The Consent Agenda is a means of expediting the consideration of routine matters. Mack walked through the consent agenda with the commission. Consent agenda items include 2020 Planning Commission appointments of Cody Nielson and John Johnson, approval of the legal services portion of the Aging Contract, a contract with Home Health to provide services to senior citizens living within the county.

Commissioner Grayeyes asked how often legal services and RN services were received in Navajo Mountain. Tammy Gallegos explained that RNs are in Navajo Mountain on a monthly basis providing health assessments on individuals serviced through the Aging Program. She also explained that any individual serviced can contact Utah Legal Services for advice. A motion to approve the consent agenda was made by Commission Vice-Chair Grayeyes, Seconded by Commissioner Adams.

RECOGNITIONS, PRESENTATIONS, AND INFORMATIONAL ITEMS

6. Beer Tax Funds Fiscal Year 2020 Annual Report, Jason Torgerson, SJC Sheriff

Sheriff Torgerson reported that the county received \$32,124 in Beer Tax funds for the period from July 1, 2019 – June 30, 2020. He stated that the county applied for the funds and would use them for alcohol and substance abuse consignment costs. Sheriff Torgerson also explained that the commission needs to sign a report stating that the county will use the funds in the manner that he outlined to the commission.

A motion to approve the commission signing the document to be sent to the State of Utah was made by Commissioner Vice-Chair Grayeyes. Seconded by Commissioner Adams. Voting Yea: Commission Chairman Maryboy, Commission Vice-Chair Grayeyes, Commissioner Adams.

7. Discussion and Consideration of the 2nd round of CARES ACT Fund Distribution, Mack McDonald, Chief Administrative Officer

Mack presented the second round of CARES Act distribution to the county. He explained that the county would like to use the funds as outlined below:

Economic Development / Visitor Services - \$60,000

The money would be used for tourism signage in the county to inform and educate visitors on dos and don't of staying safe, keeping the county clean, protecting cultural sites, and leaving not trace.

Public Lands - \$20,000 This money would be used for trail management and bringing trails back into good shape for use.

Artisan Guild - \$100,000 This money would be used for art festivals as well as working with Trading Posts

CARES Act grants - \$150,000

This money would be used to provide grants to applying businesses who missed out on the 1st round of CARES Act money sent to the county.

Communications and Building Prepardness - \$30,173 The money would used to purchase software programs to used to better prepare the county for pandemics.

Feasibility study - \$22,500

These funds would be used for a feasibility study to increase the size of the public safety building. Fund from the 1st round of CARES Act money allocated to the study were \$20,000 bringing the total funding for the study to \$42,500.

Ambulance and Communication - \$50,000

These funds would be used to sure up the budget for unanticipated transport of COVID patients. The county will also purchase radios to match the 800 Mhz system that the county is upgrading too.

Gouldings Public Use Pump - \$100,000 These funds will be used to upgrade Gouldings' private pump that they are using for public needs.

Mack also spoke about road maintenance for the road in front of Gouldings and making a request to CIB for funds to complete the road maintenance.

Reserves - 200K

The funds would be put into the county reserves in anticipation of CARES Act rules being changed by U.S. legislative action.

8. Consideration of a Utah Commission on Aging Letter of Support, Tammy Gallegos, Aging Services Director

Tammy requested that the county commission write a letter of support to Utah Legislation to continue the Utah Commission on Aging because of the good work they do with the counties.

BUSINESS/ACTION

9. Consideration of the Decker Crossing Agreement with Two Swipe Cattle Company, TJ Adair, Road Department Director

TJ stated that the cost to fix a deteriorating car bridge across Cottonwood Wash, which accesses Butler Wash, would be very costly. He explained that a more cost effective approach would be to change the county road on property owned by Two Swipe Cattle Company so that a lower land crossing could be used. He requested the commission chairman's signature on the agreement.

 Consideration of an Outreach Education Agreement between San Juan Public Health Department and the University of Utah for poison control education. Kirk Benge, Public Health Director

Kirk explained that the county has entered into this same agreement with Utah Poison Control each year to share poison control information and messaging at health fairs and on social media sites. Kirk explained that the county receives \$2,500 to provide the information and recommended that the county renew the contract.

11. Consideration of a Coronavirus Prevention Messaging Grant Contract for Fiscal Year 2021 with San Juan Public Health and the State of Utah Department of Heritage & Arts, Kirk Benge, Public Health Director

Kirk told the commission that Public Health had recently gotten approval for a grant up to an amount of \$15,000 to reimburse the county for messaging related to coronavirus prevention.

12. Purchase Order authorizing the Chamber Remodel by HKConsulting under State Contract #MA2641 Job Order Contracting For Construction Services using Cares Act Funding, Mack McDonald, Chief Administrative Officer

Mack requested that the commission a purchase order to remodel the commission chambers. He explained that commission seating would be raised in order to create distance from the public. Funds would also be used to upgrade the PA system. Mack also explained that appropriation of CARES Act funds was \$109,000 and the estimate from HK Consulting to complete the project would be \$95,000

13. Consideration of a contract for Ordinance Recodification Cost Proposal and Contract with American Legal Publishing Corporation using CARES ACT Funds, Mack McDonald, Chief Administrative Officer

Mack explained that the county does not currently have a way for the public to access county ordinances and policies. He presented for approval a contract with American Legal Publishing to codify and place the county's ordinances and policies online for greater access. The base cost of the contract would be \$8,925.

14. Consideration of a Lease Agreement with the Town of Bluff for the Lease of 2,275 Square Feet within the Bluff Community Center for Senior Services located at 190 North 3rd East. Mack McDonald, Chief Administrative Officer

Mack presented a lease agreement with the Town of Bluff to use 2,275 square ft of the Bluff Community Center for senior services. The lease amount would cost \$450 per month. The term is for 5 years with an option to renew at that time.

Commissioner Adams stated that the county built the building and then gave it to the Town of Bluff.

15. Consideration of an Agreement with AJC Architects to perform a Feasibility Study for the Public Safety Building using CARES ACT FUNDS, Mack McDonald, Chief Administrative Officer

Mack presented for consideration, an agreement with AJC Architects to perform a feasibility on the public safety building. The cost proposal for the agreement would the in the amount of \$42,500 and would be funded by CARES Act funds. Mack asked AJC to research the cost of constructing a public safety building remodel, then the county could go to CIB for a funds request. He also stated that this would help segregate individuals who may have contracted COVID and create isolation areas. Commissioner Adams also asked about the possibility of adding a 2nd court room during a building remodel.

16. Consideration of a Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) between San Juan County and Public Land Managers for the San Juan Strong Recreate Responsibly Campaign using CARES ACT Funds, Natalie Randall, Economic Development Director

Natalie reviewed the San Juan Strong Promise campaign intended to build consumer confidence in the county by recreating responsibly. She explained that Public Land Management agencies have expressed interest in participating in the campaign which lead to the creation of the proposed MOU.

17. Recommended Board of Equalization Adjustments, Greg Adams, County Assessor

County Assessor, Greg Adams, discussed this year's Board of Equalization hearing. He talked about increases in commercial property that were felt by business owners. He stated that most of the recommendations by the hearing officer were cleaning up value issues brought by property owners. Greg also explained that the program used by Economic Development to identify nightly rentals was helpful in properly taxing entities.

ATTACHMENT A WIC Program Special Provisions For San Juan County Health Department

I. FUNDING AND PAYMENTS

- A. Nutrition Service Administration (NSA) The DEPARTMENT shall reimburse the CONTRACTOR up to <u>\$125,631</u> for Federal Fiscal Year 2021 for WIC operational activities (as submitted on the monthly expense report) by the CONTRACTOR directly related to the program. This agreement will be amended to add funding each fiscal year.
- B. Peer Counseling (PC) The DEPARTMENT shall reimburse the CONTRACTOR up to \$3,489 for Federal Fiscal Year 2021 for Peer Counseling (PC) activities (as submitted on the monthly expense report). NSA funding can be used to supplement the budget in this category. This agreement will be amended to add funding each fiscal year.
- C. The CONTRACTOR shall report the costs under Sections I.A. and I.B. to the DEPARTMENT based on the following categories:
 - 1. Breastfeeding Promotion NSA
 - 2. Nutrition Education NSA
 - 3. Administration NSA
 - 4. Client Services NSA
 - 5. Technology Services NSA
 - 6. Peer Counseling PC
- D. The CONTRACTOR shall spend at least one-sixth (17%) of the reimbursement amount under Section I.A. on Nutrition Education.
- E. Paper Food Vouchers and WIC Food Benefits issued to eWIC cards provided under the WIC Program are considered Federal Financial Assistance that must be reported in the LHD Single Audit Report. The Voucher Redeemed Amount for the calendar year will be made available the following January by the DEPARTMENT.
- II. PROVISIONS INCORPORATED INTO THIS AGREEMENT BY REFERENCE, BUT NOT ATTACHED:
 - A. Utah Department of Health WIC Program Policy and Procedures (P&P) manual, current version as amended annually.
 - B. All other governmental laws, rules, regulations, or actions applicable to services provided herein.
- **III. SERVICES**
 - A. The CONTRACTOR shall furnish services as specified herein to residents of the area served by the CONTRACTOR. These services shall be provided in the CONTRACTOR'S facilities, by the CONTRACTOR'S employees and by others designated by the CONTRACTOR to carry out the provisions of this agreement.
 - B. The CONTRACTOR shall comply with the regulations and guidelines set forth in the Federal code (§42 U.S.C. 1786), and shall abide by the fiscal and operational policy requirements prescribed by the DEPARTMENT and the U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA).
 - C. The CONTRACTOR shall provide nutrition education to all adult participants, to parents or guardians of child participants and, when applicable, to child participants in order to conform to the DEPARTMENT'S and the CONTRACTOR'S Nutrition Education Plans and to USDA Regulations.

- D. The CONTRACTOR shall adhere to the Nutrition Education Plan submitted by the CONTRACTOR and approved by the DEPARTMENT each January. That document provides a plan for improving the program quality and for meeting State performance objectives for the WIC program.
- E. The CONTRACTOR must maintain competent professional staff, facilities and equipment needed to perform the measurements and tests necessary for determining the eligibility of persons for WIC participation.
- F. The CONTRACTOR shall utilize the WIC food delivery system approved by the DEPARTMENT for making WIC food benefits available to participants.
- G. The CONTRACTOR shall provide WIC food benefits to all categories of eligible participants: infants, children, and pregnant, postpartum or lactating women.
- H. The CONTRACTOR shall exchange participant information with surrounding health agencies and with agencies with overlapping WIC services areas in accordance with Food and Consumer Services (FCS) Instruction 801-1 (confidentiality) to prevent dual participation.
- I. The CONTRACTOR shall operate the WIC Program in accordance with the provisions of the DEPARTMENT'S current WIC Program Policies and Procedures Manual, as amended.
- J. The CONTRACTOR shall ensure the CONTRACTOR'S WIC Director/Coordinator or designee attends all Utah Association of WIC Administrators meetings.
- K. The CONTRACTOR shall securely store, maintain and convey all serialized inventory equipment, paper vouchers, eWIC cards and other disposables as required in the DEPARTMENT'S WIC Policy and Procedures Manual.
- L. The CONTRACTOR shall immediately conduct an initial investigation and follow-up of suspected fraudulent acts committed by WIC Program participants detected either by the CONTRACTOR or by the DEPARTMENT, and notify the DEPARTMENT immediately in every case when fraud is discovered or is confirmed to have occurred.
- M. The CONTRACTOR shall serve only participants who reside within the geographical area served by the CONTRACTOR. If CONTRACTOR serves specialty clients, it shall serve only those clients who reside within the geographical area served by the CONTRACTOR and shall serve only the special population(s) approved by the State WIC office. An exception(s) to this provision requires prior written approval by the State WIC Director, which will be reviewed on a case by case basis.
- N. If a printer error occurs, a CONTRACTOR's clinic is NOT allowed to print vouchers until the printer that experienced the error is identified. After that printer is identified, all other printers may continue to operate. The clinic will need to re-print any vouchers that were printed in error for a timeframe determined by the DEPARTMENT.

IV. NON-DISCRIMINATION

- A. The CONTRACTOR shall comply with all provisions required by the implementing regulations of the USDA, Department of Justice Enforcement Guidelines at 28 CFR 50.3, and FNS directives and guidelines (available at <u>https://www.fns.usda.gov/cr/civil-rights-laws-regulations</u>). No person shall on the grounds of race, color, national origin, sex, religious creed, disability, age, or reprisal or retaliation for prior civil rights activity in any program or activity conducted or funded by USDA be excluded from participation in, be denied benefits of, or otherwise be subjected to discrimination under any program or activity for which the CONTRACTOR receives Federal financial assistance from FCS. CONTRACTOR hereby gives assurance that the CONTRACTOR will immediately take measures necessary to effectuate all non-discrimination requirements.
- B. The CONTRACTOR shall compile data, maintain records and submit reports as required to permit effective enforcement of the nondiscrimination laws and permit authorized USDA

personnel during normal working hours to review such records, books and accounts as needed to ascertain compliance with the nondiscrimination laws. If any violations of these provisions are discovered, the DEPARTMENT or the USDA Food and Nutrition Service shall have the right to seek judicial enforcement of these provisions. These provisions are binding on the CONTRACTOR, its successors, transferees, and assignees, as long as they receive assistance or retain possession of any assistance from the DEPARTMENT.

V. COMPUTER EQUIPMENT AND SUPPLIES:

- A. The DEPARTMENT agrees to provide serially numbered food vouchers and certain blank forms to the CONTRACTOR. The DEPARTMENT also agrees to provide serially numbered eWIC cards to the CONTRACTOR.
- B. The CONTRACTOR owns the computers in operation at all local WIC clinics within the CONTRACTOR's jurisdiction. Computers and equipment that must be maintained and/or purchased by the CONTRACTOR includes, but may not be limited to: Personal Computers, Laptop Computers, LCD Screens/Monitors, Computer Mice, LCD Projectors, Report Printers and all other equipment required to maintain business operations.
- C. The CONTRACTOR shall replace any computer equipment that is lost, stolen, or abused.
- D. The DEPARTMENT agrees to replace all Magnetic Ink Character Recognition (MICR) Printers, Scanners, Signature Pads, and eWIC card reader devices that support the VISION (WIC) Information System food benefits issuance.
- E. The CONTRACTOR shall purchase MICR toner for all MICR printers within the CONTRACTOR's jurisdiction.
- F. The DEPARTMENT shall provide card acceptor devices to the CONTRACTOR for purposes of placing food benefits on electronic WIC smart cards.
- G. The CONTRACTOR shall supply its WIC Program with the computers purchased with Technology Services funding from this Contract. Computers and equipment for other CONTRACTOR programs may not be purchased using funding from this Contract.
- VI. NSA FUNDS MODIFICATION:
 - A. The total amount of NSA Funds under this Contract, as outlined in Section I.A., is subject to quarterly adjustments as required by State or Federal requirements and practices. Unused funds may lapse and revert back to the DEPARTMENT or USDA for reallocation.
- VII. TRAINING AND CERTIFICATION:
 - A. The DEPARTMENT agrees to provide workshops and other training for CONTRACTOR'S employees regarding nutrition, medical certification, eWIC benefit issuance and maintenance, and fiscal/administrative aspects of WIC.
 - B. The CONTRACTOR shall ensure that all employees of the CONTRACTOR involved in the WIC Program have an opportunity to attend DEPARTMENT-sponsored seminars and/or training meetings.

VIII. REQUIRED DEPARTMENT APPROVALS:

- A. The CONTRACTOR must obtain written approval from the DEPARTMENT to purchase capital equipment items. Capital Equipment items are defined as items or a group of like items with a cost of \$5,000.00 or more and a useful life of at least one year. Examples are building signage, building upgrades/modifications and vehicles. Computers and computer equipment does not require DEPARTMENT approval to purchase.
- B. The CONTRACTOR shall pay for all in-state and out-of-state travel by WIC staff. The CONTRACTOR must obtain written approval from the DEPARTMENT for out-of-state travel.

IX. INTERGENERATIONAL POVERTY EFFORTS

A. In an effort to support families who are experiencing intergenerational poverty and who desire to break the cycle for themselves and their children, the DEPARTMENT will reach out directly to families who self-identify or who have signed formal releases of consent to have their information shared with local health departments and other state agencies to be informed of resources and programs available that will promote positive health outcomes for themselves and their children.

X. DISPUTE RESOLUTION

- A. If any dispute arises between the parties during the activities described by this Contract, the parties agree to seek a resolution through open communication and dialogue.
- B. Either party may request a conference to resolve a disputed issue (consistent with Utah Admin. Code R380-10-3, which supports dispute resolution at the lowest level possible).
- C. If a resolution cannot be reached, Department may bring supervisory personnel into the process to facilitate resolving issues and achieving agreement.
- D. The provisions in Sections X.B. and X.C. are not mandatory.
- E. If a dispute is not resolved within 30 days of Department decision, the Department's decision is considered the "initial agency determination," as defined by Utah Admin. Code R380-10-2(3).
- F. These provisions do not preclude or affect the provisions, rights, limitations, or timelines for appealing Department actions that are provided or required by Utah Code §§ 26-23-2, 26-1-4.1, or 26-1-7.1, Utah Admin. Code R380-10, or the Utah Administrative Procedures Act (Utah Code § 63G-4).
- G. In the event of any conflict between the Dispute Resolution provisions in the Special Provisions of this Contract with applicable law or rules, the provisions of the applicable law or rules shall control.

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

We appreciate this opportunity to comment and look forward to completion of the project.



1.1 Summary of Proposed Project

The Bluff City Historic Preservation Association (BCHPA), in partnership with the Grand Canyon Trust (GCT), the Bureau of Land Management (BLM) Monticello Field Office (MFO), and local property owners, proposes to construct, maintain, and designate 6.7 miles of trails on BLM-managed lands, as part of a greater 10.6 mile Bluff River Trail system. The non-motorized trail system would be developed for pedestrian, bicycle (including e-bikes), and equestrian use on BLM-managed lands and private land easements (3.9 miles), along the San Juan River between Sand Island Recreation Area and the town of Bluff, UT. The trail would be natural surface, except for a 0.9-mile accessible trail segment (segment #2) that may require additional materials for hardening to meet Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA) standards. In addition to two proposed trailheads on private property in Bluff, an approximately one-acre trailhead would be developed and maintained on BLM-managed lands along the entry road to Sand Island Recreation Area to provide access at the trail system's west end. The trail system would also be accessible from an existing parking area in Loop A of Sand Island Campground. The segments of trail on private property have already been constructed but the trailheads have not. See **Appendix E** for additional maps.

Bluff River Trail

The Bureau of Land Management (BLM) conducted an Environmental Assessment (EA) to assess the potential impacts associated with the construction, maintenance, and designation of the Bluff River Trail on BLM-managed lands. The EA is incorporated by reference for this Finding of No Significant Impact. The Proposed Action would meet the underlying need for the BLM to provide multiple recreational uses of public lands and to sustain a wide range of recreation opportunities and potential experiences for visitors and residents, while supporting local economic stability, and sustaining the recreation resource base and other sensitive resource values. The proposed action has been reviewed and found to be in conformance with the Monticello Field Office (MFO) Resource Management Plan (RMP), as amended, dated November 2008.

Based on the analysis of potential environmental impacts contained in the EA, and considering significance criteria in 40 CFR 1508.27, I have determined that construction, maintenance and designation of the Bluff River Trail, as outlined in the Proposed Action, is not a major federal action and will not significantly affect the quality of the human environment, individually or cumulatively with other actions in the general area. The project does not in and of itself have international, national, regional, or state-wide importance. No environmental effects identified for this alternative meet the definition of significance in context or intensity as defined in 40 CFR 1508.27(b) (1-10) and do not exceed those effects described in the 2008 MFO RMP, as amended. Therefore, an environmental impact statement (EIS) is not required.







The system was established in 1926 and the U. S. Route System has reached the point of review, revision, consolidation, and perfecting, rather than continuous expansion. Therefore, any proposed alteration in the established system should be extremely meritorious and thoroughly, though concisely, explained in order that the Route Numbering Committee and the Executive Committee of the Association may give prompt and proper consideration to each and every request made by a Member Department.

Explanation and Reasons for the Request: (Keep Concise and Pertinent)

It is requested that U.S. Route 160 be designated from Cortez, Colorado southerly over the routing of U.S. Route 666 for approximately 20 miles to the junction with present U.S. Route 164 and thence southwesterly on the routing of present U.S. Route 164 to a junction with U.S. Route 89 near Tuba City, Arizona.

Present U.S. Route 164 is designated from U.S. Route 666 south of Cortez, Colorado, southwesterly to U.S. Route 89 near Tuba City, Arizona. The entire routing of present U.S. Route 164 will be designated as a portion of U.S. Route 160 and there-fore, it is requested that the present location of U.S. Route 164 be deleted under this proposal.

It is further suggested that the routing from proposed U.S. Route 160 (present U.S. Route 164) at Kayenta, Arizona, northerly via Arizona State Highway No. 464 and Utah State Highway No. 47 through Mexican Hat, Bluff, and Blanding to Monticello, Utah, then northerly via present U.S. Route 160 to Crescent Junction (U.S. Route 6 & 50), be designated as U.S. Route 164 and therefore it is requested that the present designation of U.S. Route 160 from Monticello, Utah, to Crescent Junction be deleted under this proposal.





In reply to your letter of November 4, 1969 concerning U.S. Highway 160 we have the following comments:

The description of U.S. Route 160 was extremely difficult to follow since it referred to overlapping routes not existing in Arizona, or routes located in a different part of the State. Arizona has no State Route 40 or 44. State Route 67 is located at the north rim of the Grand Canyon, some 50 miles west of the western terminus of U.S. 160. May it also be noted that the junction of U.S. 160 and U.S. 89 is 10.4 miles west of Tuba City, not in Tuba City as stated in your description.

Assuming proposed U.S. Route 160 follows the alignment previously assigned by AASHO to U.S. 164 in Arizona, we concur in your recommendations.

Would you please notify us whether our assumptions concerning U.S. 160 routing are correct, and the effective date of this action? An early response would be sincerely appreciated since our sign shop and mapping division are awaiting official authorization to begin the considerably complex task of renumbering a long route.

At the meeting of the U. S. Route Numbering Subcommittee held October the 25th, in Philadelphia, the following action was taken on your requests for the renumbering of highways in the Four Corners area.

The following action was taken and approved by the Executive Committee on October the 26th, to designate as U. S. Highway 160 that route from Cortez, Coloraod, south overlapping U. S. 666 to the intersection of State Route 40, thence overlapping State Routes 40, 67 and 44 to the intersection of U. S. 89 in Tuba City, Arizona.







We are very much in favor of the proposed extensions of U.S. Highway 666 and U.S. Highway 163. This involves extending U.S. 666 through Blanding via U.S. 191, west to Hanksville on S.R. 95, then west towards Richfield on S.R. 24. U.S. 163 could extend east on the newly completed highway at Bluff to Montezuma Creek and on to connect with U.S. 160 in Colorado. It could also extend west from Kayenta, Arizona on U.S. 160 to S.R. 98 north to Page, north on U.S. 89, then to S.R. 14 and end at Cedar City.







The Valuation Appeal Form has been completed and supplied to the Utah State Tax Commission to initiate the process for appeal of the 2020 Assessment for Elk Operating Services, LLC (Account #14584239-002-PCA).

The basis of the appeal is specifically the natural gas production valuation in the McElmo Creek Unit. As shown in the attached document (2019 Monthly Gross Production and Sales by Unit), the natural gas production was 1,650,450 MCF but only 487 MCF was sold as residue gas. The difference was either processed into NGL's, Flared or Re-injected to the Unit as part of a continued long-term pressure maintenance project to enhance crude oil production.

The second attachment to review is the data from the Utah State Tax Commission's economic summary of reserves. This shows the natural gas projections used to calculate the 'After Tax Value'. The Qi Rate (163,174 MCF/month) is the initial rate of natural gas production and although that number is accurate the amount sold as natural gas is much less. As mentioned in the prior paragraph, most of the natural gas produced is recycled and injected back into the Unit. A correct assumption to be used in the USTC economics would be to use a much smaller volume of natural gas as a Qi Rate.

The 2020 Notice of Assessment currently values the Units at \$107,909,198. With the adjustment in natural gas production back to what is actually sold the expected value will be approximately \$90,000,000.

The 2020 Notice of Assessment is attached to this appeal package.

SETTLEMENT STIPULATION

Centrally Assessed Property Tax

1. This Stipulation is entered into by and between the Property Tax Division of the Utah State Tax Commission (the "Division") and Elk Operating Services, LLC ("Elk Operating").

2. The parties have discussed and considered their respective positions concerning the assessed values determined by the Division for the related tax years and recognize the considerable costs and risks inherent in the potential litigation of these matters.

3. The parties mutually desire to avoid these costs and risks and fully settle and resolve Elk Operating's appeal for the property tax year in question without further litigation, in a fair, reasonable and economic fashion.

4. The parties agree to resolve and settle the above-captioned appeal by stipulating to the following "Stipulated Taxable Value" for the property tax year in question:

<u>Tax Year</u>	Original Assessment	Stipulated Taxable Value
2020	\$107,909,198	\$87,992,858

5. The parties further stipulate that the amounts identified as "Stipulated Taxable Value" reflect the parties' reasonable approximation of the fair market value of Elk Operating's taxable property under Utah law for the property tax year at issue.

6. The Division made two separate clerical errors in the initial assessment of Elk Operating. Elk Operating provided information regarding their shrinkage of nearly 100% of their natural gas production. This shrinkage information was not used in the original value calculation by the Division. Elk Operating also provided an updated Indian Revenue Interest, which was greater than the previous year. This update was not entered in the original assessment.

7. The appraisal methods applied in this stipulation pertain to the lien dates listed above only and the use of such methods cannot be used as evidence or as an admission against any party in another lien date or matter.

8. The parties understand that this Stipulation is subject to approval by the Utah State Tax Commission and shall become final and conclusive between the parties upon approval by the Utah State Tax Commission, as evidenced by a written order executed by the Tax Commissioners.

9. Should the Tax Commission decline to approve this Stipulation, it shall be null and void and shall not be admissible as evidence against any party in any future proceedings.

10. The parties further stipulate that Elk Operating's above-captioned Utah property tax appeal shall be dismissed when the Tax Commission's Order of Approval becomes final.

H. Reason for Relief - Statement of Facts - Summary of Arguments & Authorities Relied Upon.

<u>H.a. Reason for Relief</u>. The current historic depressed price for crude oil, the lack of a gas gatherer in the Paradox Basin and the COVID-19 historic destruction of our nation's economy are well known facts. DELHI-Trading, LLC's (DELHI) oil wells are not currently profitable, and as such have no value. These wells are a liability due to the cost to plug and abandon a 5000' deep oil well. A one-year reprieve from taxation is a reasonable request during these worse than the great depression times.

Hb. Statement of Facts. Specific hardships Producers have to deal with are as follows:

- First and foremost, is the COVID-19 coronavirus, plus Marathon Petroleum Corp. (Western Refining SW inc.) idled its Gallup, New Mexico, refinery. It was the first U.S. facility to shut down as the coronavirus pandemic emptied skies of passenger planes and the roads of cars. Refiners are still unable to move much of their products. They have been "faced with the prospect of completely shutting down," said Andy Lipow, president of Lipow Oil Associates in Houston, as reported in the Herald Dispatch newspaper. An inability to sell oil reduces our ability to make a profit
- 2. Also depressing oil prices was the production battle between Russia and Saudi Arabia. COVID-19 and the Russia Saudi aggressive production battle created the perfect profit killing storm; decreased demand and increased supply.
- Further hurting Producers ability to make a profit is CASTLETON COMMODITIES INTERNATIONAL LLC ("CCI") shutting down their 262-mile gas gathering system in the four corners region. CCI's gathering system is the only pipeline taking gas from Paradox Basin wells. As you should know, Paradox oil producers are not allowed to flare their natural gas associated with oil production. Some producers have been given relief, but such will not be allowed indefinitely.
- 4. DELHI is not able to operate profitably. The attached income and expense documentation proves that DELHI's Paradox Basin wells are not profitable.
- 5. DELHI has been especially hard hit because its oil field's only saltwater disposal well is not functioning. The cost to truck DELHI's saltwater to a saltwater disposal facility is very expensive; averaging about \$5.50 per barrel.

H.c. <u>Summary of Arguments & Authorities</u>. All of the above calamities have destroyed DELHI's ability to be profitable. Many Paradox have and will plug their wells. No new wells are being drilled. Those facts eliminated the value of the pipe and oil field equipment being that supply is great and there is no demand. There are no buyers for pipe and oil field equipment. Assigning such a value is not justified at this time.

The Utah State Tax Commission, Property Tax Division has unjustifiably assigned a value to DELHI's Paradox wells. Under the current conditions these wells are a plugging liability. Plugging a 5000+ foot deep well can average over \$50,000. To assign any value to DELHI's wells in the Paradox is a miscarriage of justice.

The federal government and many state government agencies have and are providing different forms of relief to many businesses. Paradox oil Producers need a reprieve to get through these extremely trying times.

Once the Covid-19 virus is contained our economy should recover which will once again increase the demand for oil. Then and only then would it be appropriate to assign a value to DELHI's Paradox Basin oil and gas wells.

Therefore, DELHI respectfully requests a one-year reprieve from a tax assessment form the Property Tax Division of Utah's State Tax Commission for the reasons setout above.

- 2. A segment of D2374 Section 32, Township 27 South, Range 23 East, Salt Lake Base and Meridian; approximately 0.179 miles in length.
- 3. A segment of D0674 Section 32, Township 27 South, Range 23 East, Salt Lake Base and Meridian; approximately 0.223 miles in length.
- 4. A segment of D2765 Section 32, Township 27 South, Range 23 East, Salt Lake Base and Meridian; approximately 0.682 miles in length.
- 5. A segment of D2764 Section 32, Township 27 South, Range 23 East, Salt Lake Base and Meridian; approximately 0.913 miles in length.
- 6. A segment of D2762 Section 32, Township 27 South, Range 23 East, Salt Lake Base and Meridian; approximately 1.36 miles in length.
- 7. A segment of D2473 Section 32, Township 27 South, Range 23 East, Salt Lake Base and Meridian; approximately 0.09 miles in length.

The Utah Department of Transportation (UDOT) has reviewed the proposal and Charles Stormont, Director of Right-of-Way, has provided the following response:

"I write in response to your letter dated August 25, 2020 regarding the petition that San Juan County has received to vacate several Class D roads. As co-owner of Class D roads, see Utah Code Section 72-1-105, we appreciate the opportunity to provide a response to your inquiry.

After review of the petition it appears that access to public lands would be eliminated if these roads were to be vacated. From the information provided, we have not been able to determine how or if alternative access to these areas exists. Pursuant to Utah Code 72-7-103 "a highway authority may not close a legal point of access to a public highway, unless: (a) the property has a reasonably equivalent access to the public highway after the legal access is closed; or (b) the highway authority acquires the legal point of access by gift, agreement, purchase, or eminent domain."

Without evidence that alternative access has been provided to these areas, UDOT is concerned that vacating these Class D roads would violate this statute and constitute an inverse condemnation. We have also been informed that there was litigation concerning these roads in the past. We would appreciate more information about that litigation and any Court orders that might apply to this area.

The letter mentioned alternate routes. If alternate routes could be obtained to provide the same historic access to public lands, across BLM lands or other potential routes, then maybe the impacts could be mitigated, and some of the roads could potentially be vacated. Until alternate routes are established, these roads should remain public to provide access to public lands."





Ben,

There are several environmental and safety concerns pertaining to the STRIKE RAVINE trail. The Strike Ravine trail runs through private property to include: Area BFE, Kane Creek Canyon Properties LLC., and John Rzeczycki/Kiley Miller. Unfortunately, due to the conditions caused by four wheel use and nature; it has been determined a safety hazard. Most of the trail is eroded, people have built obstacles on private property or have cleared vegetation to go around the erosion or boulders that are on the road so that they can keep using it. The land is privately owned making this activity illegal; not what the intended use of the road.

The Strike Ravine trail is not clearly marked causing people to get lost on the many trails that come off Strike Ravine into Area BFE. These trails are extreme 5+ so vehicles equipped for Strike Ravine are definitely not capable of navigating safely. We have found that when vehicles wander off Strike Ravine that they are trying to build their own road to get around all the obstacles we have on our trails at Area BFE. This is not only very dangerous, but also creates a lot of erosion issues as well as destroying our property!



Area BFE is in the planning process for construction of an event center to include: Conference Center, Lodging, Cabins, R.V. Sites and many more amenities. In conclusion, we the owners are requesting the closure of Strike Ravine due to the aforementioned. Area BFE has already discussed this with BLM and The Red Rock Four Wheel Association; both have agreed to reroute Strike Ravine outside of private



SUMMARY

In an effort to improve backcountry user safety the Utah Avalanche Center (UAC) and San Juan County – Utah's Canyon Country have placed two signs at key trailheads that provide access to backcountry winter recreationalist in San Juan County. Users include skiers, snowmobilers, snowshoers, and etc. Both signs provide reminders to users that if they plan to enter avalanche terrain to check the advisory forecast, provided by UAC, and to carry avalanche gear. Additionally, the signs Dalton Spring sign includes electronics allowing users to test if their avalanches beacons are fully functional. The UAC is committed to the region in providing forecasts for both the La Sal's and the Abajo's through the creation of separate advisory forecasts for each range. Additionally, UAC provides training for new and veteran users in how to travel safely through avalanche terrain. The MOU states that San Juan County will support the project with an annual contribution of \$500. The proposal is for these funds to come from the TRT percentage used for mitigating the impacts of visitation in an effort to support public safety.

A RESOLUTION RECOMMENDING AND ENCOURAGING THE NAVAJO NATION TO ALLOW SAN JUAN COUNTY TO MAINTAIN ALL "B" ROADS IN THE SAN JUAN, UTAH PORTIONS OF THE NAVAJO NATION AND AMEND THE CURRENT INTERGOVERNMENTAL AGREEMENT TO PERFORM MAINTENANCE OF THESE ROADS

WHEREAS, on April 7, 2020, The Navajo Nation and San Juan County entered into in Intergovernmental Agreement whereby the Navajo Nation permitted the resumption of routine road maintenance, snow removal, and flood repair services by San Juan County Road Department for 74.1 miles of school bus routes in the Navajo Nation portion of San Juan County; and

WHEREAS, we continue receive comments and complaints from the citizens requesting the County to resume maintaining the "B" roads in the Navajo Nation portion of San Juan County; and

WHEREAS, the County desires to maintain these roads that are currently not being adequately maintained and would like to request that the Navajo Nation amend the Intergovernmental Agreement allowing the County the right-of-way and authority to maintain these routes; and

WHEREAS, the County, upon amending the Intergovernmental Agreement, would request the road maintenance funds for those roads to the State of Utah, but requests similar funding from the Navajo Nation matching those road maintenance monies, similar to that which is done in other Counties within the Navajo Nation portions of Arizona and New Mexico; and

WHEREAS, the County has met with several Chapters and has heard the pleas of both of our citizens and feels that time is of the essence; that we can commence maintenance work to preserve those asphalt, gravel and dirt surfaces needing repair before more costly damage and disrepair takes place; and

Commissioners:

Last year, you had authorized the County to be a pass through for the preservation grant of \$10,000 to the County Historic Commission to begin the first phase of the \$20,000 post rehab of the Oljato Trading Post. Robert McPherson has continued to work on this project and has satisfied and met the terms of the grant award. Last year, he also requested additional funds to complete the preservation of the Oljato Trading Post. Due to budget constraints at the State level, funding was not received for the project.

At this time, it has been asked that the County assist them in this effort by applying to the Utah Navajo Trust Fund for Non-Chapter Funding for the restoration project in a request for \$35,000 to replace the roof on the Trading Post. In total, the re-roofing project will cost \$50,000 based on estimates. The Utah Division of State History/State Historic Preservation Office has already earmarked \$5,000 for this project through the National Trust for Historic Preservation. An additional \$10,000 is being requested at this time from the National Trust for Historic Preservation to complete the amount needed to complete the roof replacement.


As a reminder, this one hundred year old Trading Post was constructed in 1921 with additions in the 1930s and early 40s. The original structure has a rectangular trading hall with a shallow gable roof. It consists of a center "bull-pen" area for customers surrounded on three sides by an elevated floor for the clerks. Living quarters and storage areas are included in the additions. The walls are primarily double-wythe stacked native sandstone with adobe sections as well. The roof consists of rough-hewn logs over which is a later 1940s(?) roof structure consisting of a 2x4 grid overlaid with sheathing and roofing material. Most of the roofing material and some of the sheathing is missing, and what remains is in very poor condition (see photos).

We are requesting your authorization and support as we submit an application requesting grant funds for the project.

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

OLJATO CHAPTER RESOLUTION Resolution#: <u>DLJ 06-16-2019</u>

OLJATO CHAPTER HEREBY SUPPORTS AND APPROVES FOR COOPERATING ENTITIES AND NOT LIMITED TO SAN JUAN COUNTY, SAN JUAN COUNTY HISTORICAL COMMISSION, UTAH DIVISION OF STATE HISTORY, STATE HISTORIC PRESERVATION OFFICE (SHPO), UTAH DIVISION OF INDIAN AFFAIRS, AND NAVAJO NATION HISTORIC DEPARTMENT, TO STABILIZE AND REHABILITATE THE OLJATO TRADING POST.

WHEREAS:

- 1. Pursuant to 26 N.T.C., Section 1, (B), (1), (2) and Section 103, (B), the Oljato Chapter is recognized as a local government entity and delegated authorities and responsibilities with respect to local matters consistent with Navajo Nation Laws; and
- 2. Pursuant to 2 N.T.C., Section 4028 (a), the Oljato Chapter has the authority to review matters affecting the community and make appropriate recommendations to the Navajo Nation, County and State government agencies, and other governmental entities, and
- 3. The Oljato Chapter acknowledges the Oljato Trading Post as a historic site; and
- 4. Oljato Chapter supports efforts to stabilize and rehabilitate the deteriorated, dilapidated and unstable historic structures; and
- 5. The State Historic Preservation Office (SHPO) Certified Local Government (CLG) program can provide a matching grant of up to \$10,000 in the next grant round in January 2020. San Juan County is eligible to apply for CLG grants because of its partnership with SHPO; and
- 6. The cooperating parties will continue to explore and identify other sources of funds and expect the 2020 CLG grant will provide funding sources to this project; and
- 7. San Juan County can apply for the 2022 CLG grant (a CLG can apply only every other year); and
- 8. The SHPO will provide with permission from the Navajo Nation to visit the site and conduct a structural assessment. Written assessment will be shared with all parties. All recommended rehab work will meet the Secretary of the Interior's Standards for Rehabilitation in order to ensure financial support from federal and other funding sources; and
- 9. After reviewing the assessment, the cooperating entities will discuss opportunities for proceeding with the Oljato Trading Post project and will identify the "lead" parties both for specific action items as well as for the overall project.

NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED THAT:

Oljato Chapter supports and approves for the cooperating and not limited to the Navajo Nation, County, State, National, and Federal entities to stabilize and rehabilitate the Oljato Trading Post and Hogan.

Oljato Trading Post Re-roofing Project

(9-28-20)

Project Summary

This project will repair/replace the roof on the long-vacant 1921 Oljato Trading Post. The roof is in a very advanced state of deterioration, allowing water in at various locations, eroding the adobe and stone walls and compromising the structure.

Applicant Information

The San Juan County Commission is the applicant for UNTF Non-Chapter Funding to assist the Oljato Trading Post Restoration Project in Monument Valley. The Commission is also in close contact with the Utah Division of State History/State Historic Preservation Office (SHPO) as well as the Navajo Nation (the building owner), and the Oljato Chapter (see attached resolutions). The SHPO recently applied for a \$10,000 grant from the National Trust for Historic Preservation, a Washington, D.C., based nonprofit historic preservation organization. The SHPO is also contributing \$5,000 toward the re-roofing project, and provided a \$10,000 grant earlier in 2020 for some much-needed stabilization and clean-up work on the building.

Grant Request

The grant request is for \$35,000. The overall budget for the re-roofing project is \$50,000, based on pro-bono structural assessments and estimates provided by the SHPO's historic preservation architect. As noted above, the SHPO has applied for a \$10,000 grant from the National Trust for Historic Preservation and has already earmarked \$5,000 of its own funds toward the project.

Project Description

This one hundred year old was constructed in 1921 with additions in the 1930s and early '40s. The original structure has a rectangular trading hall with a shallow gable roof. It consists of a center "bull-pen" area for customers surrounded on three sides by an elevated floor for the clerks. Living quarters and storage areas are included in the additions. The walls are primarily double-wythe stacked native sandstone with adobe sections as well. The roof consists of rough-hewn logs over which is a later 1940s(?) roof structure consisting of a 2x4 grid overlaid with sheathing and roofing material. Most of the roofing material and some of the sheathing is missing, and what remains is in very poor condition (see photos).

Immediate Need

The emergency is that the roof is in very poor condition and the numerous leaks threaten the integrity of the structure. The problem has been years in the making, but it has reached a point

where the resulting damage is going to be irreversible. The fragile materials--stacked stone and adobe--are especially prone to water damage, as evidenced by some significant cracks in the walls and the large quantity of "melted" adobe and plaster that have sloughed off due to water penetration over the years. A three-day clean-up effort in March 2020 stabilized some of the most fragile areas and removed the accumulated debris caused by water erosion. That clean-up effort followed the recommendations made in a structural report prepared by the Utah SHPO's historical architect in the summer of 2019. That assessment deemed the building to still be structurally viable, but unless the roof could be repaired soon there would be significant structural failures.

The Navajo Nation and Oljato Chapter own and are responsible for the building, but resources for preserving the building are scarce. The San Juan County Historical Commission has taken the lead in trying to raise funds and partnerships to preserve the building. They are coordinating closely with the Navajo Nation and they are taking advantage of grants and technical assistance from the SHPO. This partnership represents the first time a coordinated effort has been made on behalf of this historic building, which is one of the very few original trading posts left in the Four Corners area. The combination of an immediate structural need and an effective proponent partnership makes this the ideal time to act. Plus, winter is approaching, and getting a roof on now could prevent additional and potentially catastrophic water damage.

The assistance needed at this time is entirely financial. The SHPO has the architectural and technical expertise to help move this project forward. Getting a roof on the building would not only protect the structure, it would also demonstrate that progress is being made, which would strengthen support for the project. We saw that result during the March 2020 clean-up/ stabilization effort, as many residents of the Oljato community stopped by to see what was going on and to express their support. We even have institutional support from Utah State University/Eastern. Some two dozen students and staff from the university's Price and Blanding campuses volunteered three days of their time during spring break to help with the clean-up. The time spent amounted to the \$10,000 match necessary for the grant.

Expected Outcome

The initial outcome will be a sound roof that can protect the historic trading post for many years to come. The longer-term outcome is that the building will be functional once again, serving as a community center and as a cultural tourism destination. The San Juan County Historical Commission has met with numerous individuals and stakeholder groups to come up with a plan for the building that will meet short- and long-term community needs, including economic development. Contact for this organization/project is Robert McPherson, Board Member. The Oljato Trading Post is one of the few original and historically intact trading posts in the Four Corners area. It would provide a more authentic experience than is currently available in the larger, more commercially focused trading posts and tourist destinations.

The Oljato Trading Post would provide a unique experience for visitors, both as a distinctive tourist destination and as a venue for showcasing local culture, art, and traditional crafts and products. It would also serve as a gathering place for the local community. This vision for the

structure has been captured in a series of promotional drawings and sketches of what the facility could look like and how it might function (see attachments).
