RULES FOR DISCUSSION FROM THE FLOOR AND PUBLIC HEARINGS

DISCUSSION FROM THE FLOOR

- Discussion from the floor is limited to three minutes per person. Longer presentations must be scheduled through the Administrator, Clerk/Treasurer's office.
- Individuals wishing to be heard must sign in with their name and address. Meetings are video recorded so individuals must approach the podium and speak clearly into the microphone.
- Council action or discussion should not be expected during "Discussion from the Floor."
 Council may direct staff to research the matter further or take the matter under advisement for action at the next regularly scheduled meeting.

PUBLIC HEARINGS

The purpose of a public hearing is to allow the City Council to receive citizen input on a proposed project. This is not a time to debate the issue.

The following format will be used to conduct the hearing:

- The presenter will have a maximum of 10 minutes to explain the project as proposed.
- Councilmembers will have the opportunity to ask questions or comment on the proposal.
- Citizens will then have an opportunity to ask questions and/or comment on the project. Those wishing the comment are asked to limit their comments to 3 minutes.

In cases where there is a spokesperson representing a group wishing to have their collective opinions voiced, the spokesperson should identify the audience group he/she is representing and may have a maximum of 10 minutes to express the views of the group.

- People wishing to comment are asked to keep their comments succinct and specific.
- Following public input, Councilmembers will have a second opportunity to ask questions of the presenter and/or citizens.
- After everyone wishing to address the subject of the hearing has done so, the Mayor will close the public hearing.
- The City Council may choose to take official action on the proposal or defer action until the next regularly scheduled Council meeting. No further public input will be received at that time.

Pursuant to due call and notice thereof, the regularly scheduled meeting of the Spring Lake Park City Council Work Session was held on July 10, 2023 at the Spring Lake Park City Hall, 1301 81st Ave. NE, at 5:47 PM.

2. DISCUSSION ITEMS

A. Minnesota GreenStep Cities Discussion (Goodboe-Bisschoff/Moran)

Administrator Buchholtz introduced the item. He explained that the Minnesota GreenStep Cities program is a voluntary challenge, assistance and recognition program that provides a framework to help cities achieve their economic, environmental and quality of life goals. He said the program is based on 29 best practices tailored to all Minnesota cities with a focus on cost savings, energy use reduction and civic innovation.

Councilmember Goodboe-Bisschoff stated that she learned about the program at the League of Minnesota Cities Annual Conference. She stated that when she reviewed the action steps under the list of best practices and determined that the City is already doing a number of them. She expressed her opinion that the City should be recognized for the good work it is doing. Councilmember Moran agreed, stating that she felt this was a beneficial program that could challenge the City to be more sustainable.

CONSENSUS of the City Council was to direct the Administrator to draft a resolution participating in the GreenStep Cities program.

B. Hybrid Code Enforcement Approach Discussion (Morris)

Code Enforcement Inspector Morris stated that he is requesting the City transition to a more proactive code enforcement model. He stated that Blaine, Fridley, Coon Rapids and Mounds View provide proactive code enforcement at the discretion of their respective code enforcement officers. He stated that the model used by Blaine, Fridley and Coon Rapids is not a good fit for the City. He suggested the hybrid approach used by the City of Mounds View which allows for proactive enforcement for the most obvious violations (unnecessary clutter/junk,

parking on lawns, poorly maintained homes, etc) while utilizing complaint based code enforcement for less-frequently received complaints. He stated that this hybrid approach better suits the residents expectations for Code Enforcement while alleviating the sense that the City is picking on a particular resident whose property was the subject of a complaint when there are other similar violations on the same block.

Councilmember Goodboe-Bisschoff inquired as to what violations would be subject to proactive code enforcement. Mr. Morris stated that he would look for violations related to noxious weeds, trash and debris, motor vehicle parking/registration, abandoned vehicles and property, discarding of debris onto public right-of-ways, property maintenance code violations, and various life safety and emergency response related codes.

Mayor Nelson expressed his vehement opposition to proactive code enforcement, stating that there could be room for abuse. He said previous code enforcement officials performed code enforcement arbitrarily and unfairly. He stated his belief that the complaint based code enforcement was the best approach.

Councilmember Goodboe Bisschoff expressed concern about proactive enforcement on recreational fire pits, noting that some had been in place prior to the Fire Code being adopted in the City.

Councilmember Dircks expressed her opinion that proactive code enforcement is important to maintaining a basic aesthetic standard in the City. She stated that she was supportive of transitioning to proactive code enforcement. Councilmember Wendling agreed. Councilmember Dircks suggested a policy be drafted to specify exactly how the hybrid code enforcement strategy would work.

CONSENSUS of the City Council was to ask Code Enforcement Inspector Morris to draft a proactive code enforcement policy for potential adoption by the City Council.

Mayor Nelson left the meeting at 6:15pm.

C. Cannabis Ordinance Update Discussion (Buchholtz)

Administrator Buchholtz stated that the City Attorney recommended amending the City Code relating to the recently adopted recreational cannabis law approved by the State Legislature. He stated that the proposed ordinance would repeal the City's edible cannabinoid product ordinance, as that ordinance will be pre-empted by the new State Law in October. He said the proposed ordinance would replace the City's licensing ordinance with more basic zoning restrictions as to where such businesses may operate, in compliance with the new law. He stated that the proposed ordinance exercises the City's authority to prohibit public use of cannabis and edible cannabinoids and prohibits the possession of drug paraphernalia within the City.

Councilmembers discussed the upcoming legalization of cannabis. CONSENSUS of the City Council was to bring the proposed ordinance forward for possible adoption on August 7, 2023.

D. Concept Plan Discussion - SE Corner of CSAH 10 & Spring Lake Park Road (Buchholtz)

Administrator Buchholtz stated that the City has received an inquiry from a developer for a 100-unit, 55+ age restricted market rate apartment building to be located on a 2.66 acre parcel currently occupied by three homes at the southeast corner of CSAH 10 and Spring Lake Park Road.

City Council reviewed the proposed concept plan and expressed support for the intial concept. Administrator Buchholtz stated that he would inform the developer of the Council's discussion.

7. DEPARTMENT REPORTS

A. Public Works Report

Public Works Director Randall stated that the department was busy at the first week of June setting up and tearing down for the Tower Days Parade and the activities at Lakeside Lions Park. He reported that the seal coat streets were swept and will be swept one more time before staff paints the crosswalks.

Public Works Director Randall stated he presented the budget for his department to Administrator Buchholz and Accountant Barker.

Councilmember Dircks inquired about the amount of "0" reads on the water meters. Public Works Director Randall explained how the "0" meter's may have happened.

B. Code Enforcement Report

Building Official Baker reported that Code Enforcement received 49 long grass complaints for June 2023 compared to 200 long grass complaints for the month of June 2022. He stated that he and Administrator Buchholtz attended the court hearing on the Garfield property. Building Official Baker thanked Attorney Thames for his work representing the City and addressing the safety concerns.

Building Official Baker stated that two permits were issued for remodeling projects in the six-figures range. He reported that he presented his proposed 2024 budget to Administrator Buchholtz and Accountant Barker.

C. Police Report

Chief Antoine reported that the Police Department responded to 940 calls for service in June 2023 compared to 806 calls for service for the month of June 2022. He said that School Resource Officer Imig submitted his annual report for the 2022-2023 school year.

Chief Antoine said Investigator Bennek handled 37 cases for the month of June, 28 of which were felony in nature and 9 misdemeanor cases. He said Investigator is monitoring 5 active forfeiture cases.

Chief Antoine stated that he participated in the Law Enforcement Torch Run for Special Olympics, along with Records Technicians Lisa Murphy and Kim Kiley, Officer Kelsey Smith and Code Enforcement Officer Walter Morris.

Chief Antoine reminded the City council and the public that August 1, 2023 is Night to Unite. He said residents can visit the Police Department website to register for the event.

D. Recreation Report

Recreation Director Okey thanked reported that the Able Park Building was open and now in use. She stated that the Tower Days Committee met June 20 to wrap up the season. She noted that the first planning meeting for 2024 will be held in October 2023.

8. ORDINANCES AND/OR RESOLUTIONS

A. Resolution 2023-27, Authorizing the City of Spring Lake Park to Participate in the Minnesota GreenStep Cities Program

Administrator Buchholtz gave an overview of the Minnesota GreenStep Cities Program. He stated that the program is a voluntary challenge, assistance and recognition program. He said the program provides a framework to help cities achieve economic, environmental and quality of life goals.

Administrator Buchholtz stated that the program is based on 29 best practices. He said that each practice can be complemented by completing one or more actions at a 1, 2 or 3-star level, from a list of four to eight actions. Administrator Buchholtz said the actions are tailored to all Minnesota cities, focus on cost savings and energy use reduction, and encourage civic innovation.

Administrator Buchholtz said that the passage of this resolution will allow the City to be recognized as a Step 1 GreenStep City.

Councilmember Goodboe-Bisschoff stated her opinion that the City has already accomplished a number of steps and should be recognized for its work.

Motion made by Councilmember Goodboe-Bisschoff to approve Resolution 2023-27, Authorizing the City of Spring Lake Park to Participate in the Minnesota GreenStep Cities Program.

Voting Aye: Councilmember Wendling, Councilmember Goodboe-Bisschoff, Councilmember Dircks, Councilmember Moran, Mayor Nelson. Motion carried.

B. Resolution 2023-28, Authorizing Application for Community Development Block Grant

Administrator Buchholtz reported that Anoka County Community Development notified the City that the entire city qualifies as a low/moderate income area for the purposes of the Community Development Block Grant (CDBG). He stated that the City does not have to income qualify households in order to use CDBG funding.

Administrator Buchholtz stated that the staff is seeking authority to seek CDBG funds to pay for the Able Park playground equipment. He stated that the grant request will be in the \$85,000-\$100,000 range.

Motion made by Mayor Nelson to approve Resolution 2023-28, Authorizing Application for Community Development Block Grant.

Voting Aye: Councilmember Wendling, Councilmember Goodboe-Bisschoff, Councilmember Dircks, Councilmember Moran, Mayor Nelson. Motion carried.

C. Resolution 2023-29, Ordering Preparation of Feasibility Report for 2024 83rd Avenue NE Pavement Project

Engineer Gravel stated that the 83rd Avenue was last reconstructed in 1994. He stated that the Public Works Director reviewed the roadway surface and determined that a pavement preservation project is necessary. Administrator Buchholtz stated a portion of the project costs will be assessed to the adjacent property owners.

Engineer Gravel requested the City Council order preparation of a Feasibility Report for 2024 83rd Avenue NE Pavement Project. He stated that the Feasibility Report for 83rd Avenue can be included with the report for Sanburnol and Elm.

Mayor Nelson asked if the project would be a mill and overlay. Councilmember Wendling inquired if the overlay would be thicker because of the traffic volume. Engineer Gravel stated that the overlay would be 2" thick. He stated that 83rd Avenue is a state aid street and would qualify for state aid funds.

Administrator Buchholtz informed the Council that the segment of the sidewalk between Nelson's Cheese and the apartments would be connected as part of the project.

Motion made by Councilmember Wendling to approve Resolution 2023-29, Ordering Preparation of Feasibility Report for 2024 83rd Avenue NE Pavement Project.

Voting Aye: Councilmember Wendling, Councilmember Goodboe-Bisschoff, Councilmember Dircks, Councilmember Moran, Mayor Nelson. Motion carried.

9. **NEW BUSINESS**

A. Accept 2022 Audited Financial Statements

Jason Miller, Smith Schafer and Associates, gave an overview of the City's 2022 financial statements. He stated that the City received an unmodified opinion, that the financial statements are free of material misstatements. He stated that there were no exceptions noted under the Minnesota Legal Compliance testing.

Mr. Miller stated the City's General Fund Balance at the end of 2022 was \$2,669,955, which represents 59% of the 2022 expenditures. He noted that the City's debt burden as of December 31, 2020 was \$1,634,468, with the majority of the debt service retired by 2025.

Motion made by Mayor Nelson to accept the 2022 Audited Financial Statements.

Voting Aye: Councilmember Wendling, Councilmember Goodboe-Bisschoff, Councilmember Dircks, Councilmember Moran, Mayor Nelson. Motion Carried.

B. Award Quote for the Abatement of Nuisance at 8064 Garfield Street

Building Official Baker stated that five companies were contacted for quotes to demolish the home at 8064 Garfield Street, and two quotes were received. He is seeking Council's approval to award the project to Rick's Demolition and Concrete Removal for a total of \$29,819.05. Building Official Baker said the project would be paid for initially by the city and assessed to the property upon completion.

Councilmember Goodboe-Bisschoff inquired if any of the trees would need to be removed. Mr. Baker did confirm that in order to get the equipment onto the property some of trees would need to be removed. Councilmember Goodboe-Bisschoff asked if the property would be checked for vermin. Mr. Baker said that the property would be cleared out before any demolition took place.

Motion made by Councilmember Goodboe-Bisschoff to Award Quote for the Abatement of Nuisance at 8064 Garfield Street to Rick's Demolition & Concrete Removal.

Voting Aye: Councilmember Wendling, Councilmember Goodboe-Bisschoff, Councilmember Dircks, Councilmember Moran, Mayor Nelson. Motion Carried.

C. <u>Authorization to Purchase Two Public Works Trucks</u>

Public Works Director Randall stated he is seeking authorization to purchase two trucks: a 2024 GMC 2500 4x4 pickup for \$44,865, and a 2024 Chevrolet 3500 4x4 for \$45,609.

He stated that the purchase would be funded through the Equipment Fund and the Public Utilities Renewal and Replacement Fund. Director Randall stated that the delivery time is 90-180 days.

Motion made by Mayor Nelson to approve Authorization to Purchase Two Trucks.

Voting Aye: Councilmember Wendling, Councilmember Goodboe-Bisschoff, Councilmember Dircks, Councilmember Moran, Mayor Nelson. Motion Carried.

D. 2024 North Metro Telecommunications Commission Budget

Administrator Buchholtz gave an overview of the 2024 North Metro Telecommunications Commission Budget. He stated that the proposed budget is \$1,420,610, which represents a \$27,692 increase over the 2023 operating budget. He stated that the increase includes a 3% COLA increase for staff, step increases, benefits increase, building maintenance cost, an accounting service, and insurance costs.

Administrator Buchholtz stated the capital cost for 2024 are \$570,8845, which represents a \$57,451 decrease from the 2023 budget. The capital expenditures include video equipment for North Metro TV, a security system update, \$230,266 for the final HD Bond payment and \$150,000 returned to cities.

Motion made by Councilmember Goodboe-Bisschoff to Approve 2024 North Metro Telecommunications Commission Budget.

Voting Aye: Councilmember Wendling, Councilmember Goodboe-Bisschoff, Councilmember Dircks, Councilmember Moran, Mayor Nelson. Motion Carried.

A. Attorney's Report

Attorney Thames thanked the Council for proceeding with the 8064 Garfield process forward. He stated that the judge complimented the work of Building Official Baker and his staff for their work.

B. Engineer's Report

Report accepted as presented.

C. Administrator Report

Administrator Buchholtz updated the Council on Triangle Park. He stated that the plantings were completed, and fencing was placed Public Works staff. The fencing will be in place during the growing season.

Administrator Buchholtz gave an update on the Highway 65 Pell Study. He stated that the utility rate study has begun and a workshop will be held in October. He updated the Council on the status of the City's GIS software and the need to upgrade to ARCGIS.

Subject: Cannabis, Edible Cannabinoids and Drug Paraphernalia Ordinance

As the Council is aware, the Minnesota Legislature passed a new law in 2022 which made it legal to sell certain edible cannabinoid products (a.k.a. "lower potency hemp edibles"). In response to this new law, the City of Spring Lake Park passed Ordinance 11.48 "Edible Cannabinoid Products" which created a local licensing framework for vendors who made such sales.

In 2023, the Minnesota Legislature approved Session Law Ch. 63, which expanded both the legalization of the types of THC products and the also the types of THC and Cannabis businesses permitted in the state. The same also established certain registration/licensing frameworks for edible cannabinoid vendors. The Legislature concurrently repealed MN Statute 152.092 ("Possession of Drug Paraphernalia Prohibited") and made certain revisions to MN statute 152.025 ("Controlled Substance Crime in the Fifth Degree"), which excepts from that crime the possession of residual amounts of controlled substances which are found in drug paraphernalia. This exception was expanded to except possession of controlled substances beyond marijuana. (See the relevant portion of the revised law below.)

152.025 Controlled Substance Crime in the Fifth Degree

Subd. 2. Possession and other crimes.

A person is guilty of controlled substance crime in the fifth degree and upon conviction may be sentenced as provided in subdivision 4 if:

(1) the person unlawfully possesses one or more mixtures containing a controlled substance classified in Schedule I, II, III, or IV, except a small amount of marijuana or a residual amount of one or more mixtures of controlled substances contained in drug paraphernalia;

Subject to certain limitations, the 2023 laws permit cities to prohibit the public use of cannabis and cannabinoid products and also to prohibit the possession of drug paraphernalia. The City passed a moratorium at its last meeting to temporarily prohibit the operation of cannabis businesses to allow the time for the matter to be studied and for proper regulations to be established. The moratorium does not apply to edible cannabinoid products, which are currently sold pursuant to the City's licensing process.

The state intends to begin registering vendors of edible cannabinoid products this fall. All such vendors must register with the state by October 1, 2023. It is believed that when the state begins to issue registration/licenses to such businesses, that local regulation thereof will be preempted. This will mean that the City of Spring Lake Park's Edible Cannabinoid Licensing framework must cease in favor of the state registration/licensing process. This proposed ordinance will repeal that licensing process and replace it with more basic zoning restrictions as to where such businesses may operate, in compliance with the new law. The Council will need to determine in what zoning districts theses sales should be permitted and whether any restriction on the number of registrations will be imposed.

This proposed ordinance also exercises the City's authority to prohibit public use of cannabis and edible cannabinoids and prohibits the possession of drug paraphernalia within the City. The latter prohibition does not prohibit marijuana paraphernalia, but does prohibit possession of paraphernalia containing residual amounts of controlled substances *other than marijuana*. The passage of this ordinance will allow the maintenance of the status quo for law enforcement to conduct searches based on probable cause as to the possession of illegal controlled substances (e.g. methamphetamines, etc.).¹

¹ Illustratively, in the event of detection of a controlled substance other than marijuana in a vehicle, an otherwise valid search of that vehicle can remain valid even if the search does not yield the discovery of a controlled substance beyond residue within drug paraphernalia.

SPRING LAKE PARK ORDINANCE 488

AN ORDINANCE AMENDING THE SPRING LAKE PARK CITY CODE RELATING TO CANNABIS AND EDIBLE CANNABINOID PRODUCTS

NOW THEREFORE, be it ordained by the Council of the Spring Lake Park, in the State of Minnesota, as follows:

SECTION 1: REPEAL "11.48 EDIBLE CANNABINOID PRODUCTS" of the Spring Lake Park Municipal Code is hereby *repealed* as follows:

REPEAL

11.48.010 Purpose And Intent

The Minnesota Legislature adopted M.S. § 151.72, making it legal to sell certain edibles and beverages infused with tetrahydrocannabinol (THC), the cannabis ingredient extracted from hemp. The City Council deems it necessary to provide for the regulation of edible cannabinoid products in order to protect the public health safety and welfare and to ensure that edible cannabinoid products are sold in accordance with State Law.

11.48.020 Adoption Of State Law By Reference

The provisions of M.S. § 151.72, as it may be amended from time to time, are hereby adopted by reference and are made a part of this section as if set out in full.

11.48.030 Definitions

In addition to the definitions contained in M.S. § 151.72, as it may be amended from time to time, the following terms are defined for purposes of this section.

CITY. The City of Spring Lake Park.

COMPLIANCE CHECKS. The system used by the city, or other applicable governmental unit, to investigate and ensure that those authorized to sell edible cannabinoid products are following and complying with the requirements of this chapter. **COMPLIANCE CHECKS** may involve the use of persons under the age of 21 authorized by this chapter. **COMPLIANCE CHECKS** may also be conducted by other units of government for the purpose of enforcing appropriate state and local laws and regulations relating to edible cannabinoid product.

SELF-SERVICE MERCHANDISING. Open displays of edible cannabinoid products in any manner where any person has access to the edible cannabinoid product without the assistance or intervention of the licensee or the licensee's employee. Assistance or intervention means the actual physical exchange of the licensed product between the customer and the licensee or employee.

TOBACCO STORE. A retail store utilized primarily for the sale of tobacco products and accessories and in which the sale of other products is incidental.

VENDING MACHINE. Any mechanical, electric, or electronic, or other type of device which dispenses tobacco-related products upon the insertion of money, tokens, or other form of payment directly into the machine by the person seeking to purchase the tobacco-related product.

11.48.040 License

- A. *License required*. No person shall sell or offer to sell any edible cannabinoid product without first having obtained a license to do so from the city.
- B. *License eligibility*. No license shall be issued except to a person operating a tobacco store licensed under SLPC 11.12, as it may be amended from time to time.
- C. *Application*. An application for a license to sell edible cannabinoid products shall be made on a form provided by the city. Upon receipt of a completed application, the Administrator, Clerk/Treasurer shall forward the application to the Police Department for the purpose of conducting a background check on the applicant. The Police Department shall have ten (10) days from receipt of a complete application to complete the background check. Upon completion of the background check, the Police Department shall forward the application and investigation results to the City Council for action at its next regularly scheduled meeting. If the Administrator, Clerk/Treasurer determines that an application is incomplete, he/she shall return the application to the applicant with notice of the information necessary to make the application complete.
- D. *Action*. The City Council may either approve or deny the license, or it may delay action for a reasonable period of time as necessary to complete any investigation of the application or the applicant it deems necessary. If the City Council approves the license, the Administrator, Clerk/Treasurer shall issued the license to the applicant. If the City Council denies the license, notice of the denial shall be given to the applicant along with notice of the applicant's right to appeal the decision.
- E. *License fee*. No license shall be issued under this chapter until the appropriate license fee is paid in full. The annual fee for a license under this chapter shall be established in the city's ordinance establishing fees and charges, as may be amended from time to time. Initial license applications covering a period of less than one year shall be charged a fee calculated on a monthly pro rata basis.
- F. Restriction on issuance.
 - 1. No license shall be granted or renewed for operation on any premises on which taxes, assessments, utility charges, service charges, or other financial claims of the city are delinquent and unpaid. In the event an action has been commenced pursuant to the provisions of M.S. Ch. 278, as it may be amended

- from time to time, questioning the amount or validity of taxes, the Council may, on application by the licensee, waive strict compliance with this paragraph. No waiver may be granted, however, for taxes or any portion thereof which remain unpaid for a period exceeding one year after becoming due.
- 2. No license shall be issued for a premises within 500 feet of any school or church. The distance is to be measured from the closest side of the school or church to the closest side of the structure on the premises within which edible cannabinoid products are to be sold.
- 3. No license shall be granted if the applicant, responsible party, owner, manager or any other person involved with the licensee:
 - a. Is under the age of 21;
 - b. Who is not of good moral character and repute; and
 - c. Who has been convicted, within five years prior to the application for such license, of any violation of any law of the United States, this state or any other state or territory or of any local ordinance regarding the manufacture, sale or distribution of edible cannabinoid products.
- G. Term. All licenses issued under this chapter shall expire on December 31 of each year.
- H. *Revocation or suspension*. Any license issued under this chapter may be revoked or suspended as provided in this chapter.
- I. *Transfers*. All licenses issued under this chapter shall be valid only on the premises for which the license was issued and only for the person to whom the license was issued. No transfer of any license to another location or person shall be valid without the prior approval of the City Council.
- J. *Display*. All licenses shall be posted and displayed in plain view of the general public on the licensed premises.
- K. *Renewals*. The renewal of a licenses issued under this chapter shall be handled in the same manner as the original application. The request for a renewal shall be made at least 30 days but not more than 60 days before the expiration of the current license.
- L. *Issuance as privilege and not a right.* The issuance of a license issued under this chapter shall be considered a privilege and not an absolute right of the applicant and shall not entitle the holder to an automatic renewal of the license.

11.48.050 Unlawful Acts

- A. *Unlawful sales*. It shall be a violation of this chapter for any person to sell any edible cannabinoid product:
 - 1. To any person under the age of 21 years;
 - 2. By means of any type of vending machine;
 - 3. By means of self-service methods whereby the customer does not need to make a verbal or written request to an employee of the licensed premises in order to receive the edible cannabinoid product and whereby there is not a physical and in person exchange of the edible cannabinoid product between the licensee or the licensee's employee, and the customer; or
 - 4. That is in violation of M.S. § 151.72, as it may be amended from time to time.

- B. *Use of false identification*. It shall be a violation of this chapter for any person to attempt to disguise his/her true age by the use of a false form of identification, whether the identification is that of another person or one on which the age of the person has been modified or tampered with to represent an age older than the actual age of the person.
- C. *Unlawful purchases*. It shall be unlawful for any person who is under the age of 21 years to purchase any edible cannabinoid product. Persons acting under the direct supervision of the city, law enforcement, or other governmental unit and which are actively engaged in a compliance check of the licensed premises are exempted from this provision while engaged in the compliance check.
- D. *Distribution of edible cannabinoid product samples*. It shall be unlawful for any licensee or any person, business or retailer to distribute or give away edible cannabinoid products free of charge to any person on any right-of-way, park, playground, school or other property owned by the city.

11.48.060 Licensee Responsibility

All licensees under this chapter shall be responsible for the actions of their employees in regard to the sale of edible cannabinoid products on the licensed premises, and the sale of such an item by an employee shall also be considered a sale by the license holder. The license holder shall at all times be responsible for how edible cannabinoid products are offered for sale on the licensed premises and for ensuring that such edible cannabinoid products are compliant with this chapter and state and federal law. Violations of this code, state law, or other applicable law or regulation may be enforced against the license holder and any other responsible individual. Nothing in this section shall be construed as prohibiting such separate enforcement actions related to a single behavioral incident nor shall the imposition of any penalty act as a bar to the prosecution, licensing action, or other enforcement action against another.

11.48.070 Compliance Checks; Inspections

All licensed premises shall be open to inspection by the City Police Department or other authorized city official during regular business hours. The City shall conduct compliance checks from time to time but at least twice per year. The City will conduct at least one compliance check that involves the participation of a person between the ages of 18 and 20 to enter the licensed premises to attempt to purchase edible cannabinoid products. Persons under the age of 21 used for compliance checks shall not be guilty of an unlawful purchase or attempted purchase, not the unlawful possession of edible cannabinoid products when those items are obtained or attempted to be obtained as part of the compliance check. No person under the age of 21 used in compliance checks shall attempt to use a false identification misrepresenting the persons age and all persons under the age of 21 lawfully engaged in a compliance check shall answer all questions about their age asked by the licensee or his/her employee and shall produce any identification, if any exists, for which he/she is asked.

11.48.080 Violations And Penalty

A. Violations a misdemeanor. A violation of this chapter shall be a misdemeanor. Nothing

in this chapter shall prohibit the city from seeking prosecution as a misdemeanor for any alleged violation of this chapter.

B. Violations.

- 1. *Notice*. Upon discovery of a suspected violation, and in addition to any criminal sanction, the alleged violator may be issued, either personally or by mail, an administrative offense citation pursuant to SLPC 3.20, setting forth the alleged violation and the alleged violator's right to be heard on the accusation.
- 2. *Hearing*. The person accused of violating this chapter may request a hearing in writing within 14 days of receipt of the notice of violation and a hearing shall be scheduled, the time and place of which shall be provided to the accused violator.
- 3. *Hearing officer.* The City Council, or its designee, shall appoint a person to serve as the hearing officer.
- 4. *Decision*. If the hearing officer determines that a violation of this chapter did occur, that decision, along with the hearing officer's reasons for finding a violation and the penalty to be imposed under this section, shall be recorded in writing, a copy of which shall be provided to the accused violator. Likewise, if the hearing officer finds that no violation occurred or finds grounds for not imposing any penalty, those findings shall be recorded and a copy provided to the acquitted accused violator.
- 5. *Appeal*. Appeals of any decision made by the hearing officer shall be made to the City Council in writing within seven days of receipt of the hearing officer's decision. The decision of the City Council shall be final.
- 6. *Continued violation*. Each violation, and every day in which a violation occurs or continues, shall constitute a separate offense.
- C. *Administrative penalties, individuals*. If a person who is not a licensee is found to have violated this chapter, the person shall be charged an administrative penalty of \$50 for a first violation of this chapter, \$100 for a second violation within a 12-month period and \$150 for a third or subsequent violation within a 12-month period.
- D. *Administrative penalties, licensee*. Any licensee found to have violated this chapter, or whose employee shall have violated this chapter, shall be charged an administrative penalty of \$500 for a first violation of this chapter, \$1,000 for a second violation at the same licensed premises within a 36-month period and \$2,000 for a third or subsequent violation at the same location within a 36-month period. After the third violation, the license is automatically suspended for seven days commencing the day following the date of exhaustion of any right of appeal, complemplated herein, of the third offense. In addition to the seven day suspension, the City Council shall conduct a hearing at the next regular Council meeting following the third violation to determine whether the license should be suspended longer than seven days. Any additional suspension may be for the remainder of the license period or 90 days, whichever is greater. Upon a fourth violation at the same location within a 36-month period, the license will be revoked.

The provisions of M.S. § 151.72 and M.S. Ch. 342, as each may be amended from time to time, are hereby adopted by reference and are made a part of this section as if set out in full.

SECTION 5: <u>ADOPTION</u> "11.50.030 Public Use Of Cannabis And Edible Cannabinoids Prohibited" of the Spring Lake Park Municipal Code is hereby *added* as follows:

ADOPTION

11.50.030 Public Use Of Cannabis And Edible Cannabinoids Prohibited(Added)

It is unlawful for any person to use cannabis flower, cannabis products, lower-potency hemp edibles, or hemp-derived consumer products as each is defined by state law, in a public place within the City of Spring Lake Park. For the purposes of this Section, "public place" shall not include:

- a. A private residence, including the curtilage or yard of the same;
- b. Private property not generally accessible by the public, unless the person is explicitly prohibited from consuming cannabis products, lower-potency hemp edibles, or hemp-derived consumer products on the property by the owner of the property;
- c. The premises of an establishment or event licensed to permit on-site consumption, provided the use complies with the on-site consumption permit.

Any violation of this Section shall be a petty misdemeanor.

SECTION 6: <u>ADOPTION</u> "11.50.040 Limitations On The Sale Of Edible Cannabinoid Products" of the Spring Lake Park Municipal Code is hereby *added* as follows:

ADOPTION

11.50.040 Limitations On The Sale Of Edible Cannabinoid Products(Added)

Edible Cannabinoid Products, as defined by M.S. § 151.72, which contain no more than 0.3% Tetrahydrocannabinol (commonly known as "THC"), may only be sold by businesses which are registered with the City and the State of Minnesota and licensed, when required by state law. To be eligible to register to sell edible cannabinoid products within the City, an applicant must comply with all of the following:

- a. Pay the applicable registration fee to the City;
- b. Comply with all state and local registration and state licensing requirements;
- c. Locate the principal place of business which will conduct the sales within the C-1 and C-2 zoning district and, at the time of the application, no more than one other business which does not comply as a "Cannabis Business" pursuant to M.S. Ch. 342 is currently registered or licensed to sell edible cannabinoid products within that district; and
- d. The sale of edible cannabinoid products outside of the zoning districts or in excess of the applicable registration limitations set forth in (c) is prohibited.

The City specifically intends that the requirements of this Section be considered local zoning requirements or regulations for the purposes of compliance with M.S. Ch. 342.

SECTION 7: <u>ADOPTION</u> "11.50.050 Possession Of Drug Paraphernalia Prohibited" of the Spring Lake Park Municipal Code is hereby *added* as follows:

ADOPTION

11.50.050 Possession Of Drug Paraphernalia Prohibited(Added)

It is unlawful for any person knowingly or intentionally to use or possess drug paraphernalia.

For the purposes of this Section, **DRUG PARAPHERNALIA** is defined as all equipment, products, and materials of any kind, except those used in conjunction with permitted uses of controlled substances pursuant to state law, which are knowingly or intentionally used primarily in (1) manufacturing a controlled substance other than cannabis flower, cannabis products, lower potency hemp edibles, or hemp-derived consumer products, (2) injecting, ingesting, inhaling, or otherwise introducing into the human body a controlled substance other than cannabis flower, cannabis products, lower potency hemp edibles, or hemp-derived consumer products, or (3) enhancing the effect of a controlled substance other than cannabis flower, cannabis products, lower potency hemp edibles, or hemp-derived consumer products. **DRUG PARAPHERNALIA** does not include the possession, manufacture, delivery, or sale of: (1) hypodermic syringes or needles or any instrument or implement which can be adapted for subcutaneous injections; or (2) products that detect the presence of fentanyl or a fentanyl analog in a controlled substance.

Any violation of this Section shall be a petty misdemeanor.

SECTION 8: <u>AMENDMENT</u> "11.52.020 Criminal History License Background Investigations" of the Spring Lake Park Municipal Code is hereby *amended* as follows:

AMENDMENT

11.52.020 Criminal History License Background Investigations

- A. The Police Department is hereby required, as the exclusive entity within the city, to do a criminal history background investigation on the applicants for the following licenses within the city:
 - 1. Peddlers, solicitors and transient merchants;
 - 2. Tobacco or edible cannabinoid products;
 - 3. Intoxicating liquor;
 - 4. Wine and 3.2% malt;
 - 5. Liquor pawnbrokers;
 - 6. Second hand goods;
 - 7. Dealer vehicles for hire;
 - 8. Sauna;
 - 9. Massage services;
 - 10. Sexually oriented business;
 - 11. Lawful gambling premises;
 - 12. Permit bingo hall;
 - 13. Kennel license: and
 - 14. Used car dealership.
- B. Conducting the criminal history background investigation. In order to screen license applicants, the Police Department is authorized to access data maintained in the Minnesota Bureau of Criminal Apprehensions Computerized Criminal History information system in accordance with BCA policy. Any data that is accessed and acquired shall be maintained at the Police Department under the care and custody of the chief law enforcement official or his or her designee. A summary of the results of the Computerized Criminal History data may be released by the Police Department to the licensing authority, including the City Council, the City Administrator or other city staff involved in the license approval process.
- C. Before the investigation is undertaken, the applicant must authorize the Police Department by written consent to undertake the investigation. The written consent must fully comply with the provisions of M.S. Ch. 13, as it may be amended from time to time, regarding the collection, maintenance and use of the information. Except for the positions set forth in M.S. § 364.09, as it may be amended from time to time, the city will not reject an applicant for a license on the basis of the applicant's prior conviction unless the crime is directly related to the license sought and the conviction is for a felony, gross misdemeanor, or misdemeanor with a jail sentence. If the city rejects the applicant's request on this basis, the city shall notify the applicant in writing

of the following:

- 1. The ground and reasons for the denial;
- 2. The applicant compliant and grievance procedure set forth in M.S. § 364.06, as it may be amended from time to time;
- 3. The earliest date the applicant may reapply for the license; and
- 4. That all competent evidence of rehabilitation will be considered upon reapplication.

SECTION 9: CUSTOM CLAUSE NAME The City Fee Schedule is hereby amended to repeal the fee for Edible Cannabinoid Products licenses and to establish the Lower Potency Hemp Edible Retailer (Sale of Certain Edible Cannabinoids) application fee at \$125/year per retail location, an initial license fee of \$125/year per retail location and renewal license fee of \$125/year per retail location.

SECTION 10: EFFECTIVE DATE This Ordinance shall be in full force and effect upon approval and publication according to law.

A RESOLUTION AUTHORIZING SUMMARY PUBLICATION OF ORDINANCE 488, AN ORDINANCE AMENDING THE SPRING LAKE PARK CITY CODE RELATING TO CANNABIS AND EDIBLE CANNABINOID PRODUCTS

WHEREAS, as authorized by Minnesota Statutes, Section 412.191, subd. 4, the City Council has determined that publication of the title and summary of Ordinance 488 will clearly inform the public of the intent and effect of the Ordinance; and

WHEREAS, a printed copy of the Ordinance is available for inspection during regular office hours in the office of the City Clerk.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the City Council of the City of Spring Lake Park, Minnesota that the following summary of Ordinance No. 488 is approved for publication:

"On August 7, 2023, the Spring Lake Park City Council approved Ordinance No. 488, entitled 'An Ordinance Amending the Spring Lake Park City Code Relating to Cannabis and Edible Cannabinoid Products.'

The following is a summary of Ordinance No. 488, a copy of which is available in its entirety for review during regular office hours at the City of Spring Lake Park, 1301 81st Avenue NE, Spring Lake Park, MN, or for review on the City's website, www.slpmn.org.

The Ordinance repeals Section 11.48, Edible Cannabinoid Products. The ordinance adopts a new Section 11.50, Cannabis and Edible Cannabinoid Products; Drug Paraphernalia. Section 11.50 establishes the purpose and intent of the ordinance, adopts M.S. § 151.72 and M.S. Ch. 342 by reference, prohibits use of cannabis and edible cannabinoids in public places, limits sale of low-potency edible cannabinoid products, prohibits possession of drug paraphernalia, except that used for cannabis products, and amends Section 11.52.020(A)(2) of the City Code to strike edible cannabinoid products from that section. The ordinance establishes registration/license fees for lower potency hemp edible retailers at \$125/year.

The Ordinance takes effect upon publication in the City's newspaper of record."

2023 MS4 Permit and SWPPP Update (193805251). The 2023 Annual Public Meeting was held on June 20th. Pond, structural BMP, and outfall inspections due by July 31st. Program analysis and annual training is due in December. The next Annual Report is due by June 30, 2024. Per 5-15-23 message: MPCA has put their requested review/audit of the city's 2022 information on hold until further notice.

2023 Sewer Lining Project (193805871). This project includes lining the remaining sanitary sewers in the city that have not been lined (approximately 35,710-feet). Terry Randall will watch this project. The Contractor is Visu-Sewer Inc with a low bid amount of \$1,047,746. Construction Contracts have been signed and sent to the contractor (Visu-Sewer Inc.). *Contractor has indicated that they intend to start work this fall.*

2023 Seal Coat and Crack Repair Project (193806041). Project included street maintenance on the streets in the area north of 81st Avenue and east of Able Street. The Contractor was Allied Blacktop (bid amount of \$97,770). Construction work has been completed. Final payment can be processed when contractor submits project close-out documents.

City Hall Building (193806049). The Design Phase for the city hall remodel project started in January 2023. The schedule calls for obtaining construction bids in late 2023. Council updated at spring 2023 workshops. Public Open House was held on May 8th. Bids are anticipated later this fall with contract award to be considered in December. *Plan preparation and staff meetings continue*.

Geographic Information System (GIS) and Mapping (19380----). The city has a need to update the mapping and records system for public works documents. Staff has been discussing implementing an online AcrGIS system maintain documents and mapping of infrastructure.

Suite Living Spring Lake Park (Hampton Cos. project at 525 Osborne). A site work and landscaping inspection needs to be completed in 2023. The remaining financial surety will be held until a final inspection (including landscaping) and CCWD sign off in 2023.

2024 Sanburnol Drive NE, Elm Drive NE, and 83rd Avenue NE (193806347). Sanburnol Drive (**SAP 183-103-001**) and Elm Drive (**SAP 183-104-001**) were reconstructed in 1998. 83rd Avenue NE was last paved in 1994. Sanburnol Drive is a shared road between the cities of Spring Lake Park and Blaine. Spring Lake Park will be the lead agency on this project, but it will be a cooperative project between Blaine and Spring Lake Park. *Joint Powers Agreement (JPA) with Blaine has been prepared. Geotechnical work has been completed. Feasibility Report being prepared.*
