Call to Order

Meeting called to order at 4:30pm by Larry Doom

Consider Approval of February 1, 2022 Minutes

With a motion by Andrew Kindschi and a second by Tom Larson, the February 1st minutes were unanimously approved.

Snow Removal Equiptment (SRE) Building Update/ Transfer of Federal Entitlement Funds

As included in the Commission's packet, an Agreement between the City of Marshall and City of Waseca proposes to transfer \$150,000 of Federal Entitlement Funds to the City of Waseca Municipal Airport, with full payback by May 15, 2023. A previous Agreement with the City of Dodge Center will also provide a \$150,000 reimbursement by 2023. Accordingly, the City of Marshall will have \$600,000 Federal Entitlement Funds banked for the SRE project. With a motion by Ron Halgerson and a second by Andrew Kindschi, the Commission recommended that the Waseca Agreement be acted on at the next City Council meeting.

CIP Update / FAA BIL (Bipartisan Infrastructure Law) Funding

With an April 1st deadline from FAA and Congress, the City proposes to engage TKDA for preparation of an updated 5 year CIP. With Tom Larson's motion and a second by Andrew Kindschi, the Commission authorized this effort.

Zoning Ordinance Update

There was question during this meeting about the status of a letter regarding the Zoning Ordinance and a related State Grant. As follow-up, the City shared a letter and supportive information with the Commission, dated January 18, 2022 and directed to MNDOT-Aeronautics. The City and TKDA are currently waiting for a grant agreement to be returned from MNDOT-Aeronautics.

Helena Chemical Update

The City was copied a letter from the MN Dept. of Agriculture as directed to Helena Chemical whereby Helena is requested to respond/ provide an "action plan" by March 4th or the environmental clean-up /mitigation of Helena's property will be assigned to the Ag Dept. Comprehensive Clean-up Program.

Airport Tenant Comments

Regarding the aviation fueling system owned and operated by Midwest Aviation, the City received their 5-year record of fuel use/ purchases. There were no other comments available from tenants.

Other Business/Information

The City has been contacted by an independent aerial spraying company regarding airport use. This inquiry is a reminder for further consideration needed for preparation of the Airport Minimum Standards document by the City and Consultant (Landrum and Brown).

As moved by Tom Larson and seconded by Ron Halgerson, the meeting was adjourned at 5:05 pm.


Additional training opportunity: **PFAS Forum**

In conjunction with the 2022 Minnesota Airports Conference, MnDOT Aeronautics and AirTAP are holding a special forum on PFAS cleanup and upcoming regulations. The event is free to attend either in person or virtually, but separate registration is required.

In recent years, federal, state, and international authorities have established various health-based regulatory values and evaluation criteria for a number of specific per- and polyfluoroalkyl substances (PFAS). PFAS are key components in aqueous film-forming foam (AFFF), which is used to fight petroleum-based fires at aviation facilities. This forum will give attendees the chance to help educate Minnesota policymakers about the state's airport community and the potential impacts of any new federal standards and regulations. Airports and others affected by PFAS will have an opportunity to learn from policymakers about new requirements coming down the pipeline and hear case studies from organizations that have experience with cleanup. Staff from all airports are welcome to attend.
