufacturing does have the problems with smell. They use rendered meat meals and rendered fats and they do smell but pet treats do not. Louwagie asked what is made at the New Hampshire facility. Trachtenberg said treats; he is just moving the New Hampshire operation to Minnesota. Louwagie said he believes the process is similar and asked if there is a cooking of the product. Trachtenberg said they are dehydrating, not cooking. Louwagie said that Trachtenberg did say his business may have smoke smell and just because Trachtenberg likes the smell that does not mean everyone will. The steam will have a smell. The facility will be right in the area of a school, golf course and residential district. Louwagie likes the idea of a business coming to Southwest Minnesota, but the main

concern is the location of the facility. At first his concern was for himself but expanded to the concern for the City of Marshall. What will the city do if they make a bad decision now and will have to deal with another problem area with smell in a residential area. That is why the industrial park area in the city was created and why that was made shovel ready for business to go. That was done for a reason and Louwagie would hope the city would adhere to that reason and keep those areas different, so the city continues to be an enjoyable place to live. Randy Fox, 508 Country Club Drive, complained about the process of notifying people and said that, as a concerned citizen, he started talking with people and realized it was sent out within a 350' radius and that is pretty limited. When he called City Officials and EDA, he was told they didn't know it was out in the public. There is a concern that no one outside the 350' knew anything about this. He did his homework and had he not, people probably would not have seen this article in Thursday paper. People are happy to have a company like this come to Marshall. When he looked this company up, it sounds like they smoke bones with marrow in and pigs' ears; how do you mitigate the smell of smoking? Trachtenberg said they do a cold smoking in a closed chamber. Smoke is a particle; you think it is a smell, but it is not, it is a solid particle so what you see is what you get. The way you mitigate it is by smoking with hard wood, not a liquid smoke; they use USDA hard hickory, and light it under a low temp, which creates smoke that is a solid particle in a closed chamber and smoke the bones, the smoke settles onto the product and not out the flue. Trachtenberg said his current building is 8 feet shorter than the one they are proposing to use here in Marshall. You can't smell it at that height there, so you won't smell it here. You won't smell that 25 feet in the air in the low volumes that they produce it. Randy Fox asked if there is smell, then where do we go. There was a similar situation with ADM. They have cut back on emissions. If there is this problem, how is it going to be handled? Looking at the surrounding businesses, we have the golf course, pool, DQ, Legion Field, the gem of Minnesota; do we take the chance to have that foul smell? If this goes through, then are we open to possibly going into Westside school if we allow a pet food manufacturing in a B-3? Randy Fox said Trachtenberg mentioned phase 2. What is that phase going to bring? Once it is in operation, he will have too much invested to relocate so let's shut it down now. This is just not the place for this as one can tell by the attendance here tonight. Randy Fox said he welcomes Trachtenberg's business in town but not in his neighborhood. He asked the Planning Commission to think about this. The City of Marshall is better than this and the citizens of Marshall are so much better than this. Kayla Speidel, 201 George Street, said there has been a lot of talk about the odor, so she won't go there. A major concern she has is that 2 years ago all the sewer lines were redone, and it was a major project, and it was set up for residential, not manufacturing. When th turkey plant was put in, there were issues with sewage. It caused massive amounts of issues. There is a difference from County Fair. They were retail, not manufacturing. No problem coming to Marshall, great idea and it sounds wonderful, but there is an industrial park that is set up for that type of business, not County Fair. Trachtenberg said they test the water and there is nothing in their water. They have grease traps, but they don't have much grease because they don't cook anything. All their chemicals that they use in the plant to clean things come from a company in Minnesota called Eco Lab. It is exactly like County Fair, they use the exact same dishwasher. There are 15 ovens, but there is no waste. Currently they have a cardboard dumpster for recycling. In the garbage that goes in the dumpster are plastic bags because meat comes in plastic. Meat scraps are ground and sold as raw diet currently. In Marshall they will be ground and turned into jerky treats. They have a new piece of equipment coming called a former. He currently operates with an 8 yd dumpster; they just don't throw anything out, that is just not good business. There is business in Marshall with a bigger dumpster. They don't use anything that is not used in a restaurant; they are like a big restaurant. A dumpster is emptied once a week and the cardboard is a

10 yd and emptied every other week. Nicole Schuler, 618 Kendal Street, said she has a child with her because of the short notice of the meeting; she said she only found out because someone posted a letter on Facebook. Very disappointed in how people are notified. She is the Marshall area PTA treasurer and concerned with the additional traffic around the school. Yes, there used to be County Fair there and yes there was grocery traffic, but it usually was not during drop off and pickup times. She is concerned about large trucks coming in and out of that area; that is the worst school for dropping off and picking up kids. She has seen kids almost get hit and she is extremely concerned about adding additional traffic in that area; even limited is more than we currently have today. Steven Schuler, 904 Elizabeth Street, said he wants to redirect the question about waste. It was answered regarding solid waste but what about the liquid waste and volume. Trachtenberg said less than 1000 gallons of wastewater per day. He said one puts more down the drain in a house. They don't do high volume water; they don't do clean in place. They don't use chemical sanitation, just hot water sanitation. They don't run it down the drain because it is expensive to keep heating it up to 185 degrees. So, they use recirculating dishwashers that are only dumped twice a day. They are not industrial in the sense people think. They are a French culinary kitchen making dog treats. Bill Gianelli, 300 West James Avenue, asked what was going to be upgraded. Trachtenberg said not the waterlines; they are too big now. The only thing he will be upgrading is gas. Gianelli asked about increased freezer space. Trachtenberg said yes, a 7,000 square foot freezer. Gianelli asked what size County Fair is? Trachtenberg said 33,000 square feet. Gianelli asked what the rest of the building would be used for if in his other building he only used half of 25,000 square feet. Trachtenberg said he is coming here to expand. Gianelli said he wants to know why this is even being considered. He said he understands there are dollars in the family business. He said he has been running a manufacturing business in Marshall for the last 19 years and he is out in the industrial park and there is a spot across from him that Mr. Trachtenberg could build. He understands time pressure which is also why no one knew about this. This is a hurry up deal. This should be in the industrial park; Gianelli doesn't care if he makes cotton balls, he does not want a business there that is going to manufacture anything. He asked about packaging. Trachtenberg said they hand package everything and hand fill, and they are not producing high volume. Gianelli asked about pictures of the facility and process. Trachtenberg said there are no videos or pictures of his operation due to proprietary process, patents and copy rights. Gianelli asked about business hours. Trachtenberg said they work 5 days a week for 10 to 12-hours. He said the town is faced with a building that has sat empty for 5 years. Gianelli said that is not his problem but he does not want manufacturing in his back yard. Mike Bodenheimer, 202 Donita Avenue, said he has a big problem with the City even though he spent 26 years on the City Council. He asked who is going to be drafting up these conditions and who will change them. Is that going to be one person? Anderson said that it is up to the Planning Commission and the City Council to apply any conditions that they wish on the property. He said that doesn't answer his question. He asked who the staff member will be doing this. Anderson said that the Planning and Zoning staff will write conditions with direction from the Planning Commission and the City Council if the Conditional Use Permit is approved. Bodenheimer said there was about as much thought put into these 7 conditions as there is in his cup of coffee. Bodenheimer said he owned a restaurant in Perham, MN, for 20 years and there was a dog manufacturing facility in that town and it stinks, and it is in the industrial district. Bayerkohler said he and Anderson are not members of the Planning Commission and will not be voting. He said that in the memo that was sent by staff this item is being put forward because the proposed use would resemble wholesale business; that was the justification. This company is making the product and that is what manufacturers do. Wholesalers do not make the product, they buy finished product, store it and sell it to retailers. In Marshall we

have zoning districts and I-2 district is where manufacturing is allowed and that is what this is. What it boils down to is this: is manufacturing the same as wholesales? That is what you need to answer; it is that plain and simple. Ron Labat, 101 Whitney Circle, said this is manufacturing, period. There is a real clear definition of manufacturing in the business dictionary. It simply says the process of converting raw materials components or parts into finished goods that meet customers' expectations and specifications. That is exactly what this gentleman said they do. So, he doesn't think there is any reason to put a manufacturing facility in a residential neighborhood and call it warehousing. Rita Carrera, 103 Marlene Street, is worried about devaluation of the houses around. They pay taxes and did not move into a manufacturing place. County Fair was a retail place and was a blessing for the neighborhood; this will not be, and it will devalue the properties. Mark Lipinski, 502 Country Club Drive, said Gutman and Trachtenberg said no odor and Edblom and the newspaper said no offensive odor. Edblom said he has not said anything, he was just reading the conditions that are in front of him. Anderson said the condition put on the Conditional Use Permit says no offensive odor beyond the property line. Lipinski said that is vague. There will be an increase in truck traffic, maybe not a massive amount; however, the quickest route to Highway 23 is 4th Street and that street is narrow and has bike path on both sides. In the industrial park there are empty buildings out there. Karla Anthony, 105 Gray Place, asked if the district doesn't allow for manufacturing, why would a permit be issued? Judy St. Aubin, 205 West James Avenue, said her occupation was a Federal Safety Inspection Agent and she has worked in several plants. She understands that this processing is not the same as the slaughter plant. But she thinks Trachtenberg has over-glorified the cleanliness of this because she has looked at a lot of plants she inspected top to bottom; where they haul out, where they come in, rodent control and insect control. So yes, it sounds glorious; realistically after a few years it usually doesn't end up being glorious, depending on how much one wants to spend and how much one wants to train employees to take care of both situations. She has been through several plants opening and closing and many cases when people start up and it doesn't go well, and they are done, they are out, and many of the business people are left holding bills unpaid. She has been at Dawson; people know about Dawson starting up; there are many producers there that were not paid for their product. Trachtenberg said he takes serious offense that she is assuming that he would not pay his bills. St. Aubin said to go ahead and take it. She did not mean anyone specifically but was saying this happens a lot. She has been in Worthington and that was already zoned for it and she has been in Dawson. This may not be the case but all she was saying is to be aware this isn't always pleasant. Plus, the truck traffic on 4th Street will increase and it will devalue the properties. And there is frustration about the notification without openness and consideration. If it wasn't for the good concerned citizens, people would not have known about this. Anderson clarified for the board the publication guidelines that were followed; the City sends out notification within 350 feet of the business. Whether that is right or wrong, that is the process in the ordinance and statutes that the City follows. St. Aubin said she understand that but thinks Mr. Trachtenberg should have been fair and had a meeting ahead of time with the neighborhood and discussed this. She understands why he did not want to show pictures, but he could do a fair presentation ahead of time. She understands that there might not be odor issues, but she has real bad asthma and they have not found the cause of it yet. So, if that is in the air it could affect people suffering from asthma and it has nothing to do with odor. She does understand that cleaning in place is entirely different than the other process but there still is a proper wash down. There are problems with traffic, that is a school area and that is residential area which is not zoned for manufacturing. How much money has been spent on the industrial park out there with buildings that are empty? In the future people should not try to push things over in a hurry. Sometimes when thing are hurried things don't work

out and there are lawsuits and business people left holding the bag. FDA is not FSIS, they are different inspecting. We have a beautiful Industrial Park to consider. Anderson repeated that the City follows the policy that is out there. And the fact that people gathered here today and are present for this meeting speaks to the fact that though it isn't perfect, the public notice process did work to an extent. People did what you would expect them to do, they discussed with each other and they showed up tonight, so thank you for coming. Bayerkohler said people should be thankful to the newspaper, they are the eyes and the ears for the community, that is how we find out information. They do a good job attending our meetings, finding out what is happening and then informing the public. Edblom went over the process and said he is going to refer the process to L&O to see if there should be a change. And if a change is recommended, it will go to the City Council for a decision. He said everyone was following the rules and regulations that are in place and have been for many years. If it is time to change, they will look at it. Randy Fox asked if the City has any financial responsibility in this project. Or is it offering tax incentives or any financing to this business, an unauthorized business use in this B-3 zoning district? Are the taxes paying for this? Knieff said that according to the information he has received, absolutely not. Edblom asked Trachtenberg if he is asking for any abated taxes or anything similar. Trachtenberg advised no, he doesn't need financing or tax abatement. Louwagie said this goes back to what Bayerkohler said: this is manufacturing business, this is not a wholesale business; that is the problem. If it were changed from retail to wholesale, that would have made perfect sense for the notification. But to move to manufacturing, he would assume that has a whole different level of notification. He thinks somewhere there was a misunderstanding or an error in City staff thinking this was wholesale instead of manufacturing. Nancy Andres, 113 West Gray Place, wondered when these ordinances came into place because Schwan's ice cream used to be there. Bayerkohler said these ordinances have been in place for a long time; it could have been grandfathered in. He assumed that when staff recommended this to the Planning Commission, it was based on the assumption that this business use resembled or was the same as wholesale and if they are not the same, then the justification for their recommendation does not stand; they are justifying this on the basis that they are the same thing. Dr. Affolter said when he was on the Planning Commission in the 70's, that is when the ice cream plant burned down, there was a temporary Conditional Use Permit. He said he has been here for 61 years. So, if there is an odor, how is it going to be fixed when it is already in place. He doesn't want to change the quality of Marshall. If there is a risk that anything might cause a problem, he would recommend denial. Andres asked about the zoning of Turkey Valley. Gutman said I-2 General Industrial. Fox asked Trachtenberg if he looked at other commercial locations for availability and if this is not approved, is he out of here. Trachtenberg said no, he has not looked at other locations, but this is a public forum and he would be glad to tell in private why it has to be this building. It has to do with bank financing, with a lot of things that have no bearing on this conversation. It has to do with fitness of building, speed of which he can get in it and a whole host of things. Most buying of commercial buildings takes 90 to 100 days and he is trying to do something much quicker. He and Mr. Carr have been able to achieve that. If it doesn't go through, he is out of here. James Carr, 506 Washington Avenue, owner of the building, said Trachtenberg asked him if the building was for sale. He said it was, but it would be a process and that is what this is. It is a process where we hear people's concerns and address those concerns. Traffic will be a lot less than when it was a grocery store. Something will go in that building at some point. It will not be vacant forever. Gianelli said he can put something in there, like a shoe store, he doesn't care, but when it's cutting meat, that must be inspected. Gianelli asked Trachtenberg why he would still be interested after hearing what he has heard. Trachtenberg said because he wants to bring jobs and prosperity to the area. He has nothing to hide, there is nothing

going on in the facility currently or in this facility that is offensive. It is about creating jobs and growth in the area and that is what he is trying to do: Trying to utilize Minnesota agriculture. He is governed by the FDA, and not inspected. It is not FSIS, he owns multiple facilities that are governed by FSIS, that is a USDA inspector that is in the facility 40 hours a week. They are welcome to come. This concept that he is going to run a different house in Marshall than in Sanborn, which is under FSIS and under constant inspection, is wrong. St. Aubin said it is not that she doesn't want a manufacturing plant in Marshall, it is the location. All the money spent by the City to provide a really good area with all the sewer and water and the streets out there. The City has worked very hard and there are buildings out there that are not occupied so her concern is why should there be a precedent and change something to allow manufacturing and then have people say you did it for one, you can for another. You have worked very hard with the zoning commission to provide locations that are residential and that are very nice, and we love to live there, why make an exception for one person. If you do, you will have to make exceptions for others and there you will sit with your industrial park. Bayerkohler said we need to remind ourselves that if approved, it stays with the land. Gutman confirmed that is correct if all conditions are complied with. Jane Fox, 508 Country Club Drive, said that grinding meat and chicken to make treats is manufacturing. Everyone knows it is manufacturing, one can say it is not, but it is manufacturing. Manufacturing needs to be in the industrial park. County Fair was not manufacturing. She asks on behalf of herself, her husband and everyone here that you all think about that: if this was in your neighborhood across the street from you, how would you feel and take that to heart. Conditional Use Permit will stay, whether he does or not, and that is very disheartening. Larry Doom, 509 Kathryn Avenue, said he probably will be the only one who will say this has a lot of merit. Look at the closing of the ShopKo building where 50 to 55 jobs were lost and this will bring 25 to 30 jobs. He feels Trachtenberg has assured us there will be no odor and there are conditions. The traffic will be less than County Fair and he feels it will do a lot for the economic development of Marshall. Louwagie said it has been determined tonight that this is manufacturing. The website indicates manufacturing, so there is no choice but to deny and run through the proper channels and rezone. Otherwise we are taking a lot on his word that this does not have a smell. The City should consider a company that will verify if there is an odor. If this commission does decide to recommend approval, it needs to make sure we are not putting the City in a situation that we cannot get back out of. Edblom went over the process and said the recommendation goes to City Council for a decision. Louwagie said he would like a condition for a smell study be done. Fox MADE A MOTION, SECOND BY Steen, to close the public hearing ALL VOTED IN FAVOR OF THE MOTION. Knieff said this notice was in the paper at least twice. He said he was a general maintenance supervisor for 5.5 years in Georgetown, Delaware. They process live chickens in one door and frozen out the other door and it smelled better there than it does here. Carstens said Marshall is built on a slew. He works over at the mall at SWWC and that pond they have there is not pleasant smell. He said Trachtenberg has clarified that there would be very little if any smell. He said if they do not meet one of these 7 conditions, the City will pull the permit and they can't operate. He agrees with Carr that there will not be a retail store that will go in there. Steen said she understands that in deciding to issue or not issue in a certain area, there are obvious things that can be detrimental, public health, morals and welfare but also it should not impair the integrity and character of the zoning district. It needs to make sense. And this is not a business that is appropriate for that area; there are appropriate buildings in Marshall that are in the industrial park which is where this business should be. She doesn't think the City should spot approve areas for business. She wants growth in Marshall too, but this business needs to be in the industrial park. Edblom asked about cooking. Trachtenberg said no cooking; low temp dehydration is not cooking.

Edblom asked how long Trachtenberg had been in business. Trachtenberg said 11 years. Edblom asked if he has ever been written up by the city he is located in. Trachtenberg said no. Edblom asked if Marshall ever contacted his city. Anderson said we did not, but he cannot speak for the EDA. Edblom asked if traffic is restricted on 4th Street. Anderson said it is a State Aid route, it is a 10-ton road. Edblom said manufacturing may not mean the same to everyone. Knieff MADE A MOTION, SECOND BY Fox to recommend to City Council an approval as recommend by staff. Motion passed with 4 Yah 2 Nay Edblom and Steen voted no.

4. A MOTION WAS MADE BY Fox, SECOND BY Lee to adjourn the meeting. ALL VOTED IN FAVOR. Chairman Edblom declared the meeting adjourned.
