#### REQUEST FOR A VARIANCE ADJUSTMENT PERMIT BY L2A, LLC, AT 501 Village Drive.

Several apartment complexes in Marshall have recently been purchased by Suite Liv'n Company. They want to add a new apartment building at the back of the 501-517 Village Drive development. There are already 6 buildings there so the options for new building location are limited. Zoning Ordinance requires a rear yard to be 25% of the entire lot depth, which in this case will be about a hundred feet. The owner is asking to reduce it to 30 feet.

An apartment building on the property directly south is located within 10 feet from the rear property line, based on a variance approved in 1992. Considering this information and the fact that adjacent property to the west is zoned A – Agricultural District and used as a cemetery, this request seems reasonable.

The variance regulations and procedures are found in Section 86-29 A property aerial photo and a proposed site plan is attached for reference.

At the Planning Commission meeting on March 28, 2019, a motion was made by Fox, second by Knieff to recommend approval to the City Council of the request by L2A, LLC for a Variance Adjustment Permit for reduction of the required rear yard from 25% of the lot depth, or about 100 feet, to 30 feet as recommended by staff. All voted in favor of the motion.

### Consider a resolution amending Resolution No. 4430, Second Series, in support of chloride reduction in water discharged to the Redwood River.

On September 26, 2017, Marshall City Council approved Resolution No. 4430, Second Series, a resolution in support of chloride reduction in water discharged to the Redwood River. The 2017 resolution supported the development by MMU and its consultants for the development of plans for new pretreatment of water system for the City of Marshall. The anticipated costs of the project at that time totaled \$9,043,000. Of that amount, MMU submitted an application hoping to receive \$7M grant to pay for the majority of the improvement costs. Grant application was submitted through the Point Source Implementation Grant (PSIG) process. The prior application, however, was denied and the PSIG funds were not dispersed to the MMU. MMU, however, has continued to develop the proposed plans and has now submitted a "certified plan" for the development of a water system for pretreatment of water. PSIG has now approved the \$7M grant to the MMU.

The plans have continued to develop, and it is anticipated that the costs of the project are now \$10,606,000. The majority of those costs are to be paid by the \$7M PSIG grant. Discussions have ensued between MMU and the City as to the appropriate parties to pay the remaining \$3,606,000 of the project. The resolution as proposed divides those remaining costs 55.74% to the City of Marshall and 44.26% to MMU. City's anticipated costs based upon engineer's estimate would be \$2,009,984. MMU's costs would be \$1,596,016. Project is to be bid by MMU on June 11, 2019.

MMU General Manager Brad Roos, Bob VanMoer, Wastewater Superintendent and Glenn Olson, Director of Public Works/City Engineer will be present to discuss this matter. Various documents and presentations have been submitted in connection with the project.

#### **Approve Strategic Planning Services.**

The City of Marshall desires to conduct a survey and focus groups with city stakeholders in order to build ownership and create a 3-year strategic plan for the city. The strategic plan will be created by the city council and city administrator in a 5-hour retreat facilitated by Vantage Point Marketing Consultants. During this retreat a detailed 3-year strategic plan, grounded in the survey results, will be developed, including action plans and accountability marks for each key goal.

The motion **Passed. 5-2**

The 2019 City of Marshall Local Board of Appeal and Equalization (LBAE) was called to order at 5:30 p.m. by Mayor Byrnes in the Community Room of the Marshall Lyon County Library at 201 C Street. Mayor Byrnes outlined the purpose of the meeting, which was to review the January 2, 2019 valuations and classifications. The meeting was then turned over to City Assessor Parsons. Assessor Parsons reviewed the assessment process and other background information for the 2019 assessment. All work must be completed by the LBAE no later than May 6, 2019. After the presentation, there were no questions from the Board.

Mayor Byrnes requested the members of the public present to state their name, address, and address of the property in question, and their reason for being present.

### Frances Remerowski Parcels: 27-148011-0 – 400 Genesis Avenue 27-145023-0 – 27-145024-0 – 27-145025-0 – 609 Cadillac Road

Mr. Remerowski was concerned with a \$30,000 value increase for 400 Genesis Avenue. Assessor Parsons indicated the properties on Genesis Avenue were increased because of sales in the area. All of Genesis Avenue had a location factor applied because of the Mobile Home Park and the Carr Addition. According to recent sales, the location factor had to be removed. Mr. Remerowski set up an appointment on April 16, 2019 at 9:00 am to have the Genesis property reviewed. No appointment was made for the property at 609 Cadillac Road which is also an estimate. The property will be reviewed and brought back to the LBAE at the reconvene meeting.

### Carr Family Ltd Partnership Parcels: 27-566017-0 – 27-566018-0 – 405 Country Club Drive

A memo was sent to the LBAE reviewing the property based upon Assessor's Parsons inspection. Mayor Byrnes asked if Mr. Carr was agreement with the memo. Mr. Carr was OK with the proposal. Lozinski questioned why the building was higher than Kruse Motors. Kruse Motors was \$13.14 per square foot Parsons indicated this was sale price, not estimated market value. Labat wanted the square footage of the Kruse building which is 16,360 square feet. Lozinski indicated the Kruse Motors building is on a commercial street and County Fair is in a residential area. County Fair must be sold for a retail purpose now, which makes it tough to value. Bayerkohler commented the Assessor has established a new value with his inspection. This is the most current information available. Bayerkohler questioned if one rate was used throughout town. Assessor Parsons said no, it is based on neighborhoods. There was no further discussion. Motion by Schaefer, seconded by Labat to reduce the proposed 2019 Estimated Market Value of Parcel 27-566017-0 – 405 Country Club Drive from \$560,400 to \$376,000 on Parcel 27-566017-0. All voted in favor of the motion except Lozinski who voted No. Motion Passed.

The LBAE received a list of property owners with Assessor's recommendations for change. Mayor Byrnes reviewed each of the recommendations as follows:

**27-209002-0 – Mark & Tracy Veglahn – 624 Kathryn Avenue.** Motion by Schaefer, seconded by Lozinski, to reduce the 2019 proposed estimated market value from \$151,400 to \$119,400. Assessor Parsons indicated this was an estimate which had been inspected. ALL VOTED IN FAVOR OF THE MOTION.

**27-708035-0 – Alvin & Lois Evers – 605 Arbor Court** - Motion by DeCramer, seconded by Lozinski, to reduce the 2019 proposed estimated market value from \$228,300 to \$206,600. Bayerkohler questioned the reason for the decrease. The property had water damage in the basement. This is a continuation of the 2016 water problem. ALL VOTED IN FAVOR OF THE MOTION.

**FUND BALANCE POLICY** 

#### I. PURPOSE

- A. The purpose of this policy is to establish specific rules the City of Marshall will use to maintain an adequate level of fund balance to provide for cash flow requirements and contingency needs because major revenues, including property taxes and other government aids, are received in the second half of the City's fiscal year.
- B. The purpose of this policy is to also establish specific rules the City of Marshall will use to classify fund balances into categories; based primarily on the extent to which the City is bound to honor constraints on the specific purposes for which amounts in these funds can be spent.

#### II. CLASSIFICATION OF FUND BALANCE

#### A. Non-spendable

1. This category includes fund balance that cannot be spent because it is either (a) not in spendable form or (b) is legally or contractually required to be maintained intact. Examples include inventories and prepaid amounts.

#### B. Restricted

1. Fund balance should be reported as restricted when constraints placed on those resources are either (a) externally imposed by creditors, grantors, contributors, or laws or regulations of other governments or (b) imposed by law through constitutional provisions or enabling legislation.

#### C. Committed

- Fund balance that can only be used for specific purposes pursuant to
  constraints imposed by formal action of the government's highest level of
  decision-making authority. The committed amounts cannot be used for any
  other purpose unless the government removes or changes the specified use
  by taking the same type of action it employed to commit those amounts.
- 2. The City's highest level of decision making authority (City Council) will, annually or as deemed necessary, commit specific revenue sources for specified purposes by resolution. This formal action must occur prior to the end of the reporting period however, the amount to be subject to the constraint may be determined in the subsequent period.
- 3. To remove the constraint on specified use of committed resources the City Council shall pass a resolution.

#### D. Assigned

- 1. Amounts that are constrained by the government's intent to use for specified purposes, but are neither restricted nor committed. Assigned fund balance in the General fund includes amounts that are intended to be used for specific purposes.
- 2. The City Council has delegated the authority to assign and remove assignments of fund balance amounts for specified purposes to the Finance Director.

#### E. Unassigned

- 1. Unassigned fund balance represents the residual classification for the General fund. It includes amounts that have not been assigned to other funds and that have not been restricted, committed, or assigned to specific purposes within the General fund. The General fund should be the only fund that reports a positive unassigned fund balance amount.
  - a. This will assist in maintaining an adequate level of fund balance to provide for cash flow requirements and contingency needs because major revenues, including property taxes and other government aids, are received in the second half of the City's fiscal year.
  - b. Fund balance exceeding 40% but less than 50% of the next year's budgeted General fund expenditures shall remain as an unassigned fund balance
  - c. Fund balance in excess of 50% shall be reviewed by City Council to determine if such excess should be transferred to other funds to be used as a financing source for capital improvement, equipment purchases, or other needs as determined by City Council.
  - d. If spending unrestricted fund balance in designated circumstances has reduced unrestricted fund balance to a point below the minimum targeted level, as noted above, the replenishment will be funded by revenue and/or expenditure adjustments within the next year's budgeting process.

#### III. DESIGNATION OF ENTERPRISE FUNDS

This actuarial valuation considers post retirement medical, dental and life insurance and also severance pay including accrued vacation and sick leave. # RESOLUTION AMEDNING RESOLUTION 4355 APPROVING THE TERMS OF UP TO A \$500,000 INTERFUND LOAN IN CONNECTION WITH TAX INCREMENT FINANCING (REDEVELOPMENT) DISTRICT NO. 1-5

BE IT RESOLVED by the City Council (the "Council") of the City of Marshall, Minnesota (the "City"), as follows:

#### Section 1. Background.

- (a) The City has heretofore approved the establishment of Tax Increment Financing Redevelopment District No. 1-5 (the "TIF District") within Redevelopment Project No. 1, and has adopted a tax increment financing plan for the TIF District (the "TIF Plan").
- (b) The City has determined to pay for certain costs identified in the TIF Plan related to the infrastructure improvements for the Marshall Hotel Acquisition & Redevelopment (the "Qualified Costs"), which costs may be financed on a temporary basis from City funds available for such purposes.
- (c) Under Minnesota Statutes, Section 469.198, Subd. 7, the City is authorized to advance or loan money from the City's general fund or any other fund from which such advances may be legally made, including tax increments from tax increment financing districts (collectively, the "Fund"), in order to finance the Qualified Costs.
- (d) The City intends to reimburse itself for the payment of the Qualified Costs, plus interest thereon, from tax increments derived from the TIF District in accordance with the terms of this resolution (which terms are referred to collectively as the "Interfund Loan").
- (e) On February 28, 2017, the City Council had approved a Resolution Approving the Terms of Up to a \$350,000 Interfund Loan in Connection with Tax Increment Financing (Redevelopment) District No.1-11 with a term that included an advance up to \$350,000 from the Fund.
- (f) The City has determined that additional expenses are deemed necessary and would like to establish a new advance maximum of up to \$500,000 from the fund with all other terms of interfund loan remaining the same.

#### Section 2. Terms of Interfund Loan.

(a) The City hereby authorizes the advance of up to \$500,000 from the Fund or so much thereof as may be paid as Qualified Costs. The City shall reimburse itself for such advances together with interest at the rate stated below. Interest accrues on the

principal amount from the date of each advance. The maximum rate of interest permitted to be charged is limited to the greater of the rates specified under Minnesota Statutes, Section 270C.40 or Section 549.09 as of the date the loan or advance is authorized, unless the written agreement states that the maximum interest rate will fluctuate as the interest rates specified under Minnesota Statutes, Section 270C.40 or Section 549.09 are from time to time adjusted. The interest rate shall be <u>0.00%</u> and will not fluctuate.

- (b) Principal and interest on the Interfund Loan shall be paid semi-annually on each February 1 and August 1 (each a "Payment Date") commencing with the Payment Date on which the City has Available Tax Increment (defined below), or on any other dates determined by the City Finance Director, through the last receipt of tax increment from the TIF District.
- (c) Payments on the Interfund Loan are payable solely from "Available Tax Increments" which shall mean, on each Payment Date, all of the tax increment available after other obligations have been paid, generated in the preceding six (6) months with respect to the property within the TIF District and remitted to the City by Lyon County, all in accordance with Minnesota Statutes, Sections 469.194 to 469.1999. Payments on the Interfund Loan are subordinate to any outstanding or future bonds, notes or contracts secured in whole or in part with Available Tax Increment, and are on parity with any other outstanding or future interfund loans secured in whole or in part with Available Tax Increment.
- (d) The principal sum and all accrued interest payable under the Interfund Loan are pre-payable in whole or in part at any time by the City without premium or penalty. No partial prepayment shall affect the amount or timing of any other regular payment otherwise required to be made under this Interfund Loan.
- (e) The Interfund Loan is evidence of an internal borrowing by the City in accordance with Minnesota Statutes, Section 469.198, Subd. 7, and is a limited obligation payable solely from Available Tax Increment pledged to the payment hereof under this resolution. The Interfund Loan and the interest hereon shall not be deemed to constitute a general obligation of the State of Minnesota or any political subdivision thereof, including, without limitation, the City. Neither the State of Minnesota, nor any political subdivision thereof shall be obligated to pay the principal of or interest on the Interfund Loan or other costs incident hereto except out of Available Tax Increment, and neither the full faith and credit nor the taxing power of the State of Minnesota or any political subdivision thereof is pledged to the payment of the principal of or interest on the Interfund Loan or other costs incident hereto. The City shall have no obligation to pay any principal amount of the Interfund Loan or accrued interest thereon, which may remain unpaid after the termination of the TIF District.
- (f) The City may amend the terms of the Interfund Loan at any time by resolution of the City Council, including a determination to forgive the outstanding principal amount and accrued interest to the extent permissible under law.

#### **FARM LEASE**

**THIS AGREEMENT,** Made this 23<sup>rd</sup> day of April, 2019, by and between the City of Marshall, a municipal corporation, Lessor, and RJC, Inc., of the County of Lyon, State of Minnesota, Lessee.

*WITNESSETH,* That the said Lessor, in consideration of the rents and covenants hereinafter mentioned, does hereby Remise, Lease and Let unto the said Lessee, and the said Lessee does hereby hire and take from the said Lessor, the following described premises situated in the County of Lyon, State of Minnesota, to-wit:

Parcel 12: 127.7 +/- acres of farm land in the as described and shown on the attached map, a copy of which is attached and made a part of this Agreement.

**To Have and to Hold,** the above rented premises unto the said Lessee, their heirs and assigns, subject to the conditions and limitations hereinafter mentioned for and during the term of this lease ending the 15<sup>th</sup> day of October, 2019.

And the said Lessee agrees to and with the said Lessor to pay as rent for the above-mentioned premises, for and during the full term of this lease, rent as follows:

\$0.00 due

And it is Further Agreed, By and between the parties as follows:

Lessee shall maintain positive weed control on land being rented, including adjacent township roadways, at their own expense.

Lessee shall furnish all materials necessary for crop production at their own expense.

Any subsequent Lessees shall have access to said premises. After current Lessee has finished with fall harvest which includes removal of crops and crop residue (residue to be removed within two weeks of crop removal), so as to allow for fall application of chemicals, if subsequent Lessee desires to apply fall chemicals.

Animal manure, if applied, must be incorporated into the soil within eight (8) hours of application. If not incorporated within said eight (8) hours, City reserves right to terminate lease and charge Lessee the cost of said incorporation.

Equipment, bales and crop products shall not be stored or remain on the site for more than five (5) days.

And the said Lessee also covenants and agrees to and with the said Lessor, not to assign this Lease or underlet the above-rented premises or any part thereof, and that he will, at the expiration of the time as herein recited, quietly yield and surrender the aforesaid premises to the said Lessor, in as good condition and repair as when taken, reasonable wear and tear and damage by the elements alone excepted. Said Lessee also covenants and agrees to cultivate the hereby leased premises in a careful and husband-like manner, and to commit no waste or damage on said real estate and to suffer none to be done.

The Lessee is also to destroy all Russian Thistles and other noxious weeds growing on said land, declared by statute to be common nuisances, within the times prescribed by law, and shall keep all roadways (Pacific Avenue) and other parts of the land, not in crop, mowed and free from growing weeds. And the Lessor or its agent shall have the right to enter upon said premises at any time, without injury to the standing crops, for the purpose of making any improvements, or for any other purpose whatsoever.

City of Marshall, Lessor reserves the right to develop all or part of the above described premises for commercial or industrial purposes. If some or all of the land is developed, the Lessor shall attempt to do the development so as to minimize damage done to current year's crops. However, if crops are damaged, the Lessor shall reimburse Lessee for crop damage.

And the said Lessor covenants that the said Lessee, performing the covenants aforesaid, shall peaceably and quietly have, hold and enjoy the said rented premises.

Lessee has no right to an extension of this Lease.

The Lessee for 2020 shall be responsible for fall "plow back".



	Hazardous materials spills are fortunately rare events, but when they do occur require a rapid response and the CAT's exist as regional teams to support and supplement local fire departments within their region. It takes a lot of training to have individuals who are capable to respond in this critical role.
	The City of Marshall has been awarded funds to supplement these operating grant funds for the training of CAT members. This grant will fund having team members receive the advanced training that is available through the annual hazardous materials conference called the Cold Zone that is located in North Minneapolis.
	There is a financial match requirement for this grant, but that match will come from the Team's operating grant and not local general funds. A copy of the Grant Agreement and budget as well as information on Signatory Requirements of the grant are attached. A resolution authorizing Director of Public Safety/Police Chief Jim Marshall to administer the grant is also attached.
Fiscal Impact:	The grant is for \$4,935.00, with a cash match requirement of \$1,233.75 for a total budget of \$6,168.75.





Subject:	Request for map amendment (rezone) 1213, 1215 and 1217 West Main Street.
Background Information:	This is a request by Douglas and Peggy Anderson, Marshall, MN to rezone properties at 1213, 1215 and 1217 West Main Street from B-3 General Business District to a I-2 General Industrial District. The owner intends to build an addition to his building (Marshall Machine Shop); that addition will be built on the north side and will extend into the lots along West Main Street. The use of the building is manufacturing, and it is not permitted in a B-3 General Business District, which the three lots to be rezoned currently are. To permit building an addition, they must be rezoned to an I-2 General Industrial District.
	The adjacent land south of these lots is presently zoned I-2 General Industrial District and the land across Main Street is zoned I-1 Limited Industrial District, so the requested rezoning is consistent with the zoning of surrounding areas. However, the 1996 City Comprehensive plan shows the corridor along Main Street as a commercial use rather than industrial. Nevertheless, the staff's opinion is that at this time the requested change is acceptable considering the age of the Comprehensive plan, the use of the neighboring properties and the location of major commercial development areas within the city.

#### ORDINANCE AMENDING CHAPTER 86 OF THE CITY CODE RELATING TO ZONING

The Common Council of the City of Marshall does ordain as follows:

Section 1. Chapter 86 of the City Code and the City of Marshall Zoning Map referred to in Section 86-72, are hereby further amended as follows, to- wit:

#### City of Marshall, County of Lyon, State of Minnesota 1213, 1215 and 1217 West Main Street See Exhibit A

is hereby rezoned from B-3 General Business District to I-2 General Industrial District.

<u>Section 2</u>. Within thirty (30) days after official publication of the Ordinance, the Zoning Administrator of said City is directed to record on the City of Marshall Zoning Map, the changes in zoning resulting from the passage of this ordinance.

Section 3. Except as amended herein, said Chapter 86, as heretofore amended, shall remain in full force and effect.

Section 4. This Ordinance shall take effect from and after its passage and publication.







### **BUSINESS DEVELOPMENT**



#### **MERIT CENTER**

The second phase of construction of the MERIT Center driving track broke ground at the end of October 2018. A bonding package approved by the Minnesota House of Representatives includes a \$3 million appropriation for the Minnesota Emergency Response and Industrial Training (MERIT) Center in Marshall. The project will add 1.5 miles of road, which will expand the types of training that can be done on the track.



#### **AVERA - ACMC ACQUISITION**

Avera Marshall purchased Affiliated Community Medical Center after being sold to Carris Health. The 150 employees of Carris Health in Marshall became Avera employees.

Avera Medical Group physicians and advanced practice providers (APPs) in the Marshall region now exceed 100.



### FURNITURE MART USA ASHLEY HOMESTORE

Furniture Mart has redeveloped the old K-mart building as a multi-tenant building, including a future Ashley HomeStore, among others to be announced.



#### **UNIQUE OPPORTUNITIES**

Unique Opportunities purchased 9 acres of Parkway III for up to a 107-unit apartment development project that could invest up to \$11 Million in the area. The first 36 unit building is currently underway. Amenities include stainless steel appliances, granite counter-tops, washers and dryers in each apartment.

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### MARSHALL AREA PUBLIC ARCHERY RANGE

This archery range will be open to the public at no cost. The range targets will vary from 10 yards all the way out to 100 yards. The total cost of the project is estimated to be about \$8,500 and will offer a new recreational sporting option to residents of the Marshall area. It will be located adjacent to MERIT Center on Erie Road.



### GRACE LIFE/EAST SIDE CAMPUS EXPANSION

Grace Life Church Expansion was \$1.6 million. The addition is 15,000 SF, one story. The expansion includes an entryway, bathrooms, a coffee bar and a worship center, which is attached to the current building on the north side.





#### **MENARDS**

The Marshall expansion will include more product selection and displays, create more space for customer order pick-up for our growing online business, an additional warehouse in the outside lumberyard, expansion of the Garden Center, and a few changes to the store's interior.



#### **ALDI**

Aldi Corp opened November 30th, 2018. This location has five aisles and 13,000 sq. ft. of retail space. The building permit was for \$2 Million dollars.

#### **EDWARD JONES BUILDING**


A newly constructed building on East College Drive is home to the new Edward Jones-Mike Leary. Two additional brand new office suites are available for rent. One rental suite is 1,800 sq. ft. and the other rental suite is 2,000 sq. ft. The site has ample parking and great visibility for a new or growing business.

#### **COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT**



#### **RED BARON USAGE**

In 2018, the Red Baron Arena & Expo was in use for more than 3,500 hours, 953 of which were meetings, private parties, and public events. The Arena hosted 15 expos and community events this year along with 7 multi-day hockey tournaments, bringing approximately 1,500 hockey players to Marshall. The Red Baron Arena & Expo helps the community generate revenue through hotel stays, dining, and local shopping.





#### **ELYSIAN CHIROPRACTIC**

Elysian Chiropractic is a new business and tenant in the remodeled former liquor store location. Elysian Chiropractic is a family and pediatric wellness office.



#### NORTH CENTRAL REFORESTATION

Formerly located in Evansville, MN, North Central Reforestation began the process of relocating the entire facility to Marshall, MN in the fall of 2018.. North Central Reforestation, Inc. specializes in growing containerized tree seedlings.



#### **DEUTZ HERITAGE FARM**

Deutz Heritage raises antibiotic-free outdoor pork, grass-fed Red Angus Beef, and, seasonally, free range chickens. Deutz Heritage Farms is licensed for retail sales of pork, beef, and other inspected meats. Deutz Heritage also provides the Marshall area with the area's first Farm to Table specialty meats delivery service, providing customers quality local meats delivered right to their door step.

#### **BICYCLE FRIENDLY COMMUNITY**

The League of American Bicyclists recognized Marshall, MN on December 6, 2018 with a Bronze Level Bicycle Friendly Community (BFC) award, joining 464 communities from across the country. Marshall was awarded for improving conditions for bicycling through investment in bicycling promotion, education programs, infrastructure and pro-bicycling policies. Mayor Bob Byrnes said, "Being recognized as one of 25 communities in the great state of Minnesota is reflective of the progressive nature of our community and their commitment to an enriched quality of life.

#### SCHWAN'S COMPANY SALE

The Schwans Food Company sold their Food Service Business to CJ CheilJedang (CJCJ), of Seoul, South Korea. The sale included 80% of Schwan's and subsidiaries that focus on foods sold in retail stores, grocery stores and food-service venues. The sale will also include the company's manufacturing and logistics operations. However, the Schwan family will keep 20% ownership of the businesses being sold, as well as 100% ownership of Schwan's Home Service, Inc.

#### **HIGHWAY 23 TRANSPORTATION**

MnDOT started the construction project to build a reduced-conflict intersection or "j-turn" at the intersection of Highway 23 and Lyon Street in early August. A restricted turn lane is also being built at the intersection of Clarice Avenue and Highway 23. The project goals are lower speed, safety and access improvements while staying within budget.

#### SAFE ROUTES TO SCHOOL

Marshall was awarded the Safe Routes to School/Transportation Alternatives Grant for Sc Zone Speed Limits and Traffic Calming Signage with a total project cost of \$424,800, a fede award of \$339,840 and a local match of \$84,960.

### **PULL FACTOR**

According to the University of Minnesota Retail Trade Analysis report, there are several ways to measure performance other than dollars of sales. Economists expect cities of larger populations to have more sales since their potential customer base is larger. A pull factor index higher than 1.0 indicates that businesses are pulling in customers from outside their community. A lower pull factor usually indicates residents are leaving the community to make purchases. The 1.56 pull factor indicates that the City of Marshall is generating 56% more than expected based on population.



### **UNEMPLOYMENT RATE**





### MARSHALL PUBLIC SCHOOLS

Our growing student enrollment is one of the biggest factors in completing our budget each year. At the end of the 2017-2018 year, we received funding for 2,470 students in kindergarten through 12th grade. At the start of January for the 2018-2019 year, there were 2,470 students enrolled in those same grades, which is even with student enrollment last year. We have had an increase of 331 students in the last 7 years, that is a 15.5% increase. The enrollment growth has created space challenges for our district. A building bond referendum will be held in May 2019.



As shown in the graph above, student enrollment in kindergarten through grade twelve has grown significantly over the past seven years. Based on several factors, we anticipate that this enrollment growth will continue.



As shown in the graph above, student enrollment in kindergarten through 12th grade is projected to continue to increase from a low of 2,470 students in 2017-2018 to a forecasted enrollment high of 2,588 in 2023-2024. For the 2017-2018 school year we are at record enrollment numbers for the school district. In 2014, at the request of the school district, Hazel Reinhardt, a former Minnesota State Demographer, studied enrollment history and other factors to develop a comprehensive enrollment projection based on a variety of factors. Ms. Reinhardt's projections include births, kindergarten 'capture' rate, and incoming 9th grade increases due to tuitioned in and non-public schools/students. Her projections indicated an increase of anywhere between 18.6% and 23.3% from 2013-2014 and 2023-2024. Interestingly, Ms. Reinhardt's most aggressive projection for 17-18 we students and our actual enrollment exceeded her most aggressive projection by 24 students. 

## HOUSING ANALYSIS

According to the Marshall Comprehensive Housing Needs Analysis report, the demographic characteristics of Marshall and the Primary Market Area show a growing demand for a variety of housing products, including: rental housing targeting the young adult (25 to 34) age group as well as the empty nester population (55 to 74 age group); entry-level ownership housing for first-time home buyers (25 to 39); move-up housing for the 35 to 44 age group; and, senior housing. In total, we find demand to supple 608 general occupancy housing units between 2015 and 2025. Demand is expected to favor rental housing, with 371 rental units and 237 for-sale housing units needed in Marshall by 2025.






## COMMERCE PARK

Commerce Park spans across 136.03 developable acres and can be subdivided into as little as 5 acre lots. Commerce Park is located west of Highway 59 North and is centrally located in the industrial district of Marshall.

Commerce Park is currently zoned agriculture, but will transition to general industrial district.

The City of Marshall was awarded a \$2 Million Business Development Public Infrastructure Grant to build out Michigan Road. In addition, Commerce Park is located in the federally designated Opportunity Zone.






## **OPPORTUNITY ZONES**

Opportunity Zones are a new community development program established by Congress in the Tax Cut and Jobs Act of 2017 to encourage long-term investments in low-income and urban communities nationwide. Opportunity Funds allow U.S. investors holding unrealized gains in stocks and mutual funds to pool their resources in projects located in Opportunity Zones, which will be invested in rebuilding low-income communities.

Minnesota Census Tract: 27083360500 was designated as an Opportunity Zone which includes Commerce Park and Victory Park (Amateur Sports Complex area).



## **SONSTEGARD SUBDIVISION II**

Sonstegard Subdivision II was initially 64.266 acres. The majority of the industrial park was filled within two years. Only one 1.2810 acre parcel is still available for development.

Dear Council Members,

We are the Board of Directors of the non-profit Marshall Cemetery Association, which owns and operates the Marshall Cemetery. The Cemetery is a public cemetery, serving the communities in and around Marshall, MN. The cemetery owns a total of 47 acres, 20 acres of which are currently used for the cemetery proper. Twelve acres are maintained in grassed buffers and 15 acres are used for cropland. In the 122 years since the Marshall Cemetery Association was incorporated, those acres not needed for burials have always been farmed and the proceeds used solely to operate and maintain the cemetery.

In 2013, for the first time, the Marshall City Assessor determined that the cropland was subject to local property taxes. The assessed taxes, based on property classifications determined by the assessor, have been as high as 95% of the rental income we received from the cropland. Even with the increase in rent we were able to negotiate this year, the property taxes will be over to 75% of our rental income.

Minnesota House of Representatives Bill H.F. 2620 and Minnesota Senate Bill S. F. 2647 - Charitable Farmland Property Tax Exemption Established directly address this issue, making property owned by a public hospital, house of worship or cemetery and used for the production of agricultural products exempt from property taxes, provided that any proceeds from the sale of the agricultural products are used to support the mission of the public hospital, house of worship or cemetery.

The assessed property taxes have had a significant negative impact on our immediate and long-term ability to operate and maintain the cemetery. If we are unable to continue, by law the cemetery would become the responsibility of either the city of Marshall or Lyon County (or both)—at a much higher annual cost than the few thousand dollars collected in property taxes.

Financially, we believe it would be in the long-term best interests of both the Cemetery Association and our local governments if the cemetery was not assessed property taxes on that portion of the cemetery used for cropland. Unfortunately, current law does not allow it. House Bill H.F. 2620 and Senate Bill SF. 2647 would correct that, and as representatives of the Marshall Cemetery Association, we strongly urge you to support passage of these bills.

Background Information:	The background information was previously provided and summarized for the Housing and Redevelopment Authority action item. Recent as-built survey has indicated slight discrepancies between the location of the constructed roadway and the roadway as previously platted. It appears that the intersections with Michigan Road and the various avenues within Commerce Industrial Park Second Addition do not meet at true 90° angles. There is a slight curvature at each intersection. As such, it is necessary to require a land transfer and subsequent dedication of public roadway and street uses.
	HRA has previously executed a deed describing land descriptions and easement descriptions. HRA has deeded the described property to the City of Marshall with the understanding that the property would be dedicated for public roadway and utility easement purposes.  City staff is recommending that the appropriate resolution be approved dedicating roadway and utilities and requiring that the resolution be recorded in the office of the Lyon County Recorder for verification of dedicated roadway and utilities.
Fiscal Impact:	The applicant will be billed for all direct costs related to the roadway and utility dedication process.

# MINUTES OF THE MARSHALL PLANNING COMMISSION MEETING APRIL 10, 2019

**MEMBERS PRESENT:** Fox, Ruud, Knieff, Steen, Edblom, Lee and Carstens **MEMBERS ABSENT:** Ilya Gutman, Jason Anderson and Glenn Bayerkohler **OTHERS PRESENT:** 

- The meeting was called to order by Chairman Edblom. He asked for the approval of the minutes of the March 28, 2019, special meeting of the Marshall Planning Commission. Steen MADE A MOTION, SECOND BY Fox, to approve the minutes as written. ALL VOTED IN FAVOR OF THE MOTION.
- 2. Gutman said this is a request by James Carr, Marshall, MN to rezone properties at 701, 703, 705, 800, 801, 802, 803, 804, 805, 806, 807, 900, 901, 902, 903, 904 and 905 Andrew Street from R-1 One Family Residential District to R-2 One to Four Family Residential District. To permit construction of tri-plex structures, as the owner desires, they must be rezoned to an R-2 One to Four Family Residential District. The adjacent land south of the zoning area is zoned R-2 One to Four Family Residential District. Staff recommends a motion to recommend approval to the City Council of the request to rezone 701, 703, 705, 800, 801, 802, 803, 804, 805, 806, 807, 900, 901, 902, 903, 904 and 905 Andrew Street from R-1 One Family Residential District to R-2 One to Four Family Residential District. Mike Schmidt, 703 Elaine Avenue, said that it appears that lots along Donald Street are all zoned R-2 One to Four Family and that is not developed so why do we want to rezone others. Carr said it is the progression of building in that direction. Schmidt said when the apartment complex was built on 4<sup>th</sup> Street, it was said at that time that the rest of this area would all be single family dwellings and that was assured. Carr said he did not own the land at that time. Schmidt said that doesn't make a difference; that is what was said that it would all be single family and now it is going to change. Carr said things change. Marshall used to be a working-class community and now Marshall is pushing business away and refuses to help businesses. Schmidt asked if building multifamily dwellings along that street will help that? Carr said people are aging in place. They want to buy a condo, get the snow removal done, the lawn work done, and right now Marshall has very few of these. If you want to see what is planned, go down Windstar Street; they have a couple of them there. Schmidt asked if they will be exactly like the white buildings. Fox said no, they are tan on the 900 block of Windstar. It would be like the tri-plex that is being built now. Carr said that he would take two lots and put a tri- plex in there. So, on one side where you have 7 single family lots, there might be 10 houses instead of 7 houses. Schmidt asked if Carr wants both sides of Andrew rezoned. Carr confirmed yes. Greg Labat, 705 Elaine Avenue, asked about parking on the street. He said in the winter time it is terrible over there. You get a car that is plowed around, and it sits there for a day or a day and half and there is only one lane traffic. Fox said it shouldn't be an issue; the tri-plex's will all have double car garage with driveway. Schmidt asked about a park in this area. At the time the apartment was going in, they said this would be a park. Fox said he doesn't know anything about that. Anderson said there is no park planned for that area at this point and time. Schmidt said the park was supposed to go in the Southwest corner. Anderson said that wasn't in the final plat. Gutman said it is in the comprehensive plan, but it is shown where it is already R-2 so it is not where we are rezoning. Anderson said there is no park in this development and there is not one scheduled to be in there currently. Susan Krenz, 1300 Cheryl Avenue, said that it seems to her there is a market for single family homes and there is a need in town. So, if these are already slotted to be single family, why not leave it. The other area is already

zoned for R-2 so leave it the way it is, and one can still put tri-plex's just a little farther out. Anderson clarified that it is zoned R-1 but in an R-1 one can build up to a duplex in its current state; one can build a single family and up to a duplex and in an R-2 one can build a single family and up to a four-plex. Krenz said the letter said single family. Anderson said the duplex is by conditional use. Gutman said that is correct: you would have to have a Conditional Use Permit to have a duplex, but it is possible. Carr said you could have two units per lot so in 2 lots you could have four units. We are taking two lots and making 3 units. Schmidt asked what that means by conditional use. Anderson explained the process to obtain a Conditional Use Permit. Schmidt said it means you wouldn't be able to buy one of those lots and put up a duplex without getting permission. Anderson said that is correct. Schmidt asked if these units will be income based. Carr said no. Fox said these will be too high end for income based. He said the approximate cost is \$265,000 to \$275,000 per unit so they are upper end. Marie Sample, 1302 Cheryl Avenue, said we have 2 lots out there at the corner lot and the one behind us and when our neighbors moved out they were selling in the price range \$275,000 to \$300,000 or a little over; they are hard to find here in Marshall, so they looked at the house and they bought it. It was not on the market very long so why can't we keep those as single-family homes along Andrew Street; they are filling up rather quickly. There is a need for that in town, so we should maintain that at least for that block. Fox said there is a stronger demand right now for these tri-plex units. Sample said as soon as new houses go up on Elizabeth Street, they are sold just that fast. Anderson said that is important but we, as the Planning Commission and the City, are here to consider and evaluate whether it meets the City's Comprehensive Plan and good zoning practice. It is ultimately up to the private sector and developers to determine how they want to use the land within the zoning. Edblom said it is fair to say that over time the City has tried to work duplex and tri-plex in with single family development to make it work and you can look around the City and see that it does work. Krenz said she can see the point, but you already have a row lined up and you can leave Andrew as single family. Carr said that in talking to the realtor, they think it is easier to sell this plan. Schmidt asked if it is the sale of the units that is driving this. Fox said yes. Krenz said we should look at the good for the whole community that is there and not just the seller of the units. Carr said the good of the community is to put housing on the streets, and get the taxes the housing generates to better the City than to have nothing there. Krenz said these houses are being sold as quick as they are built too. Carr said they are not sold as easy as what people are saying they are. We build those spec houses when we sell them. Anyone can do it, but no one is doing it. Schmidt asked if this is the final say. Edblom advised it will go to the City Council for final decision. Carr said if your concerned about what they will look like, look at the ones on Windstar; it might ease the concerns. Edblom asked if the property on Windstar was Carr's. Carr confirmed yes. Lee MADE A MOTION, SECOND BY Steen, to close the public hearing. Fox abstained MOTION PASSED. Carstens said he lives at one of the 4 plex's on Windstar Street and it is a nice area. Carstens MADE A MOTION, SECOND BY Steen to recommend to City Council an approval as recommend by staff. Fox abstained. MOTION PASSED.

3. A MOTION WAS MADE BY Carstens, SECOND BY Lee to adjourn the meeting. ALL VOTED IN FAVOR. Chairman Edblom declared the meeting adjourned.
