The regular meeting of the Common Council of the City of Marshall was held December 12, 2023, at City Hall, 344 West Main Street. The meeting was called to order at 5:30 P.M. by Mayor Robert Byrnes. Jump In, Make A Splash Committee

Sharon Hanson introduced Marc Klaith and Amanda Schwarz from the Jump In, Make a Splash Committee. Following the successful referendum held on November 7, 2023, that would provide \$18.3 million in funds through the extension of the sales tax in Marshall. The Jump In, Make A Splash Committee, which was a community-based organization, was formed in partnership with the Marshall Community Foundation, and City of Marshall, with the intention of offering residents and local businesses sponsorship and special recognition opportunities. Additional funds will help support additional amenities such as a body slide flume, lily pad water walk, climbing wall and more shade structures. All donations are being made to the Marshall Community Foundation, who is also managing the aquatic center fund. The Marshall Community Foundation had already pledged \$75,000 towards additional amenities for the Aquatic Center project.

Annual Convention and Visitor Bureau Update and Contract Renewal

Cassi Weiss, Convention and Visitors Bureau Director, presented her annual update for the CVB and the Red Baron Arena and Expo. Highlights of the presentation included a summary of the marketing campaigns done in 2023, a commercial spot that was produced and aired on KELO Land, major events such as the Made in Minnesota Beer and Wine Festival; Prairie Jam; Sounds of Summer and the Fairbanks Ice Dogs games. The CVB donated approximately \$99,000 in grants, cash, and in-kind marketing during 2023. The CVB hopes to increase the number of tournaments and events that are hosted in Marshall and also to continue to build partnerships with local businesses and local outdoor associations.

Motion made by Councilmember Moua-Leske, Seconded by Councilmember Schafer to approve the contract renewal between the Convention and Visitors Bureau and the City of Marshall as well as the lease agreement between the Convention and Visitors Bureau and the Red Baron Arena and Expo. Voting Yea: Mayor Byrnes, Councilmember Schafer, Councilmember Meister, Councilmember Schroeder, Councilmember Alcorn, Councilmember Moua-Leske, Councilmember Lozinski. The motion **Carried. 7-0.**

Project ST-015 / SP 4204-40): 2025 MnDOT College Drive Improvement Project - Consider Resolution for Municipal Consent and Layout Approval

MnDOT Project Manager, Jesse Vlaminck presented the MnDOT plans to complete State Project 4204-40, Reconstruction of Hwy 19 from 700' west of Marlene Street through Bruce Street. In accordance with Minnesota Statute 161.164, MnDOT had submitted for City approval the project's Final Layout Flap, identified as Layout Flap No. 2A, S.P. 4204-40. The City's approval was required for the project because it altered access (Many accesses will be closed and /or altered to right in right out) and required acquisition of permanent rights of way (permanent right of way would be obtained to bring city alleys to city access standards). Mayor Byrnes explained that part of this extension was at the behest of the city. The city to help reduce cost would have liked to have the utility work done at the same time as the reconstruction instead of having to create a new project and generate additional expenses. The RAISE grant would also cover a number of the expenses for both the City of Marshall and MnDOT. Councilmember Schafer asked for clarification on how far down that 700 feet would actually cover. Vlaminck indicated the 700 feet would terminate roughly at the entrance to Buffalo Ridge Concrete. The reconstruction would also be adding paint for shared bike lanes out to the Camden Regional Trail at the Lyon County Fairgrounds.

Motion made by Councilmember Schafer, Seconded by Councilmember Lozinski to approve Resolution 23-xxx for the consent and layout approval for MnDOT 2025 College Drive Improvement Project. Voting Yea: Mayor Byrnes, Councilmember Schafer, Councilmember Schroeder, Councilmember Alcorn, Councilmember Moua-Leske, Councilmember Lozinski. Voting Nay: Councilmember Meister. The motion **Carried. 6-1.**

Consider Approval of Amendments to the Personnel Policy Manual Relating to Sick Leave Policies

Sheila Dubs explained to the City Council that Minnesota had recently passed new legislation that provided for earned sick

amendments to comply with the new law. Additionally, a new sick leave policy applicable to part-time, paid-on-call, temporary, and seasonal staff was also required to comply with the new law. The Personnel Committee reviewed the policy on December 5 and recommended approval. Dubs detailed that the approval of the policy, with an effective date of 01/01/2024, would bring the City into compliance with the new law. The policy revision would not provide employees with additional sick leave accruals; full-time employees would continue to accrue at the same rates. Rather, the policy would cross-designate the first 48 hours of sick leave used per calendar year as earned sick and safe time leave. Only those first 48 hours of sick leave used per year will be subject to the requirements of the new law. The remaining sick leave accruals used by an employee will be subject to our existing requirements. Part-time, paid-on-call, temporary, and seasonal staff that worked 80 hours in a calendar year will earn one hour of sick leave for every 30 hours worked, up to a maximum of 48 hours per year. Employees may carry-over a maximum of 80 hours of sick leave from one calendar year to the next. The policy would be administered in accordance with state law. Dubs also introduced an amendment to the current employee policy to include sick leave to be used following the death of an employee's spouse/domestic partner, child, or stepchild, up to a maximum of 40 hours. The sick leave, if used must be used consecutively with funeral leave and must be pre-approved by the supervisor.

Motion made by Councilmember Schroeder, Seconded by Councilmember Lozinski to approve the amendments to the Personnel Policy Manual relating to sick leave policies. Voting Yea: Mayor Byrnes, Councilmember Schafer, Councilmember Meister, Councilmember Schroeder, Councilmember Alcorn, Councilmember Moua-Leske, Councilmember Lozinski. The motion **Carried. 7-0.**

<u>Public Use of Cannabinoid Products and Prohibition on Smoking of Cannabinoid and Tobacco Products in City Parks and</u> <u>City Recreational Facilities -Introduction of Ordinance</u>

Pamela Whitmore provided background information on the three ordinances being introduced. At the October Legislative & Ordinance Committee meeting ("L&O"), the Committee discussed the use of Cannabinoid Products in public spaces in the City of Marshall. The L&O Committee received an update from the City Attorney and City Administrator regarding the Community Services Advisory Board's recommendation related to use in public spaces. The L&O committee also reviewed the County ordinance prohibiting public use of cannabinoid products in the County. The L&O Committee directed staff to update city ordinances to mirror the county ordinance for a prohibition on use of cannabinoid products in city parks and at recreational facilities and amend current ordinances to prohibit tobacco smoking and vaping in parks and recreational facilities as well. Section 46-29 was the ordinance created to address the direction from city council to prohibit all smoking and vaping in city parks and recreational facilities. Chapter 42 was amended to prohibit use of cannabinoid products on public streets but still does allow smoking on public streets. Councilmember Meister asked about the use of lobelia in the definition of "electronic delivery device". Whitmore retorted that the definition used was what the State of Minnesota uses, and legislation decided to include lobelia as part of it. Councilmember Lozinski commented that the L&O Committee opted to ban all smoking in parks to reduce the questions from the Police Department about what was being smoked, if everything was banned it didn't matter what the product was. The matter of enforcing a county ordinance would also be cleared up by the city having its own ordinance in place and not testing jurisdictional boundaries.

Motion made by Councilmember Meister, Seconded by Councilmember Lozinski to introduce the three ordinances amending Chapter 46, Chapter 42 and Chapter 10 of the City Code. Voting Yea: Mayor Byrnes, Councilmember Schafer, Councilmember Meister, Councilmember Schroeder, Councilmember Alcorn, Councilmember Moua-Leske, Councilmember Lozinski. The motion **Carried. 7-0.**

SP 5105-30 TH 59 Detour Agreement – Consider Resolution Authorizing Execution of MnDOT Agreement No. 1055122

Jason Anderson said the proposed detour agreement between MnDOT and the City of Marshall provided payment by the State to the City for road life consumed on the portion of S. Saratoga Street that was proposed to be used as a Temporary Trunk Highway detour. The project was outlined as follows:

1. The State was going to perform concrete pavement rehabilitation and diamond grinding construction upon, along, and adjacent to Trunk Highway No. 59 from 201st Street to Trunk Highway No. 23 in 2024 under State Project No. 5105-30 (T.H. 59=17).

2. The State required a detour to carry T.H. 59 traffic on Saratoga Street during the construction.

3. The City was willing to maintain the T.H. 59 detour.

4. The State was willing to reimburse the City for the road life consumed by the detour and detour maintenance as hereinafter set forth.

5. Minnesota Statutes § 471.59, subdivision 10, § 161.25, and § 161.20, subdivision 2(b), authorize the parties to enter into this Agreement.

Per MnDOT, the dates of the detour route are July 8-August 9, 2024, but are subject to change. Councilmember Meister asked how MnDOT determined the reimbursement amount for road life consumed. Anderson stated that MnDOT had a formula that was used to determine road wear and tear during a detour. Hanson asked about traffic around the Walmart/Hitching Post intersection. Anderson said that MnDOT planned to work under traffic for that section of road, possibly by closing one or two lanes at a time.

Motion made by Councilmember Lozinski, Seconded by Councilmember Alcorn to approve Resolution 23-xxx authorizing the execution of MnDOT agreement number 1055122. Voting Yea: Mayor Byrnes, Councilmember Schafer, Councilmember Meister, Councilmember Schroeder, Councilmember Alcorn, Councilmember Moua-Leske, Councilmember Lozinski. The motion **Carried. 7-0.**

Project AP-003: Airport Snow Removal Equipment (SRE) Building - Project Update and Authorization to Advertise for Bids

The City of Marshall Public Works desired to construct a new Snow Removal Equipment (SRE) and Maintenance Equipment Storage Building at the Southwest Minnesota Regional Airport. The existing building does not adequately accommodate all airport maintenance equipment storage needs. The new facility was planned to be constructed on the East Building Area of the airport along Madrid Circle. The Project has been identified on the Airport CIP since FFY2011. The following is the most recent timeline received from TKDA, the City's consultant:

- Advertise for Bids December 15, 2023
- Bid Opening January 16, 2023
- Contract Award February 2024
- Material Order (Materials on hand) March 2024 (City will need to carry costs until grant award which will likely be no sooner than 09/2024.)
- Grant Applications March 2024
- Notice to Proceed June 2024
- Construction Completion July 2025

The Public Improvement/Transportation Committee met with the Airport Commission on 12/5/2023 to review the proposed SRE building plans with TKDA and City staff and also at separate, additional PI/T Committee meeting on 12/12/2023. TKDA removed a number of elements from the original bid that had failed and have worked extensively with the Airport Commission and city staff to ensure the designs still met the needs of the facility. Councilmember Meister mentioned that even with a re-bid the project was still very expensive and the hope would be to bring in additional airport

Motion made by Councilmember Lozinski, Seconded by Councilmember Schafer to approve authorization to advertise for bids for Project AP-003: Airport Snow Removal Equipment Building. Voting Yea: Mayor Byrnes, Councilmember Schafer, Councilmember Schroeder, Councilmember Alcorn, Councilmember Moua-Leske, Councilmember Lozinski. Voting Nay: Councilmember Meister. The motion **Carried 6-1**.

Consider Approval of the 5 Year Capital Improvement Plan (CIP)

E.J. Moberg presented the Capital Improvement Plan. The CIP was a fluid document and was updated on an annual basis. Nothing in the plan was set in stone. An example was given by Moberg for a motor grader that was re-allocated to be spread out over three years instead of all at once. The 5-year CIP served as a guide that lays out capital expenditures over the next 5 years by department as well as by the funding sources. The CIP was meant as a guide for Council and Management and does not give authorization for the projects until formally approved based on the City's Purchasing Policy.

Motion made by Councilmember Schafer, Seconded by Councilmember Alcorn to approve the five-year capital improvement plan. Voting Yea: Mayor Byrnes, Councilmember Schafer, Councilmember Meister, Councilmember Schroeder, Councilmember Alcorn, Councilmember Moua-Leske, Councilmember Lozinski. The motion **Carried. 7-0.**

Resolution Adopting 2024 Budget

Moberg gave a brief overview of the budget items, and that staff were recommending no change from the preliminary budget that was passed on September 12, 2023.

Motion made by Councilmember Schafer, Seconded by Councilmember Meister to approve Resolution 23-xxx adopting the budget for 2024. Voting Yea: Mayor Byrnes, Councilmember Schafer, Councilmember Meister, Councilmember Schroeder, Councilmember Alcorn, Councilmember Moua-Leske, Councilmember Lozinski. The motion **Carried. 7-0.**

Consider Resolution Adopting Tax Levy for 2024

At the August 29th Council work session, staff proposed a property tax levy increase of 13.63%. The main contributing factors for this increase were increased personnel and health insurance costs, an increase in debt related levies from 2023 to 2024 and increasing the levy for capital equipment after using grant dollars to lower that levy for 2023. Staff continued to work to reduce the increase for the preliminary levy that that was set on September 12th. The 2024 preliminary levy was set at \$8,988,670, which was an increase of 9.9% from the 2023 levy. Staff recommended no change to the final levy to be set at \$8,988,670, which is an increase of 9.9% from the 2023 levy.

Motion made by Councilmember Schafer, Seconded by Councilmember Moua-Leske to approve Resolution 23-xxx adopting the tax levy of 9.90% for 2024. Voting Yea: Mayor Byrnes, Councilmember Schafer, Councilmember Meister, Councilmember Schroeder, Councilmember Alcorn, Councilmember Moua-Leske, Councilmember Lozinski. The motion **Carried. 7-0.**

Consider Approval of 2024 Workers Compensation Insurance and Volunteer-Accident Plan

The workers compensation insurance covers City employees, elected and appointed officials, volunteer firefighters, Library employees and Marshall Municipal Utilities employees. The Safety Committee continues to meet and discuss safety improvements and/or changes on a regular basis. Workers' compensation rates for 2024 had increased an average of 36.1% overall, because of increased payroll in 2024 and payout on claims. The volunteer-accident plan through CHUBB-Federal Insurance Company had remained constant at a \$2,793 premium from 2023 and 2024 coverage. Councilmember Schroeder asked about the service provided by BITCO. Dubs said that Laura Wing dealt with BITCO the most but when

ad to work with BITCO they were very responsive and good to work with.

Motion made by Councilmember Schroeder, Seconded by Councilmember Lozinski to approve the workers compensation insurance and volunteer-accident plan for 2024. Voting Yea: Mayor Byrnes, Councilmember Schafer, Councilmember Meister, Councilmember Schroeder, Councilmember Alcorn, Councilmember Moua-Leske, Councilmember Lozinski. The motion **Carried. 7-0.**

Consider Appointment to Boards, Commission, Bureaus, and Authorities

Voting Yea: Mayor Byrnes, Councilmember Schafer, Councilmember Meister, Councilmember Schroeder, Councilmember Alcorn, Councilmember Moua-Leske, Councilmember Lozinski. The motion **Carried. 7-0.**

Subject:	Consider Tax Abatement Application by Rebound Partners for Proposed Hotel Project
Background Information:	 The City of Marshall received a request for financial assistance through tax abatement to assist with financing a portion of the eligible costs related to the construction of an approximate 84-room Hampton Inn by Hilton hotel in the City. Total project costs are estimated at \$14,8850,164. Based on the Core Distinction Group Hotel Study, it was identified that 60-70 room, upper midscale hotel is needed in Marshall to accommodate the displaced lodging demand.
	In addition, past surveys of businesses, sports associations, visitors bureau have indicated that lack of rooms curtails business travel and prevents visitors from staying in the city.
	In a review of the scope and projected financial performance of the project, it was determined that the project meets public purpose and warrants public assistance to proceed as proposed.
	Based on financing assumptions and analysis, without financial assistance, the project would not be feasible due to the inability of the project to support total development costs with projected operating revenues and current market conditions.
	Rebound Partners is currently working to secure bank financing and equity for the project. The developer is requesting financial assistance to include in the sources of funds available for the project.
	A public hearing on this tax abatement application will be conducted prior to the recommended staff actions to further explain the project and provide considerations.

That any public assistance related to hotel development would only be paid to developer following construction, completion, certification of meeting business subsidy agreement provisions and payment of the full property taxes.

Background Information:	The Adult Community Center is proposing renewal of updated contracts with the local senior citizen organization, the Marshall Area Senior Citizen's, Inc, and the onsite Senior Dining organization, Lutheran Social Services. Both contracts went under review in 2023. The LSS contract has remained largely the same since early 2000's. Input was received from LSS onsite staff, LSS regional manager, the LSS State Director of operations as well as the Senior Finance Manager, the Adult Community Center Commission, and Marshall's City Attorney's office regarding appropriate and necessary updates. The updated enclosed contract incorporates feedback from each group, with two main points of interest. The first includes protective legal updates based on recommendations from the City Attorney's office. The second regards the payment format and is at the request of LSS. LSS has historically paid a monthly utility fee per meal prepared onsite. Payments have varied each month with rates in the past 24 months ranging from \$215-\$540, with the average over the last 24 months being \$440. LSS proposed a flat monthly rate of \$475, a format that allows for a consistent budget of expenses for both parties. All parties involved are supportive of this change. We are requesting approval for renewal of the lease for 2024, using the updated contract.
Fiscal Impact:	The MASC, Inc contract has remained largely unchanged for 35 years. Input was received from the MASC, Inc Board of Directors, the ACC Commission, ACC affiliated City Staff, and Marshall's City Attorney's office regarding appropriate and necessary updates. The enclosed proposed contract includes updates based on feedback from each of these groups. There are two points of interest concerning these changes. The first is that the changes are largely based on feedback from the City Attorney's office to incorporate necessary legal verbiage. The second is that this contract would not need to be renewed annually as historically has been and would only need to be updated if either the MASC, Inc Board or the City of Marshall requests. We are requesting approval for approval of the contract beginning January 1, 2024.

The Marshall Area Senior Citizens, Inc. Adult Community Center Operations Agreement

THIS AGREEMENT is made and entered into January 1, 2024, by and between the City of Marshall, Minnesota (the "City"), the Adult Community Center Commission of the City of Marshall, (the "Commission"), a body politic, and the Marshall Area Senior Citizens, Inc., (the "Corporation").

WHEREAS, the City of Marshall owns an Adult Community Center located at 107 South 4th Street, Marshall, Minnesota, and

WHEREAS, the Marshall City Council established the Adult Community Center Commission (the "Commission"), to operate and maintain the City's Adult Community Center; and

WHEREAS, Marshall City Code Article 2 -VI-11 authorizes the Commission to enter into contracts related to the management and operation of the Adult Community Center, after receiving approval of the contract by the City Council; and

WHEREAS, the Corporation is an organization of citizens from the Marshall area which promotes activities for older adults, as well as, provides some financial support to the Adult Community Center, and

WHEREAS, the Corporation and the Commission desire to maintain their long-standing relationship.

NOW, THEREFORE, in consideration of the mutual agreements set forth herein, the parties agree as follows:

The Commission and the Corporation shall have the following duties, responsibilities, and privileges:

Commission Duties

- 1. The Commission, either by or on behalf of the City shall schedule hours of operation for the Adult Community Center.
- 2. The Commission shall maintain the building and keep in good order, working with the City to make such repairs as are necessary. The Commission shall provide all janitorial services. The Corporation, as a facility user, agrees to use reasonable care in its use, including picking up after themselves or from their events, and agreeing not to deposit any trash, or garbage on any part of the premises other than in designated receptacles. Normal reasonable wear and tear is expected.
- 3. The Commission shall follow its normal practice for collection for revenues from non-Corporation related events, including receptions, family celebrations, and other events managed by, but not directly related to the Corporation. The Corporation will notify the Commission as soon as the Corporation books a non-corporation event and shall provide the Commission with the contact information for the coordinators of the non-corporation events.

Corporation Duties

 The Corporation shall pay \$550.00 by the 10th day of each month. The Agreement shall become effective January 1, 2024, and continue until December 31, 2024 ("initial term"). This Agreement shall be automatically extended for an unlimited number of one-year periods, unless, on or before December 31, 2024 (for the initial term), or thereafter on or before the December 31 of any subsequent term, either Party provides to the other written notice of its desire not to automatically renew this Agreement. Either party may request a meet and confer with the other party by December 1 of any term to discuss any of the terms of this Agreement before the next automatic renewal period.

- 2. In addition to monthly rent, Corporation investment fund earnings paid to the Commission by the MASC, Inc. Foundation shall be designated for facility operations.
- 3. Special events sponsored or coordinated by the Corporation shall be scheduled with the Commission coordinator's approval.
- 4. The Corporation shall retain proceeds from Corporation-sponsored fundraising events.

Relationship

The Corporation is performing independent functions and responsibilities from the Commission. The Corporation and its personnel, if any, or volunteers, are independent contractors and not employees of the Commission. The Corporation has no authority to make any binding commitments or obligations on behalf of the Commission except to the extent expressly provided herein.

Indemnity and Duty to Defend

Each party shall be responsible for its own acts and omissions, and the acts and omissions of its own employees, agents, representative or volunteers, and the results thereof to the extent authorized by law. The Corporation agrees to defend, indemnify and hold the Commission, its officers, employees, and agents harmless from any and all liability, claims, causes of action, judgments, damages, losses, costs, or expenses, including reasonable attorney's fees, resulting directly or indirectly from the negligent acts or omissions of the Corporation or of its agents or contractors related to the performance of this Agreement. The Commission agrees to defend, indemnify and hold the Corporation, its officers, employees, and agents harmless from any and all liability, claims, causes of action, judgments, damages, losses, costs, or expenses, including reasonable attorney's fees, resulting directly or indirectly from the negligent acts or omissions of the Commission or of its agents or contractors related to the performance of this Agreement. The party seeking to be indemnified and defended shall provide timely notice to the other party when the claim is brought. The indemnifying party shall retain all rights and defenses available to the indemnified party. Nothing in this Agreement constitutes a waiver of any limits on liability, immunities, or exemptions from liability available to either party under Minnesota Statutes, chapter 466 or other law.

Termination

- 1. Mutual Termination. The parties, by mutual written agreement, may terminate this Agreement at any time.
- Corporation Termination. The Corporation may terminate this Agreement in the event of a breach of the Agreement by the Commission upon providing thirty (30) days' written notice to the Commission, so long as the Commission is given the opportunity to cure the breach within the thirty (30) day period between the termination notice and the effective date of termination.
- 3. Commission Termination. The Commission may terminate this Agreement by providing thirty (30) days' written notice at any time for breach upon written notice to the Corporation, so long as the Corporation is given the opportunity to cure the breach within the thirty (30) day period between the termination notice and effective date of termination.

4. Either party may terminate this agreement for any reason, or no reason, upon three (3) months' written notice to the other.

Upon termination of this Agreement, all electronic and hard files and their content related to the Adult Community Center shall be provided to the Commission at no cost.

General Terms

- 1. The Adult Community Center shall be open to members and non-members of the Corporation.
- 2. Compliance with Laws. Corporation shall exercise due professional care to comply with applicable federal, state, and local laws, rules, ordinances, and regulations.
- 3. Choice of Law and Venue. This Agreement shall be governed by and construed in accordance with the laws of the state of Minnesota. Any disputes, controversies, or claims arising out of this Agreement shall be heard in the state or federal courts of Minnesota, and both parties waive any objection to the jurisdiction of these courts, whether based on convenience or otherwise.
- 4. Assignment. The Corporation may not assign any right, privilege or license conferred by this agreement.
- 5. Amendment. Notwithstanding any other provision hereof, the parties hereto may by mutual consent and in writing agree to modifications and additions hereto.
- 6. Data Practices Act Compliance. Any and all data provided to the Corporation, received from the Corporation, created, collected, received, stored, used, maintained, or disseminated by Corporation pursuant to this Agreement shall be administered in accordance with, and is subject to the requirements of the Minnesota Government Data Practices Act, Minnesota Statutes Chapter 13, and specifically Section 13.495. This paragraph does not create a duty on the part of the Corporation to provide access to public data to the public if the public data are available from the Commission.
- 7. No Discrimination. The Corporation agrees not to discriminate in providing Services under this Agreement on the basis of race, color, sex, creed, national origin, disability, age, sexual orientation, status with regard to public assistance, or religion. Violation of any part of this provision may lead to termination of this Agreement.

- 8. Waiver. Any waiver by any party of a breach of any provisions of this Agreement shall not affect in any respect the validity of the remainder of this Agreement.
- 9. Survivability. All covenants, indemnities, guarantees, releases, representations, and warranties of either party or the parties and any undischarged obligations of the parties arising prior to the expiration or termination of this Agreement, shall survive such expiration or termination.
- 10. Severability. The invalidity or unenforceability of any provision of this Agreement shall not affect the validity or enforceability of any other provision. Any invalid or unenforceable provision shall be deemed severed from this Agreement to the extent of its invalidity or unenforceability, and this Agreement shall be construed and enforced as if the Agreement did not contain that particular provision to the extent of its invalidity or unenforceability.

CITY OF MARSHALL ADULT COMMUNITY CENTER LEASE AGREEMENT

THIS AGREEMENT is made and entered into this _____ day of _____, 20___ by and between the City of Marshall, Minnesota, (the "City") and Lutheran Social Services, ("LSS"), together (the "Parties").

RECITALS

WHEREAS, the City is the owner of the building located in the City of Marshall and referred to herein as the Adult Community Center;

WHEREAS LSS is organized and exists for the purpose of providing meals for qualifying individuals.

WHEREAS LSS agrees to lease and use a portion of the Adult Community Center for the purpose of installing equipment for the provision of meals and for the preparation and consumption of meals.

NOW THEREFORE, in consideration of the mutual obligations and agreements of the parties herein, and other good and valuable consideration, the receipt and sufficiency of which is hereby acknowledged, the parties hereby agree as follows:

GENERAL TERMS AND CONDITIONS

- 1. <u>**Purpose.**</u> City hereby leases to, and LSS hereby accepts, space within the Adult Community Center, as set forth in Paragraph 4 of this agreement for the following purposes:
 - a. To prepare food for the ongoing nutrition program, and to store and install equipment related to the provision of services for the food program;
 - b. To utilize the designated serving area and consumption area for the patrons of the nutrition program;
 - c. To utilize a designated preparation area to provide meals to be delivered off site; and
 - d. To utilize a designated area to conduct daily administrative tasks and store administrative supplies.
- 2. <u>Term</u>. This lease shall run from January 1 of 2024 and terminating on December 31 of 2024.
- 3. <u>Fees</u>. LSS will pay to the City as rent for said premises the sum of \$475 per month which sum shall include the cost to the City for utility services (gas, water, sewer, garbage, local phone service and electricity). Said amount shall be payable monthly on or before the last day of the month from January 1, 2024 to December 31, 2024. The rental amount provided for in this paragraph may be adjusted upwards by the City upon sixty days notice to LSS such adjustments to be based on increases in the use of utility services.
- 4. <u>Allowable Uses.</u> LSS shall be allowed the following uses of the premises:
 - a. <u>Kitchen</u> located in the Adult Community Center from the hours of 7:00 a.m. to 1:00 p.m.
 - b. <u>Dining Room</u> located in the Adult Community Center from the hours of 7:00 a.m. to 12:30 p.m., Monday through Friday. Any other hours of use of the Adult Community Center by LSS shall require prior approval of the Adult Community Center. Adult Community Center maintains their right to utilize the kitchen and dining area or permit use to others during the above-mentioned timeframes with advance communication to both the user and LSS.
 - c. <u>Additional Use Space</u> LSS may utilize the area adjacent to the dining room and kitchen to store food, administrative supplies and equipment, among other items in support of the kitchen and meal service activities. This area will be shared with the ACC on an as needed basis.

- 5. <u>Building Access</u>. The City will issue keycards to LSS Staff for entry into the Adult Community Center. LSS staff shall be responsible for lost, unreturned, and/or damaged keycards. The replacement fee shall be \$10.00 dollars per card. Key cards assigned to LSS may only be used by the LSS assigned staff unless the City provides express permission for the transfer in writing. Unauthorized key card transfer is strictly prohibited and will be considered a material breach of this Agreement subject to any applicable remedies. LSS shall be responsible for any costs incurred due to an unauthorized key transfer, including but not limited to re-keying of the premises.
- 6. <u>Insurance and Indemnification</u>. LSS will provide general liability insurance for personal injury and property damage in at least the minimum amount of \$1,000,000 Per Claim, and \$3,000,000 Aggregate. LSS shall list City as "additional insured" on said Policy and shall provide the City with proof of such coverage. LSS shall provide any and all worker's compensation insurance required by law for the coverage of its employees, agents, volunteers and servants. It is specifically understood by and between the parties that all times under this agreement and all employees, agents, volunteers and servants of LSS who participate in the meals program or in any other way authorized by this agreement shall be deemed to be employees of LSS and not of the City of Marshall, for the purpose of determining worker's compensation liability. LSS shall defend, indemnify, and hold harmless the City, its officers, employees, contractors, and agents against any and all claims, demands, actions or causes of action of whatsoever kind arising or resulting either directly or indirectly from the use, occupancy, or licensing of the Center by LSS, its sublicensee, contractors, subcontractors, agents, officers, volunteers or employees.
- 7. Equipment. LSS will insure all equipment belonging to them in amounts and under terms sufficient so as to hold the City harmless from any liability loss to said equipment. A complete inventory of equipment provided and used by LSS at the Adult Community Center will be provided to the City at the beginning of the contract period, and any changes thereto will be promptly reported in writing to the City. <u>City and Third-Party Equipment Use</u>. LSS shall make its equipment available to the City for use by it or other such persons or organizations as it may designate upon reasonable notice and at such times and under such conditions as the parties may agree to and the circumstances may warrant.
 - a. <u>Equipment Maintenance and Repair</u>. Other than as provided in Section b., LSS shall at all times be responsible for the maintenance, repair and replacement of equipment belonging to LSS or belonging to the City and used by LSS., LSS shall keep LSS-owned and City-owned but LSS used equipment in a safe and sanitary condition and shall be responsible for custodial activity associated with and resulting from their meals program. The entire rental area that is used by LSS must be cleaned on a daily basis.
 - b. <u>City-Owned Equipment.</u> The following equipment is owned by the City of Marshall and is to be maintained and/or replaced as needed by the City of Marshall:
 - i. Hobart Dishwasher,
 - ii. McCall 2 section freezer 4045F,
 - iii. Convection oven, Stainless steel worktable,
 - iv. Hobart mixer A200,
 - v. Hot food table E-303-25P6,
 - vi. Refrigerator COR155d, and
 - vii. Vulcan 6 burner oven.
 - c. <u>Equipment Security</u>. In the event the City rents the Adult Community Center Kitchen to a party other than LSS, LSS shall secure their equipment in such a manner as to not be accessible by anyone other than LSS or City Staff. The City is not responsible for any lost, stolen, or damaged LSS equipment not secured prior to third-party rental and use of the kitchen.
- 8. <u>Custodial Responsibilities</u>. The City shall be responsible for and provide necessary and reasonable maintenance and custodial services in and around the Adult Community Center. Spaces used and rented by LSS must be cleaned on a daily basis and in compliance with any requirements under LSS' certification from the Department of Health.

- 9. <u>Applicable Laws, Rules, and Regulations</u>. LSS leadership and staff shall adhere to all applicable local, state, and federal laws and regulations. LSS leadership and Staff shall adhere to all applicable food safety laws and regulations. LSS leadership and staff shall adhere to the LSS and City Codes of Conduct and Performance and Conduct Standards respectively. If there are conflicts between the LSS and City codes of conduct, LSS Code of Conduct shall control for LSS employees and volunteers.
- 10. <u>Assignment and Subletting Prohibited</u>. LSS may not assign any right, privilege or license conferred by this agreement; nor may it sublet or encumber any portion of the lease premises without first obtaining written consent of the City.
- 11. <u>Amendment</u>. Notwithstanding any other provision hereof, the parties hereto may by mutual consent and in writing agree to modifications and additions hereto.
- 12. <u>Termination</u>. This agreement may be terminated prior to expiration of the term hereof as follows:
 - a. By Mutual written agreement of the Parties; or
 - b. <u>Upon a Material Breach of the Agreement by the other party (the Breaching Party)</u>. A material breach occurs when a breach is not cured to the Aggrieved Party's reasonable satisfaction within sixty (60) days after the aggrieved Party provides the Breaching Party with written notice of the breach. In the event either Party gives written notice of breach, the Aggrieved Party alleging the breach may be required by the Breaching Party to specify in writing the exact nature of the alleged breach, specific incidents that support the claim of the alleged breach, and the specific actions that the Aggrieved party alleging the breach deems reasonable and appropriate to cure the alleged breach; or:
 - c. <u>By at Least 180 Days Written Notice</u>. Either party shall provide a minimum of at least 180 days written notice prior to the effective date of termination.
- **13.** <u>Breach</u>. In the event of a material breach as outlined in Paragraph 12(c), the Parties may pursue any and all available remedies at law or in equity under the laws of State of Minnesota. All available remedies in this Agreement or by law shall be cumulative, and the exercise of one right or remedy by the applicable party shall not impair its right to exercise any other right or remedy.
- 14. <u>Surrender</u>. In the event the Parties terminate this Agreement with no intent to renew, LSS shall peaceably surrender the leased space and remove all debris and personal property from the leased space. LSS shall not remove any of the improvements, City-owned appliances, equipment, or fixtures. LSS shall be conclusively deemed to have abandoned any personal property not removed prior to the effective date of the final termination of this Agreement or LSS' surrender of the leased space. The City may dispose of all abandoned debris and personal property. LSS shall be responsible for any disposal costs.
- 15. <u>Notice</u>. Address for any notifications required by this agreement shall be as follows, unless and until written notice of a new address is given by one party to the other:

- 16. **Data.** Where applicable, LSS agrees to abide strictly by Chapter 13, Minnesota Government Data Practice Act (MGDPA), and in particular Minn. Stat.§§ 13.05, subd. 6 and 11; and 13.37, subd. 1 (b) and Minn. Stat §§ 138.17 and 15.17. All of the data created, collected, received, stored, used, maintained, or disseminated by the LSS in performing functions under this Agreement is subject to the requirements of the MGDPA and LSS must comply with those requirements as if it were a governmental entity. If any provision of this Agreement conflicts with the MGDPA or other Minnesota state laws, state law shall control. LSS duties and obligations within this section shall survive the expiration of this Agreement.
- 17. <u>Entire Agreement</u>. This Agreement supersedes any prior or contemporaneous representations or agreements, whether written or oral, between the Parties and contains the entire agreement.
- 18. <u>Governing Law</u>. This Agreement shall be governed by and interpreted in accordance with the laws of the State of Minnesota.
- 19. <u>Waiver</u>. The waiver by either party of any breach or failure to comply with any provision of this Agreement by the other party shall not be construed as or constitute a continuing waiver of such provision or a waiver of any other breach of or failure to comply with any other provision of this Agreement.
- 20. <u>Savings Clause</u>. If a court finds any portion of this Agreement to be contrary to law or invalid, the remainder of the Agreement will remain in full force and effect.

RESOLUTION NO. 23-089

RESOLUTION CALLING PUBLIC HEARINGS ON STREET RECONSTRUCTION PLAN, TAX ABATEMENTS AND ISSUANCE OF GENERAL OBLIGATION BONDS

BE IT RESOLVED By the City Council of the City of Marshall, Lyon County, Minnesota (the "City") as follows:

Section 1. <u>Background</u>.

1.01. The City is authorized under Minnesota Statutes, Section 475.58, subdivision 3b, as amended (the "Street Reconstruction Act"), to prepare a plan for reconstruction or overlay of streets in the City over the next five years, which includes a description of the affected streets and estimated costs (the "Street Reconstruction Plan"), and to issue general obligation bonds to finance the cost of street reconstruction activities described in the Street Reconstruction Plan (the "Street Reconstruction Bonds").

1.02. Pursuant to the Street Reconstruction Act, the City Council is required to hold a public hearing regarding the Street Reconstruction Plan and issuance of Street Reconstruction Bonds.

1.03. The City now finds that it is necessary to prepare a Street Reconstruction Plan setting forth proposed street reconstruction projects in the City for the years 2024 through 2028, and to provide for the issuance of Street Reconstruction Bonds thereunder in an aggregate principal amount not to exceed \$2,000,000, to finance certain costs of the Street Reconstruction Plan, and further finds and determines that it is in the best financial interests of the City that the City hold a public hearing on the Street Reconstruction Plan and the issuance of Street Reconstruction Bonds as provided in the Street Reconstruction Act.

1.04. Under the proposed Street Reconstruction Plan, the City will issue Street Reconstruction Bonds to finance a portion of the costs described in the Street Reconstruction Plan, including the project designated by the City as the South Whitney Street Reconstruction Project (from East College Drive to Jean Avenue).

1.05. The City hereby authorizes its staff and consultants to prepare the Street Reconstruction Plan for street reconstruction projects in the City over the five-year period of 2024 to 2028 in accordance with the Street Reconstruction Act, and to place a copy of the Street Reconstruction Plan on file with the City Administrator by no later than the date of publication of the hearing notice.

1.06. The City is authorized by Minnesota Statutes, Sections 469.1812 through 469.1815 (the "Abatement Act") to grant an abatement of all or a part of the taxes levied by the City on real property within its boundaries (the "Abatement") and to issue general obligation bonds to finance public improvements (the "Abatement Bonds").

1.07. Pursuant to the Abatement Act, before approving a property tax abatement, the City Council is required to hold a public hearing regarding the Abatement.

1.08. The City proposes to issue Abatement Bonds in a principal amount currently estimated not to exceed \$600,000 to finance various public improvements, including parking lot improvements and other improvements to facilities within city parks, including Independence Park and Legion Field.

Section 2. <u>Hearings Scheduled</u>.

2.01. The City Council will hold a public hearing regarding the approval of the Street Reconstruction Plan and issuance of the Street Reconstruction Bonds on Tuesday, January 9, 2024, at approximately 5:30 PM in the Council Chambers of City Hall. The City Clerk is authorized and directed to publish a notice substantially in the form attached hereto as EXHIBIT A, to be published in the official newspaper of the City at least 10 days but not more than 28 days before the date of the hearing.

2.02. The City Council will hold a public hearing regarding the approval of the Abatement and the issuance of the Abatement Bonds on Tuesday, January 9, 2024 at approximately 5:30 PM in the Council Chambers of City Hall. The City Clerk is authorized and directed to publish a notice substantially the form attached as EXHIBIT B, to be published in a newspaper of general circulation in the City more than 10 days but less than 30 days before the date of the hearing.

2.03. City staff and consultants are authorized to take all other actions needed with respect to the Street Reconstruction Plan and the proposed Abatement and the issuance of the Street Reconstruction Bonds and Abatement Bonds before the City Council.

Background Information:	Phase II improvements included a new pipe crossing of the railroad tracks and a ponding improvement north of the tracks and south of the Parkway Addition to manage the stormwater runoff from the developed land south of the BNSF railroad tracks. The developed industrial area south of the railroad tracks had been nearly completely covered by impervious surfacing for many years, and the development pre-dated current requirements for on-site stormwater management. This resulted in development that sheds stormwater quickly without managing the volume of stormwater runoff that is generated. The items on Change Order No. 3 (Final Reconciling Change Order) for the above project
	are the result of final measurements and changes in item quantities during construction. All work has been completed in accordance with the specifications. Attached is a copy of Final Pay Request (No. 3) in the amount of \$146,410.61.
Fiscal Impact:	Change Order No. 3 (Final) results in a contract decrease in the amount of \$15,176.46. The final contract amount was \$699,956.02. The original contract amount was \$703,749.60. The final calculations result in a total contract net decrease of \$3,793.58 or -0.54%.

CITY OF MARSHALL ORDINANCE 23-029

AN ORDINANCE AMENDING CHAPTER 42, OFFENSES AND MISCELLANEOUS PROVISIONS, ARTICLE 42-V, OFFENSES INVOLVING PUBLIC MORALS, SECTION 42-112 CONSUMPTION OF BEER OR LIQUOR ON STREETS AND PUBLIC PROPERTY

The Common Council of the City of Marshall do ordain:

SECTION 1: <u>AMENDMENT</u> "Section 42-112 Consumption Of Beer Or Liquor On Streets And Public Property" of the Marshall Municipal Code is hereby *amended* as follows:

AMENDMENT

Section 42-112 Consumption Of Beer Or Liquor, Liquor or Cannabinoid Products On Streets And Public Property

(a) Definitions.

- (1) For purposes of this section, the term "cannabinoid products" shall have the definitions given to them in Minnesota Statutes, section 342.01, as it may be amended from time to time.
- (2) For purposes of this section, public property is defined as property, real and personal, that is owned, managed or controlled by the City, including, but not limited to: City buildings and all the land thereon, parking lots, parks, pathways and trails, and city rights-of-way consisting of both the traveled portion and the abutting boulevard, sidewalks and trails, and any City personal property, such as motor vehicles, city equipment, and the like.
- (3) For purposes of this section, the term "smoking" means inhaling, exhaling, burning, vaping or carrying any lighted or heated cigar, cigarette, pipe, or any other lighted or heated product containing, made, or derived from nicotine, tobacco, marijuana, cannabis plant, hemp plant, cannabinoid product or other plant, whether natural or synthetic, that is intended for inhalation. Smoking includes carrying or using an activated electronic delivery device.

(b) Prohibition.

- (1) It is unlawful for any person to consume or possess in an unsealed container, beer or liquor on any street or other public property except city parks when and where permission has been specifically granted by a permit issued by the community services department.
- (2) Except for when otherwise allowed under Minnesota Statutes Section 342.09, it is unlawful for any person to consume or smoke any Cannabinoid Product on any street or other public property except at a city sponsored or private

permitted event in a city park when and where permission has been specifically granted by a permit issued by the community services department and the event is a licensed event by the Office of Cannabis Management.

CITY OF MARSHALL ORDINANCE 23-030

AN ORDINANCE PROHIBITING THE SMOKING OR VAPING OF TOBACCO OR CANNABINOID PRODUCTS IN CITY PARKS AND IN RECREATIONAL FACILITIES AND PROHIBITING USE OF OTHER FORMS OF CANNABINOID PRODUCTS IN CITY PARKS OR RECREATIONAL FACILITIES

The Common Council of the City of Marshall do ordain:

SECTION 1: <u>ADOPTION</u> "Section 46-29 Smoking of Cannabinoid or Tobacco Products in City Parks and Recreational Facilities Prohibited; Use of All Forms of Cannabinoid Products Prohibited in City Parks and Recreational Facilities" of the Marshall Municipal Code is hereby *added* as follows:

ADOPTION

Section 46-29 Smoking of Cannabinoid or Tobacco Products in City Parks and Recreational Facilities Prohibited; Use of All Forms of Cannabinoid Products Prohibited in City Parks and Recreational Facilities(*Added*)

(a) Definitions.

- (1) For purposes of this section, the term "cannabinoid products" shall have the definition given in Minnesota Statutes, section 342.01, as it may be amended from time to time.
- (2) For purposes of this section "City Parks" means all City Parks, including trails and sidewalks in and through the City Park, and parking lots adjacent to City Parks and inside all motor vehicles located or parked in a City Park or parking lot adjacent to a City Park.
- (3) For purposes of this section, "electronic delivery device" means a product containing or delivering nicotine, lobelia or any other substance, whether natural or synthetic, intended for human consumption through the inhalation of aerosol or vapor from the product. Electronic delivery device includes, but is not limited to, devices manufactured, marketed or sold as e-cigarettes, ecigars, e-pipes, vape pens, mods, tank systems, or under any other product name or descriptor.
- (4) For purposes of this section, "recreational facility" means major structures such as aquatic centers, swimming pools, arenas, athletic fields and shelters located within lands under the ownership or control of the City of Marshall.
- (5) For purposes of this section, the term "smoking" means inhaling, exhaling, burning, vaping or carrying any lighted or heated cigar, cigarette, pipe, or any other lighted or heated product containing, made, or derived from nicotine, tobacco, marijuana, cannabis plant, hemp plant, cannabinoid product or other

plant, whether natural or synthetic, that is intended for inhalation. Smoking includes carrying or using an activated electronic delivery device.

- (6) For purposes of this section, the term "tobacco products" means any product containing, made, or derived from tobacco that is intended for human consumption, whether chewed, smoked, absorbed, dissolved, inhaled, snorted, sniffed, or ingested by any other means, or any component, part, or accessory of a tobacco product, including, but not limited to cigarettes; cigars; cheroots; stogies; perique's; granulated, plug cut, crimp cut, ready rubbed, and other smoking tobacco; snuff; snuff flour; cavendish; plug and twist tobacco; finecut and other chewing tobacco; shorts; refuse scraps, clippings, cuttings and sweepings of tobacco, and other kinds and forms of tobacco. Tobacco products includes nicotine solution products.
- (b) Prohibition.
 - (1) No person shall smoke or vape cannabinoid products or tobacco products in a city park or at a Recreational Facility.
 - (2) Unless allowed by permit under Section (C) below, no person shall use any form of a cannabinoid product in a city park or at a Recreational Facility.
- (c) Permitted private event. In addition to all other rules, procedures, and conditions for use of the facilities or parks, use of cannabinoid products at a private event, other than smoking which is prohibited in its entirety, may occur at a city park or recreational facility if the applicant:
 - (1) <u>Completes an application for the rental of the city recreational facility or park</u> and discloses on the rental application that cannabinoid products may be used <u>during the private event.</u>
 - (2) The application for rental of a city-owned facility or park for a private event shall be made by the sponsoring individual or organization and shall include the following:
 - a. The name, address, and nature of the sponsoring individual or organization.
 - b. A description of the event, including probable number of people in attendance, dates and hours of the event, and such other information as may be required.
 - c. An attestation that the applicant is familiar with all the terms and provisions of this section and will comply with the same.
 - d. An attestation that no smoking of any cannabinoid or tobacco products will occur, unless otherwise allowed by state law.
 - (3) Applications shall be accompanied by a fee as determined by ordinance or resolution of the city council.
 - (4) Prohibitions. Provision of cannabinoid products shall not be allowed:
 - a. To any person who is not attending the event (no uninvited guests at "private events").
 - b. To any minor person as defined by Minnesota Statutes.
 - c. To any person attending or participating in a youth amateur athletic event held on the premises, in which any participant is 18 years of age or younger.

- d. To any person attending, participating in or in any way being a part of a Minnesota State High School League (MSHSL) related or sponsored function, which includes students of any age, such as athletic or other activities, banquets or celebrations.
- (5) Additional requirements. The city council may impose additional requirements or conditions on renting the recreational facility or city park for a private event as it deems reasonable and appropriate.
- (d) Exceptions to Prohibitions.
 - (1) The prohibitions herein do not apply to (i) a private event held in a City Park or Recreational Facility where the City approved use of cannabinoid products in the rental application as set forth in (c) above or (ii) events licensed by the Office of Cannabis Management to permit on-site consumption of cannabis flower, cannabis products, lower-potency hemp edibles, or hemp-derived consumer products and which otherwise comply with city ordinances and regulations, including obtaining relevant permits or completing required rental applications.
 - (2) This Ordinance does not prohibit smoking by a Native American as part of a traditional Native American spiritual or cultural ceremony. For purposes of this section, a Native American is a person who is a member of an Indian tribe as defined in section 260.755, subdivision 12 of the Minnesota Statutes.
- (e) Additional Regulations. In order to protect public health, safety and welfare, and to preserve the property of the City, the City Administrator or their designee is authorized and directed to establish additional written regulation which shall define, in precise detail, the procedures to be followed in the use of the parks and in the recreational facilities.
- (f) <u>A violation of this section shall be a petty misdemeanor and is punishable in</u> accordance with Section 1-8 of Chapter 1 of this Code, including, but not limited to a fine in the amount set forth in the City's fee schedule.

Section 10-22 Requirements For Owner, Operator Or Manager Of Public Dancing Place

- (a) When a public dance is taking place at a public dancing place, the owner, operator and manager of a public dancing place shall:
 - (1) Have employed a security person that has been approved by the city police department.
 - (2) Maintain the public dancing place free of fighting and other tumultuous conduct.
 - (3) Take positive steps to prohibit persons from entering the premises that are unauthorized to enter the premises by state statutes if intoxicating liquor or <u>cannabinoid products are is</u> sold on such premises.
- (b) The police department shall have the authority to immediately stop all public dancing at a public dancing place that does not meet the requirements of subsection (a) of this section.

Event organizers are to take steps to prohibit persons from entering a premise if intoxicating liquor or cannabinoid products are sold that are unauthorized by state statutes.

The City Council has determined that opportunities exist for commercial businesses in the city to provide services involving the testing, manufacturing, transporting, or delivery and distribution of lower potency hemp edibles and hemp-derived consumer products, which will benefit commerce in the city.

ORDINANCE NO.

CITY OF MARSHALL STATE OF MINNESOTA

AN ORDINANCE AMENDING INTERIM ORDINANCE PROHIBITING THE COMMERCIAL SALE, TESTING, MANUFACTURING, COMMERCIAL CULTIVATING, COMMERCIAL GROWING, TRANSPORTING, DELIVERY, AND DISTRIBUTION OF CANNABINOID PRODUCTS, WHICH INCLUDES CANNABIS PRODUCTS, LOWER-POTENCY HEMP EDIBLES, AND HEMP-DERIVED CONSUMER PRODUCTS IN THE CITY OF MARSHALL

WHEREAS, pursuant to the City of Marshall's City Charter, Section 1.02, and Minnesota Statutes, Section 412.221, subd. 32, the Council "shall have power to provide for the government and good order of the city, . . the protection of public and private property, the benefit of residence, trade, and commerce, and the promotion of health, safety, order, convenience, and the general welfare by . . . ordinances"; and

WHEREAS, the City enacted an interim ordinance to allow the City Council time to study and consider adoption or amendment of reasonable restrictions on the operation or location of commercial businesses related to cannabinoid products, including retail stores in the City of Marshall offering Cannabis products, and Lower-Potency Hemp products, for the purpose of protecting the planning process and the health, safety, and welfare of the public; and

WHEREAS, although certain nuisance factors, including noise and odor, exist from manufacturing from seed to product, the Council has learned that with the Lower-Potency Hemp beverages, the manufacturing is not typically produced from seed to product, but instead, the manufacturers, such as breweries, purchase the THC in a liquid from and mix it with various seltzers to produce the THC-infused beverages. This type of manufacturing is less of a nuisance concern and allowing these Lower-Potency Hemp beverages to be manufactured at facilities that already produce intoxicating beverages represents a reasonable extension of their business and product lines, as long as it is not produced from the plant; and

WHEREAS, the City Council has determined that commercial businesses involved in limited manufacturing, and the transporting, or delivery and distribution of that infusion based lower potency hemp edibles and hemp-derived consumer products do not pose a risk to the health, safety and welfare of the public since the operation of those businesses do not result in an introduction or increase in availability of THC related intoxicating products for use within the jurisdictional limits of the City; and

WHEREAS, the City Council has determined that commercial businesses involved in testing, manufacturing, transporting, or delivery and distribution of lower potency hemp edibles and hemp-derived consumer products would not result in increased exposure or availability of these intoxicating products to youth in the community; and

WHEREAS, the City Council has determined that opportunities exist for commercial businesses in the City to provide services involving the testing, manufacturing, transporting, or delivery and distribution of lower potency hemp edibles and hemp-derived consumer products, which will benefit commerce in the City.

NOW, THEREFORE, The Common Council of the City of Marshall do ordain:

SECTION 1. City Code of Ordinances, Interim Cannabis Prohibition, adopted by Ord. 23-015 on June 27, 2023, is hereby amended to read as follows:

SECTION 3. MORATORIUM.

- A. A moratorium is hereby imposed to:
 - i. <u>Other than as allowed in subparagraphs a and b herein</u>, prohibit any business, person, or entity from offering for retail sale, wholesale, testing, commercial growing, commercial cultivating, manufacturing, transporting, delivering or commercial distribution of Cannabinoid Products, including Cannabis Products, f, or Hemp-Derived Consumer Products, including the establishment or operation as a Cannabis Business or Lower Potency Hemp Business within the jurisdictional boundaries of the City of Marshall.
 - a. <u>Manufacturing of Lower-Potency Hemp beverages is allowed as an</u> <u>accessory use only at breweries and distilleries, as long as the</u> <u>manufacturing process for the beverages does not involve the cannabis</u> <u>plant. The transporting or distribution of Lower-Potency Hemp</u> <u>beverages manufactured as an accessory use at a brewery or distillery</u> <u>to locations outside of the City also is allowed as part of the accessory</u> <u>use.</u>
 - b. The sale of Lower-Potency Hemp beverages that comply with Section. 3(A)(i)(a) is allowed at exclusive liquor stores. No off-sale of Lower-Potency Hemp beverage growlers is allowed by breweries or distilleries. No on-site consumption is allowed at breweries and distilleries.
 - c. <u>Breweries or distilleries manufacturing Lower-Potency Hemp</u> <u>beverages as an accessory use must be registered with the State and will</u> <u>be subject to any future applicable licensing or registration requirements</u> <u>by the state or the City of Marshall.</u>
 - ii. Prohibit any business, person, or entity from offering for retail sale, wholesale, testing, commercial growing, commercial cultivating, manufacturing, transporting, delivering or commercial distribution of Cannabis Products within the jurisdictional boundaries of the City of the City of Marshall.
 - iii. The City shall not process, or act on any application, site plan, building permit, or other zoning approval for a business, person, or entity proposing to engage in the sale of any Cannabinoid Products, including Cannabis Products, Lower-

Potency Hemp Edibles, or Hemp-Derived Consumer Products. covered <u>herein</u>, other than those related to the breweries and distilleries allowed under Section 3(A)(i)(a) and (b).

iv. This moratorium does not relate to the retail sale of Hemp Derived Topical Products, or Hemp Derived Fiber Products. The moratorium also does not relate to the sale of edible cannabinoid products as that term is defined in current statute, 151.72, subd. 1, in exclusive liquor stores.
