MINUTES OF CITY OF WHARTON CITY COUNCIL REGULAR MEETING SEPTEMBER 12, 2022

Mayor, Tim Barker, declared a Regular Meeting duly open for the transaction of business at 7:00 P.M. at City Hall 120 E. Caney Street Wharton, TX. Councilmember, Clifford Jackson, led the opening devotion and Mayor, Tim Barker, led the pledge of allegiance.

After some discussion, Councilmember, Don Mueller, moved to excuse Councilmember, Russell Machann. Councilmember, Clifford Jackson, seconded the motion. All voted in favor.

2. Proposed Budget for the City of Wharton, Texas Fiscal Year October 1, 2022 to September 30, 2023.

Mayor, Tim Barker opening the Public Hearing on the Proposed Budget for the City of Wharton, Texas Fiscal Year October 1, 2022 to September 30, 2023 at 7:12 p.m.

No comments were given.

Mayor, Tim Barker, closed the Public Hearing at 7:13 p.m.

Review and Consider:

The first item on the agenda was to review and consider action on changes to the Proposed Budget for the City of Wharton, Texas Fiscal Year October 1, 2022 to September 30, 2023. Finance Director, Joan Andel, stated that during the August 22, 2022, Regular City Council meeting she presented under separate cover a copy of the Proposed Budget for the City of Wharton, Texas, Fiscal Year October 1, 2022 to September 30, 2023. Mrs. Andel stated this item would allow the City Council to direct the City Staff to make any changes to the Proposed Budget prior to the formal adoption, which is scheduled for September 26, 2022. After some discussion, Councilmember, Don Mueller, moved to approve without changes the Proposed Budget for the City of Wharton, Texas Fiscal Year October 1, 2022 to September 30, 2023. Councilmember, Clifford Jackson, seconded the motion. All voted in favor.

The second item on the agenda was to review and consider reading of the minutes from the regular meetings held August 8, 2022 and August 22, 2022 and special meeting held August 9, 2022. City Secretary, Paula Favors, presented copies of the draft minutes from the regular meetings held August 8, 2022 and August 22, 2022 and special meeting held August 9, 2022. After some discussion, Councilmember, Terry Freese, moved to approve the minutes from the regular meetings held August 8, 2022 and August 22, 2022 and special meeting held August 9, 2022. Councilmember, Larry Pittman, seconded the motion. All voted in favor.

The third item on the agenda was to review and consider a resolution of the Wharton City Council approving a written service agreement with the property owners of W.A. Harrison Agriculture Ltd. for the provision of services under Local Government Code 43.0672; and authorizing the Mayor of the City of Wharton to execute all documents relating to said agreement. City Secretary, Paula Favors, presented a copy of a memorandum to City Manager, Joseph R. Pace, stating it was required that a City that wants to annex an area of land under Subchapter C-3. Annexation of Area on Request of Owners, under the Local Government Code, must first negotiate and enter into a written agreement with the owners of the land in the area. Mrs. Favors stated that W.A. Harrison Agriculture Ltd., had requested that a certain 0.420-acre tract of land located within the M. Allen Survey, Abstract No. 1 being a part of a called 4.167-acre tract as recorded in Volume 1000, Page 476 of the Deed of Records of Wharton County, Texas be considered for annexation within the City of Wharton. She said the property owners had also agreed to the City of Wharton Annexation Agreement of Services. After some discussion, Councilmember, Terry Freese, moved to approve City of Wharton Resolution No. 2022-85, which read as follows:

CITY OF WHARTON

RESOLUTION NO. 2022-85

A RESOLUTION OF THE WHARTON CITY COUNCIL APPROVING A WRITTEN SERVICE AGREEMENT WITH THE PROPERTY OWNERS OF W.A. HARRISON AGRICULTURE LTD. FOR THE PROVISION OF SERVICES UNDER LOCAL GOVERNMENT CODE 43.0672; AND AUTHORIZING THE MAYOR OF THE CITY OF WHARTON TO EXECUTE ALL DOCUMENTS RELATING TO SAID AGREEMENT.

- WHEREAS, The City of Wharton wishes to enter into a written service agreement with the property owners of W.A. Harrison Agriculture for a certain 0.420-acre tract of land located within the M. Allen Survey, Abstract No. 1 being a part of a called 4.167-acre tract as recorded in Volume 1000, Page 476 of the Deed of Records of Wharton County, Texas; and,
- **WHEREAS,** The City of Wharton under Local Government Code 43.0672, shall negotiate and enter into a written agreement with the owners of the land that is being requested to be annexed; and,
- WHEREAS, The City of Wharton; and the owners of W.A. Harrison Agriculture for a certain 0.420 acre tract of land located within the M. Allen Survey, Abstract No. 1 being a part of a called 4.167 acre tract as recorded in Volume 1000, Page 476 of the Deed of Records of Wharton County, Texas, are in agreement with City of Wharton Annexation Agreement of Services, attached as Exhibit "A".

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF WHARTON, TEXAS as follows:

- **Section I.** That the Wharton City Council hereby approves the written service agreement with the property owners of W. A. Harrison Agriculture LTD for the provision of services under Local Government Code 43.0672.

Councilmember, Don Mueller, seconded the motion. All voted in favor.

The fourth item on the agenda was to review and consider an ordinance annexing the hereinafter described territory, owned by W. A. Harrison Agriculture, Ltd., Wharton County, Texas, and extending the boundary limits of said City so as to include said hereinafter described property within said City limits, and granting to all the inhabitants of said property all the rights and privileges of other citizens and binding said inhabitants by all of the acts, ordinances, resolutions, and regulations of said City, and adopting a service plan. City Secretary, Paula Favors, stated that during the regular August 8, 2022, Regular Wharton City Council Meeting, the City Council accepted a petition for voluntary annexation from W. A. Harrison Agriculture Ltd. Mrs. Favors said the first and only Public Hearing was held during this regular September 12, 2022, Wharton City Council meeting and since the requirements of the Public Hearing had been satisfied, the City Council could consider the ordinance annexing the properties owned by W.A. Harrison Agriculture, Ltd., listed below:

1. 0.420 acre tract of land, located within the M. Allen Survey, Abstract No. 1 being a part of a called 4.167 acre tract as recorded in Volume 1000, Page 476 of the Deed Records of Wharton County, Texas.

After some discussion, Councilmember Don Mueller, moved to approve City of Wharton Ordinance No. 2022-14, which read as follows:

CITY OF WHARTON ORDINANCE NO. 2022-14

AN ORDINANCE ANNEXING THE HEREINAFTER DESCRIBED TERRITORY, OWNED BY THE CITY OF WHARTON, WHARTON COUNTY, TEXAS, AND EXTENDING THE BOUNDARY LIMITS OF SAID CITY SO AS TO INCLUDE SAID HEREINAFTER DESCRIBED PROPERTY WITHIN SAID CITY LIMITS, AND GRANTING TO ALL THE INHABITANTS OF SAID PROPERTY ALL THE RIGHTS AND PRIVILEGES OF OTHER CITIZENS AND BINDING SAID INHABITANTS BY ALL OF THE ACTS, ORDINANCES, RESOLUTIONS, AND REGULATIONS OF SAID CITY, AND ADOPTING A SERVICE PLAN.

WHEREAS, Article I. Incorporation; Form of Government; Corporate and General Powers of the City of Wharton City Charter; Section 8 Extending city limits upon petition and Section 9 Extending and fixing city limits by ordinance as restricted by law, of the City Charter, of the City of Wharton, Texas, an incorporated city, authorizes the annexation of territory, subject to the laws of this state; and,

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APPROVED AS TO FORM:

- **WHEREAS,** The procedures prescribed by the City Charter of the City of Wharton, Texas, and the laws of this state have been duly followed with respect to the following described territory, to wit:
 - 1. 0.420 acre tract of land, located within the M. Allen Survey, Abstract No. 1 being a part of a called 4.167 acre tract as recorded in Volume 1000, Page 476 of the Deed Records of Wharton County, Texas. (Exhibit A).

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF WHARTON, TEXAS, that:

- Section I. That the heretofore described property is hereby annexed to the City of Wharton, Wharton County, Texas, and that the boundary limits of the above described territory within the city limits of the City of Wharton, and the same shall hereafter be included within the territorial limits of said city, and the inhabitants thereof shall hereafter be entitled to all the rights and privileges of other citizens of the City of Wharton and they shall be bound by the acts, ordinances, resolutions, and regulations of said city.
- **Section II.** A service plan for the area is adopted and attached as Exhibit B.
- **Section III.** The City Secretary is hereby directed to file with the County Clerk of Wharton, Texas, a certified copy of this ordinance.
- **Section IV.** This ordinance shall become effective immediately upon its passage.

The fifth item on the agenda was to review and consider a request from the Monterey Square Business Association for the following for the Monterey Square Wine and Arts Fair on October 8, 2022:

- A. Close Fulton Street between Burleson Street and Milam Street as well as close Houston Street between Burleson Street and Hawes Street from 2:00 p.m. until 10:00 p.m. on Saturday, October 8, 2022.
- B. Provide six (6) generator lights for safety for the fair location and Guffey Park parking area.
- C. Allow open containers for the alcohol on City property on the exterior sides of the Monterey Square and approximately two adjoining blocks to include all participating businesses.
- D. Waive all local permits and fees.
- E. Provide trash cans and bags.

City Manager, Joseph R. Pace, presented a copy of the letter dated August 8, 2022, from Ms. Margaret Montgomery Kosta, Secretary of the Monterey Square Business Association, providing her request for the afore-mentioned items. After some discussion, Councilmember, Terry Freese, moved to approve A., C., D., and F. as presented and item B. having the City provide two (2) generator lights for the event. Councilmember, Clifford Jackson, seconded the motion. All voted in favor.

The sixth item on the agenda was to review and consider a request by Mr. Ron Sanders, Executive Director of the Wharton Chamber of Commerce & Agriculture, for City of Wharton assistance by approving the following for the Party Under the Bridge to be held Thursday, October 20, 2022:

- 1. Closing to traffic from 4:00 p.m. to 8:00 p.m. a portion of Elm Street from Dinosaur Park to underneath the southbound lane of Business 59 and ending near the intersection with Polk Street.
- 2. Closing to traffic from 4:00 p.m. to 8:00 p.m. the Dinosaur Park parking lot and access roads.
- 3. Closing to traffic a portion of West Colorado Street from North Richmond Road southward to the end of Dinosaur Park.
- 4. Traffic control as needed, including for the route of a children's train.
- 5. Access to electrical power in close proximity as possible to the entrance to the park at Colorado Street.
- 6. Trash cans, and if possible, clean up assistance.
- 7. Request for mosquito spraying and fire ant treatment.

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- 8. Allow open containers within the confines of the event area coordinated with the Wharton Police Department.
- 9. Labor and logistics to pick up, set up and return tables and chairs.
- 10. Picking up, setting up, operating, and returning two (2) generator light plants that the Chamber will rent.
- 11. Waive all fees.

City Manager, Joseph R. Pace, presented a copy of a letter dated August 24, 2022, from Wharton Chamber of Commerce Executive Director, Ron Sanders, regarding the Party Under the Bridge. Mr. Sanders stated the event would be on Thursday, October 20, 2022, from 5:00 p.m. to 8:00 p.m. After some discussion, Councilmember, Terry Freese, moved to approve the afore mentioned items. Councilmember, Clifford Jackson, seconded the motion. All voted in favor.

The seventh item on the agenda was to review a consider a resolution of the Wharton City Council approving an amended contract between the City of Wharton and Wharton County for Emergency Medical Services for Ambulance Transports and authorizing the Mayor of the City of Wharton to execute all documents relating to said contract. EMS Director, Christy Gonzales, presented a draft copy of the contract and draft resolution for Emergency Medical Services for Ambulance Transports between the City of Wharton and Wharton County. Mrs. Gonzales stated that there were two changes from the previous contract. (1) Exhibit A had been updated to reflect current Medicare allowable fees and (2) Ancillary supplies. After some discussion, Councilmember, Terry Freese, moved to approve City of Wharton Resolution No. 2022-86, which read as follows:

CITY OF WHARTON RESOLUTION NO. 2022-86

A RESOLUTION OF THE WHARTON CITY COUNCIL APPROVING AN AMENDED CONTRACT BETWEEN THE CITY OF WHARTON AND WHARTON COUNTY FOR EMERGENCY MEDICAL SERVICES FOR AMBULANCE TRANSPORTS AND AUTHORIZING THE MAYOR OF THE CITY OF WHARTON TO EXECUTE ALL DOCUMENTS RELATING TO SAID CONTRACT.

- **WHEREAS,** The City of Wharton wishes to enter into an amended contract with Wharton County for Emergency Medical Services for Ambulance Transports; and,
- **WHEREAS,** The Wharton City Council and Wharton County wishes to be bound by the conditions as set forth in the contract; and,
- **WHEREAS,** The Wharton City Council wishes to authorize the Mayor of the City of Wharton to execute all documents related to the contract.

Councilmember, Larry Pittman, seconded the motion. All voted in favor.

The eighth item on the agenda was to review and consider a resolution of the Wharton City Council approving the purchase of a Contraband Team Inspection Kit for the Wharton Police Department and authorizing the Mayor of the City of Wharton to execute all documents related to said purchase. Chief, Terry David Lynch, stated that at the beginning of 2022, the Wharton Police Department received the Governor's Lone Star Grant for the purpose of combatting human smuggling and contraband detection. Chief Lynch said the Police Department had been operational for a few months and they were requesting the purchase of a necessary tool which would be funded by the grant, a CT-40 Contraband Team Inspection Kit which included a Videoscope Inspection System used to probe fuel tanks and crevices for the detection of narcotics/contraband was needed. He said the kit would be purchased through CSECO (Campbell Security Equipment Company), who was the sole manufacturer/distributor of this product for \$19,074.00, which was 100% funded through the grant. After some discussion, Councilmember, Terry Freese, moved to approve City of Wharton Resolution No. 2022-87, which read as follows:

CITY OF WHARTON RESOLUTION NO. 2022-87

A RESOLUTION OF THE WHARTON CITY COUNCIL APPROVING THE PURCHASE OF A CONTRABAND TEAM INSPECTION KIT FOR THE WHARTON POLICE DEPARTMENT AND AUTHORIZING THE MAYOR OF THE CITY OF WHARTON TO EXECUTE ALL DOCUMENTS RELATED TO SAID PURCHASE.

The ninth item on the agenda was to review and consider resolution of the Wharton City Council approving a Professional Engineering Services Contract with Quiddity Engineering, LLC, for the Valhalla Water Well Rehabilitation 2022 and authorizing the Mayor of the City of Wharton to execute all documents related to said contract. Public Works Director, Anthony Arcidiacono, presented a copy of the Professional Engineering Services Contract with Quiddity Engineering for the Valhalla Water Well Rehabilitation 2022. Public Works Director, Arcidiacono, said that according to the last inspection, the pump was down 40% of its overall efficiency and needed

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reworked. After some discussion, Councilmember, Don Mueller, moved to approve City of Wharton Resolution No. 2022-88, which read as follows:

Mrs. Andel said that during the Regular City Council meeting held September 12, 2022, the City Council held a Public Hearing to receive public input regarding the City of Wharton Annual Budget for Fiscal Year 2022–2023. After some discussion, Councilmember, Clifford Jackson, moved to approve City of Wharton Ordinance No. 2022-15, which read as follows:

CITY OF WHARTON, TEXAS ORDINANCE NO. 2022-15

AN ORDINANCE ADOPTING THE FISCAL YEAR 2022-2023 ANNUAL BUDGET FOR THE CITY OF WHARTON, TEXAS; APPROPRIATING THE SUMS ESTABLISHED THEREIN; AND DIRECTING THE CITY SECRETARY TO FILE COPIES AS REQUIRED BY LAW.

- **WHEREAS**, the City's Budget for the Fiscal Year ending September 30, 2023, which is attached hereto, was duly submitted to the City Council more than thirty (30) days prior to September 30, 2022; and,
- WHEREAS, a Public Hearing was duly called and held on said Budget not less than seven days nor more than fourteen days after date of publication giving notice of such meeting and prior to the time the City Council of the City of Wharton levied taxes for such current Fiscal Year; and,
- WHEREAS, all parties desiring to participate and be heard at said Public Hearing having been heard until no more evidence was offered, and such hearing having been concluded, and the City Council of said City having made such changes in such Budget as in its judgment the law warrants and the best interest of the taxpayers of the City of Wharton, Texas, demand, said Budget with such changes being attached hereto, as aforesaid.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF WHARTON, TEXAS:

- **Section 1. THAT** the findings set out in the preamble of this ordinance are true and correct.
- Section 2. THAT the Budget of the City of Wharton, Texas for the Fiscal Year ending September 30, 2023, be and the same is hereby, in all respects, finally approved and adopted including any changes approved by the City Council; and the same shall be and is hereby filed with the City Secretary of the City.

Section 3.

THAT the General Fund is hereby established to account for resources associated with traditional government activities, which are not required legally or by sound financial management to be accounted for in another fund. The General Fund is hereby approved with \$6,560,284 estimated revenues and \$7,665,930 in appropriations and with transfers-in approved at \$1,180,144 and transfers-out approved at \$74,498. The amounts are specified for departmental purposes named in said Budget and they are hereby appropriated to and for such purposes at the departmental level.

Section 4.

THAT, the PEG (Public, Educational, Government television access) Fund is created to account for all funds received from the 1% franchise fee provided through the local cable provider. The PEG Fund is hereby approved with \$3,500 in estimated revenues and \$3,500 in appropriations.

Section 5.

THAT the Hotel Motel Fund is created to account for the occupancy tax levied on hotel rooms within the City as adopted by City Ordinance and consistently with Chapter 351 of the Texas Tax Code. The Hotel Motel Fund is hereby approved with \$281,850 in estimated revenues which includes \$281,850 in appropriations including transfers-out approved at \$224,350 with a beginning fund balance of approximately \$76,252.

Section 6.

THAT the Narcotics Seizure Fund is created to account for the resources and uses of assets seized in illegal narcotics activities. The uses are limited to law enforcement activities. The Narcotics Seizure Fund is hereby approved with \$5,700 estimated revenues, \$5,700 appropriations with beginning fund balance of approximately \$35,072.

Section 7.

THAT the Debt Service Fund is hereby created to account for the accumulation of resources collected for Interest and Sinking requirements and for the disbursement of those resources for debt requirements. The Debt Service Fund is hereby approved with \$2,681,303 in estimated revenues and \$2,681,303 in appropriations. The estimated beginning fund balance is \$496,033.

Section 8.

THAT the Capital Improvement Fund is created to account for infrastructure improvements authorized by the City Council. The Capital Improvement Fund is approved with \$100,000 in estimated revenues and expenses. The estimated beginning fund balance is \$219,345.

Section 9.

THAT the Water and Sewer Fund is created to account for the resources and uses associated with the delivery of utility services to citizens of Wharton as an enterprise fund. The Water & Sewer Fund is hereby approved with \$6,032,900 in estimated revenues. Water and sewer is approved with \$6,032,900 in appropriations, which includes a franchise fee of 8% of water and sewer sales are approximately \$464,745, and transfers-out approved at \$1,181,732.

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- **Section 11. THAT** the Solid Waste Fund is created to account for the financial activities of the City's solid waste collection contract and delivery to citizens of Wharton as an enterprise fund. The Solid Waste Fund is approved with \$1,691,349 in estimated revenues and \$1,691,349 in appropriations which includes a franchise fee of 6% of solid waste revenues or approximately \$86,007.
- **Section 12. THAT** the Emergency Medical Services Fund is created to account for the financial activities of the emergency medical services provided to the city and surrounding areas as an enterprise fund. The Emergency Medical Services Fund is approved with \$2,657,636 in estimated revenues and \$2,657,636 in appropriations which includes transfers-out of \$98,412.
- **Section 13. THAT** the Civic Center Fund is created to account for the financial activities of the Civic Center as an enterprise fund. The Civic Center is approved with \$314,524 in estimated revenues and \$314,524 in appropriations. Transfers-in are approved at \$244,098.
- **Section 14. THAT** the Airport Fund is created to account for the financial activities of the Wharton Regional Airport as an enterprise fund. The Airport Fund is approved with \$378,410 in estimated revenues and \$378,410 in appropriations.
- **Section 15. THAT** the City Secretary shall file copies of this Ordinance and of such Budget with the County Clerk of Wharton County, Texas.

The U.S. Army Corp of Engineers (USACE) Lower Colorado River Phase I Report - City of Wharton Flood Prevention Project and Recommended report is located at the Wharton County Library and the office of the City of Wharton City Secretary for viewing or the report may be viewed on line at http://www.cityofwharton.com/information-a-notices/lcrb-feasibility-study. The Project Participation Agreement (PPA) has been executed. The City has hired HDR for Right-of-Way Acquisition and Jones & Carter for City and private company utility relocations. The City has acquired all properties for the project. Utility relocations for City utilities is near completion and all private utilities have been relocated or abandoned. All asbestos abatement has been completed. Phase 1 was awarded on May 27th, but due to a complication the award was terminated, and the project will need to be rebid. USACE is currently anticipating going back out for procurement in November 2022 with an anticipated award in April 2023. Phase II Acquisition is tentatively anticipated to

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be authorized by end of December 2022.

DRAINAGE:

1. Stavena Addition Drainage Project.

The design and construction plans are complete. The project is one of the construction projects to be funded with the Texas Water Development Board (TWDB) Flood Infrastructure Fund Program for partial assistance.

2. Ahldag Ditch Improvement.

The project was approved by the City Council. The ditch improvements were proposed under the Texas General Land Office (GLO) Infrastructure Grant Program. The staff is currently working with an appraiser for ROW acquisition. The project is also listed as one of the construction projects to be funded with the Texas Water Development Board (TWDB) Flood Infrastructure Fund Program for partial assistance. Project has currently been delayed due to environmental concerns with USACE permitting for jurisdictional waters.

3. On-going Drainage and Maintenance Program.

The Public Works Department has continued working on cleaning residential drainage ditches that have experienced poor drainage.

4. Pecan Acres (Mahan, Kinkaid, Delmas) Drainage Project.

Installation of the drainage pipes was completed. The City Public Works Department will be regrading ditches to improve the drainage in the area. The project is listed as one of the construction projects to be funded with the Texas Water Development Board (TWDB) Flood Infrastructure Fund Program for partial assistance.

WATER/SEWER IMPROVEMENTS:

1. On-going Water and Sewer Maintenance Program.

Water leaks and sewer failures are still being seen in the month of August.

2. Water Well and Water Plant Project – CR 222 (Halford).

Monthly progress meetings are being held. Well drilling complete and pump being installed and set in October pending electrical service connection by CenterPoint. Ground storage tank construction complete. Plant construction still in progress.

STREET IMPROVEMENTS:

1. FM 1301 Extension and Overpass Project Progress Report.

IDC Inc. has submitted to TxDOT Yoakum District Office all required plans for the project. ROW is in process of being turned over to TxDOT for construction letting in October 2022.

2. I-69 Project.

The City submitted the comments as approved by the City Council to TxDOT. TxDOT

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has informed the City that CivilCorp engineering has begun design and the City is involved in regular coordination meetings. City staff is coordinating with Quiddity Engineering on utility relocations of water and sewer lines along I-69 that will be impacted by the expansion. 3 easements will have to be acquired by City Staff to replace existing easements on US59 to relocate the existing sanitary sewer facilities. City Staff is working with TxDot and Quiddity to compose a reimbursement agreement to be brought to the City Council.

3. NanYa Exit Ramp Project.

TxDOT has been coordinating with NanYa and JM Eagle on the exit design. As of last coordination meeting the ramp has been implemented in the design with a turnaround under the FM 102 overpass to allow for easy access to the retail area on the alternate side of the Interstate.

- (a) A recreational vehicle may be parked or stored outside a mobile home or reactional vehicle park so long as no one occupies it for permanent use, no utilities are connected to the reactional vehicle, and the vehicle is not parked on or extending over public property, unless parked on the street in full compliance with the laws.
- (b) An occupied recreational vehicle may be lawfully parked or temporarily placed on any private property for a period not to exceed seven (7) days in any consecutive six-month period.





AN ORDINANCE APPROVING THE 2022 CHAMBER OF COMMERCE & AGRICULTURE HOLIDAY PARADE PERMIT AND AUTHORIZING THE POLICE DEPARTMENT TO REDIRECT TRAFFIC.

- **WHEREAS,** The Wharton Chamber of Commerce and Agriculture has filed an application for a parade permit with the City of Wharton Police Department as required under the City of Wharton Code of Ordinances, Chapter 82, Article III, Sec. 82-91; and,
- WHEREAS, The requested parade route requires the City of Wharton to close State Highway 60 (Burleson Street and Milam Street) from its intersection with Alabama Road and Polk Street and the 100 Block of South Fulton Street and South Houston Street from 5:00 p.m. to 9:00 p.m. and declare a "no parking zone" for such; and,
- WHEREAS, The closure of State Highway 60 will be for a time of less than four (4) hours; and,
- **WHEREAS,** The closure will require the detouring of all traffic according to the map (Attachment A) attached to this ordinance; and,
- **WHEREAS**, The routing of all traffic will include truck traffic to Alabama Road which is prohibited by ordinance; and,
- **WHEREAS,** The City Council wishes to suspend for the duration of the parade the enforcement of said ordinance of trucks traveling on Alabama Road; and,
- **WHEREAS,** If there are any other ordinances that would be violated because of the re-routing of all traffic their suspension is hereby authorized.

NOW, THEREFORE BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF WHARTON, TEXAS, that:

- **Section I.** The parade permit for the Wharton Chamber of Commerce and Agriculture is hereby approved.
- **Section II.** The parade route is hereby approved as detailed in the attached map (Attachment A) which is hereby made part of this ordinance.
- **Section III.** The closure of all streets as indicated in said map identified in Section II are hereby authorized.
- **Section IV.** The traffic detour plan as identified is Section III above is hereby approved.
- **Section V.** The Chief of Police and City Staff are hereby authorized to make the necessary expenditures needed to ensure the safety of the public.

CITY OF WHARTON INVESTMENT POLICY

INTRODUCTION

The purpose of this document is to set forth-specific investment policy and strategy guidelines for the City of Wharton in order to achieve the goals of safety, liquidity, yield, and public trust for all investment activity. The City Council of the City of Wharton shall review and adopt, by resolution, its investment strategies and policy not less than annually. The resolution shall include a record of changes made to either the investment policy or strategy. This policy serves to satisfy the statutory requirement (specifically the **Chapter 2256** Public Funds Investment Act, Article 342a-2 V.T.C.S. (the "Act) to define, adopt and review a formal investment strategy and policy.

INVESTMENT STRATEGY

The City of Wharton maintains portfolios, which utilize three specific investment strategy considerations, designed to address the unique characteristics of the fund groups represented in the portfolios:

- A. Investment strategies for operating funds have as their primary objective to assure that anticipated cash flows are matched with adequate investment liquidity. The secondary objective is to create a portfolio structure, which will experience minimal volatility during economic cycles. This may be accomplished by purchasing high quality, short- to medium-term securities and maintaining balances in investment pools.
- B. Investment strategies for debt service funds and debt service reserve funds shall have as the primary objective the assurance of investment liquidity adequate to cover the debt service obligation on the required payment date. Securities purchased shall not have a stated final maturity date, which exceeds the debt service payment date.
- C. Investment strategies for special projects or special purpose fund portfolios will have as their primary objective to assure that anticipated cash flows are matched with adequate investment liquidity. These portfolios should include at least 10% in highly liquid securities to allow for flexibility and unanticipated project outlays. The stated final maturity dates of securities held should not exceed the estimated project completion date.

INVESTMENT POLICY

I. SCOPE

This investment policy applies to all financial assets of the City of Wharton. These funds are accounted for in the City's Comprehensive Annual Financial Report (CAFR) and include:

- General Fund
- Special Revenue Funds
- Debt Service Funds
- Capital Projects Funds
- Proprietary Funds
- All Other Funds

II. OBJECTIVES

The City of Wharton shall manage and invest its cash with four objectives, listed in order of priority: Safety, Liquidity, Yield, and Public Trust. The safety of the principal invested always remains the primary objective. All investments shall be designed and managed in a manner responsive to the public trust and consistent with State and Local law.

The City shall maintain a comprehensive cash management program, which includes collection of account receivable, vendor payment in accordance with invoice terms, and prudent investment of available cash. Cash management is defined as the process of managing monies in order to insure maximum cash availability and maximum yield on short-term investment of pooled idle cash.

Safety

The primary objective of the City's investment activity is the preservation of capital in the overall portfolio. Each investment transaction shall be conducted in a manner to avoid capital losses, whether they be from securities defaults or erosion of market value.

Liquidity

The City's investment portfolio shall be structured such that the City is able to meet all obligations in a timely manner. This shall be achieved by matching investment maturities with forecasted cash flow requirements and by investing in securities with active secondary markets.

Yield

The City's cash management portfolio shall be designed with the objective of regularly exceeding the average rate of return on U.S. Treasury Bills at a maturity level comparable to the City's weighted average maturity in days. The investment program shall seek to augment returns above this threshold consistent with risk limitations identified herein and prudent investment policies. The cash management portfolio yield objective shall in no way limit the investment at rates below

the portfolio-yield objective, consistent with prudent investment practices.

Public Trust

All participants in the City's investment process shall seek to act responsibly as custodians of the public trust. Investment officials shall avoid any transaction, which might impair public confidence in the City's ability to govern effectively.

III. RESPONSIBILITY AND CONTROL

Investment Committee

An Investment Committee, consisting of the Director of Finance, the City Manager and the Finance and Budget Committee shall meet at least annually to determine operational strategies and to monitor results. The Investment Committee shall include in its deliberation such topics as: performance reports, economic outlook, portfolio diversification, maturity structure, potential risk to the City's funds, authorized brokers and dealers, and the target rate of return on the investment portfolio.

Delegation of Authority and Training

Authority to manage the City's investment program is derived from a resolution of the City Council. The Director of Finance is designated as investment officer of the City and is responsible for investment decisions and activities. The Director of Finance shall establish written procedures for the operation of the investment program, consistent with this investment policy. The investment officer shall attend at least one training session relating to the officer's responsibility under the Act within 12 months after assuming duties. Training must be obtained not less than once every two years and receive 10 hours of training. Such training from an independent source shall be approved or endorsed by either the Government Finance Officers Association of Texas, the Government Treasurers Organization of Texas, the Texas Municipal League, or the North Central Texas Council of Governments, University of North Texas Center for Public Management.

Internal Controls

The Director of Finance is responsible for establishing and maintaining an internal control structure designed to ensure that the assets of the entity are protected from loss, theft or misuse. The internal control structure shall be designed to provide reasonable assurance that these objectives are met. The concept of reasonable assurance recognizes that (1) the cost of a control should not exceed the benefits likely to be derived; and (2) the valuation of costs and benefits requires estimates and judgments by management.

Accordingly, the Director of Finance shall establish a process for annual independent review by an external auditor to assure compliance with policies and procedures. The results of this review shall be reported to the City Council. The internal controls shall address the following points:

A. Control of collusion.

- B. Separation of transaction authority from accounting and record keeping.
- C. Custodial safekeeping.
- D. Avoidance of physical delivery securities.
- E. Clear delegation of authority to subordinate staff members.
- F. Written confirmation for telephone (voice) transactions for investments and wire transfers.
- G. Development of a wire transfer agreement with the depository bank or third party custodian.

Prudence

The standard of prudence to be applied by the investment officer shall be the "prudent investor" rule, which states: "Investments shall be made with judgment and care, under circumstances then prevailing, which persons of prudence, discretion and intelligence exercise in the management of their own affairs, not for speculation, but for investment, considering the probable safety of their capital as well as the probable income to be derived." In determining whether an investment officer has exercised prudence with respect to an investment decision, the determination shall be made taking into consideration:

- A. The investment of all funds, or funds under the City's control, over which the officer had responsibility rather than a consideration as to the prudence of a single investment.
- B. Whether the investment decision was consistent with the written investment policy of the City.

The investment officer, acting in accordance with written procedures and exercising due diligence, shall not be held personally responsible for a specific security's credit risk or market price changes, provided that these deviations are reported immediately and that appropriate action is taken to control adverse developments.

Ethics and Conflicts of Interest

City staff involved in the investment process shall refrain from personal business activity that could conflict with proper execution of the investment program, or which could impair the ability to make impartial investment decisions. City staff shall disclose to the City Manager any material financial interests in financial institutions that conduct business with the City and they shall further disclose positions that could be related to the performance of the City's portfolio. City staff shall subordinate their personal financial transactions to those of the City, particularly with regard to timing of purchases and sales.

An investment officer of the City who has a personal business relationship with an organization seeking to sell an investment to the City shall file a statement disclosing that personal business interest. An investment officer who is related within the second degree by affinity or consanguinity to an individual seeking to sell an investment to the City shall file a statement disclosing that relationship. A statement required under this subsection must be filed with the Texas Ethics Commission and the governing body of the entity.

IV. REPORTING

Quarterly Reporting

The Director of Finance shall submit a signed quarterly investment report. The report shall summarize investment strategies employed in the most recent quarter, and describe the portfolio in terms of investment securities, maturities, and shall explain the total investment return for the quarter.

Annual Report

Within 60 days of the end of the fiscal year, the Director of Finance shall present an annual report on the investment program and investment activity. This report may be presented as a component of the fourth quarter report to the City Manager and City Council.

Methods

The quarterly investment report shall include a succinct management summary that provides a clear picture of the status of the current investment portfolio and transactions made over the last quarter. This management summary will be prepared in a manner, which will allow the City to ascertain whether investment activities during the reporting period have conformed to the investment policy. The report will be prepared in compliance with generally accepted accounting principles. The report will be provided to the City Manager and City Council. The report will include the following:

- A. A listing of individual securities held at the end of the reporting period. This list will include the name of the fund or pooled group fund for which each individual investment was acquired.
- B. Unrealized gains or losses resulting from appreciation or depreciation by listing the beginning and ending book and market value of securities for the period. Market values shall be obtained from financial institutions or portfolio reporting services independent from the broker/dealer from which the security was purchased.
- C. Additions and changes to the market value during the period.
- D. Fully accrued interest for the reporting period.
- E. Average weighted yield to maturity of portfolio on entity investments as compared to applicable benchmarks.
- F. Listing of investments by maturity date.
- G. The percentage of the total portfolio which each type of investment represents.
- H. Statement of compliance of the City's investment portfolio with State Law and the

investment strategy and policy approved by the City Council.

V. INVESTMENT PORTFOLIO

Investments

Assets of the City of Wharton may be invested in the following instruments; provided, however, that at no time shall assets of the City be invested in any instrument or security not authorized for investment under the Act, as the Act may from time to time be amended. The City is not required to liquidate investments that were authorized investments at the time of purchase.

Authorized

- A. Obligations of the United States of America, its agencies and instrumentalities, which have a liquid market with a readily determinable market value.
- B. Direct obligations of the State of Texas and agencies thereof.
- C. Other obligations, the principal of and interest on which are unconditionally guaranteed by the State of Texas or United States of America.
- D. Obligations of the States, agencies thereof, Counties, Cities, and other political subdivisions of any state having an underlying rating of not less than "A" or its equivalent. However, if the obligations are insured by municipal bonds insurance having a rating of "double-A" equivalent or higher, then the underlying rating of the obligations shall be not less than the lowest investment grade rating.
- E. Certificates of Deposit of state and national banks domiciled in Texas, a savings bank domiciled in Texas, or a state or federal credit union domiciled in Texas, which is:
 - 1. Guaranteed or insured by the Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation or its successor or the National Credit Union Share Insurance Fund or its successor;
 - 2. Secured by obligations described in A through D above, which are intended to include all direct agency or instrumentality issued mortgage backed securities rated AAA by a nationally recognized rating agency, or by Article 2529b-1, V.T.C.S., and that have a market value of not less than the principal amount of the certificates.
- F. Fully collateralized direct repurchase agreements with a defined termination date secured by obligations of the United States or its agencies and instrumentalities pledged with a third party, selected by the Director of Finance, other than an agency for the pledgor. Repurchase agreements must be purchased through a primary government securities dealer, as defined by the Federal Reserve, or a bank domiciled in Texas. A Master Repurchase Agreement must be signed by the bank/dealer prior to investment in a

- repurchase agreement.
- G. Joint pools of political subdivisions in the State of Texas, which invest in instruments and follow practices allowed by current law. A pool must be continuously rated no lower than AAA or AAA-m or at an equivalent rating by at least one nationally recognized rating service.
- H. No-load money market mutual funds who are rated no lower than AAA or AAA-m or at an equivalent rating by at least one nationally recognized rating service, registered with the SEC, provide a prospectus, have a dollar-weighted average stated maturity of 90 days or less and includes in its investment objectives the maintenance of a stable net asset value of \$1 for each share. The City shall invest in the aggregate no more than 80 percent of its monthly average fund balance, excluding bond proceeds and reserves and other funds held for debt service in no-load money market mutual funds.

Not Authorized

The City's authorized investments options are more restrictive than those allowed by State law. State law specifically prohibits investment in the following investment securities.

- A. Obligations whose payment represents the coupon payments on the outstanding principal balance of the underlying mortgage-backed security collateral and pays no principal.
- B. Obligations whose payment represents the principal stream of cash flow from the underlying mortgage-backed security collateral and bears no interest.

Holding Period

The City of Wharton intends to match the holding periods of investment funds with liquidity needs of the City. In no case will the average maturity of investments of the City's operating funds exceed one year. The maximum final stated maturity of any investment shall not exceed five years.

Investments in all funds shall be managed in such a way that the market price losses resulting from interest rate volatility would be minimized by coupon income and current income received from the volume of the portfolio during a twelve-month period.

Risk and Diversification

The City of Wharton recognizes that investment risks can result from issuer defaults, market price changes or various technical complications leading to temporary illiquidity. Risk is controlled through portfolio diversification, which shall be achieved by the following general guidelines:

- A. Risk of issuer default is controlled by limiting investments to those instruments allowed by the Act, which are described herein.
- B. Risk of market price changes shall be controlled by avoiding over-concentration of assets in a specific maturity sector, limitation of average maturity of operating funds investments to one year, and avoidance of over-concentration of assets in specific instruments other than U.S. Treasury Securities and Insured or Collateralized Certificates of Deposits.
- C. Risk of illiquidity due to technical complications shall be controlled by the selection of securities dealers as described herein.

VI. SELECTION OF BANKS AND DEALERS

Depository

A Depository shall be selected through the City's banking service procurement process, which shall include a formal request for proposal (RFP). In selecting a depository, the credit worthiness of institutions shall be considered, and the Director of Finance shall conduct a comprehensive review of prospective depositories credit characteristics and financial history. The term for depository contracts may be no longer than five years.

Certificates of Deposit

Banks seeking to establish eligibility for the City's competitive certificate of deposit purchase program shall submit for review annual financial statements, evidence of federal insurance and other information as required by the Director of Finance.

Securities Dealers

For brokers and dealers of government securities, the City shall select only those dealers that are adequately financed to conduct public business. Investment officials shall not knowingly conduct business with any firm with whom public entities have sustained losses on investments. All Securities dealers shall provide the City with references from public entities, which they are currently serving. The Investment Committee shall adopt and annually review a list of qualified brokers authorized to engage in investment transactions with the entity.

All financial institutions and broker/dealers who desire to become qualified bidders for investment transactions must supply the following as appropriate:

- -- audited financial statements
- -- proof of Financial Industry Regulatory Authority (FINRA) certification
- -- proof of state registration

- -- completed broker/dealer questionnaire
- -- certification of having read the City's investment policy signed by a qualified representative of the organization
- -- acknowledgment that the organization has implemented reasonable procedures and controls in an effort to preclude imprudent investment activities arising out of investment transactions conducted between the City and the organization

Qualified representative means a person who holds a position with a business organization, who is authorized to act on behalf of the business organization, and who is one of the following:

- A. For a business organization doing business that is regulated by or registered with a securities commission, a person who is registered under the rules of the FINRA;
- B. For a state or federal bank, a savings bank, or a state or federal credit union, a member of the loan committee for the bank or branch of the bank or a person authorized by corporate resolution to act on behalf of and bind the banking institution; or
- C. For an investment pool, the person authorized by the elected official or board with authority to administer the activities of the investment pool to sign the certification on behalf of the investment pool.

Investment Pools

A thorough investigation of the pool is required prior to investing, and on a continual basis. All investment pools must supply the following information in order to be eligible to receive funds.

- -- the types of investments in which money is allowed to be invested.
- -- the maximum average dollar-weighted maturity allowed, based on the stated maturity date, of the pool.
- -- the maximum stated maturity date of any investment security within the portfolio.
- -- the objectives of the pool.
- -- the size of the pool.
- -- the names of the members of the advisory board of the pool and the dates their terms expire.
- -- the custodian bank that will safekeep the pool's assets.
- -- whether the intent of the pool is to maintain a net asset value of one dollar and the risk of market price fluctuation.
- -- whether the only source of payment is the assets of the pool at market value or whether there is a secondary source of payment, such as insurance or guarantees, and a description of the secondary source of payment.
- -- the name and address of the independent auditor of the pool.
- -- the requirements to be satisfied for an entity to deposit funds in and withdraw funds

- from the pool and any deadlines or other operating policies required for the entity to invest funds in and withdraw funds from the pool.
- -- the performance history of the pool, including yield, average dollarweighted maturities, and expense ratios.
- -- a description of interest calculations and how interest is distributed, and how gains and losses are treated.

An annual review of the financial condition and registration of qualified bidders will be conducted by the Director of Finance.

VII. SAFEKEEPING AND CUSTODY

Insurance or Collateral

All deposits of City funds shall be secured by pledged collateral. When a pledge of collateral is necessary it must meet the following FIRREA requirements: (1) the collateral pledge agreement must be in writing, (2) the collateral pledge agreement must be approved by the depository's board of directors or loan committee, (3) the depository's approval of the collateral pledge agreement must be reflected in the minutes of the meeting of the depository's board or loan committee approving same, and (4) the collateral pledge agreement must be kept in the official records of the depository. The depository must provide the Investment Officer with written proof of the depository's approval of the pledge agreement as required herein in the form of a signed or certified copy of the minutes of the meeting of the depository's board or loan committee reflecting the approval.

In order to anticipate market changes and provide a level of security for all funds, the collateralization level will be 102% of market value of principal and accrued interest on the deposits or investments less an amount insured by the FDIC or FSLIC. Evidence of the pledged collateral shall be maintained by the Director of Finance or a third-party financial institution. Repurchase agreements shall be documented by a specific agreement noting the collateral pledge in each agreement. Collateral shall be reviewed weekly to assure that the market value of the pledged securities is adequate.

Safekeeping Agreement

Collateral pledged to secure deposits of the City shall be held by a safekeeping institution in accordance with a safekeeping agreement which clearly defines the procedural steps for gaining access to the collateral should the City of Wharton determine that the City's funds are in jeopardy. The safekeeping institution, or Trustee, shall be the Federal Reserve Bank or an institution not affiliated with the firm pledging the collateral. The safekeeping agreement shall include the signatures of authorized representatives of the City of Wharton, the firm pledging the collateral, and the Trustee.

Collateral Defined

The City of Wharton shall accept only the following securities as collateral:

All investments authorized in A-E of Section V of this investment policy.

Subject to Audit

All collateral shall be subject to inspection and audit by the Director of Finance or the City's independent auditors.

Delivery vs. Payment

Treasury Bills, Notes, Bonds, Repurchase Agreements and Government Agencies' securities shall be purchased using the delivery vs. payment method. That is, funds shall not be wired or paid until verification has been made that the correct security was received by the Trustee. The security shall be held in the name of the City or held on behalf of the City. The Trustee's records shall assure the notation of the City's ownership of or explicit claim on the securities. The original copy of all safekeeping receipts shall be delivered to the City.

VIII. INVESTMENT POLICY ADOPTION

The City of Wharton investment policy shall be adopted by resolution of the City Council. The policy shall be reviewed for effectiveness on an annual basis by the Investment Committee and any modifications will be recommended for approval to the City Council. The City Council shall review these investment policies and strategies not less than annually and approval must be reflected in the minutes of the meeting.

GLOSSARY of COMMON TREASURY TERMINOLOGY

Agencies: Federal agency securities.

Asked: The price at which securities are offered.

Bid: The price offered for securities.

Broker: A broker brings buyers and sellers together for a commission paid by the initiator of the transaction or by both sides; he does not position. In the money market, brokers are active in markets in which banks buy and sell money and in inter-dealer markets.

Certificate of Deposit (CD): A time deposit with a specific maturity evidenced by a certificate. Large-denomination CD's are typically negotiable.

Collateral: Securities, evidence of deposit or other property, which a borrower pledges to secure repayment of a loan. Also refers to securities pledged by a bank to secure deposits of public monies.

Comprehensive Annual Financial Report (CAFR): The official annual report for the City of Wharton. It includes six combined statements and basic financial statements for each individual fund and account group prepared in conformity with GAAP. It also includes supporting schedules necessary to demonstrate compliance with finance-related legal and contractual provisions, extensive introductory material, and a detailed Statistical Section.

Coupon: (a) The annual rate of interest that a bond's issuer promises to pay the bondholder on the bond's face value. (b) A certificate attached to a bond evidencing interest due on a payment date.

Dealer: A dealer, as opposed to a broker, acts as a principal in all transactions, buying and selling for his own account.

Debenture: A bond secured only by the general credit of the issuer.

Delivery versus Payment: There are two methods of delivery of securities: delivery versus payment and delivery versus receipt (also called free). Delivery versus payment is delivery of securities with an exchange of money for the securities. Delivery versus receipt is delivery of securities with an exchange of a signed receipt for the securities.

Discount: The difference between the cost price of a security and its value at maturity when quoted at lower than face value. A security selling below original offering price shortly after sale also is considered to be at a discount.

Discount Securities: Non-interest bearing money market instruments that are issued at a discount and redeemed at maturity for full face value, e.g., U.S. Treasury bills.

Diversification: Dividing investment funds among a variety of securities offering independent returns.

Federal Credit Agencies: Agencies of the Federal government set up to supply credit to various classes of institutions and individuals, e.g., S&L's, small business firms, students, farmers, farm cooperatives, and exporters.

Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation (FDIC): A federal agency that insures bank deposits, currently up to \$250,000 per deposit.

Federal Funds Rate: The rate of interest at which Fed funds are traded. This rate is currently pegged by the Federal Reserve through open-market operations.

Federal Home Loan Banks (FHLB): The institutions that regulate and lend to savings and loan associations. The Federal Home Loan Banks play a role analogous to that played by the Federal Reserve Banks vis-avis member commercial banks.

Federal National Mortgage Association (FNMA): FNMA, like GNMA, was chartered under the Federal National Mortgage Association Act in 1938. FNMA is a federal corporation working under the auspices of the Department of Housing and Urban Development, HUD. It is the largest single provider of residential mortgage funds in the United States. Fannie Mae, as the corporation is called, is a private stockholder-owned corporation. The corporation's purchases include a variety of adjustable mortgages and second loans in addition to fixed-rate mortgages. FNMA's securities are also highly liquid and are widely accepted. FNMA assumes and guarantees that all security holders will receive timely payment of principal and interest.

Federal Open Market Committee (FOMC): Consists of seven members of the Federal Reserve Board and five of the twelve Federal Reserve Bank Presidents. The President of the New York Federal Reserve Bank is a permanent member while the other Presidents serve on a rotating basis. The Committee periodically meets to set Federal Reserve guidelines regarding purchases and sales of Government Securities in the open market as a means of influencing the volume of bank credit and money.

Federal Reserve System: The central bank of the United States created by Congress and consisting of a seven-member Board of Governors in Washington, D.C., 12 regional banks and about 5,700 commercial banks that are members of the system.

Government National Mortgage Association (GNMA or Ginnie Mae): Securities guaranteed by GNMA and issued by mortgage bankers, commercial banks, savings and loan associations, and other institutions. Security holder is protected by full faith and credit of the U.S. Government. Ginnie Mae securities are backed by FHA, VA or FHM mortgages. The term pass-throughs is often used to describe Ginnie Maes.

Liquidity: A liquid asset is one that can be converted easily and rapidly into cash without a substantial loss of value. In the money market, a security is said to be liquid if the spread between bid and asked prices is narrow and reasonable size can be done at those quotes.

Local Government Investment Pool (LGIP): The aggregate of all funds from political subdivisions that are placed in the custody of the State Treasurer for investment and reinvestment.

Market Value: The price at which a security is trading and could presumably be purchased or sold.

Master Repurchase Agreement: To protect investors, many public investors will request that repurchase agreements be preceded by a master repurchase agreement between the investor and the financial institution or dealer. The master agreement should define the nature of the transaction, identify the relationship between the parties, establish normal practices regarding ownership and custody of the collateral securities during the term of the investment, provide remedies in the case of default by either party and clarify issues of ownership. The master repurchase agreement protects the investor by eliminating the uncertainty of ownership and hence, allowing investors to liquidate collateral if a bank or dealer defaults during the term of the agreement.

Maturity: The date upon which the principal or stated value of an investment becomes due and payable.

Money Market: The market in which short-term debt instruments (bills, commercial paper, bankers' acceptances, etc.) are issued and traded.

Open Market Operations: Purchases and sales of government and certain other securities in the open market by the New York Federal Reserve Bank as directed by the FOMC in order to influence the volume of money and credit in the economy.

Purchases inject reserves into the bank system and stimulate growth of money and credit; sales have the opposite effect. Open market operations are the Federal Reserve's most important and most flexible monetary policy tool.

Portfolio: Collection of securities held by an investor.

Primary Dealer: A group of government securities dealers that submit daily reports of market activity and positions and monthly financial statements to the Federal Reserve Bank of New York and are subject to its informal oversight. Primary dealers include Securities and Exchange Commission (SEC) registered securities broker-dealers, banks and a few unregulated firms.

Prudent Person Rule: An investment standard. Investments shall be made with judgment and care, under circumstances then prevailing, which persons of prudence, discretion and intelligence exercise in the management of their own affairs, not for speculation, but for investment, considering the probable safety of their capital as well as the probable income to be derived.

Qualified Public Depositories: A financial institution which does not claim exemption from the payment of any sales or compensating use or ad valorem taxes under the laws of this state, which has segregated for the benefit of the commission eligible collateral having a value of not less than its maximum liability and which has been approved by the Public Deposit Protection Commission to hold public deposits.

Rate of Return: The yield obtainable on a security based on its purchase price or its current market price. This may be the amortized yield to maturity on a bond or the current income return.

Repurchase Agreement (RP or REPO): A holder of securities sells these securities to an investor with an agreement to repurchase them at a fixed price on a fixed date. The security "buyer" in effect lends the "seller" money for the period of the agreement, and the terms of the agreement are structured to compensate him for this. Dealers use RP extensively to finance their positions. Exception: When the Fed is said to be doing RP, it is lending money, that is, increasing bank reserves.

Safekeeping: A service to customers rendered by banks for a fee whereby securities and valuables of all types and descriptions are held in the bank's vaults for protection.

SEC Rule 15C3-1: See uniform net capital rule.

Secondary Market: A market made for the purchase and sale of outstanding issues following the initial distribution.

Securities & Exchange Commission: Agency created by Congress to protect investors in securities transactions by administering securities legislation.

Treasury Bills: A non-interest bearing discount security issued by the U.S. Treasury to finance the national debt. Most bills are issued to mature in three months, six months or one year.

Treasury Bond: Long-term U.S. Treasury securities having initial maturities of more than ten years.

Treasury Notes: Intermediate term coupon bearing U.S. Treasury securities having initial maturities from one to ten years.

Yield: The rate of annual income return on an investment, expressed as a percentage. (a) Income Yield is obtained by dividing the current dollar income by the current market price of the security. (b) Net Yield or Yield to Maturity is the current income yield minus any premium above par.

Uniform Net Capital Rule: Securities and Exchange Commission requirement that member firms as well as nonmember broker dealers in securities maintain a maximum ratio of indebtedness to liquid capital of 15 to 1; also called net capital rule and net capital ratio. Indebtedness covers all money owed to a firm, including margin loans and commitments to purchase securities, one-reason new public issues are spread among members of underwriting syndicates. Liquid capital includes cash and assets easily converted into cash.
